RULE.

When an Officer has been temporarily holding a Civil or Military Staff appointment, in consequence of the absence of the fixed Incumbent on sick leave within the limits prescribed in the Absentee Rules of the 29th January 1810, and the latter proceed to Europe, or otherwise vacate the appointment during absence the locum tenens shall not be entitled to any higher allowances by reason of such vacancy, and in the event of his being permanently appointed to the Office in which he has been officiating, he shall receive the full salary of that Office only from the date of his permanent appointment.

No. 646 of 1842.—With reference to the Orders as per margin* the Hon'ble the Governor in Council in order to prevent misapprehension, is pleased to explain.

That the following Orders are in force, in so far as regards the Wound Pensions of Men enlisted previous to the 1st May 1837,

1st. All Native Soldiers on the Establishment of this Presidency who may lose a limb or be otherwise disabled by wounds on Service shall be Pensioned on the full Pay of their Rank for life. The same indulgence will be extended to Native Soldiers who may be affected with total loss of sight in the Honorable Company's Service.

2nd. They will have no claim to the Pensions laid down in G. G. O. 8th June 1837, & 3rd February 1840, which are exclusively applicable to Men enlisted after 1st May 1837.

3d. Their Service Pensions to be regulated by the Rules laid down in Separate G. O. No. 2. Paras. 92 to 102, but in no case to be drawn in addition to the Wound Pension allowed by the G. G. O. 30th June 1811. The maximum in any case being full Pay.

4th. Sepoys enlisted after 1st May 1837, are entitled to the new or Bengal Scale of Pensions for Wounds and Service and to no other; neither can they claim the benefit of the above Order (1811) respecting loss of sight.

5th. The Orders of the 15th September 1824, and the 3th January 1825, in as far as they direct, that Native Officers and Sepoys not Natives of the Bombay Provinces (enlisted after 3rd January 1825,) who may wish to be Pensioned within the Territories Subordinate to the Bengal Government are in no instance to be allowed to receive a greater rate of Pension than is granted to corresponding Ranks under the Government of Fort William is to be carefully attended to. The rates to be those at present in force under that Presidency, G. G. O. 3rd February 1840, for Wounds and G. G. O. 8th June 1837, for Service.

LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS.

FORT WILLIAM, LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT,

THE 30TH SEPTEMBER 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 30th of September 1842 :—

ACT No. — 1842.

An Act for the better Administration of Justice within the Town of Calcutta in small causes not included within the jurisdiction of the Court of Requests.

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after it shall be lawful for any one of the Judges of Her Majesty's Supreme Court to hold a Court for the hearing and decision of all matters for which a Civil Action at Law will lie in the said Supreme Court except as hereinafter mentioned, according to the Law there administered, subject to such modifications as are hereinafter authorized—provided that the amount claimed by the Plaintiff do not exceed 400 Company's Rupees, and provided the suit be not founded on any demand of damages for an assault or battery, or for written or verbal defamation.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that Suits at present cognizable by the Court of Requests shall be brought before that Court as heretofore, and not before the Judge holding the Court indicated in the last Section—provided that no judgment passed by the Judge holding such Court shall be impeached for error, or be held as extra judicial on the ground that the Suit ought to have been brought in the Court of Requests.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Supreme Court shall make Rules for the proceedings before a Judge holding such Court as is established by this Act—which Rules shall regulate the manner of proceeding in the said Court, viz. the institution of the Suit, the entry of the Plaintiff, the Process, the entry of the Defence, and other subsequent allegation by either party, and the practice of the said Court, the fees to be taken, and the costs to be allowed. Provided that both Plaintiffs and Defendants be liable to be examined at the discretion of the Judge, and that no witness be deemed incompetent to give testimony upon any ground whatever. Provided further, that all such Rules shall receive the confirmation of the Governor General in Council before they are put in force.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that in order to reduce the costs of Suit and to render the same proportionate to the amount of the demand recoverable before the said Court the allegations of the parties be not entered in any written pleadings to be delivered between party and party, but be made orally before the Officiating Judge and be by him directed to be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose to be termed the Book of Pleadings of the said Court, and be entered accordingly under his direction in untechnical and concise language, according to the legal effect thereof, to which Books the parties shall have at all times access without the payment of any fee or reward.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that no Costs of employing any Counsel or Attorney shall be allowed on the taxation of Costs in any Suit in the Court hereby established unless the Judge who presided at the trial shall certify that the nature of the case was such as to render the employment of Counsel or Attorney expedient for the attainment of justice.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Supreme Court shall with the consent of the Governor General in Council thereto previously obtained, and with the like consent previously obtained to the salaries hereinafter mentioned, appoint such Officers as shall be necessary for transacting the business of the said

Court established by this Act to be remunerated as far as the same will extend out of the fees of the said last mentioned Court; Provided that the fees hereby directed to be imposed shall be subject to the revision of the said Governor General in Council from time to time, and that the same shall be reduced from time to time if the same shall be found to exceed the amount of the reasonable expenses of the maintenance of the said Court including all such salaries as aforesaid.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that all the power and authority vested in the Supreme Court in the case of Civil Actions shall be vested in every Judge holding such Court as is established by this Act.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 30th day of November next.

