Is hereby given, that Tenders will be received by the Clerk to Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, at his Office in the Town Hall, on or before Tuesday the 8th November next, from persons desirous of contracting for the thoroughly cleansing and keeping at all times in a state of cleanliness; the whole of the Streets, Lanes, Side Gutters, and Gullies, together with the Main Drains and Open Drains, within the Town Limits, Lists of which may be seen on application at the office of the Clerk to Her Majesty's Justices.

The Contractor will likewise be required to remove all accumulations of filth, on vacant or open spaces of the ground or passages; in any part of the Town, within the Limits, as well as any fresh filth that may be made thereon, during the term of his contract.

The Tenders will be received for the cleansing of the Streets, Lanes, &c. within the Fort, and in the Native Town, together or separately, for the period of one, two, or three years, commencing from the 1st December next.

The cleansing of the said Streets, Lanes, &c. to be performed daily and to be commenced at day-light and completed and the dirt removed therefrom and carted away, by five o'clock of the afternoon of such day, the filth and dirt so removed to be deposited in such places as will be from time to time pointed out by the Overseer of the Streets and Roads under the direction of the Committee of Conservancy and no other, without the express permission of the Committee of Conservancy.

Payments will be made monthly under a certificate from the Committee that the cleansing of the said Streets, Lanes, Side Gutters, Gullies, Open Spaces of Ground and Passages and Main and Open Drains, has during the preceding month been properly performed, but if otherwise, or if sufficient and efficiently contrived carts and persons are not employed for its due performance and within the time prescribed, the Overseer under the orders of the Committee will, after giving written notice of 24 hours, proceed to employ Carts and persons to make the necessary cleansing and removal of filth &c. from the aforesaid Streets, Lanes, Side Gutters and Gullies &c. &c.

Every expense incurred in conformity with the above clause, will be deducted from the Contractor's monthly payments, and in addition to such expense a fine not exceeding " Fifty Rupees " will be levied on the Contractor for each instance of neglecting to make such cleansings or of leaving the filth taken from any Road, Side Gutter, Gullies, Drain &c. &c. unremoved or on the side of the Road, longer than the time above prescribed, or of depositing any filth in any place except that pointed out to him, provided such neglect is proved to the satisfaction of the said Committee of Conservancy.

Every person submitting a Tender will be required to lodge with it the sum of 500 Rupees, which will be forfeited in case of delay, evasion or refusal to execute the deed of contract, should his tender be accepted.

Unexceptionable security will be required from each contractor, himself in half the amount of the sum contracted for, and two securities (whose names must be inserted in the tender) in the amount of the other half so contracted for, to be forfeited in failure of the due performance of the said contract.

The Tender must be enclosed in a sealed Envelope and forwarded on or before 3 o'clock of the afternoon of the day specified, and all persons tendering must appear before the Committee of Conservancy on the above named day at their Office in the Town Hall, with their securities.

No reason will be assigned for the rejection of any Tender.

The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for general information, the following Amended Rule in substitution of Rule 8th of the Rules of the Government Savings Bank, published in the Government Gazette, under date the 16th March 1835, and the modification thereof notified in the Government Gazette on the 10th April 1839.

Amended Rule 8th of the Government Savings Bank.

Whenever the sum deposited by any one individual shall amount to 500 Rupees, the same or so much thereof as may be necessary will be transferred from the Bank to the Government Agents, subject to the Rules which obtain in that department, for the purchase of a Government Note, in the five per cent, or any other Loan, which may be preferred, and pointed out by the Depositor, a delay of one month being allowed, in all cases where the Depositor may intimate intention to withdraw the whole, or any portion of the funds within one month from the date it has reached that amount, when should no withdrawal have been made, a transfer will be effected, as if no such notice had been given, and all Government Securities shall be handed over to the Government Agency at the expiration of three months, (subject to all the rules which obtain in that department) unless counter-instructions be immediately received from the proprietors.

This Rule shall not however be considered to affect the Deposits of Native Officers and Soldiers of the Bombay Army, on whose behalf it is hereby provided, that whenever the sums deposited by any of the said Native Officers, or Soldiers shall amount in the aggregate to 500 Rupees, should no notice be received from the Depositor within one month from the date that his deposits have reached that amount either for their refund or investment in securities of the Government of India, the amount in question will then be paid into the General Treasury, and in lieu of the certificate, which the Sub-Treasurer will grant for the same, the Accountant General will issue a Treasury Note, in favor of the Depositor bearing Interest at 4 per cent per annum, repayable after three months notice at the option of the Holder.

