THE 6TH JANUARY, 1840.

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Honorable the President in Council, in the Legislative Department, under date the 6th January 1840, is published for general information.

Read a second time the Draft of a proposed Act dated the 16th September 1839, and published in the *Calcutta Gazette* of the 21st of the same month, for preventing Affrays concerning the possession of Land and for providing relief in cases of forcible dispossession within the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

Resolution.—The Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council resolves that the following Amended Draft Act on the subject be re-published for general information.

ACT No.— of 1840.

An Act for preventing Affrays concerning the possession of Land, and for providing relief in cases of forcible dispossession, within the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

I. Whereas it is expedient to remove doubts which have arisen upon the interpretation of Regulation XV of 1824, and to amend the Law for preventing Affrays concerning the possession of Land, and for giving relief in cases of forcible dispossession, and to extend it to cases not hitherto provided for, and to make it applicable to persons of every class or description, whether British born subjects or others;

It is hereby enacted, that Regulation XLIX of 1793, Regulation XIV of 1795, Regulation XXXII of 1803, Section 5, Regulation VI of 1813, Regulation XV of 1824, and Regulation II of 1829, of the Bengal Code, together with so much of any Regulations as extends any of the above Regulations or parts of Regulations to any places within the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, be repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever any Magistrate or other Officer exercising the powers of a Magistrate may be certified that a dispute likely to induce a breach of the peace exists concerning any Land, Premises, Water, Fisheries, Crops, or other produce of land, within the limits of his jurisdiction, he shall record a proceeding, stating the grounds of his being so certified, and shall call on all parties concerned in such dispute (whether Proprietors, dependent Talookdars, Farmers, under Farmers, Ryots or other persons) to attend his Court in person, or by agent, within a reasonable time, and to give in a written statement of their respective claims as respects the fact of actual possession of the subject of dispute. And the Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid shall, without reference to the merits of the claims of any party to a right of possession, proceed to enquire what party was in possession of the subject of dispute when the dispute arose, and after satisfying himself upon that point, shall record a proceeding declaring the party whom he may decide to have been in such possession to be entitled to retain possession, until ousted by due course of Law, and forbidding all disturbance of possession until such time; and if necessary the Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid shall put such party into possession, and maintain him in possession until the rights of the parties disputing be determined by a competent Court.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that if the Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid shall, in the cases mentioned in Section II of this Act, be unable to satisfy himself as to what party was in possession of the subject of dispute when the dispute arose, he may attach the subject of dispute until the rights of the parties be determined by a competent Court, giving the Collector information of the attachment; and if the subject of dispute be Land, the provisions of Regulation V of 1827, regarding attachment by order of a Zillah or City Court

shall apply to attachments by order of a Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid made under this Section.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that if any party shall complain to a Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid, that he has been without authority of Law forcibly dispossessed of any Land, Premises, Water, Fisheries, Crops, or other produce of Land within the jurisdiction of such Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid whether the same were possessed by such party as Proprietor, dependent Talookdar, Farmer, under Farmor, Ryot or otherwise, the Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid shall require the party or parties complained against, and any other parties concerned to appear and make defence in person or by agent within a reasonable time; and if, after the examination of the necessary witnesses and documents, the complaint appears to him to be substantiated, he shall record a proceeding, ordering the party complaining to be put again into possession of the subject of dispute, and maintained in possession until the right to possession be determined by a competent Court; provided that no such order shall be passed unless the party complaining of having been so dispossessed prefer his claim within one month from the time of such dispossession.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that if, in cases instituted under this Act, the subject of dispute be newly formed Land, whereof it shall appear to the Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid that no party has ever had possession, the Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid shall award possession to the party to whom the right of possession belongs according to law or custom, and shall maintain that party in possession until the right to possession be determined by a competent Court.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that if a dispute arises concerning the right of use of any Land or Water, the Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid within whose jurisdiction the subject of dispute lies may enquire into the matter, and if it shall appear to him that the subject of dispute was open to the use of the public, or of any person, or of any class of persons, the said Magistrate or other Officer may order that possession thereof shall not be taken or retained by any party to the exclusion of the public, or of such person, or of such class of persons, as the case may be, until the party claiming such possession shall obtain the decision of a competent Court adjudging him to be entitled to such exclusive possession. Provided that the Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid shall not pass any such order as aforesaid, if the matter be such that the right of use is capable of being exercised at all times of the year, unless that right shall have been ordinarily exercised within three months from the date of the institution of the enquiry, or in cases where the right of use exists at particular seasons, unless such right has been exercised without discontinuance before the dispossession of which complaint is made.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that any person opposing by force the execution of an order for possession or use, given under this Act, or refusing obedience thereto, or knowingly contravening the same, as long as it shall remain in legal force, shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate or other Officer with the powers of a Magistrate, to be sentenced to simple imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, or to fine not exceeding two hundred rupees, commutable if not paid, to a period of simple imprisonment not exceeding six months, or to both imprisonment and fine as aforesaid.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that all orders passed under this Act shall be appealable in the usual manner under the Regulations and Laws that are or may be in force relating to appeals from the orders of Magistrates or other Officers exercising the powers of Magistrates.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that in cases instituted under this Act the Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid is authorized, with the consent of all the parties, to refer the matter in dispute, so far as it is cognizable under this Act, to an arbitrator or arbitrators for decision, whose award shall be executed as if it were the award of such Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid.

