The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council having sanctioned the publication of a weekly paper to be styled the "BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE," notice is hereby given, that after this day all advertisements and other public papers of the government, or printed in the BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE only: and all orders or other public notices, appearing in that paper, under the signature of the secretaries, or other public officers of the government, are hereby ordered and directed to be conformed to and obeyed accordingly.

When official notifications from the government are inserted in the BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE, no communication on the same subject will be made in writing to any department concerned; but all public officers are required to take notice of such official notifications in the same manner as if they had been directly communicated to them by letter from the secretary's office, and as heads of offices alone will be furnished by government with the BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE, they will be expected to communicate to their subordinate officers all orders which may in any manner concern them.

The Bombay Government Gazettes furnished by government to public offices are to be lodged with the records, and are not to be removed from the office.

The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for general information, the following Amended Rule in substitution of Rule 8th of the Rules of the Government Savings Bank, published in the Government Gazette, under date the 16th March 1835, and the modification thereof notified in the Government Gazette on the 10th April 1839.

Amended Rule 8th of the Government Savings Bank.

Whenever the sum deposited by any one individual shall amount to 500 Rupees, the same or so much thereof as may be necessary will be transferred from the Bank to the Government Agents, subject to the Rules which obtain in that department, for the purchase of a Government Note, in the five per cent, or any other Loan, which may be preferred, and pointed out by the Depositor, a delay of one month being allowed, in all cases where the Depositor may intimate intention to withdraw the whole, or any portion of the funds within one month from the date it has reached that amount, when should no withdrawal have been made, a transfer will be effected, as if no such notice had been given, and all Government Securities shall be handed over to the Government Agency at the expiration of three months, (subject to all the rules which obtain in that department) unless counter-instructions be immediately received from the proprietors.

This Rule shall not however be considered to affect the Deposits of Native Officers and Soldiers of the Bombay Army, on whose behalf it is hereby provided, that whenever the sums deposited by any of the said Native Officers or Soldiers shall amount in the aggregate to 500 Rupees, should no notice be received from the Depositor within one month, from the date that his deposits have reached that amount either for their refund or investment in securities of the Government of India, the amount in question will then be paid into the General Treasury, and in lieu of the certificate, which the Sub-Treasurer will grant for the same, the Accountant General will issue a Treasury Note, in favor of the Depositor bearing Interest at 4 per cent per annum, repayable after three months notice at the option of the Holder.

These Treasury Notes will not be transferable, and the interest on them will be payable only at the General Treasury of Bombay, but on the requisition of Holders preferred through their immediate Commanding Officers, the Accountant General may authorize the Interest to be paid from any of the Provincial Treasuries under this Presidency.

When depositors have required their deposits to be invested in other Government Securities, they will be bound by the terms of those securities.

Notice is hereby given, that Native Officers and Soldiers of the Bombay Army, holding Government four per cent Paper issued for their deposits in the Government Savings Bank at this Presidency, who may be desirous of receiving back the Principal of such securities during their present temporary depreciation, may do so, by transmitting the said securities [through the Commanding Officers of their Regiments] duly endorsed for sale, to the Government Agents [the Accountant General and the Sub Treasurer] at this Presidency, who are hereby authorized to receive and dispose of such Securities, reporting the result of such sales to Government who will thereupon direct the disbursement from the General Treasury of the deficiency arising therefrom, as an item of territorial expenditure.

Each security which may be surrendered to the Government Agents under this Notification, should be endorsed to those Officers by the holder of the said security in the presence of his Commanding Officer, who should make certification as to the endorsement having been effecting in his presence.

The Provisions of this Notification being restricted to securities issued on account of Deposits in the Government Savings Bank, Commanding Officers are required, on the presentation to them, by Native Officers and Soldiers of their Regiments of securities for the purpose aforesaid, to satisfy themselves that such securities have passed into the hands of the Holder through that Channel, and on transmitting them to the Government Agents thereafter, to apprise those Officers of the manner in which the Indorser would wish the Principal to be disposed of.

GENERAL ORDER BY THE HON'BLE THE PRESIDENT IN COUNCIL,

Fort William, 7th October 1842.

