FORT WILLIAM,

THE 15TH MARCH, 1841.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 15th of March 1841.

ACT No.—OF 1841.

An Act to enable Her Majesty's Supreme Courts within the Territories of the East India Company to give relief against adverse claims made upon persons having no interest in the subject of such claims.

I. Whereas it often happens that a person sued at Law for the recovery of Money or Goods wherein he has no interest, and which are also claimed of him by some third party, has no means of relieving himself from such adverse claims but by a suit in Equity against the Plaintiff, and such third party usually called a Bill of Interpleader which is attended with expence and delay.

It is hereby enacted, that upon application made by or on the behalf of any Defendant sued in any of Her Majesty's Supreme Courts in any action of Assumpsit, Debt, Detinue, or Trover, such application being made after declaration and before plea by Affidavit or otherwise, showing that such Defendant does not claim any interest in the subject matter of the suit, but that the right thereto is claimed or supposed to belong to some third party who has sued or is expected to sue for the same, and that such Defendant does not in any manner collude with such third party, but is ready to bring into Court, or to pay or dispose of the subject matter of the action in such manner as the Court (or any Judge thereof) may order or direct, it shall be lawful for the Court, or any Judge thereof to make rules and orders calling upon such third party to appear and to state the nature and particulars of his claim, and maintain or relinquish his claim, and upon such rule or order to hear the allegations as well of such third party as of the Plaintiff, and in the mean time to stay the proceedings in such action, and finally to order such third party to make himself Defendant in the same or

some other action, or to proceed a trial on one or more feigned issue or issues, and also to direct which of the parties shall be Plaintiff or Defendant on such trial, or with the consent of the Plaintiff and such third party, their Counsel or Attornies to dispose of the merits of their claims, and determine the same in a summary manner, and to make such other rules and orders therein as to costs, and all other matters as may appear to be just and reasonable.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that the judgment in any such action or issue as may be directed by the Court or Judge, and the decision of the Court or Judge in a summary manner shall be final and conclusive against the parties and all persons claiming by, from, or under them.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that if such third party shall not appear upon such rule or order to maintain or relinquish his claim being duly served therewith, or shall neglect or refuse to comply with any rule or order to be made after appearance, it shall be lawful for the Court or Judge to declare such third party, and all persons claiming by, from, or under him to be forever barred from prosecuting his claim against the original Defendant, his Executors or Administrators; saving nevertheless the right or claim of such third party against the Plaintiff; and thereupon to make such order between such Defendant and the Plaintiff, as to costs or other matters, as may appear just and reasonable.

IV. And it is hereby provided, that every order to be made in pursuance of this Act by a single Judge not sitting in open Court, shall be liable to be rescinded or altered by the Court in like manner as other orders made by a single Judge.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that if upon application to a Judge, in the first instance, or in any later stage of the proceedings he shall think the matter more fit for the decision of the Court, it shall be lawful for him to refer the matter to the Court, and thereupon the Court shall and may hear and dispose of the same in the same manner as if the proceeding had generally commenced by the Rule of Court instead of the order of a Judge.

VI. And whereas difficulties sometimes arise in the execution of process against Goods and Chattels issued by or under the authority of the said Courts by reason of claims made to such Goods and Chattels by Assignees of Bankrupts and other persons not being the parties against whom such process has issued, whereby Sheriffs and other Officers are exposed to the hazard and expence of actions, and it is reasonable to afford relief and protection in such cases as such Sheriffs and other Officers, it is therefore hereby further enacted, that when any such claim shall be made to any Goods or Chattels taken or intended to be taken in the execution under any such process or to the proceeds of value thereof, it shall and may be lawful to and for the Court from which such process issued upon application of such Sheriff or other Officers made before or after the return of such process, and as well before as after any action brought against such Sheriff or other Officer, to call before them by Rule of Court as well the party issuing such process as the party making such claim, and thereupon to exercise for the adjustment of such claims and the relief and protection of the Sheriff or other Officer, all or any of the powers and authorities hereinbefore contained, and make rules and decisions as shall appear to be just, according to the circumstances of the case, and the costs of all such proceedings shall be at the discretion of the Court.

VII. And it is hereby enacted that all Rules, Orders, Matters and Decisions to be made and done in pursuance of this Act, except only the Affidavits to be filed, may together with the declaration in the cause, if any, be entered of record with a note in the margin, expressing the true date of such entry, to the end that the same may be evidence in future times if required, and to secure and enforce the payment of costs directed by any such Rule or Order, and every such Rule or Order so entered shall have the force and effect of a judgment except only as to becoming a charge on any Lands, Tenements or Hereditaments; and in case any cost shall not be paid within fifteen days after notice of the taxation and amount thereof given to the party ordered to pay the same, his Agent or Attorney, execution may issue for the same by Fieri Facias, or Capias ad satisfaciendum, adapted to the case, together with the costs of such entry, and of the execution if by Fieri Facias, and such Writ or Writs may bear Teste on the day of issuing the same, whether in term or vacation, and the Sheriff or other Officer executing any such Writ shall be entitled to the same fees, and no more as upon any similar Writ grounded upon a judgment of the Court.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 15th day of June next.

