The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 24th of May 1841.

Act No. — OF 1841.

An Act concerning the taking of Oaths of Qualification by Justices of the Peace.

Whereas inconvenience has arisen in consequence of pursuing the course deemed necessary for taking of Oaths by Justices of Peace, in order that they may be duly qualified to act under Commissions of the Peace;—It is hereby enacted that all persons who are or shall be nominated and appointed in any Commission of the Peace, shall be capable of acting as Justices of the Peace in every respect, according to the tenor of such Commission, upon taking and subscribing in any Civil or Criminal Court of Justice within the places in and for which any such Commission shall have issued before the Officer presiding in such Court, whether such Officer be a Justice of the Peace or not, the Oaths appointed to be taken by Justices of the Peace, and the subscription of such persons to the said Oaths shall be deposited and kept with the Records of the Courts of Justice in which the said Oaths shall have been administered.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 24th day of August next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 31st May 1841.

ACT NO. — OF 1841.

An Act for prohibiting the importation of Rum and Rum Shrub into the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

I. It is hereby enacted, that if any person after the passing of this Act, lands or attempts to land, or shall introduce by land in any part of the Territories subject to the Government of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, any Rum or Rum Shrub, which is the produce of any foreign Country, or of any British possession into which Foreign Sugar or Rum can be legally imported, such Rum or Rum Shrub shall be seized by the Collector of the Customs, or by any other Officer authorized to seize and detain Contraband Goods, and shall be brought to confiscation according to the Rules in force for confiscating such Goods, unless the District in which such Rum or Rum Shrub is landed, or in which an attempt has been made to land such Rum or Rum Shrub be a District in which the Governor General of India in Council has authorized the importation of such Rum or Rum Shrub, and it shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council to authorize the importation of such Rum and Rum Shrub into any District of the Territories aforesaid by an Order in the Official Gazette.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that if any owner of Rum or Rum Shrub, the produce of the said Territories, or the duly authorized Agent of such Owner, desirous to obtain a Certificate of origin from the Collector or Assistant Collector of the Land or Customs Revenue of any District within the said Territories, or from any other Officer appointed by the Governor General of India in Council to give such Certificates, such Owner or Agent shall, in the presence of the Officer from whom he desires to obtain such Certificate, make and subscribe a Declaration in the Form contained in the Schedule hereunto annexed marked A, and to the said Declaration shall be appended a Certificate to its verity from any Government Officer who may be attached to

the Distillery where such Rum or Rum Shrub is declared to have been manufactured in the form prescribed in the said Schedule A.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that if the District be one into which the Governor General of India in Council has not, by any Order, authorized the importation of Foreign Sugar or Rum, or of Sugar or Rum the growth or produce of any British Possession into which Foreign Sugar or Rum can be legally imported, then the Officer before whom such a Declaration as is aforesaid shall have been made, shall grant under his hand and seal to the Declarant a Certificate in the form contained in the Schedule hereunto annexed marked B.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that every person who intends to ship Rum or Rum Shrub from any place within the said Territories for any part of the United Kingdom, shall be entitled to produce to the Collector of Customs at that place, or to any other Officer who may have been appointed by the Governments of the respective Presidencies to act on that behalf in place of the Collector of Customs a Certificate, such as is above described, and also in the presence of the Officer to whom he has so produced such Certificate to make and subscribe a Declaration in the form contained in the Schedule hereunto annexed marked C.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that the Officer to whom such a Certificate shall have been so produced, and before whom a Declaration in the last mentioned form shall have been so made and subscribed, shall, unless he see cause to deem such Declaration fraudulent and untrue, grant to the person who has made the last mentioned Declaration a Certificate in the form contained in the Schedule hereunto annexed marked D.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that the Owner of Rum or Rum Shrub intended for exportation under this Act, or the duly authorized Agent of such Owner shall not be entitled to any of the Certificates described in this Act unless such Rum or Rum Shrub shall be the produce of a Distillery worked according to law in the European method under License from the Board or other authority vested with the management of the Revenue derived from the Abkarry or Tax on Spirits.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that the Rum and Rum Shrub manufactured for exportation to the United Kingdom under this Act at any Licensed Distillery shall be manufactured pure without admixture of spirits made from Rice, Grains, or any other substance or substances not being the produce of the Sugar Cane or of the Date or Palm-tree, and shall be so declared and verified at the time of application for export according to the form of Schedule A.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that if any Rum or Rum Shrub that may be brought to any Custom House for exportation under this Act shall be found to be adulterated or mixed contrary to the above prohibition, the same with the casks or materials in which it is contained shall be seized and confiscated, and the party or parties upon whose Declaration Certificate of manufacture free from adulteration or mixture may have been granted for the admission of such Rum or Rum Shrub to the privilege of exportation under this Act, as well as the party or parties who may have verified such Declaration, shall be proceeded against for the false and fraudulent Declaration as hereinunder prescribed.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that any person who shall in making any Declaration under the authority of this Act, knowingly affirm an un-

truth, shall on conviction thereof before such Court, as would be competent to try such person for perjury, be punished as in cases of perjury; and every person procuring another person to affirm such untruth shall be liable to be punished as in cases of subornation of perjury, and any Officer of Government subscribing an attestation to the verity of such Declaration knowing the same to be untrue, shall be subject to a like penalty as the false Declarant, besides dismissal from the employment of Government.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the Meeting of the Legislative Council of India on the 7th day of June in next week.