1 The Hon'ble the President in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the annexed Table, exhibiting the Pay, Batta, and Superannuation allowances of Warrant Officers of the Subordinate Medical Department, to have effect at the three Presidencies, from this date.

2 To entitle Apothecaries and Hospital Stewards to retire in Europe, on the Pension of their rank, they must have served in India and the Department, for the periods laid down for Warrant Officers of the Ordnance Department in Government General Orders 17th July 1819, No. 187, the rules contained in Paragraphs 5 to 9 inclusive of which regulation, will continue to be applicable to all Warrant Officers of the Medical Establishment.

3. Full, or Half batta, is to be drawn for Medical Warrant Officers as well as for those of the Ordnance and Commissariat Departments at all Garrisons and Stations where either rate of batta is admissible to European Commissioned Officers.

4. Although it has not been deemed necessary to admit Assistant Apothecaries and Assistant Stewards, to the benefits of Furlough, or to retire on a Pension in Europe, yet should any Individual of those Classes establish a fair claim to the indulgence, the Government will be prepared to give the circumstances of each case, a favorable consideration, on their being brought under its notice by the Commander in Chief.

GENERAL ORDERS BY THE RIGHT HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA.

SECRET DEPARTMENT; SIMLA, THE 14TH OCTOBER 1842.

The Governor General has sincere satisfaction in announcing the termination of the war with China, by a Peace honorable to Her Majesty's Crown, and durable in its provisions, which was concluded in the British Camp, under the walls of the Imperial City of Nankin, on the 29th of August.

Thus within two months after the arrival of the re-inforcements sent from England and from India, for the prosecution of this third campaign, the direction of a preponderating force to the true point of attack has compelled the Emperor of China to submit to all Her Majesty's just demands.

The Emperor could only save the internal trade of his empire from ruin, his ancient capital from capture by assault, and his empire itself from the peril of dissolution, by yielding to such conditions as it was Her Majesty's pleasure to impose, in order to afford to the subjects of Her Crown indemnity for the past and security for the future.

This event, glorious as it is to Her Majesty's arms, will convey to Her Majesty's heart other and yet higher satisfaction than that which is derived from the contemplation of military success, in the cessation of hostilities which have unhappily involved the most afflicting evils to humanity.

The Governor General cannot presume to offer to the Commanders of Her Majesty's naval and military forces employed on the Coast of China, in the execution of Her Majesty's orders, the expression of the feelings with which their zeal, their energy, and their ability, have inspired him; nor is it for him to presume to anticipate the approbation which the brave Seamen and Marines and Soldiers under their command may receive from the high authority under which they have the honor to serve. The Governor General can only offer to the Commanders of Her Majesty's forces his grateful acknowledgments of the regard they have ever evinced during these joint operations for the army and fleet of India, and his thanks for the opportunity they have on all occasions afforded to the Native troops of proving themselves to be worthy of fighting by the side of British Soldiers.

The short duration of the operations of the troops on shore, has not afforded to every corps of the Native army of India, the opportunity which all ardently desired of distinguishing themselves before the enemy, but wherever that opportunity has been afforded, the several corps of the army of India have added to their acknowledged fame.

Three companies of the battalion of Bengal volunteers had the good fortune to be the first engaged with the enemy before the City of Ching-Keang, and they well sustained the high reputation of the army they represented.

The 2nd and 6th regiments, and the rifle company of the 36th regiment of Madras native infantry, were engaged in the capture by assault of that City, on the 21st of July.

On that occasion, as on all others, the Madras artillery and the Madras sappers and miners maintained the high character which has always been attached to their respective corps in the Madras army.

The Governor General is pleased to direct, that in commemoration of the distinguished services rendered by those corps in co-operation with Her Majesty's troops in the capture of the City of Ching-Keang, the 2d and 6th regiments of Madras native infantry, and the rifle company of the 36th regiment Madras native infantry, shall hereafter bear upon their appointments a Dragon wearing an Imperial Crown; and that the same honor shall be granted to such troops or companies of the Madras artillery and of the Madras sappers and miners, as His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir Hugh Gough may designate as justly entitled to that distinction by their service before the enemy in China, in the present or in the previous campaigns.