X. And it is hereby further provided, that this Act shall not extend to any place beyond the limits of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, or to the Settlements of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, or Malacca, or to any place situated within the local limits of the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Supreme Court at Calcutta.

Ordered, that the amended Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 6th day of February next.

THE 13TH JANUARY, 1840.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 13th January 1840.

ACT No.—OF 1840.

An Act for amending the law administered in Her Majesty's Courts of Justice with reference to Arbitrations, Damages, and interested Witnesses.

I. Whereas it is expedient to extend to the Territories of the East India Company certain provisions of the Statute 3d and 4th William IV Chap. 42, whereby remedies have been applied for the uncertainty and imperfections heretofore incident to Arbitrations, for the insufficient damages to which injured parties were limited by the technical forms of certain actions, and for the obstruction to justice frequently occasioned by reason of the legal incompetency of witnesses to give evidence in consequence of having some interest in the event of the suit to which their testimony relates.

It is hereby enacted, 3 and 4. W. 4. C. 42. that, in order to render Sec. 26. the rejection of witnesses on the ground of interest

less frequent, if any witness shall be objected to in any of Her Majesty's Courts of Justice as incompetent on the ground that the verdict or judgment in the action on which it shall be proposed to examine him would be admissible in evidence for, or against him, such witness shall nevertheless be examined, but in that case a verdict of judgment in that action in favor of the party on whose behalf he shall have been examined shall not be admissible in evidence for him or any one claiming under him, nor shall a verdict or judgment against the party on whose behalf he shall have been examined be admissible in evidence against him or any one claiming under him.

II. And it is hereby 3 and 4. W. 4. C. 42. enacted, that the Court Sec. 20. on the trial of any issue, or on any inquiry of da-

mages, in any suit before any of Her Majesty's Courts of Justice may, if it shall think fit, give damages in the nature of interest over and above the value of the Goods at the time of the conversion or seizure in all actions of trover or trespass de bonis asportatis and over and above the money recoverable in all actions or policies of assurance made after the passing of this Act.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that the power and authority of any arbitrator or umpire appointed by or in pursuance of any rule of Court, or Judge's order, or order of reference, in any action now brought or which shall be hereafter brought or by or in pursuance of any submission to reference containing an agreement that such submission shall be made a rule of any of Her Majesty's Supreme Courts, shall not be revocable by any party to such reference without the leave of the Court by which such rule or order shall be made or which shall be mentioned in such submission, or by leave of a Judge, and the arbitrator or umpire shall and may, and is hereby required to proceed with the reference notwithstanding any such revocation, and to make such award, although the person making such revocation shall not afterwards attend the reference, and that the Court, or any Judge thereof may from time to time enlarge the term for any such arbitrator making his award.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that when any reference shall have been made by any such rule or order as aforesaid, or by any submission containing such agreement as aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the Court by which such rule or order shall be made, or which shall be mentioned in such agreement, or for any Judge by rule or order to be made for that purpose to command the attendance and examination of any person to be named, or the production of any documents to be mentioned in such rule or order, and the disobedience to any such rule or order shall be deemed a contempt of Court, if, in addition to the service of such rule or order, an appointment of the time and place of attendance in obedience thereto, signed by one at least of the Arbitrators, or by the Umpire, before whom the attendance is required, shall also be served either together with or after the service of such Rule or Order; Provided always, that every person whose attendance shall be so required, shall be entitled to the like conduct money and payment of expences, and for loss of time as for and upon attendance at any trial: Provided also, that the application made to such Court or Judge for such Rule or Order shall set forth the place where such witness is residing at the time, or satisfy such Court or Judge that such person cannot be found: Provided also, that no person shall be compelled to produce under any such Rule or Order any writing or other document that he would not be compelled to produce at a trial, or to attend at more than two consecutive days to be named in such Order.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that when in any Rule or Order of reference, or in any submission to arbitration containing an agreement that the submission shall be ordered or agreed that the witnesses upon such reference shall be examined upon oath, it shall be lawful for the Arbitrator or Umpire, or any one Arbi-

trator, and he or they are hereby authorized and required to administer an oath to such witnesses, or to take their affirmation in cases where affirmation is allowed by law instead of oath, and if upon such oath or affirmation any person making the same shall wilfully and corruptly give any false evidence, every person so offending shall be deemed and taken to be guilty of perjury, and shall be prosecuted and punished accordingly.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that this Act shall take effect in Calcutta from the day of its passing, and at Madras and Bombay after the expiration of thirty days from such day, and in the Straits Settlements after the expiration of sixty days from such day.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 13th day of April next.

THE 27TH JANUARY, 1840.

The following Act is passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council on the 27th of January, 1840, with the assent of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India, which has been read and recorded:

Ordered, that the Act be promulgated for general information.

ACT No. I of 1840.