These Treasury Notes will not be transferable, and the interest on them will be payable only at the General Treasury, of Bombay, but on the requisition of Holders preferred through their immediate Commanding Officers, the Accountant General may authorize the Interest to be paid from any of the Provincial Treasuries under this Presidency.

When depositors have required their deposits to be invested in other Government Securities, they will be bound by the terms of those securities.

The Governor General, taking into consideration the many eminent services which Mr. George Clerk, his Agent on the North Western Frontier, has rendered to the Government during the whole course of the Afghan war, is pleased, in testimony of his entire approbation, to confer upon that Officer the title of Envoy to the Maha Rajah Shere Sing, that so in all future communications with the Durbar of Lahore, Mr. George Clerk may bear the highest rank expressive of the highest confidence of the Governor General.

The Envoy to the Maha Rajah will, in all communications with His Highness and the Durbar of Lahore, bear the title of Excellency.

Mr. H. H. Greathead is appointed Secretary of Legation.

LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS.

FORT WILLIAM, LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT, THE 26TH AUGUST, 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 26th of August 1842.

ACT No.—OF 1842.

An Act for amending the Bengal Code with regard to the punishment of affrays.

1. It is hereby enacted, that all persons committing any affray, and using therein any weapon whatever within the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, shall be punishable with imprisonment with or without labor for any period not exceeding two years; or with fine not exceeding 500 Rs. or both; and in either case the fine may be enforced by imprisonment with or without labor for a year.

2. And it is hereby enacted, that all persons committing any affray, but not using arms therein within the Presidency aforesaid, shall be punishable with imprisonment with or without hard labor for any period not exceeding one year, or with fine not exceeding 500 Rs. or both, the fine to be enforced as aforesaid.

3. And it is hereby enacted, that if the affray shall be attended with homicide, every person guilty thereof, and who shall not be found guilty of murder, shall be punishable with imprisonment with or without hard labor for any period not exceeding five years, or a fine of 1000 Rupees or both; the fine being commutable by imprisonment with or without hard labor for two years.

4. And it is hereby enacted, that persons guilty of the offences indicated in this Act, shall be punishable on conviction before any Magistrate, except where the affray is attended with homicide.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 26th day of November next.

FORT WILLIAM, LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT, THE 16TH SEPTEMBER, 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th of September 1842.

ACT No.—OF 1842.

An Act for amending the Law concerning Appeals from Justice of the Peace, and from Magistrates acting under the Statute 53, Geo III. Ch. 155.

Whereas, in many cases provided by law, offences may be prosecuted before Magistrates not acting within the local limits of the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Supreme Courts, and which such Magistrates may take cognizance of either in their Magisterial capacity under the Regulations, or as Justices of the Peace. And whereas the Appeal from convictions before Magistrates acting in their Magisterial capacities, and from the like convictions before Justices of the Peace are subject to different rules. And whereas in all cases of convictions before Justices of the Peace in the Mofussil and before Magistrates exercising jurisdiction under the provisions of Statute 53 Geo. III. C. 155, in cases of assaults, forcible entries, or other injuries accompanied with force committed by British subjects, the law as to Appeals requires amendment.

1. It is hereby enacted, that an Appeal shall lie from all sentences passed by any Justice of the Peace acting without the local limits of any of Her Majesty's Supreme Courts upon convictions had before him for any offence, and from all sentences passed by any

Magistrate upon convictions had before him exercising such jurisdictions as aforesaid to the same authority and subject to the same rules as are provided by the Regulations and Acts of the Government in the case of sentences passed by Magistrates in the exercise of their ordinary jurisdiction.

II. And it is hereby provided, that nothing in this Act contained shall be held to take away the power of quashing any conviction by means of a Writ of Certiorari.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 16th day of December next.

FORT WILLIAM, LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT, THE 30TH SEPTEMBER 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 30th of September 1842 :—

ACT No. — 1842.

An Act for the better Administration of Justice within the Town of Calcutta, in small causes not included within the jurisdiction of the Court of Requests.