The Governor General is likewise pleased to direct, that the 2d and 6th regiments of Madras native infantry shall hereafter bear upon their colours a golden Dragon wearing an Imperial Crown.

The Governor General requests, that His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir Hugh Gough will have the goodness to transmit to him a nominal list of such Officers, Non-commissioned Officers & Privates, of the several corps of the army of India serving under His Excellency's command, in the present or in the previous campaigns, as he may deem to be justly entitled by their services before the enemy to the honor of wearing a medal commemorative of such services; and to every Officer, Non-commissioned Officer and Private named in such list, the Government of India will present a silver medal, bearing on one side the head of Her Majesty, with the superscription "Pax Asiæ Victoriâ restituta," and the figures "1842" underneath, and on the reverse a Dragon wearing an Imperial Crown.

The Governor General, equally desirous of distinguishing the eminent services of the Officers and Seamen and others serving in the Steam Vessels of War belonging to the Government of India, by the marks of honor they have so well deserved, requests that His Excellency Vice Admiral Sir William Parker will have the goodness to transmit to him a nominal list of the several Officers and Seamen and others serving in such Steamers under his command, whom he may deem to be justly entitled to the honor of wearing a medal commemorative of their services; and to all persons named in such list the Government of India will present a silver medal similar to that presented to the troops.

The Governor General directs, that the victories obtained by the combined forces in China may be made known to all the troops at all the Stations of the army; and that at all such Stations a salute shall be fired of 21 guns for those victories, and a similar salute of 21 guns for the Peace which has been signed by the Plenipotentiaries of the Emperor of China.

LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS.

FORT WILLIAM, LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT, THE 26TH AUGUST, 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 26th of August 1842.

ACT No. — OF 1842.

An Act for amending the Bengal Code with regard to the punishment of affrays.

1. It is hereby enacted, that all persons committing any affray, and using therein any weapon whatever within the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, shall be punishable with imprisonment with or without labor for any period not exceeding two years, or with fine not exceeding 500 Rs. or both; and in either case the fine may be enforced by imprisonment with or without labor for a year.

2. And it is hereby enacted, that all persons committing any affray, but not using arms therein within the Presidency aforesaid, shall be punishable with imprisonment with or without hard labor for any period not exceeding one year, or with fine not exceeding 500 Rs. or both, the fine to be enforced as aforesaid.

3. And it is hereby enacted, that if the affray shall be attended with homicide, every person guilty thereof, and who shall not be found guilty of murder, shall be punishable with imprisonment with or without hard labor for any period not exceeding five years, or a fine of 1600 Rupees or both; the fine being commutable by imprisonment with or without hard labor for two years.

4. And it is hereby enacted, that persons guilty of the offences indicated in this Act, shall be punishable on conviction before any Magistrate, except where the affray is attended with homicide.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 26th day of November next.

FORT WILLIAM, LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT, THE 16TH SEPTEMBER, 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th of September 1842.

ACT No. — OF 1842.

An Act for amending the Law concerning Appeals from Justice of the Peace, and from Magistrates acting under the Statute 53, Geo III. Ch. 155.

Whereas, in many cases provided by law, offences may be prosecuted before Magistrates not acting within the local limits of the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Supreme Courts, and which such Magistrates may take cognizance of either in their Magisterial capacity under the Regulations, or as Justices of the Peace. And whereas the Appeal from convictions before Magistrates acting in their Magisterial capacities, and from the like convictions before Justices of the Peace are subject to different rules. And whereas in all cases of convictions before Justices of the Peace in the Mofussil and before Magistrates exercising jurisdiction under the provisions of Statute 53 Geo. III. C. 155, in cases of assaults, forcible entries, or other injuries accompanied with force committed by British subjects, the law as to Appeals requires amendment.

1. It is hereby enacted, that an Appeal shall lie from all sentences passed by any Justice of the Peace acting without the local limits of any of Her Majesty's Supreme Courts upon convictions had before him for any offence, and from all sentences passed by any

Magistrate upon convictions had before him exercising such jurisdictions as aforesaid to the same authority and subject to the same rules as are provided by the Regulations and Acts of the Government in the case of sentences passed by Magistrates in the exercise of their ordinary jurisdiction.