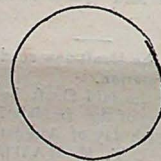

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 31st of May, 1841.

ACT No. _____ OF 1841.

An Act for consolidating, amending and extending the law relating to the Registration of Assurances.

1. It is hereby enacted, that Regulations XXXVI. 1793, XXVIII. 1795, XVII. 1803. and Section 17, Regulation VIII. 1805 so far as it relates to Regulation XVII. 1803, also Section 32; Regulation XII. 1805, Regulation XXII. 1812 and Regulation IV. 1824 of the Bengal Code. Regulation XVII. 1802 of the Madras Code, and Regulation IX. 1827 of the Bombay Code and Act No. XXX. 1838, be repealed:

II. And it is hereby enacted, that the Local Government of each Presidency shall on or before the _____ day of _____ establish at and for each Presidency, Town and each Zillah Station, and such Districts of smaller extent as may be deemed necessary, an Office for the Registering of Assurances, and shall appoint such persons to superintend those offices and shall assign to them such salaries and establishments and shall take such securities for the due performance of their duties, and shall frame such rules for their guidance not inconsistent with this Act, as may seem fit.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that all Assurances to be made, passed or executed after the said _____ day of _____ by which any lands within the said Presidency, Towns or the said Zillahs shall be in any way affected at Law or in Equity may be registered at the local Register Office of the Town or Zillah or other district in which the said lands or the greater part of them may be situated in the manner hereinafter directed.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that every decree or order of any Court and every Will or Codicil, and every Contract, Memorandum, Receipt or other writing whatsoever by which any estate or interest in any lands shall be created, transferred or otherwise affected, and every writing which shall be the evidence of any act or matter whereby any such estate or interest shall be created, transferred or otherwise affected, shall be considered as an Assurance affecting such lands within the meaning of this Act: and every person whose estate or interest in any lands shall be transferred or determined in whole or in part by any Assurance shall be considered as the grantor of such Assurance.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that where any Will by which any lands within the said Presidency, Towns or the said Zillahs shall be in any way affected at Law or in Equity, shall have been made, passed or executed on or before the said day of and the testator shall die after the said day of such Assurance may be in like manner registered at the local Register Office of the Town or Zillah as the case may be.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that where any lands shall form part of the personal estate of any person deceased, every Will duly proved or Letters of Administration by which the personal representative of such person deceased shall be appointed, or by which the appointment of such personal representative shall be revoked, or by which the right to the personal representation of such person deceased shall be in any way regulated, shall be considered as affecting such land.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that any person may require a Caveat to be entered in the Register for any Town or District, against his own acts and in favor of any other person, for the protection of any Assurance affecting any lands within such Town or District, which shall have been made and executed, or shall be in progress, or shall have been in contemplation at the time of entering such Caveat.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that every requisition for a Caveat shall be made in writing, and shall be signed by the grantor thereof, and shall name or describe the person in whose favor the Caveat is to be entered, and shall specify or describe the lands which it is intended should be affected thereby, and the time during which such Caveat shall remain in force, which time shall not exceed 6 months from the date of the Caveat.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that every requisition for a Caveat at which may be deposited at the Register's Office, shall be registered in the same Register, and under the same load, and in the same manner, as the Assurance to be protected by such Caveat would, under the provisions of this Act, have been registered if the same had been registered at the time of entering such Caveat.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that the Registrar to whom an Assurance may be presented for registry shall immediately note upon it the day, hour and minute of presentation, and shall cause an exact copy of it to be entered in a book according to the order in which it is presented, or if two or more Assurances shall be received at the same time then according to their respective dates, and shall attest the copy with his signature and with the signature of the party by whom the deed is presented, and shall then return the original with a certificate under his signature endorsed thereon specifying the day, hour and minute of receipt and of registry with references to the book containing the registry thereof, and the page and number under which the same shall have been entered therein.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that every Assurance by his Act authorized to be registered (except as hereinafter provided) shall, so far as regards any lands to be affected thereby, be void as against any person claiming under any subsequent Assurance duly registered, unless the prior Assurance shall have been duly registered before the registration of the subsequent Assurance; any alleged notice of such prior Assurance notwithstanding.