An Act for regulating the Procedure on Trials referred to the Court of Foujdaree Udawlut at Madras.

I. Whereas the dispensing with a Futwa, in cases referred to the Court of Foujdaree Udawlut at Madras, will be attended with great convenience, and the Futwa may be dispensed within that Court, without altering or impairing the authority of the Mahometan Law:—It is, therefore, hereby enacted, that in Trials referred to, the said Court of Foujdaree Udawlut at Madras, that Court shall not be required to take a Futwa from their Law Officers. Provided always, that nothing in this Act contained shall authorize the said Court to dispense with the Mahometan Law in any case, which, before the passing of this Act, would have been determinable according to that Law by the said Court.

THE 27TH JANUARY, 1840.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 27th of January, 1840.

ACT No.—of 1840.

An Act for authorizing the appointment of Uncovenanted Servants to the Offices of Deputy Register and Assistant Register to the Sudder Courts of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

It is hereby enacted, that whenever the Governor of Bengal, and the Lieutenant Governor, or other authority exercising the powers of Lieutenant Governor of the North Western Provinces; shall deem it expedient to appoint any persons not being Covenanted Servants to the Offices of Deputy Register or Assistant Register to

the Courts of Sudder Dewanny and Nizamut Adawlut at Calcutta and Allahabad respectively, it shall be competent to those Courts to assign to the Officers above named any duties at present performed by their Registers.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 27th day of March next.

The Gram to be unexceptionable, completely cleansed, and of the quality and description generally used by the Mounted Corps at Mhow, and to be delivered free of all expense to Government, on account of carriage &c. at the Commissariat Godowns at that Station, and in case of any dispute, the opinion of a Committee to decide the point, and to be final.

The contractor is to lodge in the Commissariat Granary, a stock of Gram equal to 3 months consumption, and to keep that supply for nine months, when it will be gradually expended in fulfilment of this engagement.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 3rd FEBRUARY 1840.

No. 60 of 1840.—The Government of India having declared the provisions of the General Order No. 120, issued by that Government under date the 15th August 1838, to be applicable to all the Presidencies, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to republish the same for the information of the Army.

No. 120 of 1838.—In conformity with instructions received from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council is pleased to publish the following scales, regulating the grant of Pensions and Allowances to the several ranks of the Native Army, for wounds received in Action; those for the Commissioned grades being strictly governed by the rules applicable to European Officers, and published in General Orders Vice President, No. 90 of the 3rd June 1831.

These Pensions being granted as a Compensation for the permanent disability sustained by wounds received in action, may be held together with any other pension, pay, and allowances, to which a Native Officer or Soldier may be entitled, without any deduction on account thereof.

No. 92 of 1840.—His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir Thomas McMahon, Bart. K. C. B. appointed by the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, to be Commander in Chief of the Company's Forces serving under the Presidency of Bombay, having this day taken the Oaths and his Seat as Second in Council of Bombay, the Honorable the Governor in Council orders and directs, that all Officers and Soldiers, on the Establishment of Bombay, do obey Lieutenant General Sir Thomas McMahon, Bart. K. C. B. and that all returns be made to him as Commander in Chief accordingly.

The following Commission, appointing Lieutenant General Sir Thomas McMahon, Bart. K. C. B. Commander in Chief of the Hon'ble Company's Forces serving under this Presidency, is published for general information.

THE HON'BLE EAST INDIA COMPANY.

To Lieutenant General Sir Thomas McMahon, Baronet, and Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath.

We the said Company reposing especial trust and confidence in you Lieutenant General Sir Thomas McMahon, Bart. do by these Presents constitute and appoint you to be Commander of our Military Forces belonging to and under the Presidency of Bombay in the East Indies, except such Forces as are, or may be employed in our said Service within the Fort, Garrison, and Town of Bombay, to take the said Office upon you from and immediately after your arrival at the said Presidency, and to hold the same during our Will and Pleasure. And you are to the utmost of your skill and power to do and perform all such Offices and Services as appertain to the Post of Commander of our Military Forces belonging to and under the said Presidency, except as before is excepted, subject however to all such rules, orders, and instructions as you shall at any time receive from the Court of Directors of us the said East India Company, in writing under the hands of Thirteen or more of them, or from the Governor in Council of Bombay, or from the Governor General of India in Council, or from the Commander in Chief of all our Forces in the East Indies for the time being, when he shall be resident within the Presidency of Bombay aforesaid, or within any Settlement or Place subordinate thereto, according to the rules and discipline of War, in pursuance of the trust hereby reposed in you, and we do hereby strictly require, charge, and command all Commissioned Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, Soldiers and others belonging to our Military Forces under the Presidency of Bombay beforementioned, except as before is excepted, to yield you as their Commander, due obedience accordingly, and we do hereby revoke, and annul all and every former Commission and Commissions to any person or persons to act as Commander in Chief of our Forces under the said Presidency of Bombay, except as before is excepted, from the time that you shall take the said Office upon you under and by virtue of this present Commission—Given under our common Seal this Twenty-eighth day of November in the 3rd year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and thirty nine.