II. And it is hereby provided, that nothing in this Act contained shall be held to take away the power of quashing any conviction by means of a Writ of Certiorari.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 16th day of December next.

FORT WILLIAM, LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT, THE 30TH SEPTEMBER, 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 30th of September 1842.

ACT No. — OF 1842.

An Act for the better Regulation of Cantonments.

I. It is hereby enacted, that any person, whether European or Native, not being a Sutler, or amenable to the Articles of War, or a Camp Follower, who shall convey Liquor of any description into Military Cantonments or Bazars, without written authority from the Officer Commanding at the Station, or shall without such authority, sell or supply the same to any European Soldier or European Woman, shall be punishable before any Magistrate or Justice, in a fine not exceeding 20 Rupees, or imprisonment not exceeding one month,

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 30th day of December next.

FORT WILLIAM, LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT, THE 7TH OCTOBER, 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 7th of October 1842.

ACT No. — OF 1842.

An Act to facilitate the Execution of Process issued by any of Her Majesty's Courts of Justice in India and for the improvement of the administration of Justice therein.

Whereas it is desirable to render more effectual the execution of the Judgments, Decrees, Orders and of all Process of Her Majesty's Courts of Justice in India, beyond the local limits of the respective jurisdictions, and to that end to apply the provisions of the Act No XXIII. of 1840, for the execution within the Local Limits of Her Majesty's Courts in India of Legal Process issued by the authorities in the Mofussil, to the execution without such Local Limits of the Legal Process issued by Her said Majesty's Courts as nearly as the same may be made applicable thereto.

1. It is hereby enacted, that any Writ, Order, Warrant, or other Process whatsoever issued by any of Her Majesty's Courts of Justice in India may be executed as follows out of the Local Limits of those Courts respectively and within the respective Presidencies in which they are established in addition to such ways and means whereby the same may now be

executed. A copy of such Writ, Order, Warrant or other Process and of all indorsements thereon purporting to be made by the Court issuing the same or any Judge thereof and authenticated by the Seal of the Court out of which it issues, and which Seal shall be taken to prove itself, and shall be sufficient proof of such Writ, Order, Warrant, Process, and of such Indorsements as aforesaid shall be forwarded to any Judge of any Court of the Honorable East India Company, Justice of the Peace, or any Magistrate in the Service of the said Honorable Company in and for the district or place wherein the same is to be executed, and whose aid in the execution of the said Writ, Order, Warrant or other Process is desired, who is hereby authorized and required under his hand and signature to endorse the same, and to direct the same to be executed within the limits of his jurisdiction according to the nature of such Writ, Order, Warrant or other Process, as nearly as may be as any Writ, Warrant, Order, Process or Proceeding for the like purpose would be executed when originally issued or made by any such Judge, Justice of the Peace or Magistrate as aforesaid.

II. And it is hereby provided, that the person or persons to whom the delivery of such Order, Writ, Warrant or Process so endorsed as aforesaid is made shall execute the same according to the said direction, and the same shall be executed in all cases as nearly as may be as if the same had originally been issued or made by the said Judge, Justice of the Peace or Magistrate, and shall be subject to the same rules touching priority and the mode and order of execution as shall be then in force in respect of process or proceedings originally issued by such Judge, Justice of the Peace or Magistrate. Provided always, that no Judge, Justice of the Peace, or Magistrate, nor any persons acting according to the said direction, shall be liable to any suit or action or other proceeding for putting in execution the said Writ, Warrant, Order, or other Process aforesaid according to the direction therein contained.