XII. Provided however, and it is hereby enacted, that every Will which shall be registered within the space of one year after the death of

the testator, shall be as valid and effectual as if the same had been registered immediately after the death of such testator.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that where any Assurance for the protection of which a Caveat shall have been entered shall be executed by the grantor of such Caveat, or by any person who shall claim under him, and shall also be executed by the person in whose favor such Caveat shall have been entered, or by his Executors, Administrators, or any other person entitled to the benefit thereof, and shall be duly registered within the time not exceeding six months for which the Caveat shall have been registered, such Assurance shall be entitled to the same preference and protection as if the same had been registered at the time of entering the Caveat.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that any person may apply to a Register Office for an office copy or extract of any Assurance or other document registered thereat; and thereupon such copy or extract shall be prepared and a certificate signed by the Registrar shall be written or endorsed thereupon, which certificate shall state that such copy or extract is an examined copy or extract of the Assurance or other document registered; and shall specify the book and the place in which such Assurance or other document has been registered.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that any person may on application at a Register Office, be allowed to inspect and search any of the registers to be kept at the said offices; and to take extracts from any such registers, subject to such Regulations as shall be made in pursuance of this Act.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that all office copies, extracts and certificates to be provided under this Act, and all receipts to be given under this Act for the payment of fees and for deposits, unless the same be required to be given in evidence in a Court of Civil Justice, shall be exempted from Stamp duty.

XVII. And it is hereby enacted, that every certificate under the signature of a Registrar made according to the provisions of this Act, shall be admitted in all Courts as sufficient evidence of any matter duly certified by such certificate without proof of the hand-writing of the Certifying Officer.

XVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that every copy of or extract from any Assurance or other document registered at any Register Office, shall, if duly certified according to the provisions of this Act, be admitted in all Courts as sufficient evidence of the contents of such Assurance or other document, or of such part of such Assurance or other document as such copy or extract shall purport to contain.

XIX. And it is hereby enacted, that the fees specified in the Schedule of this Act annexed, shall be paid to the Registrar of every Register Office for the acts and things for which the same are respectively in the said Schedule expressed to be payable.

XX. And it is hereby enacted, that the fees for registering any Assurance or for entering any Caveat, shall be brought or sent to the Register Office, with the document to be registered, and the fees for making office copies of and extracts from any registered documents, shall be paid before such office copies or extracts shall be delivered, and the fees for the several other acts and things for which fees are in the said Schedule expressed to be payable, shall be paid before such acts or things respectively shall be done or permitted; and no person shall be entitled to the

delivery from a Register Office, of any compared or examined document, office copy, extract or certificate, or to make any search in the said Register Office, until the fees payable thereon shall have been paid.

XXI. And it is hereby enacted, that in case of the death or absence on leave of any person appointed by the Local Government to register Assurances under this Act, it shall be lawful for the Zillah Judge or other Officer specially authorized by the Local Government, to appoint any person whom he may think proper to take temporary charge of the office and to register Assurances in the same manner as if such person had been appointed to the office by the orders of the Local Government.

XXII. And it is hereby enacted, that upon any Assurance being brought to any such office as aforesaid for registration, it shall be the duty of the Registering Officer to provide that a complete and exact copy be taken of the contents of such Assurance, which copy shall on no account be removed from the office, and any person fraudulently removing such copy from the office of Registry, or fraudulently making any alteration or erasure therein, shall be transported beyond seas for the term of his life.

The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for general information the following Act 3 and 4 Victoria, Cap. 8, intituled "An Act to reduce the Duty on Rum and Rum Shrub, the produce of, and imported from, certain British Possessions in the East Indies into the United Kingdom."

VICTORIÆ REGINÆ.

CAP. VIII.

An Act to reduce the Duty on Rum and Rum Shrub, the Produce of, and imported from, certain British Possessions in the East Indies, into the United Kingdom.

(6th April 1841.)

WHEREAS it is expedient to reduce the Duties now payable by Law upon the Importation into the United Kingdom of Rum and Rum Shrub, the Produce of certain British Possessions within the Limits of the East India Company's Charter into which the Importation of Foreign Sugar is or shall hereafter be prohibited: Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same,

That instead of the Duties now imposed upon Rum and Rum Shrub, the Produce of any such British Possession within the Limits of the East India Company's Charter there shall be raised, levied, collected, and paid unto Her Majesty, on the Importation of the same into the Unit-

ed Kingdom, the following Duty, in like Manner as if the same had been imposed in and by an Act passed in the third and fourth Years 3 & 4 W. 4 C. 56. of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth intituled *An Act for granting Duty of Customs*; (that his to say,)

For every Gallon of Rum of any Strength not exceeding the Strength of Proof by Syke's Hydrometer, and so in proportion for any greater or less Strength than the Strength of Proof, and for every greater or less Quantity than a Gallon, being the Produce of any British Possession within the Limits of the East India Company's Charter, not being sweetened or mixed with any Article, so that the Degree of Strength thereof cannot be exactly ascertained by such Hydrometer, Nine Shillings and Four-pence:

For every Gallon of Rum Shrub, however sweetened, the Produce of and imported from such Possession, and so in proportion for any greater or less Quantity than a Gallon, Nine Shillings and Four-pence.

II. Provided always, and be it enacted, That such Rum or Rum Shrub shall be the Produce of some British Possession within the Limits of the East India Company's Charter into which the Importation of Foreign Sugar shall have been prohibited.

