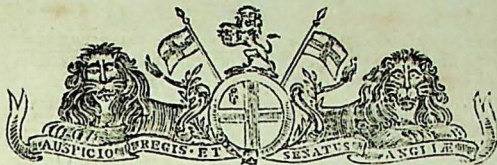

It is not intended that public intelligence, or private advertisements, and notifications should be inserted in the government gazette.

When official notifications from the government are inserted in the BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE, no communication on the same subject will be made in writing to any department concerned; but all public officers are required to take notice of such official notifications in the same manner as if they had been directly communicated to them by letter from the secretary's office, and as heads of offices alone will be furnished by government with the BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE, they will be expected to communicate to their subordinate officers all orders which may in any manner concern them.

The Bombay Government Gazettes furnished by government to public offices are to be lodged with the records, and are not to be removed from the office.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 17th August 1840:

ACT No.—OF 1840.

An Act for declaring the law touching the liability of Auction Purchasers of permanently assessed Estates under Section XXI. Regulation XI. of 1822, of the Bengal Code.

1. Whereas doubts have arisen whether the liability of Auction Purchasers, under the provisions of Section XXI Regulation XI. of 1822, Bengal Code, to make good the difference between the sums bid at a first and second sale of Lands, sold for the realization of arrears of Revenue, has been affected by the Provisions of Section VII, Regulation VII. of 1830 of the same Code.

It is hereby declared and enacted, that the said liability provided for, and imposed by Section XXI. Regulation XI. of 1822 aforesaid, has in no wise been altered or affected by Section VII, Regulation VII. of 1830 aforesaid, and that such liability shall be considered in full force and virtue, as if such last mentioned Regulation had not been passed.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 17th day of October next.

Notice

For the prevention of the Petty Piracies reported to have occurred on the Coast, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to

direct, that when any Vessel may be attacked, or may have reason to fear an attack from Pirates, and there be any of the Hon'ble Company's Vessels in sight, or be near the shore in the vicinity of a Signal Station, assistance will always be obtained by hoisting a Whelf (as shewn below) made with either a Flag, a piece of cloth or a small Sail, at the Mast Head, or Yard Arm, wherever most conspicuous.

Proclamation.

TERRITORIAL DEPARTMENT,
REVENUE, OPIUM.

1st. Notice is hereby given, that Passes for the free transit of Malwa Opium to Bombay, for importation by Sea, will be granted on application to the Opium Agent at Bombay, or to the Resident and Opium Agent in Malwa, on payment of Bombay Rupees one hundred and twenty five (125) per Chest of 140 lbs. weight.

2nd. For the convenience of importers Passes will be granted for Maunds, instead of Chests; should it be desired, but in no case will a Pass be given for less than 30 Maunds, or ten Chests.

3rd. Passes obtained at Bombay will not be given open to the persons taking them out, but enclosed in a sealed letter of advice to the Opium Agent in Malwa, who will countersign each Pass before the Opium is despatched: persons taking out Passes for Malwa Opium, that may have left that Province, will be required to satisfy the local authorities in whose district the Drug may first arrive, that it is the actual produce of Malwa, and in the event of its proving otherwise, the same will be confiscated, and the Pass money forfeited.

4th. No Duties will be exacted on account of the Hon'ble Company's Government, on Opium protected by Passes; it will however be liable, should occasion require, to examination at the different Nakas and Chowkees, when in transitu, and also on its arrival at Bombay, with the view of ascertaining that the quantity corresponds with that specified in the Pass: but there will be no detention or obstruction by the Officers of Government beyond what may be necessary for the diligent prevention of any Opium being conveyed into the Territories subordinate to this Presidency.

5th. The owners of the Opium will have to make their own arrangements for its transport. The dispatches will be accompanied by one or more Chuprasees or Peons, as the Resident and the Opium Agent in Malwa shall consider advisable, but the providing of Escorts for the protection of the Drug will rest with the owners, and Government will not be answerable for any casualties that may befall the same.

6th. It is left to the option of persons taking out Passes, to pay at the rate of Bombay Rupees seventeen (17) per Chest, in commutation of all Customs and Duties that may be due to the Native States thro' whose territories the Opium is conveyed, or to pay those Duties themselves. Opium for which this commutation money may have been paid, shall be allowed to pass equally free from Customs and Duties, whether examined at, and despatched from, Indore, or Rutlam, or other Marts in Malwa.

7th. Persons residing at Ahmedabad, Baroda, Surat, or other places, desirous of exporting Malwa Opium, under a Pass, will be furnished with the same on application to the British authorities resident at such places.