No. 221 of 1841.—In accordance with the system in force under the Bengal Presidency, the Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to relieve Officers, in charge of Troops and Companies, from the expense of providing lights for their Barracks and Regimental Guard Rooms, and to direct, that the same be henceforth a public charge.

2nd. Each occupied Barrack Room of European Regiments, will be allowed two lights, one of which will be extinguished atattoo beating, the other to burn all night. To each European and Native Corps, one light to burn all night will be allowed for the use of the Quarter Guard.

3rd. The allowance of Oil for each lamp, to burn the whole night, is from the 1st April to the 1st October five ounces, from the 1st October to the 1st April six ounces; for all lamps requiring to be extinguished atattoo beating, two ounces, at all seasons.

4th At stations where there is a Barrack Master, or other Officer in charge of public Buildings, the supply will be made by him, on regular requisitions from Corps, shewing the number of lights of each description, for which Oil is required—Native Corps, at Stations where there is no supplying Officers, will obtain Oil for lighting the Quarter Guard, by a Contingent Bill, the amount of which, will be regulated by the current price of the Bazar.

5th. The necessary allowance will be made to the Barrack Department, for the supply of wicks and waste, under the direction of the Military Board.

6th. The above arrangements are to have effect from the 1st May next.

The Honorable the Governor in Council having recently had under his consideration a Narrative of the

140 Rank and File of the 5th Regiment Bombay Native Infantry and one 12 pounder Howitzer in charge of Lieut. D. Erskine of the Artillery.

proceedings of a Detachment of the Strength named in the margin, under the Command of Captain Lewis Brown, of the 5th Regiment Native Infantry, in retaining possession for a period of nearly five months of the Fort of Kahun, in defiance of repeated attempts of the Enemy to dislodge them, has the highest gratification in publicly recording the high sense he entertains of the distinguished services of Captain Brown and the Detachment under his Command.—In maintaining this post, Captain Brown has reported to Government, that he was most ably seconded by Lieutenant D. Erskine, of the Artillery, and by Mr. Assistant Surgeon

Glasse, who was in medical charge of the Gar rison.

Notwithstanding the critical position in which the Garrison was placed, and the privations to which they were exposed, Captain Brown nobly refused to surrender the Fort until the last extremity, and then only, after he had secured for himself and brave Comrades, a safe retreat, with all the honors of War. The Governor in Council believes, that there are few instances on record, where under circumstances of such great discouragement, a dangerous and harrassing service, attended by severe privations, has been performed with greater cheerfulness, or with a more zealous devotion to the public service.

In order to testify his admiration, of the gallantry, prudence, and perseverance, which distinguished the conduct of Captain Brown in the defence of Kahun, and the fidelity and bravery of the Officers and Men under his command, the Governor in Council, with the sanction of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council, is pleased to direct :—

First.—That in consideration of the honor conferred on the 5th Regiment Native Infantry, by the conduct of the Detachment of that Corps, in the defence of Kahun, this Regiment shall be permitted to have "Kahun" inscribed on their Colors, and borne on their appointments.

Second.—That in consideration of the losses of the Detachment, arising from want of Carriage and other causes, a Donation of six months Batta shall be granted to the Survivors of the Garrison of Kahun, and the Heirs of those who fell in it's defence.

Third.—That this order be read at the Head of every Regiment of the Army of this Presidency, at a Special Parade to be held for this purpose.

The Hon'ble the the Governor in Council will likewise have great satisfaction in bringing the distinguished services of Captain Brown and the Officers and Men, who composed the Garrison of Kahun, to the favorable notice of the Honorable the Court of Directors.

10. The Promissory Notes of this Loan shall not be renewed or sub-divided except by the Accountant General at Fort William. But the Accountants General at Fort St. George and Bombay will, on application of the Proprietors of such Notes, and the payment of the established fees, transmit them to the Accountant General in Bengal for the purpose of being renewed, or sub-divided free of all further expence. In other respects the practice and rules heretofore in use in regard to the renewal and sub-division of Promissory Notes will be adhered to,

11. The Notes of this Loan shall be advertised for discharge relatively to the 5 per cent Loans of 1825, and 16th January 1830, in the order of their date, and the several Notes of this Loan shall be advertised for payment in the inverse order, in which they shall have been placed on the General Register, that is to say, the Notes last brought on the Register shall be first liable to be discharged. But all Notes advertised at the same time for payment shall become payable on demand, without regard to priority, at the expiration of the notice. Government shall also be at liberty to advertise other Notes for payment without waiting for the expiration of pending notices, and to discharge the Notes so subsequently advertised at the expiration of the notice relating to them notwithstanding the Holders of Notes comprised in prior advertisements may have omitted by themselves, or their Attornies duly authorized to apply for payment.