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after it shall be lawful for any one of the Judges of Her Majesty's Supreme Court to hold a Court for the hearing and decision of all matters for which a Civil Action at Law will lie in the said Supreme Court except as hereinafter mentioned, according to the Law there administered, subject to such modifications as are hereinafter authorized—provided that the amount claimed by the Plaintiff do not exceed 400 Company's Rupees, and provided the suit be not founded on any demand of damages for an assault or battery, or for written or verbal defamation.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that Suits at present cognizable by the Court of Requests shall be brought before that Court as heretofore, and not before the Judge holding the Court indicated in the last Section—provided that no judgment passed by the Judge holding such Court shall be impeached for error, or be held as extra judicial on the ground that the Suit ought to have been brought in the Court of Requests.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Supreme Court shall make Rules for the proceedings before a Judge holding such Court as is established by this Act—which Rules shall regulate the manner of proceeding in the said Court, viz. the institution of the Suit, the entry of the Plaintiff, the Process, the entry of the Defence, and other subsequent allegations by either party, and the practice of the said Court, the fees to be taken, and the costs to be allowed. Provided that both Plaintiffs and Defendants be liable to be examined at the discretion of the Judge, and that no witness be deemed incompetent to give testimony upon any ground whatever. Provided further, that all such Rules shall receive the confirmation of the Governor General in Council before they are put in force.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that in order to reduce the costs of Suit and to render the same proportionate to the amount of the demand recoverable before the said Court the allegations of the parties be not entered in any written pleadings to be delivered between party and party, but be made orally before the Officiating Judge and be by him directed to be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose

to be termed the Book of Pleadings of the said Court, and be entered accordingly under his direction in untechnical and concise language, according to the legal effect thereof; to which Books the parties shall have at all times access without the payment of any fee or reward.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that no Costs of employing any Counsel or Attorney shall be allowed on the taxation of Costs in any Suit in the Court hereby established unless the Judge who presided at the trial shall certify that the nature of the case was such as to render the employment of Counsel or Attorney expedient for the attainment of justice.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Supreme Court shall with the consent of the Governor General in Council thereto previously obtained, and with the like consent previously obtained to the salaries hereinafter mentioned, appoint such Officers as shall be necessary for transacting the business of the said Court established by this Act to be remunerated as far as the same will extend out of the fees of the said last mentioned Court; Provided that the fees hereby directed to be imposed shall be subject to the revision of the said Governor General in Council from time to time, and that the same shall be reduced from time to time if the same shall be found to exceed the amount of the reasonable expenses of the maintenance of the said Court including all such salaries as aforesaid.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that all the power and authority vested in the Supreme Court in the case of Civil Actions shall be vested in every Judge holding such Court as is established by this Act.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 30th day of November next.

THE 30TH SEPTEMBER, 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 30th of September 1842:

ACT No. — OF 1842.

An Act for the better Execution of Decrees in the Territories subject to the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

I. It is hereby enacted, that so much of Sections 10 and 11, Regulation I. 1793, Section 7, Regulation XXVII. 1795, Sections 37 and 38, Regulation XXV. 1803, and Sections 27 and 28, Regulation IX. 1805, as relate to the adjustment of the Government Jumma on Lands exposed to public sale, in satisfaction of the Decrees of the Courts of Civil Judicature; Regulations XLV. 1793 and XX. 1795, Sections 15 to 26 inclusive of Regulation XXVI. 1803; so much of Section 27 of the same Regulation as relates to sales of Land in satisfaction of Decrees; and Sections 4 and 5, Regulation VII. 1825, be repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that attachments and sales of Land, or of any interest in Land in satisfaction of the Decrees, or other Process of the Courts of Civil Judicature shall hereafter be made by such Courts, or under their immediate directions; and that the Rules now in force for the attachment and sale of such real property as the Courts of Civil Judicature were heretofore authorized to sell in satisfaction of Decrees without application to the Revenue authorities, shall apply to all attachments and sales made under the authority of this Act.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that all sales of Land, or of any interest in Land made under the authority of this Act, shall be deemed to be of the nature of private transfers.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that the Courts of Sudder Dewanny Adawlut shall from time to time frame such Rules as to them shall seem meet for the attachment and sale of property in satisfaction of Decrees or other Process of the Courts of Civil Judicature, which Rules shall, after they have been approved by the Governor General of India in Council, have the same force, as if they had been part of this Act, until revoked by the said Courts of Sudder Dewanny Adawlut, with the approbation of the said Governor General of India in Council, or by the said Governor General of India in Council.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that all applications which may have been made by the Courts of Civil Judicature to the Revenue Authorities for the sale of Land or of any interest in Land, in satisfaction of Decrees or other Process of such Courts, previously to the passing of this Act, shall be proceeded upon in the same manner as if this Act had not been passed.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that the operation of this Act shall be confined to the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal; and that no part of this Act shall affect the process of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature, or of the Court of Requests at Calcutta, or of the Recorder's Court in the Straits of Malacca.

