THE 3D AUGUST, 1840.

The following Act passed by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council, on the 3d of August 1840, is hereby promulgated for general information:

ACT No. XVI. OF 1840.

An Act concerning the management of Convicts transported to places within the territories of the East India Company.

I. Whereas doubts have arisen touching the legal mode of treating Convicts transported to places within the territories of the East India Company, and it is expedient to modify the rules which have heretofore been following with regard to the management of such Convicts;

It is hereby declared and enacted, that as soon as any offender shall be delivered to the person or persons to be appointed by the Governor General in Council on that behalf at the place to which he is transported, the property in the service of such offender shall be vested in such person or persons during the term of transportation.

II. And it is hereby declared and enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor General in Council to appoint the Governor or other Authorities at any place within the territories of the East India Company, or to appoint one or more Superintendents at any such place as the persons to whom Convicts undergoing transportation shall be delivered and in whom the property in the service of such Convicts shall be vested as aforesaid.

III. And it is hereby declared and enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor General in Council to issue orders from time to time to any such Governor, Authority, or Superintendent, and which orders are hereby required to be duly executed, and to frame rules touching the classification of Convicts, their confinement,

treatment and discipline, and touching such moderate correction as may be necessary in cases of misbehaviour and disorderly conduct, and of neglect or disobedience in the service of those persons in whom the property of such service may be vested as aforesaid.

IV. And it is hereby declared and enacted, that all persons who have heretofore been transported to any place within the territories of the East India Company, and whose terms of transportation are not yet expired, shall be subject to the provisions contained in this Act, and nothing heretofore done with respect to offenders who have been so transported in conformity with the provisions of this Act, or by the orders, or with the sanction of Government, shall be called in question in any Court of Law.

THE 10TH AUGUST, 1840.

The following Act passed by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council on the 10th August 1840, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. XVII. OF 1840.

An Act for amending Regulation V. of 1831 of the Madras Code as far as the same regards penalties for certain breaches of the Salt Laws.

Whereas great inconvenience has been experienced, in consequence of sending persons accused of petty offences against the Salt Laws for trial in the Criminal Courts, who might be more conveniently tried by Magistrates as in the case of other offences subject to the same amount of punishment:

It is hereby enacted in modification of Regulation V. of 1831 of the Madras Code, that all penalties prescribed by the Madras Code for any breaches of the Salt Laws shall be recoverable before the Magistrate of the district:

Provided always, that it shall be lawful for any such Magistrate before whom any person shall be charged with the commission of any offence against the Salt Laws, at his discretion, to proceed against such person in the same manner as against persons charged with offences the punishment of which rests with the Criminal Court. Provided also, that no Magistrate shall, under the authority of this Act, punish any offender by a fine exceeding 50 Rupees, or by imprisonment with or without labor for a longer period than thirty days.

The following Act passed by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council on the 10th August 1840, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. XVIII. of 1840.

To Regulate the granting and withholding Licenses for the Sale of Liquors within the Islands of Bombay and Colaba.

I. It is hereby enacted, that all powers and duties now vested by law in Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in Bombay with respect to granting and withholding Licenses for the sale of Arrack, Toddy and other Spirituous and Fermented Liquors, within the Islands of Bombay and Colaba, shall from and after the passing of this Act be vested in and discharged by the Collector of Land Revenue, and the Senior Magistrate of Police in Bombay jointly, but the said Justices at Quarter Sessions assembled shall have power in their discretion to quash such Licenses or to withdraw the same on the breach of any of the conditions thereof.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that the Honorable the Governor in Council shall have authority at all times to regulate the form of Licenses to be granted for the sale of Arrack and other Liquors aforesaid in Bombay, and to vary and add to the terms and conditions thereof.

III. And it is further enacted, that nothing herein contained shall have the effect of repealing or altering any laws now in force touching the sale of Spirituous Liquors in Bombay or Colaba otherwise than as such laws are hereby repealed or altered.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 17th of August, 1840:

ACT No.— of 1840.

Act concerning Suits instituted under the provisions of Regulation 49 of 1793, prior to, and pending at, the date of the enactment of Act IV. of 1840.

It is hereby enacted, that Act IV. of 1840 shall not affect the trial of Suits under Regulation 49, 1793 which were pending originally or in appeal at the time of the passing of that Act, and that all such suits shall be tried and decided in the same manner as if Act IV. of 1840 had not been passed.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 17th day of October next.

OUR GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL, AT BOMBAY.

