It is hereby notified, for general information. First. That all Letters and Newspapers, except Soldier's and Sailor's letters, intended for transmission by the Overland Mails, and except those specially marked "via Falmouth," will be sent thro France, and thus be subject to the heavier rate of Postage. Second. Letters and Newspapers addressed to France, as well as those to other Foreign countries, with which France is the channel of communication (if the latter are expressly directed to be so sent) will be made up in Packets and sent to the French Post Master at Marseilles; but Letters for foreign Countries, other than France, if not specially directed, will be included in the Packets for England. Letters &c. for places lying between Bombay and Marsellies, will be dispatched in separate packets. Third. Letters for the United Kingdom of Great Britain, weighing less than a quarter of an ounce, and passing thro' France, are charged single postage, which by that route amounts to 2s. 8d. By the Falmouth route. Letters of half an ounce in weight, are subject to single postage only, which by that route, has now been reduced to 1s. News-papers, if sent via Falmouth, are free of postage; but if transmitted by the way of Marseilles, they are charged 2d. each.

GENERAL ORDERS BY THE RIGHT HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL.

*Fort William, 6th April 1842.*

With reference to General Orders dated 29th March 1823, and 3rd June 1825, No. 168, permitting the indulgence of remittances to Europe by the Soldiers of Her Majesty's Army, and to General Orders No. 138 dated 10th July 1837, explaining that the indulgence of Family Remittances to them was confined to bonafide savings from their Pay, the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council is pleased to direct the publication in General Orders for observance at the three Presidencies, of the following Memorandum received from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, dated 1st November 1841, which the Secretary at War has circulated to Her Majesty's Regiments on the Indian Establishment, in order to prevent the abuse of the privilege enjoyed by Soldiers remitting Money to their Families through the Company's Treasuries.

*Memorandum.*

Various abuses having taken place in making remittances from India to this Country, through the East India Company's Treasury, particularly in the cases of Soldiers who have realized large sums by other means than by savings from their Pay, and a recent case having occurred in which a Serjeant whose Wife had acquired a considerable sum in Trade, remitted nearly £ 500 by buying up Drafts from Soldiers for the sums sent home by them as deposits for their future benefit, Commanding Officers and Pay-masters are accordingly enjoined to pay the strictest attention in future to the instructions in Lord Palmerston's Circular Letter No. 586, dated the 23rd January 1827, defining the objects and limits of such remittances, as for the due observance of those instructions, they will be held responsible.

# LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS,

## FORT WILLIAM, LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT. THE 1ST FEBRUARY, 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 1st February, 1842.

ACT NO. — OF 1842.

*An Act for regulating the service of Hereditary Officers under the Presidency of Bombay.*

Whereas it has been found that *Preamble.* the provisions of Regulation XVI, 1827, of the Bombay Code, are insufficient to secure the efficient discharge of the duties of Hereditary Officers.

I. It is hereby enacted, that Sections XVII and XVIII, of Regulation XVI, of 1827 of the Bombay Code, be rescinded.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that all Hereditary Officers of whatever denomination, belonging to, or employed in the management of the Land Revenue, or of the Customs or Town Duties, or Excise or other Revenue, or in the Police, or in the Civil Administration of the country, shall render the usual services of their respective Offices, as far as the same may be required by the Collector, or other Officer under whose control they may be placed by usage or the orders of Government.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that when the duties of an Hereditary Office fall in more than one Department, it shall be competent to the Governor in Council of Bombay to prescribe what Officer shall be vested with the control of such Office.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the Collector or other Officer to whom the duties of an Hereditary Office are, as provided in Clause II., to be rendered, when the performance of those duties is claimed in rotation by different sharers, to require that the sharers in the wutun shall nominate a fit and proper person from among their number, who shall hold the Office as the Representative of the family either during life, or for such term, not being less in each instance than (five) 5 years, as the Collector or Controlling Officer shall determine with the sanction of the Governor in Council, and in the event of the sharers not so nominating one or more, if required of their number within a reasonable period to be fixed by the Collector or Controlling Officer, the latter shall himself exercise the power of selection, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the Collector or Controlling Officer to refuse to confirm the nomination by the sharers of any individual, if he shall have reason to think, that from age or personal disqualification the duties of the Office will not be properly performed by him, or if from character and past conduct the person nominated be considered unworthy of trust, provided that the grounds of such refusal shall be recorded in writing and that an appeal from such decision shall lie to the Governor in Council, whose order thereon shall be final.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that the Collector or Controlling Officer shall have power to punish Officiating Hereditary Officers for misconduct or neglect of duty by suspension from office, pay and emolument, or by fine not exceeding the computed official emolument of their offices for three months, and to levy the said fine in the mode authorized for realizing Revenue demands.