Ordered, that the Draft now read, be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 30th day of November next.

ACT No. — OF 1842.

An Act for the better Regulation of Cantonments.

I. It is hereby enacted, that any person, whether European or Native, not being a Sutler, or amenable to the Articles of War, or a Camp Follower, who shall convey Liquor of any description into Military Cantonments or Bazars, without written authority from the Officer Commanding at the Station, or shall without such authority, sell or supply the same to any European Soldier or European Woman, shall be punishable before any Magistrate or Justice, in a fine not exceeding 20 Rupees, or imprisonment not exceeding one month.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 30th day of December next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 7th of October 1842.

ACT No. — OF 1842.

An Act to facilitate the Execution of Process issued by any of Her Majesty's Courts of Justice in India.

and for the improvement of the administration of Justice therein.

Whereas it is desirable to render more effectual the execution of the Judgments, Decrees, Orders and of all Process of Her Majesty's Courts of Justice in India, beyond the local limits of their respective jurisdictions, and to that end to apply the provisions of the Act No. XXIII. of 1810, for the execution within the Local Limits of Her Majesty's Courts in India of Legal Process issued by the authorities in the Mofussil, to the execution without such Local Limits of the Legal Process issued by Her said Majesty's Courts as nearly as the same may be made applicable thereto.

1. It is hereby enacted, that any Writ, Order, Warrant, or other Process whatsoever issued by any of Her Majesty's Courts of Justice in India may be executed as follows out of the Local Limits of those Courts respectively and within the respective Presidencies in which they are established in addition to such ways and means whereby the same may now be executed. A copy of such Writ, Order, Warrant or other Process and of all indorsements thereon purporting to be made by the Court issuing the same or any Judge thereof and authenticated by the Seal of the Court out of which it issues, and which Seal shall be taken to prove itself, and shall be sufficient proof of such Writ, Order, Warrant, Process, and of such Indorsements as aforesaid shall be forwarded to any Judge of any Court of the Honorable East India Company, Justice of the Peace, or any Magistrate in the Service of the said Honorable Company in and for the district or place wherein the same is to be executed, and whose aid in the execution of the said Writ, Order, Warrant or other Process is desired, who is hereby authorized and required under his hand and signature to endorse the same, and to direct the same to be executed within the limits of his jurisdiction according to the nature of such Writ, Order, Warrant or other Process, as nearly as may be as any Writ, Warrant, Order, Process or Proceeding for the like purpose would be executed when originally issued or made by any such Judge, Justice of the Peace or Magistrate as aforesaid.

II. And it is hereby provided, that the person or persons to whom the delivery of such Order, Writ, Warrant or Process so endorsed as aforesaid is made shall execute the same according to the said direction, and the same shall be executed in all cases as nearly as may be as if the same had originally been issued or made by the said Judge, Justice of the Peace or Magistrate, and shall be subject to the same rules touching priority and the mode and order of execution as shall be then in force in respect of process or proceedings originally issued by such Judge, Justice of the Peace or Magistrate. Provided always, that no Judge, Justice of the Peace, or Magistrate, nor any persons acting according to the said direction, shall be liable to any suit or action or other proceeding for putting in execution the said Writ, Warrant, Order, or other Process aforesaid according to the direction therein contained.

