The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General in Council, in the Legislative Department, is published for general information.

Read a second time, the Draft of a proposed Act, dated the 14th October 1839, and published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 16th of the same month, for amending the Bengal Code in regard to Sales of Land for Arrears of Revenue.

Resolution.—The Right Hon'ble the Governor General in Council resolves, that the following amended Draft on the subject be republished for general information:—

ACT No. — of 1841.

An Act for amending the Bengal Code in regard to Sales of Land for Arrears of Revenue.

Preamble. I. Whereas it is deemed expedient with a view to the benefit of the Agricultural Community to regulate the number of periodical sales of Estates for arrears of Revenue; to discontinue the levy of interest and penalty upon such arrears; to provide for the absolute sale (under restrictions and exceptions in certain cases) of any Mehal, the whole of the Land Revenue due from which may not have been discharged on or by appointed days; and otherwise to amend the Laws for the realization of the Land Revenue;—

It is hereby enacted, that Sec. 2, Reg. XIV. 1793; Sec. 2, Reg. III. 1794, Reg. XI. 1822, except Sections 36 and 38, and Reg. VII. 1830 are rescinded, except in so far as they rescind other Regulations or parts of Regulations.

Regulations rescinded.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that there shall be no demand of interest or penalty upon any arrear of Land Revenue which shall fall due after the date specified in Section XXXIII of this Act.

Interest and Penalty abolished.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the promulgation of this Act the Sudder Board of Revenue at Calcutta, shall determine with regard to each permanently settled District or Zillah under their jurisdiction, the fixed days in each year not being more than three, on which & on no other days sales shall be held for realization of arrears of Land Revenue. And the said Board shall give notice of the dates so fixed in the Calcutta Gazette; and shall direct corresponding publication to be made, as far as regards each District, in the language of that District, in the office of the Collector, or Deputy Collector, or other Officer duly authorized to hold sales under this Act, and in the Courts of the Judge, Magistrate, Principal Sudder Ameen, Sudder Ameen, Sudder Moonsiffs; and the days so fixed shall not be changed until the same be changed by the said Board by advertisements and notifications in the manner above described; such advertisements and notifications to be issued, on every occasion after the first above provided for, before the close of the official year preceding that in which the new date or dates are to take effect.

Days fixed for Sale.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the promulgation of this Act the Sudder Board of Revenue at Calcutta, shall determine with regard to each permanently settled District or Zillah under their jurisdiction, the fixed days in each year not being more than three, on which & on no other days sales shall be held for realization of arrears of Land Revenue. And the said Board shall give notice of the dates so fixed in the Calcutta Gazette; and shall direct corresponding publication to be made, as far as regards each District, in the language of that District, in the office of the Collector, or Deputy Collector, or other Officer duly authorized to hold sales under this Act, and in the Courts of the Judge, Magistrate, Principal Sudder Ameen, Sudder Ameen, Sudder Moonsiffs; and the days so fixed shall not be changed until the same be changed by the said Board by advertisements and notifications in the manner above described; such advertisements and notifications to be issued, on every occasion after the first above provided for, before the close of the official year preceding that in which the new date or dates are to take effect.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that in Districts not permanently settled, and in the province of Benares, no sale shall take place for arrears of Land Revenue or other demand of Government without the special sanction of the Sudder Board of Revenue previously obtained in each several case of sale.

Definition of an Arrear.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that if the whole or a portion of a kist or instalment of any month of the Bengallee, Fussullee or Ummullee year be unpaid on the first of the following month, the sum so remaining unpaid shall be considered an arrear of Revenue; that is to say, the kist of Bysakh shall be an arrear on the 1st Jeth; and the kist of Jeth on the 1st Asarh, and so on.

All Estates in arrears to be sold.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that except as hereinafter excepted, all Estates from which: at noon of the day preceding that fixed for a sale an arrear of Revenue may be due, shall on the said fixed day, or on the day or days following as hereinafter provided, be put up to public auction by and in the presence of the Collector or Officer exercising the power of Collector in that behalf, and shall be sold to the highest bidder; and no payment or tender of payment made subsequent to the hour of noon of the day preceding that fixed for a sale shall bar or interfere with the sale either at or after the conclusion of that transaction.