VII. And it is hereby further enacted, that the Collector or Controlling Officer, in cases of

misconduct or incompetency on the part of an Officiating Hereditary Officer, shall have power to dismiss such Officer from his employment, but no such dismissal shall take place, except on an investigation recorded in writing, which shall be submitted for the approval and sanction of the Governor in Council.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that, in conducting the investigation prescribed in the preceding Section, the Collector or Controlling Officer shall have the same authority as a Magistrate in compelling the attendance of parties and witnesses, and the production of papers, and in taking evidence.

IX. And it is hereby further enacted, that, if fraud or malversation, or any criminal offence in the conduct of the duties of the Office is proved in a competent Court against an Officiating Hereditary Officer, it shall be lawful for the said Governor in Council, on the report of the Collector or Controlling Officer, to direct the attachment and confiscation of the entire wutun, either wholly or in part, or for a term of years, and during such attachment and confiscation the duties of the office shall be performed, and the proceeds of the wutun disposed of, in such a manner as the said Governor in Council may direct.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that no female shall perform in person the duties of any hereditary office.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that if any hereditary Officer is incapable of personally discharging the duties of his or her office by reason of sex, minority, mental or bodily infirmity, or manifest incapacity, it shall be lawful for the Collector or the Controlling Officer to call upon him or her, or his or her Guardians to appoint a Deputy, subject to his approval, and on the party or parties failing to appoint a fit deputy within a reasonable period, the appointment shall be made by the said Collector or Controlling Officer.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, that all deputies appointed to perform the Duties of Hereditary Offices under this Act, and under Section IV. Regulation V. 1833, of the Bombay Code, shall be subject to the same rules and penalties as the Principals,—and the wutun of the office shall also be liable to attachment and confiscation for misconduct of the Deputy, when appointed by the Hereditary Officers, in the same manner as it would be, if the Hereditary Officer himself were the offender.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that nothing contained in this Act shall be construed to debar the right of any sharer to participate in the rents and profits of any Hereditary Office so held and filled as above provided, after provision shall have been made therefrom for the fit maintenance of the Officiating Hereditary Officer, for which purpose it shall be competent to the Collector or Controlling Officer to fix and assign a specific portion of such rents and emoluments, leaving the remainder only, subject to the claims of the other sharers—and further that the portion of the rents and emoluments so fixed and assigned shall be the official remuneration of the Officiating Hereditary Officer, and shall not be liable to Civil process of any Court of Law.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever it may be necessary, as above provided, that the Collector or Controlling Officer shall appoint a Deputy to conduct the duties of an Hereditary Office, it shall be lawful for him to assign to such Deputy a fit remuneration from the rents and profits of the said office.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that the terms "Hereditary District or Villiage Office or Officers" or "Hereditary District or Villiage Re-



venue Office or Officers " used in Regulation XVI 1827 and Regulation V 1833, of the Bombay Code, shall be held to apply to all descriptions of Hereditary Offices and Officers.

Ordered, that the draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the first day of May next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 21st March 1842.

ACT No. — OF 1842.

*An Act concerning the acquirement and extinction of rights by prescription in the territories subject to the Government of the East India Company, without the local jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Courts, at Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay, and in the Straits Settlements; and for the limitation, of Suits in the Courts of the East India Company.*

*Prescription Section I.* It is hereby enacted that subject to the exception hereinafter mentioned, a title by prescription shall be acquired in respect of property, moveable and immoveable, and hereditary offices, by uninterrupted possession, mediate or immediate, as proprietor, for six years, in the case of moveable property, and for twelve years in the case of immoveable property and hereditary offices; provided that if any other title be proved, the possession shall have been adverse thereto—and provided that nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect any right arising from possession of moveable property now recognized by Law.

*Section II.* And it is hereby enacted, that in the case of any benefits, liberties, or privileges, derived out of, or affecting any immoveable property which shall have been enjoyed without interruption for twelve years, a right to the enjoyment thereof against the owner of the property shall be acquired by prescription, subject to the exceptions hereinafter mentioned, unless such benefits, liberties, or privileges shall have been enjoyed by some consent or agreement expressly given or made for that purpose by some Deed or writing.

*Section III.* And it is hereby enacted, that when a right to any such benefits, liberties, or privileges, as aforesaid, whether acquired by prescription or otherwise, shall have been disused for twelve years, the right shall be extinguished.

*Section IV.* And it is hereby enacted, that when a party shall have been forcibly dispossessed of immoveable property, or shall have been prevented from enjoying some benefit, liberty or privilege, derived out of, or affecting immoveable property, and shall have applied within the time limited by any law now in force, or within one month, to the proper authority, for assistance to recover the possession or the use thereof, and shall have recovered the same—the period during which his possession or enjoyment was interrupted in such manner shall not be considered an interruption within the meaning of this Act.