III. And it is hereby provided, that if the said Writ, Order, Warrant or Process shall be bailable, and shall by indorsement under the hand of any Judge of the Court issuing the same direct in what amount and with what number of Sureties bail shall be taken, the said Judge, Justice of the Peace, or Magistrate aforesaid is hereby authorized and required to take such bail as is thereby directed to be taken, but if no such direction be given, then to take such bail as he shall think fit, and the same shall in either case to all intents and purposes be as valid, and the Recognizance or other instrument of bail shall be as binding to all intents and purposes as well for purposes of jurisdiction as otherwise, and shall have all the like consequences as if the same had been taken before the said Court from which such Writ, Order,

Warrant or Process originally issued, or before any Judge thereof

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that all persons disobeying or obstructing the execution of any Order, Writ, Warrant, or other Process endorsed under this Act, shall be punishable in like manner and amenable to the same jurisdiction for such disobedience or obstruction, as if the same had been originally issued by such Judge, Justice of the Peace or Magistrate as aforesaid. Provided always, that in the case of Process for the attendance of Witnesses, the same rules shall be observed concerning the tender of expences and other matters as are established in regard to Subpoenas issued from Her Majesty's said Court.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that in the case of persons seized or detained by virtue of any Order, Writ, Warrant or other Process executed under the authority of this Act, where the same is endorsed as hereinafter mentioned, it shall be the duty of such Judge, Justice of the Peace, or Magistrate, and they are hereby required to deliver the person or persons in custody to the authority of persons specified by indorsement on the said Writ, and who shall have been charged with the execution of the Writ, Warrant, or other Process by the authority originally issuing the same, and for that purpose to cause the party to be conveyed to any place within the Company's Territories beyond the Local Limits of the jurisdiction of such Judge, Justice of the Peace or Magistrate. And it is further provided, that the same indorsement shall be signed by one of the Judges of the said Court.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that all Writs, Process and other proceedings as aforesaid of Her said Majesty's Courts which are intended to be executed by the aid of any Judge of any of the Courts of the Honorable East India Company, or of any Justice of the Peace, or of any such Magistrate as aforesaid, shall be in the same form and be addressed in like manner as they are now addressed, but in addition thereto shall have endorsed on the same under the hand of any of the Judges of the Court out of which the same shall issue.

The following word or words to the like effect:

"This (describing the instrument,) may be executed under the provisions of the Act of _____ by any Judge, Justice of the Peace, or Magistrate thereby authorized to act in aid of the execution of the Process of Her Majesty's Courts in India," and thereupon the same may either be exercised by and under the provisions of this Act; or in any manner in which the same may otherwise by Law be executed; and the party or parties suing out such Process as aforesaid may instead of delivering the same to the Sheriff or other person to whom the same is addressed, transmit the same for execution to the Judge, Justice of the Peace or Magistrate, by whom the same is intended to be executed in aid, and in such case the Sheriff or other person to whom the same is addressed shall not be liable in any way in respect of the execution or non-execution of the same, nor be in any manner called upon to return the same.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that every Judge of the Honorable the East India Company's Courts, or any Magistrate in the Service of the said Company, or any Justice of the Peace, shall within the limits of their respective jurisdictions and without the local limits of Calcutta, Madras or Bombay respectively, have authority and power to take any affidavit or solemn declaration that shall be made before them in any proceeding then pending, in the Supreme Court of the Presidency, or that shall be made with a view to institute, and as the foundation for instituting any proceeding in the Supreme Court of that Presidency in which their respective jurisdiction lies; and all such affidavits and solemn declaration so made and taken as aforesaid shall be as valid to all intents and purposes as if the same had been made and taken be-

fore such Court or Judge thereof, or any Commissioner under any Commission issuing therefrom, and shall be deemed to have been taken judicially, and any person or persons making any affidavit or solemn declaration under the powers given by this Act, shall be liable if he swear falsely or make a false declaration to be indicted for misdemeanour in the Supreme Court of that Presidency to which the proceeding relates.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 7th day of January next

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 14th of October 1842:

Act No.—OF 1842.

An Act for amending the Law concerning the Registration of written conveyances and other instruments affecting titles and other interests to land.