Claims to abatement and set off. VII. And it is hereby enacted, that no claim to abatement or remission of Revenue unless the same shall have been allowed by the authority of Government, nor any private demand or cause of action whatever held or supposed to be held by any defaulter against Government shall bar a sale, nor render a sale under this Act voidable; nor shall the plea that money belonging to the defaulter, and sufficient to pay the balance or part of it, was in the Collector's hands, bar a sale nor render a sale under this Act voidable, unless the money have been transferred in account to credit of the Estate, or unless after due application made to him, the Collector shall have, on insufficient grounds, refused so to transfer it.

Exceptions. VIII. Provided always, and it is hereby enacted, that no estate shall be sold for the recovery of arrears or demands of the description mentioned below, otherwise than after a notification in the language of the District, specifying the nature and amount of the arrear or demand, shall have been affixed, for a period not less than twenty days preceding the day of sale, in the Office of the Collector, Deputy Collector, or other Officer as aforesaid, by whom the sale is intended to be made, in the Court of the Judge within whose jurisdiction the land advertised lies, in the Courts of all the Principal Sudder Ameens, Sudder Ameens and Sudder Moonsiffs of the District, and at the Police Thannah of the Division in which the estate to which the notice relates, or part of it is situated, the same to be certified by the receipt of the Officer at whose Office such publication may have been made; and also at the Cutcherry of the Malgoozar of the estate, or at some conspicuous place upon the estate, the same to be certified by the peon or other person employed for the purpose. And it shall be declared in the said notification that no payment or tender of payment of the arrear or demand due, which may be made after the hour of noon of the day preceding the fixed day of sale, will bar or interfere with the sale either at or after the transaction.

First—Arrears due from or to be recovered by the sale of estates not permanently settled.

Secondly—Arrears other than those of the current or the preceding year.

Thirdly—Arrears of Revenue due on account of estates other than that to be sold.

Fourthly—Arrears to be recovered by re-sales consequent upon default of purchasers as provided in Section XV of this Act.

Fifthly—Arrears due on account of Tuccavy, Poolbuudee, or other demands not being Land Revenue, but recoverable by the same process as arrears of Land Revenue.

Payments by IX. And it is hereby enacted, that Collectors

non-proprietors. shall, at any time before the hour of noon of the day preceding the fixed day of sale receive as a deposit from any party not being a proprietor of the estate in arrear, the amount of the arrear of Revenue due from it, to be carried to the credit of the said estate at noon as aforesaid, unless before that time the arrear shall have been liquidated by a proprietor of the estate. And in case the party so depositing, whose money shall have been credited to the estate in the manner aforesaid, shall be a plaintiff in a suit pending before a Court of Justice for the possession of the same or any part thereof, it shall be competent to the Judge of the Zillah in which such estate is situated, to order the said party to be put into temporary possession of the said estate, subject to the rules in force for taking security in the cases of appellants and defendants. And if the party depositing whose money shall have been credited as aforesaid shall prove before a competent Civil Court that the deposit was made in order to protect an interest of the said party, which would have been endangered, or damaged by the sale of the estate, he shall be entitled to recover the amount of the deposit with interest, from the proprietors of the said estate.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that no estate shall be liable to sale for the recovery of arrears which have accrued during the period of its being under the management of the Court of

Wards and Minor's. Ward's Estate sole property of a minor or minors, and descended to him or them by the regular

course of inheritance duly notified to the Collector for the information of the Court of Wards, but of which the Court of Wards has not assumed the management under Regulation V. 1822, shall be sold for arrears of Revenue accruing subsequently to his or their succession to the same, until the minor or minors, or one of them, shall have attained the full age of 18 years. And no estate held under attachment by the Revenue Authorities, otherwise than by order of a Judicial Authority, shall be liable to sale for arrears accruing whilst it was so held under attachment.

Attached by a Revenue Officer. And no estate held under attachment by a Revenue Officer, in pursuance of an order of a Judicial Authority, shall be liable to sale for the recovery of arrears of Revenue accruing during the period of such attachment, until after the end of the year in which such arrears accrued.