*Section V.* And it is hereby enacted, that when the possession upon which a title by prescription is claimed shall have been acquired by the deprivation of another party who was previously in possession, or in opposition to a title which had accrued but upon which possession had not been taken, or having been taken had

been previously interrupted, it shall be deemed adverse in respect of the party so deprived of possession, and of any one claiming in the same right, or in respect of the parties interested in the said title, as the case may be, from the time at which the possession actually commenced; and that when an adverse title shall have accrued after the possession was acquired, the possession shall be deemed adverse to the parties interested therein from the time at which such title accrued.

*Section VI.* And it is hereby enacted, that possession acquired by a bona fide purchaser for valuable consideration from a Trustee, or from a Depository or Mortgagee, shall be deemed adverse to the Mortgagor, or Depositor, or Beneficial Owner under the Trust, from the time of the acquisition by purchase.

*Section VII.* And it is hereby enacted, that a title by prescription shall be acquired by possession by or through a Depository or Mortgagee which shall have continued without interruption; for thirty years in the case of moveable property, and sixty years in the case of immoveable property, unless in the mean time an acknowledgment of the title of the Mortgagor or Depositor, or of his right of redemption, shall have been given to him or some person claiming his interest, in writing signed by the Mortgagee or Depository or the person claiming through him, in which case prescription shall not take effect until possession shall have been had without interruption for 30, or 60 years, as the property may be moveable or immoveable, from the date of such acknowledgment.

*Section VIII.* And it is hereby enacted, that in the case of a concealed fraud by which a party shall have been deprived of any property, the possession thereof shall not be deemed adverse to the party entitled until the time at which such fraud shall or with reasonable diligence might have been first known by him, except when it shall have been acquired by a bona fide purchaser for a valuable consideration, or when a party shall have succeeded to it by inheritance or devise; in the former case adverse possession shall be deemed to have commenced from the time that the party entitled was deprived of the property by means of such fraud—in the latter from the time of the succession—provided it shall not appear that the party to whom the possession devolved assisted in the commission of the fraud, or at the time he entered into possession knew, or had reason to believe that the fraud had been committed.

*Section IX.* And it is hereby enacted, that when a party having a right to any Estate or interest in reversion or remainder shall have become entitled to the same in possession by reason of any forfeiture or breach of condition, but shall have waived his action to recover thereupon, possession shall not be deemed adverse to him or any party claiming in the same right until the determination of the previous right.

*Section X.* And it is hereby enacted, that suits other than for property and rights to which the above rules are applicable shall not be admitted in the Courts of Judicature of the East India Company except as hereinafter provided, unless they are instituted respectively within the period specified in the following Section.

*Section XI. First.* Within one year from the time the cause of action arose.

Suits for penal damages or pecuniary penalties, or forfeitures, for the breach of any law or regulation.



Suits for damage for injury to the person and personal property or to the reputation.

Suits for debt, on account of wages of servants, artisans, and labourers; for hire of animals and vehicles; for retail supplies of victuals and articles of daily consumption; for tavern bills and bills for board and lodging and for lodging only; for the rent of building; and on any other account subject by established custom to settlement by the month, or a shorter period.

Suits to alter or set aside summary decisions or orders of the ordinary Courts of Judicature.

Suits to alter or set aside summary awards by Collectors and other Officers of Revenue, in disputes regarding arrears and exactions of rent.

Suits founded on the right of pre-emption in cases to be governed by a law or usage which recognises such right.

*Second.* Within six years from the time the cause of action arose.

All suits for debts and damages, upon contracts, or for wrongs, other than are described in Clause first of this Section; and for the enforcement of contracts.

*Third.* Within twelve years from the time the cause of action arose.

Suits for the recovery of Legacies.

*Section XII.* Provided, that suits against Trustees shall not be barred by any length of time.

*Section XIII.* And provided that whereby any law a shorter period is specially prescribed for the institution of a particular suit, the limitation so prescribed shall still be observed notwithstanding this Act.

*Section XIV.* 1st. And it is hereby enacted,—with respect to suits for the recovery of legacies and for debts that if an acknowledgment shall have been made by the party liable within the period of limitation applicable to the case, either by writing signed by him, or by part payment or part satisfaction on account of principal, or interest due thereon, then a new period of limitation shall be reckoned, according to the nature of the case from the date of such acknowledgment, or payment or satisfaction.

2d. Provided that if there be two or more parties liable no one of them shall be chargeable by reason only of a written acknowledgment made or signed by any other.

*Section XV.* And it is hereby enacted, that in suits for balances upon accounts current between Merchants and Traders who have had mutual dealings, the period of limitation shall be computed from the close of the year in the accounts of which there is the last entry indicating the continuance of mutual dealings; reckoning the year as it is reckoned in the accounts.