A copy having been transmitted to us, of a Despatch addressed by Sir George Gipps, to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, under date the 1st November 1839, relative to the effect of the alteration of the minimum price of Land in New South Wales, upon the interests of Naval and Military Settlers, we deem it proper, with reference to our Despatch in this Department of the 25th September last, to forward a Copy of the same, for information; and to apprise you, that Lord John Russell having had the subject under consideration, has not thought fit to direct any modification of the existing Regulations beyond that reported in the despatch, copy of which is now forwarded.

MY LORD,

In the concluding part of my Despatch No. 62 of the 1st April last, I stated to your Lordship the course which I had then adopted, with respect to the remission allowed, in the purchase of Land to Military and Naval Officers settling in the Colony, and that under the advice of the Executive Council it had been determined that all Officers who might *bonâ fide* have left England on the faith of the Regulations of the 15th August 1834, should be considered Settlers under those Regulations, and have the full benefit of them.

I have now to report to your Lordship, that difficulties having arisen in deciding upon the claims of Officers to be considered Settlers under the Old Regulations; I felt the necessity of laying down some definite Rule upon the subject, and that consequently it was fixed with the advice of the Executive Council, that all Officers who left the United Kingdom before the 1st January 1839, should have the full benefit of the Regulations of the 15th August 1834, whilst those who might leave England on or after the same day, should be considered Settlers, under the Regulations of the 1st August 1838.

As I have reason to believe that some Officers who feel themselves aggrieved under this decision have made representations on the subject to the Lords of the Admiralty, or to the

General Commanding in Chief, I feel it right to address your Lordship more at length upon the subject, and particularly to explain the way in which Officers are affected by the change in Regulations.

The Regulations of 1838 differ from those of 1834 solely by the omission of the 8th Clause, or the Clause by which Officers were allowed to take the amount of their remission money in Land, at the upset price, and without competition, provided such Land had been previously exposed to sale at public auction, and not brought under the old Regulations as under the new, the advantages held out to Officers were estimated in money and not in land, and the price at which Officers were allowed by the 8th Clause of the old Regulations to obtain Land which had been exposed to auction, was not the fixed price of 5s, but the upset price, which could never be less than 5s per acre, though it might very much exceed it whatever might be the price at which a certain piece of Land had been put up, at that price an Officer could obtain it: such at least was, (I apprehend) the meaning of the Regulations in practice, however, all Land was, with little exception, put up, until very recently, at 5s per acre, whatever might be its value, and as at every sale a good deal remained unsold, the aggregate quantity of Land which had been put up at 5s, but not sold, came to be very considerable; but of this Land, it was not difficult, for an Officer, having good means of information, and allowing himself sufficient time for enquiry, to select portions, worth considerably more than 5s, and by a local regulation, he was not confined to the exact quantity, sufficient to absorb his remission money, but was allowed to take at the same price of 5s, the excess, that there might be in the lot or lots selected by him, over what his remission money would cover. For example, a Captain in the Army, entitled to a remission of £ 200, might select two Sections of 640 acres each (one Section not being sufficient to absorb his remission money). The price of these two Sections of Land, at 5s per acre, would be £ 320; he would therefore, in addition to his remission money, have to pay one hundred and twenty pounds out of his pocket; the real value of the land, however, or what it would fetch, if again put up at auction, might be, and perhaps generally was, about 7s, it is therefore evident, that in addition to his remission money, he must gain an advantage of two shillings per acre, on the whole one thousand two hundred acres, or one hundred and twenty eight pounds, making his real remission three hundred and twenty-eight pounds in lieu of two hundred pounds. In proportion to the rise, in the value of Land, his advantage would of course be increased, and if it were so to rise, as to make the value of the Land 12s per acre, the additional advantage would be 7s on each of the 1280 acres (or £ 428), and the real remission would of course be £ 628, in lieu of two hundred pounds.

This statement will sufficiently explain to your Lordship, the dissatisfaction with which the new Regulations have been received by Officers recently arrived in the Colony. Many of those Officers have complained that they were not made aware of the change before

they left England by any public notice, either from the Horse Guards or the Admiralty; but this omission (allowing it to have been such), is one, for which, I respectfully submit, that this Government can be in no way responsible.

It seems to me extremely probable, that the altered position in which Officers are placed by the new Regulations, is not even known at the Horse Guards, as Certificates are still given to Officers, in which the General Orders issued to the Army on the 25th August 1834 are quoted, although those Officers come clearly under the Regulations of 1st August 1838. A copy of one of these Certificates, I enclose, in which the Officer is stated to be about to proceed to New South Wales, as a Settler, under the General Order of the 25th August 1834, although he obtained his first Commission in the Army subsequent to the new Regulations of August 1838.

