The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for general information, the following Order issued by Rear Admiral Sir W. Parker, K. C. B., Commanding Her Majesty's Fleet in the Indian Seas; relative to the detention of Chinese Junks, with either valuable or rich Cargoes.

By Sir William Parker, K. C. B., Rear Admiral of the Red, and Commander in Chief of Her Majesty's Ships and Vessels employed and to be employed in the East Indies and Seas Adjacent.

Her Majesty's Ship

Her Majesty's Plenipotentiary having in his letter dated the 6th instant, intimated his opinion that the period has arrived, at which it is desirable and requisite to add to the stringency of our operations against the Government of China, and suggested that Her Majesty's Vessels may be authorized to detain all Junks with either valuable or rich Cargoes.

You are hereby required and directed to seize and bring into the harbours of "Chusan" or "Hong-Kong," or any other secure anchorage, in the occupation of Her Majesty's Forces, all such Vessels, taking especial care, that every article of property, is most scrupulously brought to account, for the receipt and safe keeping of the authorized Agents, vizt.

until the gracious pleasure of the Queen shall be known as to the disposal of such captured or detained property, or until the amount, for which any portion of it that it may be found necessary or advisable to dispose of immediately, shall be realized by public sale.

But exceptions are to be made in favor of the property belonging to private individuals, and their Junks, navigating on the Coasts of the Farkien Province, from which an active trade is carried on with our Straits Settlements; and, their Vessels which may be actually bound to, or from any of the said Straits Settlements, or Chusan; or Hong-Kong are to be granted privilege and immunity from seizure or detention, and any Captain or Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Ships, or the Indian Navy, who may examine such Vessels, and allow them to pass, is to furnish the Master of the Junk with a certificate that he has done so, or make an endorsement on the papers of the Vessel to that effect.

All passes which may be given by the Senior Officer, on the parts of the Coast referred to, are to be respected; but it will neither be useful, or possible, to man and detain any number of private Junks, freighted with ordinary produce.

The Trade of Formosa is also to be stopped, as far as is practicable, and the same system, and Embargo is to be enforced all along the Coast of China to the utmost extent that circumstances will permit.

All Chinese Government Junks, or property which may any where be seized, and which do not admit of being removed, are, as far as may be practicable, to be destroyed.

2d.