Attached by a Court. XI. And it is hereby

Exemption from sale. enacted, that it shall be competent to the Collector at any time before the sale shall have taken place to exempt any estate from sale, and to direct the receipt of arrears due upon it by a special order to the Collector to that effect in each case; and, no sale of an estate shall be legal if held after the receipt of an order of exemption in respect to such estate. Provided, however and it is hereby enacted, that an order for exemption so issued, shall not affect the legality of a sale which may have taken place before the receipt by the Collector of the order for exempting it from sale,

Proviso. provided, however and it is hereby enacted, that an order for exemption so issued, shall not affect the legality of a sale which may have taken place before the receipt by the Collector of the order for exempting it from sale,

shall, at any time before the hour of noon of the day preceding the fixed day of sale receive as a deposit from any party not being a proprietor of the estate in arrear, the amount of the arrear of Revenue due from it, to be carried to the credit of the said estate at noon as aforesaid, unless before that time the arrear shall have been liquidated by a proprietor of the estate. And in case the party so depositing, whose money shall have been credited to the estate in the manner aforesaid, shall be a plaintiff in a suit pending before a Court of Justice for the possession of the same or any part thereof, it shall be competent to the Judge of the Zillah in which such estate is situated, to order the said party to be put into temporary possession of the said estate, subject to the rules in force for taking security in the cases of appellants and defendants. And if the party depositing whose money shall have been credited as aforesaid shall prove before a competent Civil Court that the deposit was made in order to protect an interest of the said party, which would have been endangered, or damaged by the sale of the estate, he shall be entitled to recover the amount of the deposit with interest, from the proprietors of the said estate.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that no estate shall be liable to sale for the recovery of arrears which have accrued during the period of its being under the management of the Court of Wards and Minor's. Ward's Estate sole property of a minor or minors, and descended to him or them by the regular course of inheritance duly notified to the Collector for the information of the Court of Wards, but of which the Court of Wards has not assumed the management under Regulation V. 1822, shall be sold for arrears of Revenue accruing subsequently to his or their succession to the same, until the minor or minors, or one of them, shall have attained the full age of 18 years. And no estate held under attachment by the Revenue Authorities, otherwise than by order of a Judicial Authority, shall be liable to sale for arrears accruing whilst it was so held under attachment. And no estate held under attachment by a Revenue Officer, in pursuance of an order of a Judicial Authority, shall be liable to sale for the recovery of arrears of Revenue accruing during the period of such attachment, until after the end of the year in which such arrears accrued.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the Collector at any time before the sale shall have taken place to exempt any estate from sale, and to direct the receipt of arrears due upon it by a special order to the Collector to that effect in each case; and, no sale of an estate shall be legal if held after the receipt of an order of exemption in respect to such estate. Provided, however and it is hereby enacted, that an order for exemption so issued, shall not affect the legality of a sale which may have taken place before the receipt by the Collector of the order for exempting it from sale,

XII. And it is hereby enacted, that in case the Collector, Deputy Collector, or other Officer as aforesaid shall be unable from sickness, from the occurrence of a holiday, or from any other cause to commence the sale on the day of sale fixed as aforesaid, or if, having commenced it, he be unable, from the like cause to proceed with it, he shall be competent to adjourn it to the next day following, not being Sunday or other close holiday, recording his reasons for such adjournment, forwarding a copy of such record to the Commissioner of Revenue and announcing the adjournment by a written proclamation stuck up in his Cutcherry; and so on, from day to day, until he shall be able to commence upon, or to proceed with, the sale, but with the exception of adjournments so made, recorded, and reported, each sale shall invariably be made on the day of sale fixed in the manner aforesaid.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that on the day of sale fixed according to Section III. of this Act, sales shall proceed in regular order; the estate to be sold bearing the lowest number on the Towjee or rent roll of the District being put up first, and so on, in regular sequence; and it shall not be lawful for the Collector or other Officer as aforesaid to put up any estate out of its regular order by number.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that the party who shall be declared the purchaser of an estate at any such public sale as aforesaid, shall be required to deposit immediately, either in Cash, Bank of Bengal Notes or Post Bills, or Government Securities duly indorsed, 25 per cent, on the amount of his bid, and in default of such deposit, the estate shall, forthwith, be put up again and sold.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that the full amount of purchase money shall be made good by the purchaser before noon of the thirtieth day from that on which the sale of the estate bought by him took place, reckoning that day as one of the thirty; or if the thirtieth day be a Sunday or other close holiday, than on the first office day after the thirtieth; and in default of payment within the prescribed period as aforesaid, then and afterward as often as such default shall occur, the deposit shall be forfeited and credited to the estate in payment of so much of the balance due from it at the time of sale; and if thereafter any part of the balance for which the sale was made remain due, the estate shall be resold, and the defaulting purchaser shall forfeit all claim to the estate, or to any part of the sum for which it may subsequently be sold, and in the event of the proceeds of the sale which may be eventually consummated being less than the price bid by the defaulting bidder aforesaid, the difference shall be leviable from him by any process authorized for realizing an arrear of public Revenue, and it shall be so levied and credited to the defaulting proprietor of the estate sold.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever an estate shall have been sold as aforesaid, the Collector, Deputy Collector, or other Officer as aforesaid, shall affix a proclamation in the language of the District in his Cutcherry; and as soon thereaf-