8th. The Hon'ble the Governor in Council guarantees that the price to be paid for the Passes, and in commutation of the Duties to Native States, shall continue as now fixed, to the 1st of October 1841; but the guarantee here given will not debar the Government from continuing to grant Passes after the expiration of this period, should it think fit to do so, without a further Proclamation.

9th. For the convenience of individuals, deposits of Company's Paper will be received on account of sums payable for the Passes and Duties specified in articles 1st and 6th, interest being payable to Government on the same, until redeemed, at the rate of 5 per-cent per annum; and the deposit should be redeemed on or

before the arrival of the Drug at Bombay, from which period the charge on account of interest will be doubled.

10th. Hoondies may be received by the Opium Agent in Malwa, for Passes taken out there payable to the Opium Agent in Bombay within six days after sight: if not redeemed within that period, a deposit of Company's Paper, or substantial Security must be given by the parties concerned, interest being charged at the rate of 5 per-cent until the arrival of the Opium which will be detained until payment be made. If security be not forthwith produced, the Hoondies will be returned as dishonored, and the Opium seized on its arrival.

11th. The holders of Passes are to take the Opium to Indore, Rutlam, or any other place in Malwa, that may suit the wishes and convenience of both parties, to be weighed by persons who will be appointed by the Opium Agent in Malwa to perform that duty.

12th. Fifteen days notice must be given to the Opium Agent in Malwa, or his Assistant by all persons about to make exportations under Licenses previously to the production of the Opium at the place of weighing, in order that he may be better prepared to receive, weigh, and despatch it.

13th. Only one dispatch will be allowed under a Pass or License, which dispatch may, or may not, at the option of the holder of the Pass, be to the full quantity mentioned in it, but if a smaller quantity be exported, no drawback, or refund, from the sum paid for the Pass, will be allowed on account of such deficiency, excepting in the case of parties taking out Passes at Bombay, who will be allowed a refund on account of such deficiency, on a report thereof being made to this Government by the Opium Agent in Malwa; but in the event of the actual dispatch containing a greater quantity of Opium than that for which the Pass was taken out, such excess shall be paid for at the rate specified in the 1st article of this Proclamation, and shall, by way of security for payment, be liable to detention by the Collector of Customs at Bombay until paid for.

14th. In weighing the Opium, an allowance of three lbs will be allowed for each chest of 140 lbs, on account of leakage and dustage.

15th. With the exception contained in article 8th, the Honorable the Governor in Council reserves to himself the right to adopt, from time to time, such measures as he may conceive to be necessary, to prevent the illicit trade in Opium, and to secure the object of Government in sanctioning the present arrangement.

A copy having been transmitted to us of a Despatch addressed by Sir George Gipps, to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, under date the 1st November 1839, relative to the effect of the alteration of the minimum price of land in New South Wales, upon the interests of Naval and Military settlers, we deem it proper with reference to our Despatch in this Department of the 25th September last, to forward a copy of the same, for information, and to apprise you, that Lord John Russell having had the subject under consideration, has not thought fit to direct any modification of the existing Regulations beyond that reported in the despatch, copy of which is now forwarded.

MY LORD,

In the concluding part of my despatch No. 62 of the 1st April last, I stated to your Lordship the course which I had then adopted with respect to the remission allowed, in the purchase of Land to Military and Naval Officers settling in the Colony, and that under advice of the Executive Council it had been determined, that all Officers who might have left England on the faith of the Regulations of the 15th August 1834, should be considered settlers under those Regulations, and have the full benefit of them.

I have now to report to your Lordship, that difficulties having arisen in deciding upon the claims of Officers to be considered settlers, under the Old Regulations, I felt the necessity of laying down some definite rule upon the subject, and that consequently it was fixed with the advice of the Executive Council, that all Officers who left the United Kingdom before the 1st January 1839, should have the full benefit of the Regulations of the 15th August 1834, whilst those who might leave England on or after the same day, should be considered Settlers under the Regulations of the 1st August 1833.

As I have reason to believe that some Officers who feel themselves aggrieved under this decision, have made representations on the subject, to the Lords of the Admiralty or to the General Commanding in Chief, I feel it right to address your Lordship more at length upon the subject, and particularly to explain the way in which Officers are affected by the change in Regulations.