III. Provided also, and be it enacted, that this Act shall not come into operation until satisfactory Proof shall have been laid before Her Majesty in Council that Rum and Rum Shrub the produce of any Foreign Country, or of any British Possession into which Foreign Sugar or Rum can be legally imported, have been prohibited to be imported into any of the British Possessions within the Limits of the East India Company's Charter, on the Importation of Rum, &c. is allowed by this Act.

Rum Shrub the Duty of Nine Shillings and Four-pence per Gallon is hereby imposed, nor until the Governor General of India in Council shall have passed an Act containing such Regulations, for the Prevention of Frauds by the Admixture of Spirits made from Rice, Grain, or other Substances, not being the Produce of the Sugar Cane, or of the Date or Palm Tree, with the Rum or Rum Shrub to be exported under this Act, or otherwise, as in the Opinion of the said Governor General in Council shall be calculated for that Purpose; and in the event of any such Prohibition, and of the Enactment of such Regulations, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the Advice of the Privy Council, or by Her Majesty's Order in Council, to be published from Time to Time in the London Gazette, to allow the Importation of Rum or Rum Shrub the Produce of the Possessions aforesaid to be admitted to Entry in the United Kingdom at the Duties hereby imposed.

IV. And be it enacted, That before any such Rum or Rum Shrub shall be entered in the United Kingdom as being the Produce of any such British Possession, the Master of the Ship importing the same shall deliver to the Collector or Comptroller of the Customs at the Port of importation, a Certificate under the Hand and Seal of the Collector of the Sea Customs of the Port where such Rum or Rum

Shrub was taken on board, testifying that there had been produced to him by the Shipper of such Rum or Rum Shrub a Certificate under the Hand and Seal of the Collector or Assistant Collector of the Land or Customs Revenue of the District within which such Rum or Rum Shrub was produced that the same was of the Produce of such District; and the said Collector of Sea Customs shall, in the Certificate which he is hereby required to give, state the Name of the District or Districts in which such Rum or Rum Shrub was produced, the Quantity and Strength thereof, the Number and Denomination of the Packages containing the same, the Name of the Ship in which it is about to be laden, and of the Master thereof; and that the Master of the Vessel importing such Rum or Rum Shrub shall also make a Declaration before the Collector and Comptroller that such Certificate was received by him at the Place where such Rum or Rum Shrub was taken on board, and that the Rum or Rum Shrub so imported is the same as is mentioned therein.

V. And be it enacted, That this Act may be amended or repealed by any Act to be passed in this present Session of Parliament.

VI. Provided always, and be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council to appoint any Officer or Officers, other than the said Collector and Assistant Collector of Land Revenue and the Collector of Customs, to give such Certificate.

Notification.

The following Rules approved of by Government respecting the Posting of Palkee Bearers are published for the information of the Public, and for the guidance of the several Post Masters under this Presidency:-

I. Travellers may be furnished with Dawk Bearers on application at the different Post Offices, where they will obtain all the requisite information as to the estimated distances between known stations, to which only Dawk bearers can be laid by any Post Master.

II. A set of Dawk Bearers comprizes twelve, and one Mussalchee for which is charged, payable in advance, at the rate of eight annas per Mile, but as in many instances, owing to the delay caused by Travellers remaining longer on the road than the stipulated time, this sum is found unequal to the expense, a further sum of four annas per Mile is required to be paid as a deposit to cover any eventual expense or demurrage caused by delay on the part of the Traveller. —Should none occur, the full amount of the sum deposited is refunded, upon the traveller furnishing a certificate from the Deputy Post Master at the place where his journey finished, that he arrived there without having incurred demurrage. It is the duty of the Deputy Post Masters to furnish Travellers with certificates specifying according to circumstances whether or otherwise they has come on demurrage;—such certificate must however be understood, is only applicable to the Deputy Post Master's Division, who grants it, for it sometimes happens that a Traveller having incurred demurrage on part of the road, by travelling

subsequently during those hours originally appointed for halting, reaches the last Division within the given time.

N. B. It is to be particularly observed, that in some Districts, Bearers are with difficulty procured, and where they have to be sent a considerable distance to take up the Traveller, and in like manner to return home, for time so occupied they are paid additionally, and in all such cases Post Masters are authorized to charge the actual cost for the Travellers Bearers.

When Demurrage is incurred adjustment of expenses deferred.

III. When it is reported that a Traveller comes on demurrage, on any part of the road the adjustment of the amount deposited to cover such expenses will be postponed until the receipt of the Bills for the Dāk, from all the Post Masters through whose Divisions the Traveller may have passed.

Form to be provided to Travellers to insure their complaints being brought to notice.

IV. Travellers whether proceeding from the Presidency, or from Out-stations are provided with a Form, in which they are requested particularly to note any cause of dissatisfaction they may meet with on their journey, and the places where they meet with obstructions, or irregularities on the part of the Bearers or Subordinate Post Office Servants, this Form being affixed to the certificate which the Travellers has to present for signature, secures its being noticed.

When Bearers are withdrawn from their Posts by directions of the Traveller, adjustment of account how deferred.