ter as may be in the Cutcheries of the Moon-siff's and of the Darogahs of Police, within whose jurisdiction or jurisdictions any part of such estate may be situated; and also at the Cutcherry of the Malgoozar of such estate; or on some conspicuous place on such estate; forbidding the ryots and under-tenants of such estate to pay rent falling due subsequent to the date therein specified and up to the date of the subsequent notice hereinafter prescribed by Section XX of this Act, on pain of not being entitled to credit in their accounts with the purchaser for any sums paid within the period aforesaid.

XVII. And it is hereby enacted; that it shall be lawful for the Commissioner of Revenue to receive an appeal against any sale made under this Act if preferred to him on or before the fifteenth day from the date of sale, reckoning as in Section XV., or if preferred to the Collector for transmission to the Commissioner on or before the tenth day from the day of sale, and not otherwise; and the Commissioner shall be competent in every case of appeal so preferred, to annul any sale of an estate made under this Act, which shall appear to him not to have been conducted according to the provisions of this Act; and the order of the Commissioner annulling a sale or dismissing an appeal shall be final unless set aside by a competent Court of Justice in a regular suit brought for that purpose.

XVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the Commissioner of Revenue on the ground of hardship or injustice to suspend the passing of final orders in any case of appeal from a sale and to represent the case to the Sudder Board of Revenue, who, if they see cause, may recommend to the Local Government to annul the sale; and the Local Government in such case, but in no other, may annul the sale and cause the estate to be restored to the proprietor on such conditions as may appear equitable and proper.

XIX. And it is hereby enacted, that all sales of which the purchase money has been paid up as prescribed in section XV of this Act, and against which no appeal shall have been preferred, shall be final and conclusive at noon of the thirtieth day from the day of sale, reckoning the said day of sale, as the first of the said thirty days. And sales against which an appeal may have been preferred, and the appeal dismissed by the Commissioner, shall be final and conclusive from the date of such dismissal, if more than thirty days from the day of sale, or if less, than at noon of the thirtieth day as above provided.

XX. And it is hereby enacted, that immediately upon a sale becoming final and conclusive, the Collector or other Officer as aforesaid, shall give to the purchaser a certificate of title in the following form.

I certify that A. B. has purchased at public Auction under Act — of — Mehal C, and that his purchase has taken effect on and since the — day of — (being the date of sale.)

And the said certificate shall be deemed in any Court of Justice sufficient evidence of the title to the estate sold being vested in the person

or persons named from the date specified: and the Collector shall also notify such transfer by written proclamation in his own Cutcherry, and in those of the Moonsiff and Darogah of the jurisdictions within which any part of the estate sold shall be situated and shall apply the purchase money first to the liquidation of all arrears due upon the day of sale, or upon the day of the original sale, if the sale finally consummated be a re-sale, and secondly, to the liquidation of all outstanding demands debited to the Muhlal in the public accounts of the district, holding the residue, if any, in deposit on account of the late recorded proprietor or proprietors of the estate sold, to be paid to their receipt on demand in the manner following; to wit, in shares proportioned to their recorded interest in the estate sold, if such distinction of shares were recorded, or if not, then as an aggregate sum to the whole body of proprietors upon their joint receipt.

XXI. And it is here-
Benamce purchase. by enacted, that any suit brought to oust the certified purchaser as aforesaid, on the ground that the purchase was made on behalf of another person, not the certified purchaser, though by agreement the name of the certified purchaser was used, shall be dismissed with costs.