III. And it is hereby provided, that if the said Writ, Order, Warrant or Process shall be bailable, and shall by indorsement under the hand of any Judge of the Court issuing the same direct in what amount and with what number of Sureties bail shall be taken, the said Judge, Justice of the Peace, or Magistrate aforesaid is hereby authorized and required to take such bail as is thereby directed to be taken, but if no such direction be given, then to take such bail as he shall think fit, and the same shall in either case to all intents and purposes be as valid, and the Recognizance or other instrument of bail shall be as binding to all intents and purposes as well for purposes of jurisdiction as otherwise, and shall have all the like consequences as if the same had been taken before the said Court from which such Writ, Order, Warrant or Process originally issued, or before any Judge thereof.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that all persons disobeying or obstructing the execution of any Order, Writ, Warrant, or other Process endorsed under this Act, shall be punishable in like manner and amenable to the same jurisdiction for such disobedience or obstruction, as if the same had been originally issued by such Judge, Justice of the Peace or Magistrate as aforesaid. Provided always, that in the case of Process for the attendance of Witnesses, the same rules shall be observed concerning the tender of expences and other matters as are established in regard to Subpoenas issued from Her Majesty's said Court.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that in the case of persons seized or detained by virtue of any Order, Writ, Warrant or other Process executed under the authority of this Act, where the same is endorsed as hereinafter mentioned, it shall be the duty of such Judge, Justice of the Peace, or Magistrate, and they are hereby required to deliver the person or persons

in custody to the authority of persons specified by indorsement on the said Writ, and who shall have been charged with the execution of the Writ, Warrant, or other Process by the authority originally issuing the same, and for that purpose to cause the party to be conveyed to any place within the Company's Territories beyond the Local Limits of the jurisdiction of such Judge, Justice of the Peace or Magistrate. And it is further provided, that the same indorsement shall be signed by one of the Judges of the said Court.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that all Writs, Process and other proceedings as aforesaid of Her Majesty's Courts which are intended to be executed by the aid of any Judge of any of the Courts of the Honorable East India Company, or of any Justice of the Peace, or of any such Magistrate as aforesaid, shall be in the same form and be addressed in like manner as they are now addressed, but in addition thereto shall have endorsed on the same under the hand of any of the Judges of the Court out of which the same shall issue.

The following word or words to the like effect :

"This (describing the instrument,) may be executed under the provisions of the Act of _____ by any Judge, Justice of the Peace, or Magistrate thereby authorized to act in aid of the execution of the Process of Her Majesty's Courts in India," and thereupon the same may either be exercised by and under the provisions of this Act; or in any manner in which the same may otherwise by Law be executed; and the party or parties suing out such Process as aforesaid may instead of delivering the same to the Sheriff or other person to whom the same is addressed, transmit the same for execution to the Judge, Justice of the Peace or Magistrate, by whom the same is intended to be executed in aid, and in such case the Sheriff or other person to whom the same is addressed shall not be liable in any way, in respect of the execution or non-execution of the same, nor be in any manner called upon to return the same.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that every Judge of the Honorable the East India Company's Courts, or any Magistrate in the Service of the said Company, or any Justice of the Peace, shall within the limits of their respective jurisdictions and without the local limits of Calcutta, Madras or Bombay respectively, have authority and power to take any affidavit or solemn declaration that shall be made before them in any proceeding then pending, in the Supreme Court of the Presidency, or that shall be made with a view to institute, and as the foundation for instituting any proceeding in the Supreme Court of that Presidency in which their respective jurisdiction lies; and all such affidavits and solemn declaration so made and taken as aforesaid shall be as valid to all intents and purposes as if the same had been made and taken before such Court or Judge thereof, or any Commissioner under any Commission issuing therefrom, and shall be deemed to have been taken judicially, and any person or persons making any affidavit or solemn declaration under the powers given by this Act, shall be liable if he swear falsely or make a false declaration to be indicted for misdemeanour in the Supreme Court of that Presidency to which the proceeding relates.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 7th day of January next.

And it is hereby further enacted, that it shall be competent at all times to the Local Government to dissolve any such Committee, and to appoint any person or persons to enquire into and report upon the conduct of such Committee or of any Members thereof in the execution of their Trusts, and such person or persons so appointed shall have power to send for persons, papers and records, and to compel the attendance or delivery of the same and to examine witnesses upon oath.

ACT No. XI of 1842.

An Act for amending and explaining the Law concerning the importation of Foreign Sugar.

It is hereby enacted, and declared that the prohibition and penalties contained in Acts No. XXXII. of 1836 and No. XV. of 1839, against the landing or attempting to land in any part of the Territories subject to the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, or the Presidency of Fort St. George, of any Foreign Sugar, or any Sugar which is the growth of any British possession into which Foreign Sugar can be legally imported, shall apply and be deemed to apply to such Sugar otherwise imported into any part of the Territories subject to the said Presidency.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA.

