FORT WILLIAM.

THE 5TH OCTOBER, 1840.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 5th October 1840.

ACT No.—OF 1840.

*For amending the Law with respect to rates for Municipal purposes within the Town of Calcutta.*

Whereas it is expedient to specify the particular purposes to which rates assessed on houses, buildings and grounds in Calcutta shall be applied; and to confine the appropriation of such rates to some only of the various purposes to which they have hitherto been deemed applicable. And whereas it is expedient to abolish the practice which has hitherto prevailed, of levying five per cent on the annual value of all houses, buildings and grounds, without reference to the amount necessary for accomplishing the purposes of the rates; such per-centage being inadequate for the purposes to which the rates have hitherto been deemed applicable, and which purposes it is proposed to limit by the present Act. And whereas it is expedient to make the per-centage leviable by quarterly rates on the annual value of property to depend entirely on the expenditure necessary or accomplishing in an efficient manner, the purposes to which the rates shall henceforth be applicable, and providing for all incidental expences and casual deficiencies or defaults. And whereas it is expedient to subject the collection and administration of the funds raised for Municipal purposes in the various districts of the Town to the management of the rate-payers themselves within such districts respectively, whenever they are desirous of undertaking the same, and are willing to enter into proper arrangements for the purpose. And whereas it is expedient to modify the provisions of the Statute 33, Geo. 3, Cap. 52 in regard to Assessments for the Town of Cal-

cutta in order for the better collection of the same, reserving all the authority of such Statute in matters not inconsistent with this Act.

It is hereby enacted, that the Assessments which by the Statute 33, Geo. 3, Ch. 52 are authorized to be made for the Town of Calcutta, shall be applicable to the following purposes only—viz. lighting, cleansing, watering and repairing the roads and streets of the said Town.

2. And it is hereby enacted, that the Assessments and rates made under the authority of the said Statute shall be sufficient for accomplishing in an efficient manner, the purposes mentioned in the last Section, for discharging all incidental expences, and for making up deficiencies and defaults of every kind whatsoever.

3. And it is hereby enacted, for the encouragement of the control and supervision of the Assessment and collection of the rates and the management thereof within particular districts being undertaken by the rate-payers themselves—the Justices at their Quarter Sessions shall publish quarterly the particulars of all sums laid out, and of all the expences of collection and deficiencies during the preceding quarter within the following districts of the Town, so long as the assessment collection or management of the rates for such districts shall remain under their jurisdiction, viz. The districts of \_\_\_\_\_, \_\_\_\_\_, \_\_\_\_\_.

4. And it is hereby enacted, whenever two-thirds in number and value of the rate-payers of any of such respective districts shall apply to the Governor of Fort William in Bengal to undertake themselves the assessment, collection and management of the rates of such district, or any or either of these trusts, it shall be lawful for the Governor of Fort William in Bengal to authorise the same accordingly, at his discretion; provided always, that such majority of rate-payers shall present a scheme which shall obtain his full approbation for the safe and efficient execution of the trusts the transfer of which from the pro-

vent authorities is sought for. Provided always, that in any such arrangement, the amount to be levied in any particular district shall not be considered as necessarily limited by the amount expended within such district, but shall be adjusted by the Governor of Fort William in Bengal upon reference to all local circumstances.

5. And it is hereby enacted, that for the better assessment and collection of rates under this Act, it shall be lawful for the Governor of Fort William in Bengal, to appoint such Assessor or Assessors, Collector or Collectors, and to make such union of the offices of Assessor and Collector, and to prescribe such rules and take such securities for the due execution of this Act by the person or persons employed in assessments and collections and in the management of the rates collected as he shall deem expedient.

6. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall not be necessary in any Assessment rate or Warrant of Distress under this Act to specify the names of the owners or occupiers of houses, buildings and grounds; but it shall be sufficient if every property rated be identified, and, in the case of houses numbered in any street, that the name of the street and number of the house rated be particularly specified.

7. And it is hereby enacted, that the Good and Chattles of the owner of any property rate shall be seizable any where (except where property is concealed as hereinafter mentioned) for deficiency in the payment of rates. And that all property which shall be found upon any premises rated, shall be seizable for any arrears which may be due for a period of one year immediately preceding such seizure. And in the case of the seizure of the property of a tenant under such circumstances, he may deduct the amount of the levy from the next payment of his rent.

8. And it is hereby enacted, that where there is ground to suspect that property liable to distress under this Act is concealed in any Zenana, the Officer charged with the execution of the Warrant shall make a special report to the Justice granting the same, who shall thereupon follow, as closely as is practicable, the rules for the seizure of property in like cases adopted by Her Majesty's Supreme Court.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 5th day of December next.