Notice of annul- by enacted, that the annul-
ment. ment of a sale by a Commissioner shall be publicly notified by the Collector or other Officer as aforesaid in the same manner as the becoming final and conclusive of sales is required to be notified by section XX of this Act, and the amount of deposit and balance of purchase money shall be forthwith returned to the purchaser with interest thereon at the rate of the current public securities, from the dates on which they were respectively paid in to the date on which the refund is actually made.

Purchase liable for by enacted, that the party

Proviso. hereby enacted, that nothing in this Act contained shall be construed to debar any person considering himself wronged by any act or circumstance connected with a sale under this Act, from his remedy in a personal action for damages against the individual by whose act or omission he considers himself to have been wronged,

Refund on XXV. And it is hereby
reversal of sale. enacted, that in the event of a sale being reversed by a final decree of a Court of Justice, the purchase money shall be refunded to the purchaser by Government, together with interest at the rate of the current public securities.

Enhancement of XXVI. And it is here-
rents in Bengal, ser of an estate sold under
&c. this Act, for the recovery of arrears due on account of the same, in the permanently settled districts of Bengal, Behar, Orissa and Benares, shall acquire the estate free from all encumbrances which may have been imposed upon it after the time of settlement, and shall be entitled after notice given under Section X, Regulation V, 1812, to enhance at discretion, (any thing in the existing Regulations to the contrary notwithstanding) the rents of all under-tenures in the said estate, and to eject all tenants thereof, with the following exceptions:

First. Tenures which were held as Istemrerece or Mocurrerece at a fixed rent, more than 12 years before the permanent settlement.

Secondly. Tenures existing at the time of the Decennial settlement, which have not been, or may not be, proved to be liable to increase of assessment, on the grounds stated in section 2, Regulation VIII of 1793.

Thirdly. Lands held by Khood Kasht or Kudeemee Ryots having rights of occupancy under the Regulations in force.

Fourthly. Lands held under bonâ fide leases, at fair rents, temporary or perpetual, for the erection of dwelling houses, or manufactories, and being so used, or for gardens, tanks, canals, clearing of jungle, or like purposes.

Fifthly. Farms granted in good faith at fair rents by a former proprietor, for terms not exceeding twenty years, under written and duly registered leases.

Under-tenures XXVII. And it is here-
elsewhere. by enacted, that the purchaser of an estate sold under this Act for the

recovery of arrears due on account of the same in Districts other than those mentioned in Section XXVI. shall acquire the estate free from all encumbrances which may have been imposed upon it after the time of settlement, and shall be competent to avoid and annul all tenures which may have originated with the defaulter or his predecessors, being representatives or assignees of the original engager, as well as all agreements with ryots or the like settled or credited by the first engager or his representatives, subsequently to the last settlement, as well as all tenures which the first engager may, under the conditions of his settlement, have been competent to set aside, alter, or renew, saving always and except bonâ fide leases of ground for the erection of dwelling houses, or buildings, or for offices thereunto belonging, or for gardens, tanks, canals, water courses, or the like purposes, which leases or engagement shall, so long as the land is duly appropriated to such purposes, and the stipulated rent paid, continue in force and effect. Provided that nothing in this Act contained shall be construed to entitle any purchaser of land at a public sale to demand a higher rate of rent from any persons whose tenure or agreement may be annulled as aforesaid than was demandable by the former Malgozar, except in cases in which such persons may have held their lands under engagements, stipulating for a lower rate of rent than would have been justly demandable for the land, in

consequence of abatements having been granted by the former Malgoozars from the old established rates by special favour, or for a consideration, or the like, or in cases in which it may be proved that according to the custom of the Pergunnah, Mouzah, or other local division such persons are liable to be called upon for any new assessment, or other demand not interdicted by the Regulations of Government.

XXVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that excepting copartners of estates under Butwarrah who may have saved their shares from sale under sections 33 and 34, Regulation XIX 1814, any recorded or unrecorded proprietor or copartner who may purchase in his own name or in the name of another the estate of which he is proprietor or copartner; or who by re-purchase or otherwise, may recover possession of the said estate after it has been sold for arrears under this Act; and likewise any purchaser of an estate sold for other arrears or demands than those accruing upon itself, shall by such purchase acquire the estate subject to all its encumbrances existing at the time of sale and shall not acquire any rights in respect to Ryots and under-tenants which were not possessed by the previous proprietor at the time of the sale of the said estate.

