Whereas it has been deemed expedient to pass certain rules for regulating the shipment and landing of Goods at the Port of Bombay, the Honorable the Governor in Council, in virtue of the power vested in him under Section XXX of Act No. I. of 1838, is pleased to publish the following for general information;

All shippers of Goods shall present at the Custom House a Pass-note for shipment of Goods, and no Goods shall be allowed to pass the Custom House Gates, or be put on board any Vessel or Boat in the Harbour without such Pass-note, signed by the Collector, Deputy Collector, or one of the Assistants; which Pass-note shall be delivered to the Gate Keeper as an authority for passing the Goods.

No Pass-note shall have effect for a longer period than the day subsequent to its date.

The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish, for general information, the following Amended Rule, in substitution of Rule 17th of the Rules of the Government Savings Bank, published in the Government Gazette under date the 16th March 1835.

Amended Rule 17th of the Government Savings Bank.

As a general Rule, deposits, with the Interest due thereon, will be repaid to the Depositors personally in all practicable cases. Military Officers and Soldiers, European and Native, at Out-stations, who may be desirous of making, payable to the Presidency, any sum or sums of money out of their deposits in the Government Savings Bank, can do so, by first withdrawing the necessary amount through their respective Regimental Pay Masters, and then remitting the same themselves in the Regimental Monthly Remittance List to the Military Pay Master at the Presidency, who, on the receipt of such list, will pay it on application to the individual entitled thereto. No private Drafts upon the Government Savings Bank drawn by Soldiers will be henceforth paid by that Institution.

LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS.

FORT WILLIAM,
LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT,
THE 22D APRIL 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 22nd April, 1842.

ACT No. — of 1842.

For the better collection of Revenue from Lands within the Bombay Presidency, of which the Revenue has been alienated by the State.

I. Whereas it is expedient to authorize the grant by the Governor in Council of Bombay of Commissions to certain Jageerdaars, at the discretion of the said Governor in Council, by virtue of which such Jageerdaars shall possess increased powers for collecting the Revenue due to them in respect of Lands within the Bombay Presidency of which the Revenue has been alienated by the State.

It is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council of Bombay, to grant to any Jageerdar, Surinjamdar, Inamdar, or other person holding Lands, the Revenue of which has been alienated to him by the State, a Commission conferring upon him authority for the collection of such Revenue by the powers hereinbefore mentioned, or such of them as shall be specified in the Commission in addition to the powers now exercisable by law.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that such Commission shall be granted or withheld, and, when granted shall be liable to be withdrawn at the discretion of Government, and such Commission may, if the Governor in Council of Bombay see fit, include one or more Agents of such Jageerdar or other holder of alienated Lands as well as such holder in person.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that the holder of such Commission shall have authority to demand security for the payment of the Land Revenue, in respect of the Lands specified in the Commissions, and, if the same be not furnished, to take such precaution as the Collector is authorized, to take under Section XI. Regulation XVII. of 1827, Bombay Code.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that the holder of such Commission shall have authority to send Mohussuls or Defaulters under the Provisions of Clauses 2, 3, 4, 5, Section XII. Regulation XVII. of 1827, Bombay Code, provided that one foot Mohussul only be employed in each case, and that the Mohussullee shall cease on the enforcement of any other remedy for the collection of the Revenue, except the taking of such security as aforesaid.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that the holder of any such Commission shall be authorized to attach the property of persons making default in the payment of such Revenue as aforesaid, making an immediate report to the Collector or his Assistant of his having done so, and should the demand on account of which the attachment may be made appear to the Collector or his Assistant to be just, he shall give orders for the sale of such property, and the sale shall be conducted agreeably to the Provisions of Clause VII. Sect. XII. Regulation XVII. of 1827, Bombay Code, except in cases in which the holder of the Commission by whom the attachment has been made shall be a Jageerdar, Surinjamdar or Inamdar, vested by Regulation XIII. of 1830, with civil jurisdiction and with power to execute his own decrees or his Agents, when the sale shall be conducted by him, and not by the Collector and his subordinate Revenue Officers.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that if the Revenue or rent payable by any Malgoozar or Ryot to a Jageerdar or other holder of Government alienated lands shall have been fixed by a Government Officer before the grant of the Land in Jageor, or if any Malgoozar or Ryot have paid at the same rate on account of any land for five years consecutively, or if the rent tendered by any Malgoozar or Ryot be at the usual rate payable for the Land according to the custom of the Village and Pergunna as declared by the Kookurnee and other Local Officers of Revenue, the demand by any Jageerdar under color of this Act of an excess of rent beyond the amount due as above provided shall be deemed to be extortion, and the person against whom such demand shall have been made shall obtain upon any judgment being passed after regular or summary trial three times the amount of any such excessive demand as damages for the same. Provided, however, that nothing herein prescribed or contained shall prevent a Jageerdar or other Lakhirajdar from instituting a suit in any Court of competent jurisdiction for the purpose of establishing his claim to re-assess the Lands of any Malgoozar or Ryot who may be paying less than the full Jumma to which he is justly liable, and upon the Jageerdaars obtaining a decree adjudging to him such power the demand made by him under such decree, shall if conformable thereto be deemed a legal demand for arrears, and shall be lovable by the same process as is above provided for other arrears due.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that no Jageerdar shall proceed under this Act by arrest or by restraint and sale of effects for any arrear of longer standing than one year from the date of instituting such process.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that the holder of any such Commission as is above described shall be liable to the same penalty for an excessive demand of Revenue or rent as other Jageerdaars.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that all compulsory process under this Act shall cease on the alleged defaulter furnishing security to pay the amount which may be decreed against him with costs and interest in a Court competent to try such suits, provided that such suits in which any one of the privileged classes established by Regulation XXIX. of 1827, Sections III. and IV. and by Regulation VII. of 1830, Bombay Code, may be the defendant, shall be tried before the Collector and his Assistants. Any thing in Regulations I and XVI. of 1831, notwithstanding, and any holder of any such Commission as aforesaid by himself or his Agents proceeding with any compulsory process under this Act after the furnishing of such security as aforesaid, or after the due tender thereof shall forfeit all the Revenue sought to be recovered by such compulsory process.