SECRET DEPARTMENT.

SIMALA, THE 19TH OCTOBER 1842.

The Governor General is pleased to direct, that the functions and allowances of all officers holding political appointments in Scinde and Beloochistan, and of all persons in their several establishments, shall cease on the 15th of November.

Major General Sir Charles Napier, K. C. B., commanding the forces in Scinde and Beloochistan, will submit, for the approval of the Governor General, the names of such officers as he may be desirous of having attached to his Staff as extra Aid-de-Camps, for the purpose of performing political duties under his directions.

Such extra Aid-de-Camps will, in addition to their allowances as such, have granted to them such moderate extra allowances as may be sufficient to defray the necessary expenses of their journeys and fixed establishments.

Major General Sir Charles Napier will suggest to the Governor General what, in his judgment, the amount of such extra allowances should be, having reference, not to former salaries and allowances, but the just remuneration for service to be performed.

The Major General will likewise suggest to the Governor General what, in his judgment, would be the proper establishment of clerks and others to be attached to the General officer commanding in Scinde and Beloochistan, for his own use, and that of the extra Aid-de-Camps so to be employed by him.

Major General Sir Charles Napier is authorized to make any provisional arrangements to the above effect, subject to the approval of the Governor General.

The Governor General is likewise pleased to direct, that the functions and allowances of all officers holding political appointments on the right bank of the upper Indus, and of all persons in their several establishments, shall cease on the 15th of November.

The functions and allowances of Sir Richmond Shakespear, Military Secretary to Major General Pollock, will cease on the 31st of December.

The several officers above mentioned, will, with all expedition, send in their accounts and their last contingent bills, and will, with the exception of such as may be appointed extra Aid-de-Camps by Major General Sir Charles Napier, rejoin their several corps, being hereby, from the dates above mentioned, placed at the disposal of the Commander in Chief of the armies of their respective presidencies.

GENERAL ORDERS.

BY THE RIGHT HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA.

SECRET DEPARTMENT, SIMLA, THE 20TH OCTOBER 1842.

The Governor General has much satisfaction in announcing the successful termination of the arduous and difficult operation confided to Major General England, of withdrawing, through the Kojuck and Bolan passes into the valley of the Indus, a portion of the force lately stationed at Candahar; and all the scattered garrisons of the intermediate places between the Eastern face of the Kojuck mountains and the plains of Cutchee.

This operation, less brilliant in its circumstances than that entrusted to Major General Pollock and Major General Nott, was yet one which demanded the greatest prudence in the making of every previous arrangement for securing the safe descent of the several columns, and which called into exercise many of the higher qualities which must contribute to form the character of an accomplished General.

The Governor General could not but regard with some anxiety the progress of this movement, requiring so much of delicate management in its execution; and it is a subject of extreme satisfaction to him, that the same complete success should have attended this, which has, during the present campaign, attended every other part of the combined operations of the armies beyond the Indus.

The Governor General requests that Major General Sir Charles Napier will express to Major General England, and to all the Officers and Troops which were under his command, the entire satisfaction with which their whole conduct has been viewed on this occasion.

The Governor General also requests that Major General Sir Charles Napier will communicate to Major Outram, and the other Political Officers, his thanks for the zeal and ability they have manifested in the collection of the means of carriage and supply, and in their various transactions with the native chiefs and tribes, tending to facilitate and secure the descent of the several columns of the army.

SIR,

I have the honor to acquaint you, for the information of the Right Honorable the Governor General in Council, that the troops destined to descend to the Indus by the Bolan pass, finally evacuated Quetta on the 1st instant, and have accomplished their march through that defile without much difficulty.

2. In order to facilitate the movement of this large body, which, with the acquisition of the garrison of Quetta, consisted of more than seven battalions, with details of cavalry, eighteen pieces of artillery, and an increased retinue of invalids, and of stores, I divided it into three columns of route, retaining the last in as light a form of equipment as possible, in the hope and supposition that, if the tribes through whose country we should pass were inclined to attack us, they would prefer to make their chief efforts on the last departing division; and I, therefore, sent the greater portion of the sick and public stores with the leading divisions accordingly.