XXIX. And it is hereby enacted, that arrears of rent which at the date of sale may be due to the defaulter from his tenants, shall be recoverable by him after a sale by any process which might have been used by him for that purpose before the sale was made.

XXX. And it is hereby enacted, that any Collector or Officer exercising the powers of Collector, shall be competent to punish any contempt committed in his presence in open Cutcherry or Office for the time being, by fine to an extent not exceeding Co.'s Rs. 200, commutable if not paid, to imprisonment in the civil jail for a period not exceeding one month; and the Magistrate to whom such an offender may be sent by a Collector as aforesaid, shall carry his sentence into effect. Provided that an appeal from any order passed under this Section shall lie to the Revenue Commissioner, whose decision shall be final.

XXXI. And it is hereby enacted, that a default to make good bid by making the deposit required by section XIV of this Act shall be held to be a contempt.

XXXII. And it is hereby enacted, that the operation of this Act shall be confined to the Provinces of Bengal, Behar, Orissa and Benares, and to the Ceded and Conquered Provinces under the Government of the Presidencies of Fort William in Bengal, and nothing in this Act contained shall affect land in the Town of Calcutta or the settlements of Singapore, Penang or Malacca.

XXXIII. And it is hereby enacted, that this Act shall have effect on and after the first day of the next ensuing Fussyly and Ummullee year respectively in those provinces in which the Fussyly and Ummullee eras are severally current; and on and after the first day of the Bengalee year 1249 in the districts in which the Bengalee era is current.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 18th day of April next.

PUBLIC ORDER

To regulate the religious procession of the Mohurrum, and for the preservation of the public peace during that festival, sanctioned by the Honorable the Governor in Council, as provided for by Rule, Ordinance, and Regulation II, A. D. 1827.

1st. Every person desirous of erecting or carrying about a *Taboot*, *Punjia*, or *Dholee-ka Punjia* at the ensuing Mohurrum, must obtain a license from the Magistrates of Police; and a license will be granted to no persons except Mussulmans.

2nd. The licenses shall bear the signatures of the Magistrates of Police, and all persons obtaining them shall be bound to produce them when demanded by any authority having a right so to do, and a refusal to do so shall be held to be a breach of these rules.

3rd. Each *Taboot* is to have but one set of "Tassa," one set of "Dholee" one "Kurnab" and fifteen "Hillals."

4th. Any person who may be seen carrying a Sword, Dirk, Bludgeon, or other offensive weapon, will be taken into custody.

5th. *Taboots* meeting on the public road, are to give way to one another in the same manner that carriages do, each *Taboot* keeping to the left.

6th. *Taboots* are not permitted to go abreast on the public road, but they are to follow each other in a peaceable manner.

7th. No *Taboots* are allowed to go in procession on the last night of the Mohurrum before 12 o'clock, or to continue so after 3 o'clock in the following morning. These processions are limited (on the last night and day of the Mohurrum) to the Blendy Bazar road, Duncan road, Chinch Bunder and Market Streets; and *Taboots* are not to be taken out on the last day before 12 o'clock, and on meeting carriages, and horsemen, are strictly enjoined to cease playing country music, until they shall have passed the *Taboots*, keeping the left side of the road; and it is directed that they be thrown into the sea, and the ceremony concluded by 5 o'clock P. M.

8th. No procession of the Zool Junnah or Horse, through the public streets or roads, will be permitted.

9th. The inhabitants of Bombay are enjoined not to assault or insult the Moguls during the celebration of the Mohurrum.

10th. All persons licensed to sell Spirituous Liquors, and all venders of Opium and Bhang, are enjoined to keep their shops closed; and persons found selling any thing of an intoxicating nature, during the aforesaid period, will be taken into custody and punished.

11th. Any persons violating any of the above rules, or behaving in any manner likely to create a breach of the peace, or making a disturbance of any kind, will be immediately taken into custody and dealt with according to law.

Newspapers if sent via Falmouth, are free of Postage, but if transmitted by the way of Marseilles, they are charged 2d. each. They should however be kept open at the ends, or they are liable to be charged the Letter rate of Postage.