V. When a Dāk has been ordered and circumstances may render it expedient for the Traveller to postpone his journey, or to withdraw the Bearers entirely, he will of course be held liable for any expense which may have been incurred on his account. The amount paid for the Dāk, and the account deposited to cover demurrage will therefore remain unadjusted until reports are received from the General Post Master on the line of route upon which the Dāk was ordered.

Weight of Travellers Bagghies limited.

VI. Travellers Baggage may not exceed for each Baghy Burdar, twenty-four seers, and this must be divided into two Parcels, or Pattarals of such dimensions as to render them conveniently portable when slung as Bagghies.

Terms upon which a Traveller avails himself of the Post Office to lay Dāks.

VII. It is to be generally understood, that although Government permits their servants to lay Dāk Bearers for the convenience of the Public, the state derives no benefit from this source, and that neither Government nor any of their Officers are in any degree responsible to the Traveller for the misfortunes and disappointments which are inseparable from Dāk travelling, thus every Traveller travels at his own risk, and is liable to the losses and increased expenses incidental to delays, and accidents, and that Government can in no instance be considered liable to make good any losses whatever.

Post Master General will investigate complaints.

VIII. When irregularities and consequent inconvenience occur to Travellers, the Post Master General on being applied to, will immediately investigate the complaint brought to his notice, but this can only be done in the same manner, and to the same end as a superior in any other Department would interfere to enquire into complaints preferred against his subordinates.

In case of surcharge or unjust charges Post Master General will investigate with a view to a refund.

Master who lays the Dāk, it would be the duty of the Post Master General to investigate the matter with a view to afford pecuniary redress.

Penalty for refusing payments on account of Dāk Bearers.

Letters, Parcels &c. for the person from whom demands are due in the same manner as is authorized to act under clause IX of the General Rules.

IX. In case of surcharge alone, or charges which to the Parties complaining might appear unjust because arising out of some positive neglect, or error on the part of the Deputy Post

General to investigate the matter with a view to afford pecuniary redress.

X. In every case of refusal to make good demands on account of laying Dāk Bearers, Post Masters are authorized to detain all Letters

for the person from whom demands are due in the same manner as is authorized to act under clause IX of the General Rules.

XI. Any decision pronounced by the Post Master General in all references to be considered final.

FORT WILLIAM,
THE 31ST MAY, 1841.

The following Act passed by the Right Honble the Governor General of India in Council on the 31st of May 1841, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT NO. V. OF 1841.

An Act for the greater uniformity of the process upon Trials for State Offences, and the amendment of such process in certain cases.

I. Whereas it is expedient, that the rules of process for the trials of state offences should be modified with a view to uniformity at the different Presidencies; and whereas some of the rules heretofore in force at particular Presidencies require amendment;

It is hereby enacted, in modification of all regulations and parts of regulations affecting process upon trials for state offences, that it shall be competent for the ordinary tribunals to try charges of treason, rebellion or other crime against the state.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent for the Government of any Presidency to issue a commission for the trial of any offences of treason, rebellion or crime against the state by one or more Judges, together with such Law Officers as shall be required or without any such Officer, according as it may be deemed expedient.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that the Court convened under such Commissions are to try the prisoners brought before them in the same manner as in trials before the Ordinary Courts; and shall exercise all powers and authorities vested in such Courts, except that their sentence, whether of acquittal or punishment, shall in every instance be reported with their proceedings to the highest Court of the East India Company for Criminal matters of the Presidency, previous to carrying the same into execution; and they are to be guided as to the place where they are to assemble, the persons to be tried by them, and all other particulars not provided by any Regulation of the respective Presidencies, or by any Act of the Governor General of India in Council, by the special orders which they may receive from the executive

Government, or from the highest Court of the East India Company for Criminal matters in the Presidency.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that in case of the death, or of the absence from indisposition or other cause, of any of the Judges, or Law Officers of the Courts which may be appointed to try offenders under this Regulation, the remaining Judge or Judges, or Law Officer or Officers, shall be competent to form a Court, and proceed with the trial or trials, until provision can be made by the Government of the Presidency for supplying the place of such Judge or Judges, or Law Officer or Officers, if any such provision shall be deemed necessary; or if no such provision be made, the powers and proceedings of the said Courts shall not be affected by the death or absence of such Judge or Judges, or Law Officer or Officers.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that the highest Courts of the East India Company for Criminal matters of the respective Presidencies on the receipt of any trials referred to them under this Act are to proceed thereupon according to the rules in force with respect to other trials referred to them; except that they are in every instance to report their sentences to the executive Government of the Presidency for the time being; and are to wait the orders of Government for the period of three calendar months before they direct their sentence to be carried into execution.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that the Magistrates of the several Zillahs and Cities, where any person or persons shall be charged with the crimes mentioned in this Act, shall give immediate notice thereof to the Government of the Presidency to which their several Districts or Cities belong, and shall pay immediate and strict attention to all orders which may be transmitted to them by their respective Governments for the apprehension of persons charged as aforesaid, or for making any enquiry respecting such persons, or for committing them to take their trials before the Ordinary Courts, or before the Special Courts described in this Act.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that this Act shall not be construed to alter or affect the jurisdiction of any of Her Majesty's Supreme Courts of Justice.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 7th of June, 1841.