Whereas the Registry Laws now in force in the respective Mofussils of Bengal, Madras and Bombay, provide that registered conveyances and other instruments affecting titles to land and other interests therein shall not take precedence of unregistered conveyances and instruments in cases where the party registering shall have known of the existence of such unregistered conveyances or other instruments. And whereas a complicated system of law has arisen out of the construction which is to be given to the provisions regarding the knowledge of parties, or notice had by them in such cases. And whereas much perjury has been committed in investigations touching the fact of such notice or knowledge, and much of the time of the Courts has been occupied with such investigations. And whereas in consequence of forgeries, perjuries, fraudulent concealments, and other practices, no person purchasing or advancing money on the security of land, can safely rely on the conveyances or other instruments affecting the title to such land or other interest therein affording, by means of their being registered, a security against conveyances or instruments being set up, as of previous date, by unregistered claimants;—

It is hereby enacted, that all provisions contained in any Regulation or Regulations of the Bengal, Madras, or Bombay Codes, touching such knowledge or notice as aforesaid, of previous unregistered conveyances, or instruments affecting titles to land or other interests therein shall be repealed from the first day of May next; and every conveyance or other instrument affecting title to land, or any interest in the same authorized by those Codes respectively, to be registered, shall so far as regards any lands to which the same relate, be void as against any person claiming under any subsequent conveyance or other instrument duly registered, unless the prior conveyance or instrument shall have been duly registered before the registration of the subsequent conveyance or instrument; any alleged notice or knowledge of such prior conveyance or instrument notwithstanding. Provided always, that this Act shall not be construed to extend to any conveyance or other instrument made before the first day of May next.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 14th day of January next.

GENERAL ORDERS BY THE RIGHT HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA.

SECRET DEPARTMENT; SIMLA, THE 14TH OCTOBER 1842.

The Governor General has sincere satisfaction in announcing the termination of the war with China, by a Peace honorable to Her Majesty's Crown, and durable in its provisions, which was concluded in the British Camp, under the walls of the Imperial City of Nankin, on the 29th of August.

Thus within two months after the arrival of the re-inforcements sent from England and from India, for the prosecution of this third campaign, the direction of a preponderating force to the true point of attack has compelled the Emperor of China to submit to all Her Majesty's just demands.

The Emperor could only save the internal trade of his empire from ruin, his ancient capital from capture by assault, and his empire itself from the peril of dissolution, by yielding to such conditions as it was Her Majesty's pleasure to impose, in order to afford to the subjects of Her Crown indemnity for the past and security for the future.

This event, glorious as it is to Her Majesty's arms, will convey to Her Majesty's heart other and yet higher satisfaction than that which is derived from the contemplation of military success, in the cessation of hostilities which have unhappily involved the most afflicting evils to humanity.

The Governor General cannot presume to offer to the Commanders of Her Majesty's naval and military forces employed on the Coast of China, in the execution of Her Majesty's orders, the expression of the feelings 'with which their zeal, their energy, and their ability, have inspired him; nor is it for him to presume to anticipate the approbation which the brave Seamen and Marines and Soldiers under their command may receive from the high authority under which they have the honor to serve. The Governor General can only offer to the Commanders of Her Majesty's forces his grateful acknowledgments of the regard they have ever evinced during these joint operations for the army and fleet of India, and his thanks for the opportunity they have on all occasions afforded to the Native troops of proving themselves to be worthy of fighting by the side of British Soldiers.

The short duration of the operations of the troops on shore, has not afforded to every corps of the Native army of India, the opportunity which all ardently desired of distinguishing themselves before the enemy, but wherever that opportunity has been afforded, the several corps of the army of India have added to their acknowledged fame.

Three companies of the battalion of Bengal volunteers had the good fortune to be the first engaged with the enemy before the City of Ching-Keang, and they well sustained the high reputation of the army they represented.

The 2nd and 6th regiments, and the rifle company of the 36th regiment of Madras native infantry, were engaged in the capture by assault of that City, on the 21st of July.

On that occasion, as on all others, the Madras artillery and the Madras sappers and miners maintained the high character which has always been attached to their respective corps in the Madras army.

The Governor General is pleased to direct, that in commemoration of the distinguished services rendered by those corps in co-operation with Her Majesty's troops in the capture of the City of Ching-Keang, the 2d and 6th regiments of Madras native infantry, and the rifle company of the 36th regiment Madras native infantry, shall hereafter bear upon their appointments a Dragon wearing an Imperial Crown; and that the same honor shall be granted to such troops or companies of the Madras artillery and of the Madras sappers and miners, as His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir Hugh Gough may designate as justly entitled to that distinction by their service before the enemy in China, in the present or in the previous campaigns.