3. It has proved that this conjecture was right, because the two preceding divisions have been wholly unmolested in their progress through the pass, whereas on the morning of the 3rd I found the Kakurs posted in some numbers on the steep ground which commands the upper extremity of the narrow zig-zag near Sir-i-bolan.

4. These insurgents however, had only time to deliver a few rounds on the column, when their attention was engaged by the flanking parties which covered our left, and which I now reinforced by a strong detachment of the 6th regiment Bombay native infantry, and by nearly the whole of the 5th regiment of irregular infantry, under Major Woodhouse and Captain Maedonell, respectively.

5. I had every reason to be satisfied with the handsome manner in which our troops ascended these stupendous heights, and cleared them of the enemy; and Major Woodhouse speaks very highly of the conduct of a party of Brahoë horse which accompanied him in this affair.

6. On this occasion also Major Outram gave me his able assistance as well as in flanking the lower extremity of the Bolan pass near Kundyë, were I had good reason to expect again to meet some hostile tribes, but the total disappointment of the Kakurs on the 3d and the effectual flanking arrangements made on all occasions by our troops, seem to have prevented any renewal of interruption.

7. I beg leave to enclose a list of the casualties which have occurred during their passage of the Bolan defile.

8. As I now consider the chief difficulties of this march to have terminated, I trust I may be permitted to bring to the notice of His Lordship the Governor General, the general good conduct of the Troops I have had the honor to command during these prolonged and laborious operations; and I venture to submit the names of Major Waddington, Commanding Engineer; Major Wyllie, Major of Brigade; Major Boyd, Acting Assistant Quarter Master General; Captain Davidson, Deputy Commissary General; and Surgeon Wight, in chief medical charge; and to claim His Lordship's favorable estimate of the exertions of these Officers in their several departments and capacities; and it is with the utmost satisfaction I am enabled to assure His Lordship that, owing to the discipline which has been exacted, these British columns, in emerging from the Bolan pass, will leave amongst the peaceable inhabitants of the countries they have quitted, a well-merited character for forbearance and humanity; whilst in the deliberate and systematic order of their march, during which every enemy has been beaten off, and no stores lost or captured, the power of our arms has been alike equally and imperiously made manifest.

9. The garrison of Sebee will be withdrawn to-morrow, and that of Dadur on the 12th or 13th, when I propose to resume my progress to the Indus.

The Governor General has the highest gratification in communicating to the Army, that Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to permit Her Majesty's 13th Regiment of Light Infantry to receive and wear the medal which he has ordered to be presented to every Officer, Non-Commissioned Officer and Private, European and Native, who belonged to the garrison of Jellalabad on the 7th April 1842.

Thus the European General in Her Majesty's Army, and the Native Sepoy in the Army of the East India Company and all the intermediate ranks of both Armies and of both nations, will bear the same decoration commemorative of their common service in the field of danger and of glory.

The Governor General feels assured that he may, in the name of the whole Army, as well as in that of the Government of India, lay at Her Majesty's feet his most humble acknowledgments of this boon, proceeding no less from Her Majesty's enlightened wisdom, than from Her Majesty's gracious favor—a boon of all others the most grateful to men who justly feel that the first of all professions is that of a soldier, and that the first of all rewards is military honor.

In consideration of the distinguished gallantry displayed by the 13th Light Infantry, during the campaigns in the Burmese empire and in Afghanistan, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to approve of that Regiment assuming the title of the 13th, or Prince Albert's Regiment of Light Infantry, and of its facings being changed from yellow to blue.

Her Majesty has also been pleased to authorize the 13th Regiment of Light Infantry being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments, a mural crown, superscribed Jellalabad, as a memorial of the fortitude, perseverance, and enterprise evinced by that Regiment, and the several corps, which served during the blockade of Jellalabad.

Her Majesty has been likewise pleased to permit the 13th Regiment to receive and wear a silver medal, which has been directed by the Governor General of India to be distributed to every Officer, Non-Commissioned Officer, and Private, European and Native, who belonged to the garrison of Jellalabad, on the 7th April 1842, such medal to bear on one side a mural crown, superscribed "Jellalabad," and on the other side, "7th April 1842."