ACT NO. — OF 1841.

An Act for amending the proceedings in appeals before the Courts of Sudder Dewanry and Nizamut Adawlut, in the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

I. It is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to either of the Courts of Sudder Dewanry and Nizamut Adawlut within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, by an Order, under the signature of the Register of such Court, to transfer to such Register the duty of preparing appealed causes for trial, and of executing the decrees and orders of the said Courts, and to authorize him to issue the necessary process, and to proceed thereupon agreeably to the Rules proscribed by the general Regulations of Government; provided always, that such Register be a Covenanted Servant of not less than 10 years standing.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent for the said Courts of Sudder Dewan-

ny and Nizamut Adawlut to frame such Rules of practice for the due exercise of the Civil and Criminal Jurisdictions vested by the Regulations in those Courts, as may from time to time be found requisite, and shall submit the same to the Governor General of India in Council, and the said Rules and Orders when approved by the said Governor General of India in Council, shall be of the same force as if they were inserted in this Act.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 7th day of August next.

And I hereby require and enjoin all persons bound to prosecute and give evidence at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, to attend at the time and place abovementioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.—Dated this Twenty first day of June in the fifth year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

No. 110 of 1841.—The Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council is pleased to promulgate, for general information and guidance, the subjoined Sections of the Act 3rd and 4th Victoria; Chapter XXXVII, and extracts from the Articles of War, providing for the care, application and distribution of the effects and credits of deceased Officers and Soldiers in the Service of the East India Company.

XLVIII. And whereas by an act passed in the sixth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled *an act to amend Section 6, G. 4, C. 61, two Acts of fifty-eighth year, of His late Majesty for regulating the payment of Regimental debts, and the distribution of the effects of Officers and Soldiers, dying in Service and the receipt of sums due to Soldiers, and of the fourth year of His present Majesty, for punishing Mutiny and desertion of Officers and Soldiers in the Service of the East India Company*, provision is made for the care, application, and distribution of the effects and credits of Officers and Soldiers, in the said Company's Service, and it is expedient to render such provisions more effectual; be it enacted, that it shall

Persons employed under Articles of War, to collect effects of Officers and Soldiers, dying in service abroad, may do so without probate or letters of administration.

be lawful for all persons, who may be employed or required, by or under the authority of any Articles of War, in force for the time being for the European Officers or Soldiers in the Service of the said Company to take care of, collect or superintend or direct the collection of the effects of Officers or Soldiers dying in the service of the said Company out of the United Kingdom, to ask, demand, and receive any such effects, and to commence, prosecute and carry on any actions or suits for the recovery thereof, and to sell, and dispose of the same, without taking out any letters of administration, either with any will annexed or otherwise, in every respect as if such Officer or persons employed or required as aforesaid had been appointed executors, or had taken out administration of such effects; and no Registrar of any Court in the *East Indies*, or any person acting under the appointment or authority of such Court, *ad Colligenda* or otherwise shall in any manner, interpose in relation to any such effects, unless required and authorized so to do by any such Officer or persons employed or required as aforesaid, any act or acts, law, statute, or usage, to the contrary notwithstanding.

XLIX. And be it enacted, that all sums of money due by deceased Officers and Soldiers in respect of any Military clothing, appointments and equipments, servant's wages due, and household expenses, during the current

only of such arrears of pay or allowances, prize or bounty money, equipage, goods and chattels, or the proceeds thereof, shall be deemed the personal estate of the deceased, for the payment of any duty in respect of any probate, or of any letters of administration, or confirmation of testament, or letters testamentary or dative, or for the purpose of distribution as personal estate; and it shall be lawful for the said Military Secretary to order and direct the payment or distribution of any such surplus in any case in which the same shall not exceed five hundred Company's Rupees, without any probate or letters of a administration, or confirmation of testament, or letters testamentary or dative, or payment of any duty of stamps, or upon legacies or otherwise; and it shall also be lawful for any Pay Master or other person to issue any sum not exceeding the value of five hundred Company's Rupees, which may be due to any Officer deceased, or to the widow or relative of any other Officer deceased, or the representative or representatives, of any Officer's widow or relative in India, like manner without any probate or letters of administration, or confirmation of testament; or letters testamentary or dative, or payment of any duty of stamps, or upon legacies or otherwise, the same to be paid to the person who shall be notified by the said Military as aforesaid as being entitled thereto; and all such payments respectively shall be as valid and

effectual, to all intents and purposes, and if the same had been made by or to any executor, or administrator, or under the authority of any probate or letters of administration, or confirmation of testament, letters testamentary, or dative; any thing in any Act or Acts, or Law or Laws, to the contrary notwithstanding.

Effects remitted not deemed assets in the place to which remitted, so as to render administration necessary, and Military Secretary authorized to order remittance of effects to any other place in India.