The Governor General is likewise pleased to direct, that the 2d and 6th regiments of Madras native infantry shall hereafter bear upon their colours a golden Dragon wearing an Imperial Crown.

The Governor General requests, that His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir Hugh Gough will have the goodness to transmit to him a nominal list of such Officers, Non-commissioned Officers & Privates, of the several corps of the army of India serving under His Excellency's command, in the present or in the previous campaigns, as he may deem to be justly entitled by their services before the enemy to the honor of wearing a medal commemorative of such services; and to every Officer, Non-commissioned Officer and Private named in such list, the Government of India will present a silver medal, bearing on one side the head of Her Majesty, with the superscription "Pax Asiæ Victoriâ restituta," and the figures "1842" underneath, and on the reverse a Dragon wearing an Imperial Crown.

The Governor General, equally desirous of distinguishing the eminent services of the Officers and Seamen and others serving in the Steam Vessels of War belonging to the Government of India, by the marks of honor they have so well deserved, requests that His Excellency Vice Admiral Sir William Parker will have the goodness to transmit to him a nominal list of the several Officers and Seamen and others serving in such Steamers under his command, whom he may deem to be justly entitled to the honor of wearing a medal commemorative of their services; and to all persons named in such list the Government of India will present a silver medal similar to that presented to the troops.

The Governor General directs, that the victories obtained by the combined forces in China may be made known to all the troops at all the Stations of the army; and that at all such Stations a salute shall be fired of 21 guns for those victories, and a similar salute of 21 guns for the Peace which has been signed by the Plenipotentiaries of the Emperor of China.

SIR,

I have the honor to acquaint you, that Shumshoodeen, Sultan Jan and other Affghan Chiefs, having assembled about 12,000 men, occupied a succession of strong mountains intercepting my march upon Beenee Badam and Mydan, on the 14th and 15th instant. Our troops dislodged them in gallant style, and their conduct afforded me the greatest satisfaction.

The artillery distinguished themselves, and I beg to mention the names of Captain Leslie, Bombay horse artillery, Captains Blood, Bombay foot artillery, and Anderson and Turner, of the Bengal horse artillery, and the 38th and 43d Bengal native infantry. I beg to bring under the favorable notice of Government, Captain White, of Her Majesty's 40th regiment, in command of the light companies of Her Majesty's 40th and 41st regiments, and of the 2d, 16th, 38th, 42d and 43d Bengal native regiments, for the able manner in which he carried my orders into effect, and for the gallantry displayed by him and the companies under his command, in ascending the mountains and driving the enemy from their positions; I had every reason to be pleased with the conduct of all the troops, European and Native. I forward a list of killed and wounded.

The success of the Major General's operations against Istalif, is most gratifying, that place being considered by the Affghians as totally inaccessible to our troops

Sir,

I have the satisfaction to acquaint you, for the information of Major General Pollock, C. B. that the troops under my command yesterday made themselves masters of the strong and populous town of Istalif, totally defeating the numerous levies collected for its defence, under the infamous Ameenoollah Khan Loguree, Khaojie Ameer Kotwal, Hazin Khan (an assassin of Sir Alexander Burnes) Hazir Alee Khan, Khuleefa Ibrahim, and many other Chiefs of Cabool and the Kohistan.

The Major General is aware that the Force detailed in the margin was placed at my disposal for operations in these valleys on the 25th; the two brigades formed a junction near Khowja Rawash on the 26th; moved to an encampment near Zimuree on the 27th, and pitched their tents within four miles of this place on the 28th. The same evening I reconnoitred

Brigadier Tulloch's brigade, with the addition of Captain Broadfoot's sappers and miners, and the exception of the 60th native infantry, Brigadier Stacy's brigade.

ranges of hills separated by deep ravines or traversing by narrow roads, its gardens, vineyards, and orchards, fenced in with strong enclosure walls; the whole of them, with the mountain side and tops of the houses, were occupied by Jezaïlchies, and the strongest proof is afforded that the enemy after this disposition considered the place unassailable by their having retained within the town the wives and children not only of the inhabitants, but of thousands of refugees from Cabool.