# GENERAL ORDERS.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

BY THE HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 29th OCTOBER 1840.

No. 702 of 1840.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased, in assimilation with the practice in Bengal, to establish the following Rules for the performance of Staff duties to Detachments of Artillery.

1st. When 2 or more Troops of Horse, or Companies of Foot Artillery or Golundauze, detached from Brigade or Battalion Head Quarters, are located together at a Station where there may be no Brigade or Battalion Staff, an Officer will be appointed to act as Adjutant and Quarter Master to the Detachment, upon the usual allowances of that situation, vizt.

If to a Detachment composed entirely of European Artillery, or of European and Native Artillery... ..	} The same as to an Adjutant and Quarter Master of European Foot Artillery, Rupees 222.

2nd. Should the Head Quarters of a Brigade of Horse, or of a Battalion of Foot Artillery or Golundauze be at the same Station with one Troop or more of Horse, or one Company or more of Foot Artillery of Golundauze, not of the same Brigade or Battalion, the Staff duties of the whole will be conducted by the Brigade or Battalion Adjutant, who will draw an extra allowance of Rupees 35 per mensem (the present rates) for Writers and Stationery, to cover the additional expenses attendant on such duties. But on establishing the foregoing provisions, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council directs, that care be taken to distribute the Head Quarters of Troops and Companies at the various Stations of Artillery, so as to prevent the necessity of employing Wing or Detachment Adjutants, except when actually required by the exigencies of the service.

3rd. These orders are to have effect from the 1st proximo, except in cases where their application would prove detrimental to officers who, on the receipt of this order, may be, or Acting as Troop or Detachment Adjutants, under former Regulations, the benefits of which they will continue to enjoy, until such Staff appointments lapse, under circumstances which would disqualify them under those Regulations.

No. 703 of 1840.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to direct, that Officers nominated to Staff situations, are to be considered, and indeed placed in charge from the date of arrival at the Station, and that when Stores are to be given over, the relieved Officer shall remain to perform that duty without receiving any remuneration on that account, or compensation for loss of Command or other allowance, occasioned by such detention.

## GENERAL ORDERS BY THE RIGHT HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL.

Fort William, 7th October 1840.

In consequence of instructions recently received from the Honorable the Court of Directors, the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council is pleased to publish the following Rules in modification of that prescribed in para. 4th of the Honorable Court's letter promulgated in the General Order issued by His Lordship under date the 29th of June 1838, and to declare them applicable to the 1st European Regiment at each of the three Presidencies.

"An Officer of the 1st European Regiment promoted in any one Wing shall take Rank Regimentally immediately on Promotion and from its date, if the Senior in both Wings of the Rank from which he is promoted, or if Senior in the Service to the Senior of his Grade in the other Wing."

An Officer promoted in either Wing, who is Junior regimentally and in the service to one or more of the Officers in the other Wing of the Rank from which he is promoted, shall not succeed to the Regimental Rank of the advanced grade thus obtained, but shall Rank by Brevet only, until the Officer or Officers of the other Wing who are his Seniors in the Service and Regimentally, shall have attained the same grade of Rank; next after the last of whom he shall take his advanced Rank Regimentally, he will notwithstanding be entitled to the pay and allowances of his advanced rank, and to its full advantages for line promotion."

No. 117 of 1840.—The Honorable the Governor in Council feels regret, with reference to those Officers of the Indian Navy, who are honorable exceptions to the cause of censure, to be called upon to publish the following Extract of a despatch from the Hon'ble Court of Directors dated the 15th July 1840, conveying the expression of their sentiments on the want of discipline, which very extensively prevails in the Indian Navy.

While the Governor in Council expresses his determination to act up to the orders therein conveyed, and rigidly to enforce the rules and discipline laid down in the Articles of War, and Naval Regulations and Instructions, he at the same time desires to entertain the sanguine hope, that the good sense, and professional esprit-de-corps of the Officers of a Naval Service, will shew itself henceforth in the zealous fulfilment of every part of their important duties, not in their letter only, but in their full spirit, for the promotion of the public Service, and that the Government may experience the gratification of observing that the Naval Instructions are acted up to by all ranks, the Seniors leading in a course of perfect and considerate discipline, and the Juniors following in the same, and thus Military Subordination with zeal, activity and efficiency be established.