The Regulations of 1833 differ from those of 1834 solely by the omission of the 8th Clause or the Clause by which Officers were allowed to take the amount of their remission money in land at the upset price and without competition, provided such land had been previously exposed to sale at public auction and not bought under the Old Regulations as under the new, the advantages held out to Officers were estimated in money and not in land and the price at which Officers were allowed by the 8th Clause of the Old Regulations to obtain land which had been exposed to auction was not the fixed price of 5s, but the upset price which could never be less than 5s per acre, though it might very much exceed it, whatever might be the price at which a certain price of land had been put up at that price an Officer could obtain it; such at least was (I apprehend), the meaning of the Regulations in practice, however all land was with little exception put up until very recently at 5s per acre, whatever might be its value, and as at every sale a good deal remained unsold, the aggregate quantity of land which had been put up at 5s, but not sold, came to be very considerable, but of this land it was not difficult for an Officer having good means of information, and allowing himself sufficient time for enquiry, to select portions worth considerably more than 5s, and by a local regulation he was not confined to the exact quantity sufficient to absorb his remission money, but was allowed to take at the same price of 5s, the excess that there might be in the lot or lots selected by him over what his remission money would cover. For example, a Captain in the Army entitled to a remission of £ 200 might select two Sections of 610 acres each (one Section not being sufficient to absorb his remission money). The price of these two Sections of Land at 5s per acre would be £ 320, he would therefore in addition to his remission money have to pay one hundred and twenty pounds out of his pocket; the real value of the Land however or what it would fetch if again put up at auction, might be and perhaps generally was about 7s, it is therefore evident, that in addition to his remission money, he must gain an advantage of two shillings per acre on the whole one thousand two hundred acres, or one hundred

and twenty eight pounds, making his real remission three hundred and twenty-eight pounds in lieu of two hundred pounds. In proportion to the rise in the value of Land his advantage would of course be increased, and if it were so rise as to make the value of the Land 12s per acre, the additional advantage would be 7s on each of the 1280 acres (or £ 423) and the real remission would of course be £ 623 in lieu of two hundred pounds.

This statement will sufficiently explain to your Lordship the dissatisfaction with which the new Regulations have been received by Officers recently arrived in the Colony. Many of these Officers have complained that they were not made aware of the change before they left England by any public notice, either from the Horse Guards or the Admiralty, but this omission (allowing it to have been such), is one for which I respectfully submit, that this Government can be in no way responsible.

It seems to me extremely probable, that the altered position in which Officers are placed by the new Regulations is not even known at the Horse Guards, as Certificates are still given to Officers in which the General Orders issued to the Army on the 25th August 1834 are quoted, although those Officers come clearly under the Regulations of 1st August 1834. A copy of one of these Certificates, enclosed, in which the Officer is stated to be about to proceed to New South Wales, as a Settler under the General Order of the 25th August 1834, although he obtained his first Commission in the Army subsequent to the new Regulations of August 1834.

I beg to assure your Lordship, that I am always happy to see Officers of the Army or Navy in the Colony, and am anxious to secure them all the advantages intended for them by Her Majesty's Government; at the same time I think it my duty to say, that although they certainly are now in a less favorable position than they were, the real difference is, that they henceforth will get only what was intended for them, whilst heretofore they got more :

I am directed by Lord John Russell to transmit to you for the information of the President of the Board of Control, the copy of a Despatch from the Governor of New South Wales, relative to the effect which the alteration of the minimum price of Land in that Colony has on the interests of Naval and Military Settlers.

Lord John Russell has had under his consideration, representations from various Parties affected by the recent Regulation, but His Lordship does not feel justified in directing a further modification of it in favor of Naval or Military Settlers than that reported in the enclosed Despatch. The amount of remission which may be accorded to them in the purchase money must be considered as quite independent of any increase which may take place in the price of Lands at Government sales.

Para. 3. In reply to Courts observations on the expediency of having every where some Functionary bound to receive charge of Public property when the Officer in Custody of it is prevented by any circumstance from retaining charge.

Para. 30th. You express an opinion that it must be considered the duty of every Functionary under Government to take charge of public property when required to do so. We trust that this opinion has been duly promulgated, for in the case which gave rise to our observations, all the Officers at the station declined the responsibility of taking charge of certain public stores.

MY LORD,

In the concluding part of my Despatch No. 62 of the 1st April last, I stated to your Lordship the course which I had then adopted with respect to the remission allowed in the purchase of land to Military and Naval Officers settling in the Colony, and that under the advice of the Executive Council it had been determined that all Officers who might bona fide have left England on the faith of the Regulations of the 15th August 1834 should be considered Settlers under those Regulations and have the full benefit of them.