Effects in the place to which such proceeds or surplus may be remitted, so as to render it necessary that administration should be taken out in respect thereof, and it shall be lawful for the Military Secretary to the Government of the Presidency to which the deceased Officer or Soldier shall have belonged to order that such effects, or the proceeds or surplus of any such effects, shall be remitted to any other place in India, where the same can more conveniently be paid over to the person or persons entitled thereto; and the obedience to the orders of such Military Secretary in respect to the payment and disposal of any such effects, proceeds or surplus of such effects, shall be a discharge from all actions, suits and demands, in respect thereof, to any person, to whose hands any such effects, proceeds or surplus, shall have come, and which shall have been paid and disposed of under the order of such Military Secretary.

Mode of Administering Surplus prescribed.

Such Regimental debts as aforesaid shall, with all convenient speed be transmitted to such Military Secretary, by the Officer or person employed or required to take care of, collect, and receive the same as aforesaid; and such Military Secretary shall cause the same, or the surplus thereof remaining after satisfying such debts, and after such payment and application as is herein before authorized, to be paid to the executor or legal representative (if in India) of such Officer or Soldier; or if such executor or legal representative shall not be in India, or shall not within twelve months from the death of such Officer or Soldier claim such surplus, then and in that case, such Military Secretary shall remit the said surplus to the Court of Directors of the said Company in London, to be by them paid to the executor or legal representative of such Officer or Soldier so deceased, and such remittance, at the end of twelve months as aforesaid, shall be a discharge to such Military Secretary from all actions, suits, and demands in respect of

Registrars of Supreme Courts not to take out administration to surplus. Court of Directors may distribute remitted surplus if not exceeding £50.

such surplus; provided always, that the Registrars of Her Majesty's several Supreme Courts in India shall not be required or entitled to take out letters of administration, with the will annexed or otherwise, in respect of such surplus; and in all cases in which the surplus so to be remitted by the said Military Secretary to the said Court of Directors to order and direct the payment and distribution thereof to the parties entitled thereto, without any probate, letters testamentary or dative, or payment of any duty of stamps upon any legacies or otherwise.

ARTICLE 110. When any Commissioned Officer shall happen to die out of the United Kingdom, or be killed in the service, the Major of the regiment or battalion, or the Officer doing the Major's duty, shall immediately secure all his effects or equipage then in Camp or Quarters, and shall, with all convenient speed, and not later than one month after the death of the Officer, with the assistance of two other Officers not under the rank of Lieutenant, having served not less than eight years as a Commissioned Officer, to be appointed by the Commanding Officer of the regiment or battalion, make an inventory, together with an account of the debts and credits, to the Office of the Military Secretary to the Government of the Presidency to which such Officer belonged, to the end that after payment of such Officers' regimental debts, and quarters and interment, the overplus, if any, be paid over by the said Military Secretary to the legal representatives of the Officer so deceased, as hereinafter mentioned.

111. When any Non-Commissioned Officer shall happen to die out of the United Kingdom, or be killed in the service, the then Commanding Officer of the Troop or Company to which he may have belonged, shall, in the presence of two other Commissioned Officers, take an account of whatever effects he dies possessed of, besides his regimental clothing, arms and accoutrements and of his credits, and shall take care that the same be applied in the first instance to the liquidation of his regimental debts, the remainder, if any, to be paid over to his legal representative, under the directions of the Military Secretary to the Government of the Presidency to which such Soldier shall have belonged, and the Major and other Officers to be selected and appointed for the purpose aforesaid, who are hereby authorized and required to take upon them the said duties shall faithfully discharge the same, and in all respects conform to the provisions and regulations of the Laws in force in this behalf, particularly of an Act passed in the 3rd and 4th years of our reign, Chapter 37 intitled "an Act to consolidate and amend the Laws for punishing mutiny and desertion of Officers and Soldiers in the service of the East India Company and for providing for the observance of discipline in the Indian Navy and to amend the Laws for regulating the payment of Regimental debts, and the distribution of the effects of Officers and Soldiers dying in the service" particularly Sections 48, 49, 50, 51, and 52 of the said act.

In pursuance of the provisions of the above cited Sections of the Mutiny Act and Articles of War for the better Government of Officers and Soldiers in the service of the East India Company, the Governor General in Council is pleased to lay down the following rules of procedure to be observed on the decease of Officers and Soldiers.

Immediately upon the decease of an Officer present with his regiment, the Major of the regiment, or the Officer who may be second in command at the time with the regiment, having secured the effects or equipage of the deceased, a committee of adjustment shall be assembled without delay, whose duty it will be, in all cases, to search for a will, to make an inventory of effects, and an account of the debts and credits, and in all practicable cases, to settle the regimental debts of the deceased.

The inventory, together with the account of debts and credits, and any sum which may remain after satisfying the regimental debts, will be transmitted by the committee, through the Officer Commanding the regiment, to the Military Secretary to Government, to be by him paid to the executor or legal representative of the deceased.

