THE 14TH SEPTEMBER 1840.

The following Act passed by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council, on the 14th of September 1840, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No XIX. OF 1840.

Act for amending the procedure in cases of Appeals made in Formâ Pauperis, within the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

It is hereby enacted, that the proviso contained in Clause I. Section V. Regulation XXVIII. 1814 of the Bengal Code in regard to females of rank, shall be applicable, at the discretion of the Courts of Sudder Dewanny Adawlut of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal respectively, to any party desirous of appealing in formâ pauperis to either of those Courts.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 14th September 1840.

ACT No. — OF 1840.

An Act concerning the annexation of the Deyra Doon to the District of Seharanpore.

It is hereby enacted, that the tract of Country called Deyra Doon is for all purposes to be deemed annexed to the District of Seharanpore.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 14th day of November next.

FORT WILLIAM.

THE 5TH OCTOBER, 1840.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 5th October 1840.

ACT No. — OF 1840.

For amending the Law with respect to rates for Municipal purposes within the Town of Calcutta.

Whereas it is expedient to specify the particular purposes to which rates assessed on houses, buildings and grounds in Calcutta shall be applied; and to confine the appropriation of such rates to some only of the various purposes to which they have hitherto been deemed applicable. And whereas it is expedient to abolish the practice which has hitherto prevailed, of levying five per cent on the annual value of all houses, buildings and grounds, without reference to the amount necessary for accomplishing the purposes of the rates; such per-centage being inadequate for the purposes to which the rates have hitherto been deemed applicable, and which purposes it is proposed to limit by the present Act. And whereas it is expedient to make the per-centage leviable by quarterly rates on the annual value of property to depend entirely on the expenditure necessary or accomplishing in an efficient manner, the purposes to which the rates shall henceforth be applicable, and providing for all incidental expences and casual deficiencies or defaults. And whereas it is expedient to subject the collection and administration of the funds raised for Municipal purposes in the various districts of the Town to the management of the rate-payers themselves within such districts respectively, whenever they are desirous of undertaking the same, and are willing to enter into proper arrangements for the purpose. And whereas it is expedient to modify the provisions of the Statute 33, Geo. 3, Cap. 52 in regard to Assessments for the Town of Cal-



cutta in order for the better collection of the same, reserving all the authority of such Statute in matters not inconsistent with this Act.

It is hereby enacted, that the Assessments which by the Statute 33, Geo. 3, Ch. 52 are authorized to be made for the Town of Calcutta, shall be applicable to the following purposes only—viz. lighting, cleansing, watering and repairing the roads and streets of the said Town.

2. And it is hereby enacted, that the Assessments and rates made under the authority of the said Statute shall be sufficient for accomplishing, in an efficient manner, the purposes mentioned in the last Section, for discharging all incidental expenses, and for making up deficiencies and defaults of every kind whatsoever.

3. And it is hereby enacted, for the encouragement of the control and supervision of the Assessment and collection of the rates and the management thereof within particular districts being undertaken by the rate-payers themselves—the Justices at their Quarter Sessions shall publish quarterly the particulars of all sums laid out, and of all the expenses of collection and deficiencies during the preceding quarter within the following districts of the Town, so long as the assessment collection or management of the rates for such districts shall remain under their jurisdiction, viz. The districts of—, , ,

4. And it is hereby enacted, whenever two-thirds in number and value of the rate-payers of any of such respective districts shall apply to the Governor of Fort William in Bengal to undertake themselves the assessment, collection and management of the rates of such district, or any or either of these trusts, it shall be lawful for the Governor of Fort William in Bengal to authorise the same accordingly, at his discretion; provided always, that such majority of rate-payers shall present a scheme which shall obtain his full approbation for the safe and efficient execution of the trusts the transfer of which from the present authorities is sought for. Provided always, that in any such arrangement, the amount to be levied in any particular district shall not be considered as necessarily limited by the amount expended within such district, but shall be adjusted by the Governor of Fort William in Bengal upon reference to all local circumstances.

5. And it is hereby enacted, that for the better assessment and collection of rates under this Act, it shall be lawful for the Governor of Fort William in Bengal, to appoint such Assessor or Assessors, Collector or Collectors, and to make such union of the offices of Assessor and Collector, and to prescribe such rules and take such securities for the due execution of this Act by the person or persons employed in assessments and collections and in the management of the rates collected as he shall deem expedient.

6. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall not be necessary in any Assessment rate or Warrant of Distress under this Act to specify the names of the owners or occupiers of houses, buildings and grounds; but it shall be sufficient if every property rated be identified, and, in the case of houses numbered in any street, that the name of the street and number of the house rated be particularly specified.

7. And it is hereby enacted, that the Goods and Chattles of the owner of any property rated shall be seizable any where (except where property is concealed as hereinafter mentioned) for deficiency in the payment of rates. And that all property which shall be found upon any premises rated, shall be seizable for any arrears which

may be due for a period of one year immediately preceding such seizure. And in the case of the seizure of the property of a tenant under such circumstances, he may deduct the amount of the levy from the next payment of his rent.