*Section XVI.* And it is hereby enacted, that in suits for damages for wrong done by a concealed fraud the cause of action shall be deemed to have first arisen at the time at which such fraud shall or with reasonable diligence might have been first known by the party wronged.

*Section XVII.* And it is hereby enacted, that in computing the periods of prescription specified in Sections I. and II. the time shall be excluded during which some party entitled to interrupt the possession or enjoyment shall have been under the disability of infancy or unsoundness of mind, or shall have been absent out of the Territories of the East India Company, and the contiguous Territories, and the Island of Ceylon; provided that no longer time than 18 years shall be excluded on account of any such disability, and no longer time than 5 years on account of such absence, and provided that the ab-

sence shall have been continuous from the time the title accrued.

*Section XVIII.* And it is hereby enacted, that in computing the period of prescription specified in Section I. in the case of moveable property the time shall be excluded during which the party in possession shall have been absent out of the Territories of the East India Company.

*Section XIX.* And it is hereby enacted, that in computing the periods of prescription specified in Sections I. and II. the time shall be excluded during which any suit brought bona fide to interrupt the possession shall have been pending and shall have been diligently prosecuted in any Court of Judicature which from defect of jurisdiction or other cause shall have been unable to decide upon it, or shall have passed a decision which shall have been annulled on appeal for any such cause.

*Section XX.* And it is hereby enacted, that the provision of Section III. shall not have effect when the party entitled to use the benefits, liberties or privileges therein referred to, shall have been under any of the disabilities specified in Section XVII., except as subject to the provisions contained in that Section.

*Section XXI.* And it is hereby enacted, that in computing the periods of limitation specified in Section XI. the time shall be excluded during which the claimant or any person through whom he claims shall have been under the disability of infancy or unsoundness of mind; provided in respect of the suits described in Clauses 2 or 3 of the said Section that no longer time than 18 years shall be so excluded, and in respect of the suits specified in Clause I. of the same Section, excepting suits for penal damages, that no longer time than 5 years shall be so excluded; provided further, that suits for penal damages shall never be admitted after the expiration of 1 year.

*Section XXII.* And it is hereby enacted, that in all suits described in Section XI. except suits for penal damages, when the claimant or the person through whom he claims shall have been absent out of the Territories of the East India Company, and the contiguous territories and the Island of Ceylon, at the time the cause of action arose, and shall have continued so absent, the time of such continued absence shall be excluded in computing the prescribed period of limitation, provided that no longer time than 5 years shall be so excluded.

*Section XXIII.* And it is hereby enacted that in all suits described in Section XI. the time during which the defendant shall have been absent out of the Territories of the East India Company, shall be excluded in computing the prescribed period of limitation.

*Section XXIV.* And it is hereby enacted, that in computing the period of limitation applicable to any case the time shall be excluded, during which the claimant or the person through whom he claims shall have been engaged in prosecuting a suit upon the same cause of action against the same party or some party whom he represents, bona fide and with due diligence, in any Court of Judicature, which from defect of jurisdiction or other cause shall have been unable to decide upon it, or shall have passed a decision which on appeal shall have been annulled for any such cause.

*Section XXV.* And it is hereby enacted, that when by the provisions of this Act a person is barred from bringing a suit for the recovery of any legacy, debt, or damages, his right to the legacy, debt, or damages, for which a suit might



have been brought by him, but for those provisions, shall be extinguished unless such right is secured by some mortgage, pledge or lien.

*Section XXVI.* And it is hereby enacted, that no complaint or information shall be proceeded upon by any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace against any person for any offence punishable by fine only, or by any Officer of Revenue against any person liable to any penalty or forfeiture, unless such complaint or information shall have been received within one year from the commission of the act charged, or within any shorter period that may be prescribed by any existing law for preferring such complaint or information.

*Section XXVII.* And it is hereby provided, that this Act shall not be construed to affect the provisions of Section X. Regulation XIX, 1793 extended to Cuttack by Section XXIV, Regulation XII, 1805, Section X. Regulation XLI, 1795, and Section VI. Regulation XXXI, 1803, extended to the Territories ceded by Dowlut Rao Scindiah and the Peishwah by Section XXI. Regulation VIII, 1805, of the Bengal Code.

*Section XXVIII.* And it is hereby provided, that this Act shall not extend to any public property or right, nor to any suits for the recovery of the public Revenue, or for any public claim whatever.

*Section XXIX.* And it is hereby enacted, that all suits that may be now pending or that may be instituted within the period of 6 months from the date of the passing of this Act shall be tried and determined as if this Act had not been passed.

*Section XXX.* And it is hereby enacted, that the provisions of this Act concerning the acquisition and extinction of rights shall not be of force in respect of any property situated or being within the local jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Supreme Courts at Calcutta, Madras and Bombay, and of the Recorder's Court in the Straits of Malacca, and that the Rules of limitation contained in this Act shall not be applied to any suits or actions in those Courts.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council after the 21st day of June next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 21st March, 1842 :

ACT No. — OF 1842.