Extract Para. 7th of a letter from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, No. 79, dated 2nd December 1840.

Reporting that several instances have occurred of Officers of the Bengal and Madras Presidencies arriving at Bombay, by the Steamers having, owing to defective arrangements on their part, been detained in Bombay until the arrival of the Baggage from England, and suggesting the adoption of certain regulations to guard against similar inconvenience.

Para. 7th.—When we permitted Officers returning to Bengal and Madras, via Bombay, to draw pay and allowances, from the date of their arrival at Bombay, provided the Regiment to which they belonged was stationed within certain limits, it was our intention that they should have no greater advantage with respect to leave of absence after their arrival than would be granted to them if arriving direct from England at the Capitals of their respective Presidencies. That advantage is limited to one month on private affairs, and we desire that in no case may pay and allowances be granted for a longer period under these circumstances at your Presidency.

With reference to Letter of 31st January last, No. 17, transmit further proceedings on the subject of forming a portion of the Infantry of the Bombay Army into Light Infantry and Rifle Corps and arming one of the Regiments of Light Cavalry with Lances.

Letter dated 29th April 1840, No. 56.

Para. 27. We have already conveyed to you our authority to form one of the Regiments of European Infantry, into a Light Infantry Regiment. The additional measure recommended by Lieutenant Generals Lord Keane and Sir Thomas McMahon, of forming two Regiments of Native Infantry into Light Infantry Corps, has also our sanction, upon the understanding expressed by Sir Thomas McMahon, viz. that it entails no expense, and that the Regiments are to be as available for the general duties of the Service as all others of the same Arm. To the conversion of another Regiment into a Rifle Corps as recommended by your Commander in Chief, we have also no objection upon a similar understanding.

No. 120 of 1841.—The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish to the Army the following Extract, paras. 35th and 36th of the Honorable Court's Letter, No. 79, dated 2nd December last:

Extract Paras 35th and 36th of a letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors, No. 79, dated 2d December 1840.

Para 35th. We forward a number in the Packet, copy of our Resolution dated the 22nd November 1837, under which the Cadets who were then in course of Instruction at the Military Seminary, and who might thenceforward be appointed to that Institution are entitled to count the time passed by them at the Seminary after they attain the age of 16 as so much time passed in India in calculating their period of service for Retiring Pensions on Full Pay.

36th. We also forward a List of the Officers on your establishment who are entitled to benefit by this Resolution, specifying the period of time claimable by each.

ATA COURT OF DIRECTORS, THE 22nd NOVEMBER 1837.

Resolved by the Ballot, that having had under consideration the nature and extent of the advantages accorded to the Cadets who receive their education at the Military Seminary by the Court's Resolution of the 4th December 1833, under which such Cadets on passing their public examination take rank above all Cadets the orders contained in the Court's Military Circular Despatch of the 17th April 1816, under which Cadets who pass for Engineers are permitted to reckon the commencement of their Service in India from the date

at which they would have arrived in that country, had they proceeded to their destination instead of remaining to carry on their professional studies at Chatham, the Court are of opinion, that the Cadets studying at the Seminary should be still further protected from the loss which they may be considered to sustain as compared with those who proceed upon direct appointments.

That on adverting to the Regulations framed at the time when Cadets were educated for the Company's Service at the Royal Colleges of Marlow and Woolwich, the Court observe, that such Cadets were placed on the same footing as the Cadets who, not having received their education at those Institutions proceeded at once to India and that as "direct" Cadets could then so proceed at the age of fifteen the period at which the College Cadets should take rank was fixed at fifteen years and a half, thus allowing six months for their arrival in India.

That the Court are of opinion, that upon the same principle Cadets who may continue at the Military Seminary after they have attained the age at which "direct" Cadets may now proceed to India, namely, sixteen years, should not lose the advantage in respect to Retiring Pension on Full Pay which they would derive if they immediately proceeded to their destination.

That accordingly all the time during which Cadets actually continue at the Military Seminary after attaining the age of Sixteen, and before they pass their public examination (provided they pass within the fixed period of four terms) shall count as a portion of the period which may eventually entitle them to retire upon Full Pay under the Regulations as now established.