Ordered, that the Draft now read, be published for general information.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 22d of April 1842.

Act No. —— of 1842.

An Act concerning payment on account of Licenses for the sale of Spirits in the Islands of Bombay and Colaba.

I. It is hereby enacted, that whenever a License to Retail Spirituous Liquors in the Islands of Bombay and Colaba shall be granted under the Provisions of Act XVIII. of 1840, the Officers granting such Licenses shall be authorized to demand such Fee, Tax, or Duty in consideration of the privilege granted as may from time to time be fixed by such Officers under the sanction of the Governor of Bombay in Council, And such Fee, Tax, or Duty may be made payable in advance, or at such period as may be settled under such authority as aforesaid.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Officers granting such Licenses to withhold or recall the same in case the Fee, Tax, or Duty aforesaid be not duly paid according to the conditions upon which any such License shall be granted. And any person vending Spirituous Liquors within the Islands aforesaid whilst such License shall be withheld, or after it shall have been recalled as aforesaid shall be liable to all the penalties for vending Spirituous Liquors without a License.

ACT NO. —— of 1842.

An Act for annexing to the British Territory certain Villages belonging to the late Nepanee Jagheer, and acquisitions by exchange from the Sattara State, and for bringing under the Regulations an Inam Village of Purgunna Yelloor.

Whereas the villages lately composing the Nepanee Jagheer have lapsed to Government, and it has been deemed desirable, in order to the better consolidation and management of the British and Sattara territories, to exchange certain Villages for mutual convenience, and whereas the Village of Despoor, in Purgunna Yelloor, though held in Inam under the British Government has not yet been brought under the Regulations.

It is hereby enacted, that from the time of passing this Act, so much of Regulation XXIX. of 1827 and Regulation VII. of 1830, as relates to the undermentioned seven Villages, viz:

Naquelle mesma Circular vem transcripta o resultado das medidas que a Administração actual do Governo de S. M. Imperial, fez sentir imediatamente ao Corpo Legislativo, e as que absolutamente se fazião necessarias tomar para tirar o Paiz da má organização em que se achava, e dar mais vigor a ação do Governo, e mais força ao elemento Monarchico da Constituição do Imperio. Nas diferentes prorrogações que tiverem lugar durante as quais a grande maioria que sustenta o Governo, se conservou firme na Corte, com grande sacrificio de muitos Deputados e Senadores residentes nas Províncias, passarão Leis da maior importância política, taes são as que abaixo transcrevo.

1ro. A que dá exclusivamente ao Imperador o direito de nomear os Vices Presidentes das Províncias, que até agora erão da nomeação das Assembleas Provinciais, podendo apenas o Imperador inverter a ordem dessa nomeação.

2do. Aque reforma o Código do Processo Criminal, e entre outras disposições importantes, tira dos Juizes de Paz as atribuições Policiais, e a dos Juizes da nomeação do Governo.

3ro. Aque restabelece o Juizo dos Feitos da Fazenda, e habilita melhor o Governo, para a arrecadação das rendas públicas.

4to. Aque concede ao mesmo Governo hum Crédito de Seis Mil Contos de Reis, alem da receita ordinária.

5to. Aque autoriza para fazer Regulamentos tendentes a evitar o Comércio que com os Rebeldes fazem os Negociantes no Rio Grande do Sul.

6to. Aque melhora os soldos dos Militares de Mar e Terra.

7mo. Aque igualmente o autho iza para organizar o Quadro do Exército e da Armação.