*An Act for extending the Statute Ch. XXI. 4th and 5th of Queen Victoria in certain cases to the Territories of the East India Company.*

I. It is hereby enacted, that the Statute Ch. XXI. of the 4th and 5th years of the reign of Queen Victoria, entitled "An Act for rendering a Release as effectual for the conveyance of Freehold Estates as a Lease and Release by the same parties," shall be extended to the territories of the East India Company from the 1st day of July next; provided always that this Act shall not be construed to affect any case which would not have been governed by the Law of England before the passing of the aforesaid Statute, if this Act had not passed.

*An Act for rendering a Release as effectual for the conveyance of Freehold Estates as a Lease and Release by the same Parties.*

[18TH MAY, 1841.]

"Whereas it is expedient to lessen the expense of conveying Freehold estates." Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, That every Deed or Instrument of Release of a Freehold Estate, or Deed or Instrument purporting or intended to be a Deed or Instrument of Release of a Freehold Estate, which shall be executed on or after the 15th day of May 1841, and shall be expressed to be made in pursuance of this Act, shall be as effectual for the purposes therein expressed, and shall take effect as a conveyance to uses or otherwise, and shall operate in all respects both at Law and Equity as if the releasing party or parties who shall have executed the same had also executed in due form a Deed or Instrument of Bargain and Sale or lease for a year for giving effect to such Release although no such Deed or Instrument of Bargain and sale or lease for a year shall be executed, provided that every such deed or instrument so taking effect under this Act shall be chargeable with the same amount of Stamp Duty as any Bargain and Sale or lease for a year would have been chargeable with (except progressive Duty) if executed to give effect to such deed or instrument, in addition to the Stamp Duties which such deed or Instrument shall be chargeable with as a Release or otherwise under any Act or Acts relating to Stamp Duties.

II. "And whereas many Deeds or Instruments of Bargain and Sale or Leases for a year, to give effect to Deeds or Instruments of Release of Freehold Estates heretofore executed, have been lost or mislaid;" be it enacted. That where, in or by any Deed or Instrument of Release of Freehold Estates executed before the 15th day of May 1841, any Deed or Instrument of Bargain and Sale or Lease for a year for giving effect to such Deed or Instrument of Release shall be recited, or by any mention thereof in such Deed or Instrument of Release appear to have been made or executed, such recital or mention thereof shall be deemed and taken to be conclusive Evidence of the deed or instrument of Bargain and Sale or Lease for a year so recited or mentioned having been made and executed; and such Deed or Instrument of Release shall also have the like effect as if the same had been executed after the 15th day of May 1841; whether such deed or instrument of bargain and Sale or Lease for a year shall or shall not have been lost or mislaid, or may or may not be produced: Provided always, that this Act shall not prejudice or affect any proceedings at Law or in Equity pending at the time of the passing of this Act, in which the validity of any Bargain and Sale or Lease for a year shall be in question between the party claiming under such bargain and Sale or Lease for a year and the party claiming adversely thereto, and such bargain and Sale or Lease for a year if the result of such proceedings shall invalidate the same, shall not be rendered valid by this Act.

III. And be it enacted, that in the construction of this Act the word "Freehold" shall have not only its usual signification, but shall extend to all Lands and Hereditaments for the conveyance of which, if this Act had not been passed,

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 21st day of June next.

The following Act passed by the Right Honorable the Governor-General of India in Council, on the 28th of March 1842, is hereby promulgated for general information ;

ACT No. 11. OF 1842.

*An Act for providing for the exercise of certain powers by the Governor General during his*

*absence from the Council of India.*

I. Whereas it is expedient that the Governor General should visit the North Western Provinces and other parts of India, unaccompanied by any Member of the Council of India, it is enacted that during the absence of the Governor General from Calcutta, it shall be lawful for the Governor General alone to exercise all the powers which may be exercised by the Governor General in Council, except always the power of making Laws and Regulations.

II. And it is further enacted, that this Act shall commence from the day on which it shall be notified by an Order published in the Official Gazette, that the Governor General has quitted Calcutta for the purpose of so proceeding as aforesaid.

1st. The parties to whom Advances may be made shall agree that the respective Consignments be delivered into such Warehouses as the Court of Directors may approve: and that they be subject to the control of the Court of Directors until the lien of the Company upon the Consignment shall have been satisfied.

2nd. Upon each Consignment, the value of which is to be ascertained by the Officers of the Indian Governments, an Advance not exceeding three-fifths of such ascertained value will be made.

3rd. For re-payment of the Advance, Bills of Exchange to be drawn in triplicate, at ten months' date, at the rate of

The rate of exchange to be determined from time to time at the place where the advance is made under the Court's orders.