FORT WILLIAM, LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT,

THE 30TH SEPTEMBER, 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 30th of September 1842 :

ACT No. — OF 1842.

An Act for the better Execution of Decrees in the Territories subject to the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

I. It is hereby enacted, that so much of Sections 10 and 11, Regulation I. 1793, Section 7, Regulation XXVII 1795, Sections 37 and 38, Regulation XXV. 1803, and Sections 27 and 28, Regulation IX 1805, as relate to the adjustment of the Government Jumma on Lands exposed to public sale, in satisfaction of the Decrees of the Courts of Civil Judicature; Regulations XLV. 1793 and XX. 1795, Sections 15 to 26 inclusive of Regulation XXVI. 1803; so much of Section 27 of the same Regulation as relates to sales of Land in satisfaction of Decrees; and Sections 4 and 5, Regulation VII. 1825, be repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that attachments and sales of Land, or of any interest in Land in satisfaction of the Decrees, or other Process of the Courts of Civil Judicature shall hereafter be made by such Courts, or under their immediate directions; and that the Rules now in force for the attachment and sale of such real property as the Courts of Civil Judicature were heretofore authorized to sell in satisfaction of Decrees without application to the Revenue authorities, shall apply to all attachments and sales made under the authority of this Act.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that all sales of Land, or of any interest in Land made under the authority of this Act, shall be deemed to be of the nature of private transfers.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that the Courts of Sudder Dewanny Adawlut shall from time to time frame such Rules as to them shall seem meet for the attachment and sale of property in satisfaction of Decrees or other Process of the Courts of Civil Judicature, which Rules shall, after they have been approved by the Governor General of India in Council, have the same force, as if they had been part of this Act, until revoked by the said Courts of Sudder Dewanny Adawlut, with the approbation of the said Governor General of India in Council, or by the said Governor General of India in Council.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that all applications which may have been made by the Courts of Civil Judicature to the Revenue Authorities for the sale of

Land or of any interest in Land, in satisfaction of Decrees or other Process of such Courts, previously to the passing of this Act, shall be proceeded upon in the same manner as if this Act had not been passed.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that the operation of this Act shall be confined to the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal; and that no part of this Act shall affect the process of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature, or of the Court of Requests at Calcutta, or of the Recorder's Court in the Straits of Malacca.

Ordered, that the Draft now read, be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 30th day of November next.

HEAD QUARTERS, SIMLA, THE 5TH OCTOBER 1842.

Since the public Notification of the 30th ultimo, the Governor General has received the gratifying intelligence of the safety of all the European Prisoners but one, in the following extract from a communication from Major General Pollock, C. B., dated the 21st ultimo.

EXTRACT FROM A LETTER TO THE GOVERNOR GENERAL FROM MAJOR GENERAL POLLOCK, C. B.

Dated Camp Cabool, 21st September 1842.

"MY LORD,

It gives me great gratification to be enabled to state, that the whole of the European Prisoners are now quite free from the hands of Mahomed Akbar, except Captain Bygrave. I will make my official report on this subject whenever they reach my Camp, which will no doubt be to-morrow. I sent a lightly equipped Force, under Sir R. Sale, to meet them, and the whole of the party is with him, with the following exceptions, who have already reached my Camp:

I have the honor to report, for the information of His Excellency the Commander in Chief, that having received information from Bamean, that the Europeans, Officers and Soldiers, Prisoners there, had made arrangements by which they hoped to effect their own liberation, I, at the suggestion of Mohun Loll, with the concurrence of Khan Sheereen Khan, Chief of the Kuzzulbashes, sanctioned the speedy departure of (700) seven hundred of his horse on the 15th instant, the day of our arrival here, to meet the party. Some difficulty occurring on the score of money, I advanced

ten thousand (10,000) Rupees, which were delivered by Sir R. Shakespear, who accompanied the Kuzzulbashes. Being apprehensive that attempts would be made to intercept the Prisoners, I detached Major General Sir R. Sale, with the Troops named in the margin, on the 19th instant, to the Arghundee pass, and the circumstance proved fortunate, as a delay of twenty-four hours would have enabled Sultan Jan, who was in pursuit, to over-take our people. I am happy to state, that the whole who were in confinement, (as per subjoined roll) with the exception of Captain Bygrave, who is with Mahomed Akbar, arrived in my Camp yesterday evening.

I cannot conclude without recording my opinion, that to Khan Sheereen Khan and Mohun Loll may be attributed the safety of the Prisoners, and I have reason to believe the Chief of the Kuzzulbashes to be a steadfast adherent to the British Government.