I beg to assure your Lordship, that I am always happy to see Officers of the Army or Navy, in the Colony, and am anxious to secure them all the advantages intended for them by Her Majesty's Government; at the same time I think it my duty to say, that altho' they certainly are now in a less favorable position than they were, the real difference is, that they henceforth will get only what was intended for them, whilst heretofore they got more.

SIR,

I am directed by Lord John Russell to transmit to you, for the information of the President of the Board of Control, the copy of a Despatch, (No. 142, 1st November 1839) from the Governor of New South Wales, relative to the effect, which the alteration of the minimum price of Land in that Colony has, on the interests of Naval and Military Settlers.

Lord John Russell has had under his consideration, representations from various par-

ties affected by the recent Regulation, but His Lordship does not feel justified in directing a further modification of it in favor of Naval or Military Settlers, than that reported in the enclosed Despatch. The amount of remission which may be accorded to them, in the purchase money, must be considered as quite independent of any increase which may take place in the price of Lands, at Government Sales.

2. Parties desirous of obtaining Advances of Cash on the terms now notified, should prefer the usual application to the Opium Agent and Superintendent of Stationery.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

FOR MAKING ADVANCES IN INDIA AND CHINA UPON

The Goods and Merchandize of Individuals intended for Consignment to England, re-payable to the Court of Directors of the East-India Company.

1st. The parties to whom Advances may be made shall agree that the respective Consignments be delivered into such Warehouses as the Court of Directors may approve; and that they be subject to the control of the Court of Directors until the lien of the Company upon the Consignment shall have been satisfied.

2nd. Upon each Consignment, the value of which is to be ascertained by the Officers of the Indian Governments, or authorized Agents of the East India Company, an Advance not exceeding three fifths of such ascertained value will be made.

The rate of exchange to be determined from time to time at the place where the advance is made under the Court's orders.

3d. For repayment of the Advance, Bills of Exchange to be drawn in triplicate, at six months' sight, at the rate of

4th. The parties will be required to place in the hands of the Board of Customs, Salt and

Opium,* Bills of Lading of the Consignment and Policies of Insurance effected thereon, both in triplicate. The Bills of Lading must be drawn deliverable to the East-India Company, or endorsed to the order of the East-India Company. The Policies of Insurance must be effected in the name and on behalf of the East-India Company, as the parties interested, or endorsed to their order; but persons desirous of effecting the necessary insurance in this country, and of depositing the Policies in the Company's Treasury, will be allowed to do so.

5th. In case of default being made either in acceptance or payment of the Bills, the Court of

Directors to be authorized, in such manner and at such times as they may see fit, to sell the Goods, for the purpose of repaying the Company the amount of the Advances made thereon, including freight and any other charges or expenses which the Company may have incurred on account of the Consignment, together with Interest, should any have accrued; the Company, on the other hand, allowing Discount; where any part of the proceeds shall be realized before the Bills fall due, and the settlement of either surplus or deficiency shall be made with the Consignor; and if in India or China, by the Government or Agents from whom he received the Advance, at the rate of Exchange at which the Company may at the time be drawing Bills upon such Government or Agents.

6th. An Agent in England shall be appointed for each Consignment, to whom the Court of Directors shall be empowered to make over the Goods, subject to all the conditions agreed upon with the Company, on payment of the Bills; and with whom they shall be authorized to transact generally all business relating to such Goods. The Consignor shall be at liberty to make provision, in case of the party upon whom the Bill is drawn (being also the Agent) having failed to accept the Bill, for the substitution of another Agent.

7th. After the arrival of the Goods in England, and when they shall have been placed in such deposit as may have been agreed upon, the Agent may be put into possession of them before the Bills become due upon the amount of such Bills (less Discount) being paid, together with the Freight and any other charges and expenses which the Company have paid or may be subject to on account of the Goods.

8th. The rate of Discount to be allowed by the Company shall be the same as that charged by the Bank of England, and in cases where Interest shall have accrued, such Interest shall be computed at the rate or rates per cent, at which the Company have allowed Discount during the period for which such Interest is chargeable.

9th. Parties or their Agents will be required to insure the Goods from Fire, and deposit the Policies with the East-India Company; such Insurance to take effect from the date of the termination of the Sea Risk. Should however the Parties or their Agents fail to effect such Insurance, the East-India Company shall be at liberty to insure the Goods, the expense of which shall be reimbursed to them previously to their making over the Goods to those Parties or their Agents.

10th.