8. And it is hereby enacted, that where there is ground to suspect that property liable to distress under this Act is concealed in any Zenaana, the Officer charged with the execution of the Warrant shall make a special report to the Justice granting the same, who shall thereupon follow, as closely as is practicable, the rules for the seizure of property in like cases adopted by Her Majesty's Supreme Court.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 5th day of December next.

#### NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC,

*Instructions to all Post Masters and Letter Receivers.*

*General Post Office,

The practice of sealing Letters passing to and from the *East and West Indies*, and other warm climates, with Wax, is attended with much inconvenience, and frequently with serious injury to the Letters, in consequence of the Melting of the Wax, and Adhesion of the Letters to each other.

In the case of a Mail recently received from *India*, considerable delay was occasioned at this Office, and notwithstanding the greatest care was taken in separating the Letters, which owing to the cause already mentioned, adhered closely together, many were much damaged and torn; the public are therefore recommended, in all possible cases, to use Wafers in preference to Wax, in sealing their Letters sent to *India* or other warm climates, and also to advise their correspondents in those Countries to pursue the same course.

Post Masters are also enjoined to give every publicity to this caution.

## Notification.

### GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following letter from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, dated the 4th September 1840; and directs that each Civil Servant returning to Europe under the Absentee Regulations or on Special Leave, apply to the Secretary to Government in the General Department for a Copy thereof, for his guidance.

*Para. 1.* We have to acquaint you, that we have adopted the following Regulations with respect to the grant of extensions of leave to Members of the Indian Civil Establishments repairing to this Country under the Absentee Regulations or on Special Leave of absence, vizt:

That Civil Servants coming to England under the Absentee Regulations or on Special Leave, shall immediately on their arrival, report themselves with their address, by letter to our Secretary, forwarding at the same time the certificates which they received in India.

That in all cases of leave, Civil Servants be required to join the Establishment to which they belong at the expiration of the term for which leave may have been granted, unless they shall have obtained an extension of it from us six months before the expiration of the said leave.

That extensions of leave will not in future be granted by us except in cases of sickness certified to our satisfaction, or in cases in which it shall be proved that a further residence in Europe is indispensably necessary.

That when under any such circumstances a Civil Servant shall have obtained an extension of leave to a given period, he must at the expiration thereof apply for and obtain our permission either to return to his duty or to reside a further time in Europe, failing in which he shall be liable to be struck off the List of Civil Servants.

That the Act of the 33rd Geo. 3. Cap. 52, Sec. 70 as it respects Civil Servants, applies only to cases of sickness, infirmity or inevitable accident, and that no Civil Servant be hereafter considered eligible to return to the Service after 5 years absence under that enactment, who has failed to obtain from us agreeably to the foregoing Regulations, an extension of leave under the circumstances referred to in the Act.

2nd. We desire that the foregoing Regulations be published for general information, and that each Civil Servant returning to this Country under the Absentee Regulations or on Special Leave, be furnished with Copy for his guidance.

The Governor General in Council has great satisfaction in giving publicity to the annexed copy of a Despatch from Major General Sir Willoughby Cotton, K. C. B. and K. C. H., Commanding Troops in Afghanistan, announcing a brilliant success gained by a Party of the 35th Regiment N. I. and of H. M. Shah Shoojah's Troops, over Dost Mahomed Khan and his Oosbeg Confederates.

*Camp Cabul, 20th September 1840.*

SIR.—I have the greatest satisfaction in apprising you, for the information of the Governor General, that I have this morning received accounts from Brigadier Donnie, dated the 18th instant, of a most brilliant action which took place on that day, wherein the Brigadier with 230 of the 35th N. I., 270 of the Coorkha Corps; 2 Guns, in conjunction with a party of Captain

Anderson's Cavalry, the Jaunbazes and a few Men of Captain Conolly's escort, totally routed the combined forces under Dost Mahummud Khan, and the Wallee of Khoolum, wounding the former, and capturing his Tents, Kettle-Drums, Baggage, some Standards, and the only Gun he brought into the Field (a large 16-pounder) with a further loss to the enemy of 500 killed and a proportionable number of wounded.

The Brigadier speaks in the highest terms of the conduct of the Troops of all Arms engaged which I shall fully detail when the Official report reaches me: the loss on our side, the Brigadier mentions, as comparatively small. Lieut. LeGeoyt of the Cavalry, and Captain Hart of the Jaunbazes, are the only Officers, his private letter names, as wounded.

The flight is represented as complete. Brigadier Dennie's decision and judgment, in immediately with the Force, though small, which he had with him, attacking the enemy, deserves, in my opinion, the highest praise.

This action will have the best effect and be the means of tranquillizing the spirit of insurrection which was rife in various parts of the country, and of effectually destroying all influence Dost Mahummud might have hoped to have excited. The official report shall be transmitted the moment it reaches me.