4th. The parties will be required to place in the hands of the Board of Customs, Salt and Opium,\* Bills of Lading of the Consignment and Policies of Insurance effected thereon, both in triplicate. The Bills of Lading must be drawn deliverable to the East-India Company, or endorsed to the order of the East-India Company. The Policies of Insurance must be effected in the name and on behalf of the East-India Company, as the parties interested, or endorsed to their order; but persons desirous of effecting the necessary Insurance in this country, and of depositing the Policies in the Company's Treasury, will be allowed to do so:

5th. In case of default being made, either in acceptance or payment of the Bills, the Court of Directors to be authorized, in such manner and at such times as they may see fit, to sell the Goods, for the purpose of repaying the Company the amount of the Advances made thereon, including freight and any other charges or expenses which the Company may have incurred on account of the Consignment, together with Interest, should any have accrued; the Company, on the other hand, allowing Discount, where any part of the proceeds shall be realized before the Bills fall due, and the settlement of either surplus or deficiency shall be made with the Consignor; and if in India, by the Government from whom he received the Advance, at the rate of Exchange at which the Company may at the time be drawing bills upon such Government.

6th. Commanding at Jellalabad, dated the 7th instant, reporting the particulars of a signal Victory, which was on that morning gained by the Troops under his Command, over the Force of Mahomed Akbar Khan.

The Governor in Council directs, that a Royal Salute be fired at Noon this day, from the Garrison of Bombay, in honor of these events.

I have the honor to forward copy of a despatch to the Supreme Government, detailing the operations of this Force yesterday.

Camp Ali Musjid, 6th April 1842.

Sir,

1. It is with feelings of much gratification I have the honor to report for the information of the Right Honorable the Governor General in Council, the following detail of operations undertaken and carried into effect against the Afreedees.

2. Yesterday morning at half past three, the Troops were under Arms, the Camp struck, and according to arrangements previously made, the Treasure, Ammunition and Baggage placed on the Road leading from Jumrood towards the entrance of the Khyber Pass. The enemy had for some days appeared in great numbers at the mouth of the Pass which they had fortified with a strong breast-work of stones and bushes. The hills on the right and left were rocky and precipitous, presenting great natural obstacles to the ascent of Troops. To gain the summit of these heights, defended as they were by a numerous body of the enemy, was an undertaking of considerable difficulty.

3. The columns destined to accomplish this most important object, moved off simultaneously with the main column intended to assault the entrance, but were compelled to make a considerable detour to the right and left, to enable them to commence the ascent.

4. The right column consisting of the Troops detailed in the margin, under the Command of Lieutenant Colonel Taylor, Her Majesty's 9th Foot, and Major Anderson, 64th Regiment Native Infantry,

5. The left column under the Command of Lieutenant Colonel Moseley and Major Huish commenced the ascent led by Captain Ferris, Regiment of Jezailchees. Both columns after considerable opposition which they overcame in the most gallant style, succeeded in routing the enemy and gaining possession of the crest of the hills on either side, while the flanking columns were in progress on the heights, I ordered Captain Alexander, in Command of the Artillery, to place the Guns in position and to throw Shrapnell among the enemy when opportunity offered, which assisted much in their discomfiture. As Lieutenant Colonel Taylor, from the opposition he had met with, and the extremely difficult nature of the ground, was some time in reaching the summit of the hill on the right,—I detached a party under the command of Brigadier Wild to assault it in front, it was however so extremely steep near the top, that notwithstanding the undaunted gallantry of the Officers and Men, they were

unable to gain a footing on the summit, and I regret to say, the enemy were enabled to throw stones with fatal effect upon some of the leading Grenadiers of the 9th Foot. Finding the heights in our possession, I now advanced the main column to the mouth of the Pass, and commenced destroying the Barrier which the enemy had evacuated on perceiving their position was turned: A portion of the right and left columns being left to keep the heights under the command of Lieutenant Colonel Moseley, and Major Anderson, respectively. Major Huish and Lieutenant Colonel Taylor, continued their advance to crown the hills in front and on each side, which were covered with the enemy, who appeared determined to contest every inch of ground, but nothing could resist the gallantry of our Troops who carried every thing before them. A position of considerable strength above the Bridge now remained to be carried, and again the Jezailchees were conspicuous in forcing the enemy to relinquish their strong holds. Crowning parties having taken possession of their heights, all opposition on the part of the enemy may be said to have ceased, as no large body of them has since come in sight. The nature of the arrangements made for the protection of the Baggage will be best understood when I state that not a single Baggage Animal has fallen into the hands of the enemy.

6. It now remains for me to perform the pleasing duty of stating how much I feel indebted to the Officers and Men comprising the Force under my Command, for their zeal, devotion and unflinching valour, in performance of the very arduous duty which they have so nobly executed.