8vo. Aque permite nas Províncias da Bahia, Pernambuco, e Maranhão, a circulação, e pagamentos de Juros das Apólices da Dívida Pública Fundada.

9no. Aque crea hum Conselho de Estado.

10mo. Aque reconhece como Princesa Brasileira a Senhora D. Maria Amélia, Filha Legítima de Suas Magestades o falecido Senhor D. Pedro Iro., e a Senhora Imperatriz D. Amélia.

11mo. Aque crea hum Azylo de Invalidos para a classe Militar.

12mo. Aque autoriza o Governo a destacar em quanto durar a rebellão do Rio Grande do Sul, ate Cinco Mil Homens da Guarda Nacional de todo o Imperio, para suprir as faltas de Tropa de linha.

13ro. Finalmente a Lei do Orçamento, na qual foram adoptados muitas disposições tendentes ao aumento da Renda pública; e outras em que he o Governo autorizado a fazer reformas importantes na repartição da Fazenda, na Secretarias de Estado, nos Arsenaes, Intendencias, e na Administração do Correio Geral, bem como a contratar em maior escala o serviço dos Paquetes de Vapor no Litoral do Im-

perio: alem de varias Resoluções de menor monta, mas que concorreu sem duvida para melhoramento que o Paiz reclamava.

Estes foram os resultados dos trabalhos no Corpo Legislativo naquella Sessão durante a Administração actual, nao obstante os maiores esforços, empregados em contrario pela muita dinâmica, mas muito tenaz oposição.

Estes resultados prova em primeiro lugar, que o Governo actual comprehende as necessidades do Paiz, naõ se desculpou de procurar satisfaze-las logo no começo do reinado de Sua Magestade o Imperador como muito convinha. Em segundo prova outro sim, que o Corpo Legislativo do Imperio estava possuído daquelas mesmas necessidades, e disposto a ocorrer a elas, mostrando, que não he em vão que o Governo Imperial appella para o seu patriotismo.

E posto que alguns discursos Parlamentares dos Membros da Oposição e seus Jornais, pertendesse fazer acreditar no Paiz e foras delle que as Províncias se revoltarião com tais medidas.

O Governo Imperial está bem convencido com a grande maioria sensata da Nação Brasileira, e quaisquer esforços dos inimigos da ordem e da Monarquia Representativa serão baldados (embora se acobertem com esse pretexto) attento o bom senso Nacional e mediante a vigilância da Authoridade Pública.

O Imperio acha-se em perfeito socorro, e posteriormente ao resultado daquelas medidas urgentes deliberadas por o Corpo Legislativo que teve lugar naquelas diferentes prorrogações da referida Sessão aparecem noticias do mesmo Imperio ate 16 de Fevereiro deste anno, transcritas no Pregoirio da Liberdade No. 20, de 14 de Maio, Jornal que não he suspeito, e em obsequio da verdade, declara o melhoramento que tem havido naquelle rico e vasto Imperio, durante a Administração actual, vindas do Rio de Janeiro pela Barca *Henry Duncan*, como transcrevo abaixo:

Pela Barca *Henry Duncan*, vinda do Rio de Janeiro, tivemos cartas e periodicos daquelle Imperio ate 16 de Fevereiro. As forças Imperiais tinham ultimamente alcançado vantagens decididas sobre os Insurgentes do Rio Grande do Sul. Em todo o resto do Imperio segundo pudemos colher d' uma vista muita ligeira que passamos pelos periodicos, reinava perfeito socorro. O Imperio parece que vai fazendo progressos rápidos em melhoramento material. Ja ali estavam em uso commum vapores, e diversas outras Maquinas, que suprem a falta de braços. Começaram a aparecer em diversos pontos do Imperio Colônias Agrícolas, e Industriais, que diffundindo pelo Paiz conchecimentos uteis e praticos devem grandemente concorrer para acelerar a marcha da Civilização naquelle tão vasto e rico Imperio.

Alem desta publicação, receberão-se cartas por aquelle mesmo Navio, em que dizem—Conservão-se com as Pastas do Governo de Sua Magestade Imperial, a dos Estrangeiros os Senhores—Aureliano de Souza e Oliveira Coutinho—João Clemente, com a da Guerra—Calmão, Fazenda—O Marquez de Paranaguá, Marinha—Candido Joze de Araujo Viana, Imperio—e o Paulino Joze Suares de Souza, Justiça—os quais tem em ambas as Camaras grande maioria, e assim elles tivessem obrado com maior energia que he mister, para fazer callar os ruguentos, mas apesar disto toda a gente boa esta contente com esta Administração, pelas medidas que tem tomado, junto com a maioria das Camaras, para as prosperidades deste Imperio, e concorrido para a tranquilidade publica em que se acha.

Faço esta publicação, para destruir quaisquer falacides que por ventura possam espalhar aquelles, que não estão ao facto do estado actual daquelle Imperio, a que tenho a honra de pertencer.