*Extract from a despatch dated 15th July 1840, from the Hon'ble Court of Directors, to the Government of Bombay.*

Para. 1st. Your letters dated 26th October 1839, No. 74, and 31st December 1839, No. 97, the former reporting the occurrence of a destructive fire on board the Steamer Atalanta, and the latter forwarding the proceedings of a Court Martial held on Mr. Midshipman Zouch, the Officer in charge of the Vessel at the time the fire broke out, have occasioned us much concern. The serious damage sustained by the Vessel, and the temporary loss of her services in consequence would of themselves be sufficient cause for dissatisfaction, but our displeasure is greatly heightened by the indications which your communications on the subject afford of gross neglect of discipline, and of the prevalence of a most unbecoming and unmilitary spirit among some of the Officers of the Indian Navy.

3rd. With regard to Mr. Zouch, it appears that he has been tried by Court Martial on a charge of "most disgraceful and highly irregular conduct and neglect of duty" in four instances, on the occasion of the fire on board the Atalanta. He was found guilty of having refused to obey the lawful command of his superior Officer, Lieutenant C. W. Montriou, to proceed on board the Receiving Ship Hastings, and to consider himself under close arrest, and for this breach of Naval discipline was adjudged to be severely reprimanded, but was acquitted of the other instances of the charge, in one of which he was accused of having been in a shameful state of intoxication and unable to perform his duty. The Commander of the Forces, Sir John FitzGerald expressed his strong disapproval of both the verdict and the award, the one of which he considered to be "at variance with the most satisfactory and conclusive evidence" and the other in every respect inadequate to the serious nature of the offence of which Mr. Zouch had been convicted.

7th.

We entirely agree with Sir John FitzGerald in considering the award of a simple reprimand wholly incommensurate with the offence of which Mr. Zouch was actually convicted. The misplaced lenity of the Court is particularly to be regretted at a time when the spirit of insubordination which (as you inform us) prevails among many of the Junior Members of the Indian Navy, calls for an example of severity.

8th. It is probable, that if the Court had had the opportunity of reconsidering their proceedings, they might have taken a different view of the conduct of the Prisoner, but the dispersion of a large portion of its Members in consequence of the urgent calls of the public Service unfortunately prevented such reconsideration.

9th. As however it has been clearly proved, that on the occasion of the burning of the "Atalanta" Mr. Zouch was incapacitated for the discharge of his duty by a degree of excitement which he himself acknowledges, though he attributes it to "constitutional weakness over which he had no control" it may be questioned whether a person so situated ought to be continued on the effective list, circumstances must occasionally arise when as a Naval Officer, a charge of great responsibility may devolve upon him, or he may on a sudden emergency be placed in a situation calling for the exercise of calmness, self-possession, and deliberate judgment. In order therefore to guard against the injurious consequences to which the public Service might be exposed by the employment of an Officer really suffering under such constitutional weakness, it is our desire that, on the receipt of this Despatch, a Committee be convened, for the purpose of enquiring into the fitness of Mr. Zouch for the discharge of the duties of his profession, and if that Committee should report him unfit, we authorize your placing him on the Pension List, with an allowance not exceeding the shore pay of a Midshipman; if otherwise, Mr. Zouch must return to his duty:—but in restoring him to active service, it is our desire, in order that his punishment may be more apportioned

in the officers of which he has been convicted, and that an example may be given to the Service of which he is a Member, that the name of Mr. Zouch be placed on the list of Midshipmen eight steps lower than it stood at the time he was tried before the Court Martial.

Both Mr. Zouch will therefore take rank between Mr. S. B. King and Mr. Charles Eden.  
The lenity of discipline in the Indian Navy, which is more than once alluded to, in the Papers before us, and of which the recent disaster of the "Semiramis" as well as of the "Atalanta" affords convincing proof, requires not merely expressions of regret, but prompt and vigorous remedies. The general want of the absolute neglect, or negligent performance of the duties enjoined by the Standing Regulations of the Service, the inattention to orders, and the contempt of Superior authority exhibited on recent occasions, must not be suffered to continue. It belongs to you to watch over the preservation of discipline in the Indian Navy;—The authority you possess is sufficient to enable you, through the Superintendants, to bring and to enforce the necessary Regulations, and in the judicious exercise of that authority you may be assured of our cordial support.

Under the instructions conveyed in the foregoing despatch, the case of Mr. Zouch has been enquired into by the Medical Board, who have reported that he does not labour under any constitutional unfitness to discharge the duties of his profession, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council therefore directs, according to the instructions in the 5th paragraph of the Hon'ble Court's despatch, that Mr. Zouch return to his duty with the loss of eight steps in rank therein specified, his name being placed on the list of Midshipmen, to take rank between Mr. S. B. King and Mr. Charles Eden.