7. From Major General McCaskill, K. H., Commanding the Infantry Division, and who was on this occasion Commanding the Rear Guard, I have received every assistance, as likewise from Brigadier Wild:—to Lieut. Colonel Taylor, K. H. my warmest acknowledgments are due for the spirit, coolness and judgment with which he discharged the duties entrusted to him. Where Officers and Men, European and Native, have all so gallantly performed their duty it is difficult to select the names of particular individuals, but I cannot omit the names of those who so admirably led the Troops to storm the heights, viz: Lieutenant Colonel Moseley, 64th N. I., Major Huish, 26th N. I., Major Anderson, 64th N. I., and Captain Ferris, Commanding the Jezailchees, whose conduct excited the delight and admiration of all who beheld them, indeed I consider much of the success of the day to be attributed to their gallantry, skill and perseverance in this most difficult description of warfare. I have also to express my satisfaction with the manner with which the Artillery was served by Captain Alexander Commanding, the precision with which Shrapnell was thrown, caused considerable loss to the enemy,—To Captain Ponsonby, my Assistant Adjutant General, Captain Codrington, Assistant Quarter Master General, Captain Macadam, Deputy Judge Advocate General, and to Lieutenant Pollock, A. D. C. I am much indebted for communicating my orders at different times during the day.

8. I cannot conclude this despatch without requesting that you will bring to the particular notice of the Governor General in Council the very great assistance I have received from Captains Mackeson and—Lawrence, Captain Mackeson's knowledge of the localities was invaluable to me by enabling him to point out those Heights which required to be crowned. Both these Officers came on to the ground which I now occupy. Captain Lawrence returned to Peshawur yesterday, and Captain Mackeson proceeds with the force—Captain Sir Richmond Shakespear volunteered his services to accompany Lieutenant Colonel Taylor as his A. D. C. and took command of the Men lately composing the Garrison of Alli Musjid, his exertions throughout the day were most conspicuous and unceasing.

9. I must here observe, that from the character of the operations, and the very great numbers of the enemy, estimated at about 10,000, I found the Force under my command numerically deficient, and in consequence the Troops suffered severely from excessive fatigue.

10. There were some of the enemy's Horse in the vicinity of Alli Musjid, but I regret they did not wait for Brigadier White, and his Brigade, to make an example of them.

In continuation of my despatch of the 6th instant, I have now the honor to enclose a Return of Casualties which took place on the 5th and 6th, those of the latter date occurred in taking possession of Ali Musjid,—I am happy to say, the amount of our loss is trifling, considering the very great opposition we experienced from the enemy.



In my last communication, I inadvertently omitted to mention the name of Lieutenant John Becher, Acting Field Engineer, and have to request you will bring to the notice of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General in Council the very essential services rendered by that Officer in clearing the Pass of the impediments constructed by the enemy, which he did with a degree of celerity, notwithstanding their strength and difficulty of removal, that elicited my warmest satisfaction.

Sir,

Information was on the evening of the 5th instant brought into this place, in the most positive and circumstantial terms from Spies in the enemy's Camp, to the effect, that the Force under Major General Pollock, C. B. had met with a reverse in the Khyber and retraced their steps towards Peshawur, and about 10 P. M. on the 6th, a feu-de-joie and Salute of Artillery was fired by Mahomed Akbur, which was said to be in honor of the event. It was on the same day and through similar channels announced to me, that the Afghans were sending reinforcements to aid in defending the frontier Passes. Although I could not wholly depend upon these statements, which were improbable in themselves, and accompanied by counter-reports of another revolution at Cabool, which was assigned by some as the cause of the rejoicing of the defeat of the Afghans in Khyber, and by one account, of the intended and even actual retreat of the Sirdar to Lughman: I came on a full consideration of the various circumstances and rumours, to the resolution of anticipating the last mentioned event, by a general attack on the Afghan Camp, in the hopes of relieving the place from blockade and facilitating General Pollock's advance. Accordingly gave directions to form 3 Columns of Infantry, the centre consisting of the 13th Light Infantry, 500 Rank and File under Colonel Dennee, C. B. The left, of the 35th Native Infantry, 500 Rank and File under Lieutenant Colonel Mouteith, C. B. and the right, of a Company of the 13th Light Infantry, another of the 35th Native Infantry, and the detachment of Sappers and Miners under Lieutenant Orr, (the severity of Captain Broadfoot's wound still rendering him non-effective) the whole 360 strong commanded by Captain Havelock, Her Majesty's 13th Light Infantry. These were to be supported by the fire of the Guns of No. 6 Light