I have now to report to your Lordship that difficulties having arisen in deciding upon the claims of Officers to be considered settlers under the old Regulations, I felt the necessity of laying down some definite Rule upon the subject, and that consequently it was fixed with the advice of the Executive Council that all Officers who left the United Kingdom before the 1st January 1839 should have the full benefit of the Regulations of the 15th August 1834, whilst those who might leave England on or after the same day should be considered Settlers under the Regulations of the 1st August 1838.

As I have reason to believe that some Officers who feel themselves aggrieved under this decision, have made representations on the subject to the Lords of the Admiralty or to the General Commanding in Chief, I feel it right to address your Lordship more at length upon the subject and particularly to explain the way in which Officers are affected by the change in Regulations.

The Regulations of 1838 differ from those of 1834 solely by the omission of the 8th Clause or the Clause by which Officers were allowed to take the amount of their remission money in land at the upset price and without competition, provided such land had been previously exposed to sale at public auction and not bought under the old Regulations as under new, the advantages held out to Officers were estimated in money and not in land, and the price at which Officers were allowed by the 8th Clause of the old Regulations to obtain land which had been exposed to auction was not the fixed price of 5s. but the upset price which could never be less than 5s. per acre, though it might very much exceed it, whatever might be the price, at which a certain price of land had been put up, at that price an Officer could obtain it; such at least was (I apprehend) the meaning of the Regulations in practice, however all land was with little exception put up until very recently at 5s. per acre, whatever might be its value, and as at every sale a good deal remained unsold, the aggregate quantity of land which had been put up at 5s. but not sold, came to be very considerable, but of this land it was not difficult for an Officer having good means of information and allowing himself sufficient time for enquiry to select portions worth considerably more than 5s. and by a local Regulation he was not confined to the exact quantity sufficient to absorb his remission money, but was allowed to take at the same price of 5s. the excess that there might be in the lot or lots selected by him over what his remission money would cover. For example a Captain in the Army entitled to a remission of £ 200 might select two sections of 640 acres each, (one section not being sufficient to absorb his remission money). The price of these two sections of land at 5s. per acre would be £ 320, he would therefore in addition to his remission money have to pay one hundred and twenty Pounds out of his pocket; the real value of the land however or what it would fetch if again put up at auction might be and perhaps generally was about 7s; it is therefore evident, that in addition to his remission money he must gain an advantage of two shillings per acre on the whole one thousand two hundred acres or one hundred and twenty eight pounds, making his real remission three hundred and twenty eight pounds in lieu of two hundred pounds, in proportion to the rise in the value of land his advantage would of course be increased, and if it were so to rise as to make the value of the land 12s. per acre, the additional advantage would be 7s. on each of the 1280 acres (or £ 428) and the real remission would of course be £ 628 in lieu of two hundred pounds.

This statement will sufficiently explain to your Lordship the dissatisfaction with which the new Regulations have been received by Officers recently arrived in the Colony. Many of those Officers have complained that they were not made aware of the change before they left England by any public notice either from the Horse Guards or the Admiralty, but this omission (allowing it to have been such) is one for which I respectfully submit, that this Government can be in no way responsible.

It seems to me extremely probable that the altered position in which Officers are placed by the new Regulations is not even known at the Horse Guards, as Certificates are still given to Officers in which the General Orders issued to the Army on the 25th August 1834 are quoted, although those Officers come clearly under the Regulations of 1st August 1838. A Copy of one of these certificates I enclose in which the Officer is stated to be about to proceed to New South Wales as a settler under the General Order of the 25th August 1834, although he obtained his first Commission in the Army subsequent to the new Regulations of August 1838.

I beg to assure your Lordship that I am always happy to see Officers of the Army or Navy in the Colony, and am anxious to secure them all the advantages intended for them by Her Majesty's Government, at the same time I think it my duty to say, that although they certainly are now in a less favorable position than

they were, the real difference is, that they henceforth will get only what was intended for them, whilst heretofore they got more.

I am directed by Lord John Russell to transmit to you for the information of the President of the Board of Control the copy of a Despatch from the Governor of New South Wales, relative to the effect which the alteration of the minimum price of Land in that Colony has on the interests of Naval and Military Settlers.

Lord John Russell has had under his consideration representations from various Parties affected by the recent Regulation, but His Lordship does not feel justified in directing a further modification of it in favor of Naval or Military Settlers than that reported in the enclosed Despatch. The amount of remission which may be accorded to them in the purchase money must be considered as quite independent of any increase which may take place in the price of land by Government sales.