In all cases where a will is not found, and the estate is not solvent; or when no executor is appointed, or when the executor named in the will is at too great a distance to be communicated with within one month; it will be the duty of the committee to cause the live stock and other property of the estate to be sold by public auction without delay; but in the event of the executor being on the spot or within the distance above indicated, the estate appearing to be solvent, the committee will communicate with him, and reserve or dispose of the live stock and other property of the estate as he may desire; the proceeds of sale and the property reserved being subject, however, to the orders of the Military Secretary to Government, without whose authority no effects, or proceeds or surplus of effects, are to be made over to the executor.

The committee will, in all cases, draw the arrears of pay, &c. which may be due to the deceased, and accounts of estates are not to be closed until such pay &c. shall have been received. To relieve the committee from the charge and responsibility of keeping proceeds of estates in their hands, pending the close of accounts, remittances on account are to be made to the Military Secretary to Government.

To avoid delay in adjusting the arrears of pay due to Officers deceased, it will be the duty of the Military Auditor General, immediately on receiving notice from the Military Secretary to Government, or other certain information, of the decease of an Officer, to cause all bills in his office connected with the deceased in any way to be examined and checked, in order to their early settlement.

The committee will record and sign their proceedings, entering, with all other necessary particulars, the date, places and object of their assembly, as well as the names of the convening Officer, and of the President and Members. When any delay appears likely to occur in bringing the proceedings to a close, a special report of the circumstance is to be made to the Military Secretary to Government, by the committee, with a statement of the progress made up to the date of such report.

All proceedings and papers connected with estates transmitted to the Military Secretary to Government, and all references for instructions made to him are to be forwarded through the convening Officer, who is considered responsible for the regularity of the procedure of the committee. All correspondence with the Registrar of the Supreme Court, relative to his taking out administration to estate, is restricted to the Military department; and committees of adjustment will neither communicate their proceedings direct to the Registrar, nor will they make remittances on account of estates direct to the General Treasury, but only through the Military Secretary to Government.

In the case of demise of an Officer possessed of instruments, field books or maps or other articles, the property of Government, it will be the duty of the committee of adjustment to report specially upon such public property to the convening officer, who will be held responsible that the same be not sold with the private effects of the deceased, and that proper measures be taken for its safe custody. A copy of such special report will be inserted in the proceedings of the committee.

With reference to section XLIX. of the Mutiny Act, it is hereby notified that, all sums due to the Military Fund, are of the nature of regimental debts; but claims or demands of the undermentioned descriptions are not regimental debts, and therefore will not be settled by committees of adjustment;

Bills of tradesmen of every class, without exception.

Private accounts of agents, merchants, shop-keepers, money-lenders, and dealers.

Claims for money borrowed, for the purpose of building or purchasing quarters, to distinguish it from money due for the hire of quarters, or for their purchase from the former proprietor, which is a regimental debt.

Mess bills for any period in arrears beyond the month in which an Officer dies and the immediately preceding month.

Bills for liquors supplied from the mess stores to unmarried Officers separate from their charges at mess.

Bills on account of subscriptions to regimental bands, book clubs, and similar private institutions.

When an Officer separated from his regiment by employment on the general staff, or by having obtained leave of absence, or by any other circumstance, or an Officer of the invalid establishment, shall die at any station, it will be the duty of the Officer commanding at such station to order a committee of adjustment to assemble, without delay, consisting of a president, being either not under the rank of Major or the next senior Officer available at the station, and of two Members, who shall, in all practicable cases, be Officers of eight years standing in the service, and such committee shall proceed in every particular in the mode laid down in the foregoing rules for the guidance of regimental committees of adjustment. In the case, however, of an Officer temporarily detached from his regiment, dying at a station other than that to which he properly belongs, it will likewise be the duty of the Officer of the regiment, on receiving intimation of his decease, to convene a regimental committee in the usual manner; and in such a case, the regimental committee and not that assembled where the individual died, will draw the arrears of pay; and the proceedings of the latter committee will be forwarded to the Officer commanding the regiment to which the deceased belonged, in order to their communication to the regimental committee of adjustment, and to their transmission simultaneously with the proceedings of the regimental committee to the Military Secretary to Government.

Officers Commanding at stations where detached Officers die, will consider all the foregoing rules relating to the duties and responsibilities of regimental commanding Officers, to be equally applicable to themselves.

On the decease of Warrant Officers, and of Non-Commissioned Officers and Soldiers in detached employment, committees of adjustment, composed of three Commissioned Officers will be assembled by order of the Officer commanding at the station, and will proceed in the mode herein before prescribed.

It is the duty of the Town Major to convene committees of adjustment on the effects of Officers dying at the Presidency; such committees to consist of any three Officers who may be available, the president being not under the rank of Major, and the Members of at least eight years standing in the service. The proceedings of such committees will be forwarded direct to the Military Secretary to Government to whom application is to be made, when necessary, for instructions.

Such parts of the foregoing rules as are applicable to the cases of Soldiers dying in the service, and are in conformity with the Mutiny Act and Articles of War relating thereto, are hereby extended to such cases.