Field Battery under Captain Abott, to which Captain Backhouse, S. S. Artillery was also attached, and by the whole of my small Cavalry Force under Captain Oldfield and Lieutenant Mayne. The Troops issued from the Cabool and Peshawar Gate at day-light this morning. So far from the Sirdar having made dispositions to avoid the encounter, his whole force, (not falling short in all of 6,000 Men,) was formed in order of battle, for the defence of his Camp; the right resting on a Fort, its left on the Cabool River, and even the ruined works within 800 yards of the place were filled with Ghilzie Marksmen; recently repaired for stout resistance. The attack was led by the Skirmishers and Column under Captain Havelock, which drove the enemy in the most satisfactory manner from the extreme left of his advanced line of works, which it pierced at once, and proceeded to advance into the Plain; Whilst the central column directed its efforts against a square Fort, the defence of which was obstinately maintained. With the deepest regret, I have to mention that whilst leading his Regiment to the assault, Colonel Dennis, C. B. of H. M. 13th Light Infantry, received a shot through the body, which shortly after proved fatal. The rear of this work having been gained by passing to its left, I gave orders for a combined attack on the enemy's Camp. It was in every way brilliant and successful. The Artillery advanced at the Gallop, and directed a heavy fire on the Afghan centre, whilst two of the columns of Infantry, penetrated his line at the same point, and the third drove his left back from its support on the River, into the Stream of which some of his Horse and Foot were forced.

The Affghans made repeated attempts to check our advance, by a smart fire of Musquetry, and throwing forward heavy bodies of Horse, which twice closely threatened the Troops under Captain Havelock, and by opening against us 3 Guns from a Battery screened by a Garden Wall and said to have been served under the personal Superintendence of the Sirdar—but in a short time, they were dislodged from every point of their position,—Their Cannon taken, and their Camp involved in a general conflagration. The battle was over, and the enemy in full retreat in the direction of Lughman by about 7 A. M. We have made ourselves master of two Cavalry Standards, recaptured four Guns, lost by the Cabool and Gundamuck Forces, the restoration of which to our Government, is received by the Force with much honest exaltation; and destroyed the whole of the enemy's Tents. In short, the defeat of Mahomed Akbar, by the Force, which he boasted of blockading, has been in the open field, complete and signal. The fall of an Officer, so distinguished, as Colonel Dennis, will be felt as a public calamity; Lamenting it in every way, I must share with his Country, his Regiment and his Friends, in the consolation afforded by the reflexion, that he was killed, most gallantly performing his duties. I have to express my entire satisfaction with the conduct on this occasion of Lieutenant Colonel Monteath, C. B. Commanding one of the Infantry Columns under my own eye, and of Captain Wilkinson, on whom the charge of the other devolved on the death of his Lieutenant Colonel; of Captain Oldfield and Lieutenant Mayne, who led the Cavalry, and of Captains Abbott, Backhouse, and Lieutenant Davis, Artillery.

The able and judicious manner in which Captain Havelock moved the Force under his Command, which acted on a line so distant, as to render the manœuvres independent of my immediate control, demands my particular and separate commendation.

My acknowledgments are also especially due to Captain Wade, my Brigade Major, whose exertions on this day were, as they have ever been, most meritorious.

To Major Fraser of the Light Cavalry, who acted as my Aide-de-Camp, and to Captain Mainwaring, Commissariat Officer with the Force, who was present in, and active in the field; Captain Macgregor, Political Agent, handsomely offered his services with No. 6 Light Field Battery, and was most useful in serving the Guns.

I enclose returns of Killed and Wounded, and Ordnance captured. \*

Lieutenant and Adjutant Wood, Her Majesty's 13th Light Infantry, made a dash at one of the enemy, and in cutting him down, his Charger was so seriously injured, as to have been since destroyed. Captain Havelock reports in the most favorable manner the gallant conduct of Lieutenant Cox, H. M. 13th Lt. Infantry, who was the first to seize the enemy's Guns after the party, which captured them.

The Governor General feels assured that every subject of the British Government will peruse with the deepest interest and satisfaction the Report he now communicates of the entire defeat of the Afghan Troops under Mahomed Akbar Khan by the Garrison of Jellalabad.

That illustrious Garrison, which by its constancy in enduring privation, and by its valor in action has already obtained for itself the sympathy and respect of every true Soldier, has now, sallying forth from its walls, under the command of its gallant Leader, Major General Sir Robert Sale, thoroughly beaten in open field an enemy of more than three times its numbers, taken the Standards of their boasted Cavalry, destroyed their Camp, and re-captured four Guns which under circumstances which can never again occur, had during the last winter fallen into their hands.

The Governor General cordially congratulates the Army upon the return of victory to its Ranks. He is convinced that there, as in all former times, it will be found, while, as at Jellalabad, the European and Native Troops mutually supporting each other, and evincing equal discipline and valor, are led into action by Officers in whom they justly confide.

The Governor General directs that the substance of this Notification and of Major General Sir Robert Sale's Report be carefully made known to all the Troops, and that a Salute of 21 Guns be fired at every principal Station of the Army.