The observations which I was enabled to make under a sharp jezail fire and the report of Major Pottinger, induced me to determine to assault the next morning the right of the Enemy's extensive position, as it was there that I could hope to bring the artillery most effectively into battery; arrangements were made with this view. The troops were formed into two columns of attack and reserve; Brigadier Tulloch's brigade and the mountain train composed the right; Brigadier Stacy's and Captain Blood's battery and the 18-pounders the left; these were supported by the third column under Major Simmonds, Her Majesty's 41st consisting of a wing of this Regiment and the Cavalry under Major Lockwood; Captain Christie's corps protected the baggage.

The troops moved soon after daylight, and traversing the plain in perfect order, passed nearly from the left to the right of the enemy's position. Our light troops and guns repressed the occasional attacks of their Jezaïlchies from the gardens, who were numerous and most audacious; but when the column arrived in front of the village Ismillah, I resolved to make a combined attack on this point; Brigadier Tulloch's brigade assailed its left, and Brigadier Stacy, making a longer detour, attacked the right.

I cannot express in adequate terms my admiration of the style in which the former column covered by skirmishers rushed upon the gardens filled with bold and skilful marksmen. Her Majesty's 9th foot, the 26th native infantry, and Captain Broadfoot's sappers, vied with each other in steady courage; and their rapid and unhesitating advance soon left the enemy no resource but flight; very shortly after this assault, the three light companies of Her Majesty's 41st, the 42d and 43d native infantry, covering their own column, got into action, and on their side stormed the Village and vineyard with distinguished gallantry; the combination was steadily persevered in, and though I had few opportunities of using the artillery with effect, I had soon the gratification of seeing the enclosures, forts, heights, suburbs and town successively won by the 2 columns. The enemy were driven from them, and pursued with a rapidity which left no time to rally, and a singular spectacle was then presented in the escape up the mountain side of the women and children from the place, to which no interception was offered; but as detached parties of the beaten Afghans still occupied some very lofty heights, the mountain train ascended them by a dizzy pathway, and dispersed the fugitives by its effective fire. Our reserve was now established on the lower heights, and the whole of the place, filled with property of every description; much of it plundered from our army in 1841, was in the hands of our force; two guns, brass field pieces were also taken, and one of them was seized with such promptitude that its captor, Lieutenant Elmherst, Her Majesty's 9th foot, turned its fire upon the fugitives with some effect. I directed the town to be set on fire in several places, after taking out various supplies which might be useful to our troops, and the work of demolition is still proceeding under the direction of Major Sanders, of the engineers. Our loss has been trifling, for the advance of our Officers and Men was too rapid and decisive to allow of the sharp fire of the enemy telling much upon them, and deceived by the direction of the reconnoissance of the 28th, the Afghans had expected the attack on their left, and posted their guns and the elite of their force in that quarter. I have now the pleasing task of expressing the amount of my obligations for their exertions in the field to Brigadiers Tulloch and Stacy, commanding brigades and columns; to Lieutenant Colonel Taylor, K. H, Her Majesty's 9th foot; Major Huish, 26th native infantry; and Captain Broadfoot, of the sappers, commanding corps on the right, which bore the brunt of the action; to Major Simmonds, Her Majesty's 41st foot, commanding the reserve; to Captain Backhouse, commanding the mountain train, and Captain Blood, commanding the battery of 9-pounders; the last was ably aided by Lieutenant Terry. I have received valuable assistance throughout our operations from Major Pottinger, C. B. and Major Sanders, engineers, and yesterday from Captain Mackenzie and Lieutenant Airy, Her Majesty's 3d buffs, and Lieutenant Webb, 30th regiment Madras native infantry, temporarily attached to me, and since we marched from Cabool, as on former occasions, from my own staff, departmental and personal, vizt, Captain Havelock, Deputy Assistant Adjutant General; Lieutenant Mayne, Deputy Assistant Quarter Master General; Lieutenant Pollock, artillery, Aid-de-Camp to the Major General, who volunteered his services with me: and to Lieutenant Bethune, Her Majesty's 9th foot, my own Aid-de-Camp. Regarding the last mentioned officer, I take the opportunity of rectifying an oversight on my part; I ought specially to have reported to Major General Pollock, Lieutenant Bethune's valuable services in the recent affair at the Huft Kotul, in which I was entrusted with the command of the main column. Brigadier Tulloch reports in very strong terms on the good conduct on the present occasion of Captain Smith, Her Majesty's 9th foot, his Brigade Major. I enclose a return of the killed and wounded, and of the two guns captured.
