them:

It is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council of Bombay, to grant to any Jageerdar, Surinjamdar, Inamdar, or other persons holding Lands or Villages the Revenue of which has been alienated to him by the State, a Commission conferring upon him authority for the collection of such Revenue by the powers hereinafter mentioned, or such of them as shall be specified in the Commission in addition to the powers now exercisable by

II. And it is hereby enacted, that such Commission which shall be drawn out according to the form of the annexed Schedule A, shall be granted or with-held, and, when granted, shall be liable to be withdrawn at the pleasure of Government, and that it may, if the Governor in Council of Bombay see fit, be issued to one or more Agents of such holder of alienated Revenue as well as to the holder in person.

And it is hereby enacted, that the holder of such Commission shall have authority to demand security for the payment of the Revenue, in respect of the Lands or Villages specified in the Commission, and if the same be not furnished, to take such precaution as the Collector is authorized to take under Section XI. And it is hereby enacted, that the holder of any such Commission shall be authorized to attach the property of persons making default in the payment of such Revenue as aforesaid, making an immediate report to the Collector or his Assistant of his having done so, and should the demand on account of which the attachment may be made appear to the Collector or his Assistant to be just, he shall give orders for the sale of such property, and the sale shall be conducted agreeably to the Provisions of Clause VII.
Section XII. Regulation XVII. of 1827, Bombay Code, except in cases in which the holder of the Commission by whom the attachment has been made shall be a Jageerdar, Surinjamdar or Inamdar, vest-ed by Regulation XIII. of 1830, with Civil jurisdiction and with power to execute his own decrees or his Agents, when the sale shall be conducted by him, and not by the Collector and his subordinate Revenue Officers.

XXIX. of 1827; Sections III. and IV. and by Regulation VII. 1830, Bombay Code, may be the defendant, shall be tried before the Collector and his Assistants, any thing in Regulations I and XVI. of 1831, notwithstanding. Provided however, that nothing herein prescribed or contained shall prevent a holder of alienated Lands or Villages from instituting a suit in any Court of competent jurisdiction for the purpose of esta-blishing his claim to re-assess the Lands or re-settle the Revenue of any Ryot or other who may be paying less than the full Juma to which he is justly liable, and upon such holder obtaining a decree adjudging to him such power the demand made by him under such decree, shall, if conformable thereto be deemed a legal demand for arrears, and shall be leviable by the same process as is above provided for other arrears due.

GENERAL ORDERS

BY THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA,

Political Department; Simla, the 16th November, 1842.

Major General Nott having, in pursuance of his instructions, removed the gates of the temple of Somnauth from the tomb of Sultan Mahmood of Ghuznee, and brought them with his army to India, the Governor General is pleased to make the following orders, with a view to the secure and honorable transmission of those illustrious trophies of victory to the temple from which they were taken by Sultan Mahmood in the year A. D. 1024.

Major General Nott will select an officer from amongst those who were present at the capture of Ghuznee, to accompany the gates of the temple to Somnauth, and to communicate with the several chiefs through whose territories the trophies will be carried, for the purpose of making every necessary previous arrangement for their safe reception and transmission, and for the avoiding of confusion on the march.

This officer will receive an allowance of 1,000 rupees a month.

Major General Nott will likewise select from amongst the officers and soldiers present at the capture of Ghuznee:

- 1 Captain,
- 1 Lieutenant,
- 1 Assistant Surgeon,
- 2 Subedars,
- 2 Jemadars,
- 10 Havildars, 10 Naicks.
- 101 Sepoys
- 2 native Doctors,

These officers and soldiers will form the escort of the trophies from the bridge of the Sutlej to Somnauth.

Captain Herries, of H. M. 43d regiment, Aide-de-Camp to the Governor General, and a detachment of the body guard, will accompany the escort.

The officers and soldiers escorting the trophies, will receive double batta during their special service; and all the native officers and soldiers will have one year's furlough granted to them on their return to their respective regiments.

FROM THE GOVERNOR GENERAL TO ALL THE PRINCES AND CHIEFS, AND PEOPLE OF INDIA.

My BROTHERS AND MY FRIENDS.

Our victorious army bears the gates of the temple of Somnauth, in triumph from Afghanista, and the dispoiled tomb of Sultan Mahmood looks upon the ruins of Ghuznee.

The insult of eight hundred years is at last avenged. The gates of the temple of Somnach, so long the memorial of your humiliation, are become the proudest record of your national glory; the proof of your superiority in arms over the nations beyond the Indus.

To you, Princes and Chiefs of Sirhind, of Rajwarra, of Malwa and of Guzerat, I shall commit this glorious trophy of successful war.

You will yourselves, with all honor, transmit the gates of sandal-wood through your respective territories to the restored temple of Somnauth.

The Chiefs of Sirhind shall be informed, at what time our victorious army will first deliver the gates of the temple into their guardianship, at the foot of the bridge of the Sutlej.

MY BROTHERS AND MY FRIENDS,

I have ever relied, with confidence, upon your attachment to the British Government. You see how worthy it proves itself of your love, when, regarding your honor as its own, it exerts the power of its arms to restore to you the gates of the temple of Somnauth, so long the memorial of your subjection to the Affghans.

For myself, identified with you in interest and in feeling, I regard, with all your own outhusiasm, the high achievements of that heroic army; reflecting alike immortal honor upon my native and upon my adopted country.


To preserve and to improve the happy union of our two countries, necessary as it is to the welfare of both, is the constant object of my thoughts. Upon that union depends the security of every ally, as well as of every subject of the British Government, from the miseries, whereby, in former times, India was afflicted: through that alone has our army now waved its triumphant standards over the ruins of Guznee, and planted them upon the Bala Hissar of Cabool.

May that good Providence, which has hitherto so manifestly protected me, still extend to me its favour, that I may so use the power now entrusted to my hands, as to advance your properity and secure your happiness, by placing the union of our two countries upon foundations which may render neternal.

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas there was this day read at the Board a representation from the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, dated the tenth August instant, and

in the words following, vizt.

The Lords of the Judicial Committee, having taken into consideration the scale on which the costs of Appeals and other matters referred by your Majesty to this Committee, are usually taxed by the Masters of the Court of Queen's Bench, or other persons to whom their Lordships have from time to time referred the same; their Lordships agree humbly to represent to your Majesty that it is expedient that the scale of costs hitherto allowed in the said proceedings before this Committee should be reduced and their Lordships recommend that previously and until further consideration such Costs in all Appeals or matters not being Appeals from the Courts of Ec-clesiastical or Admiralty Jurisdiction should be taxed and allowed by all such taxing Officers as shall hereafter be directed to ascertain and report the same to the Board according to the Schedule hereunto annexed, and that this rate of charge should be observed by Solicitors conducting business before this Committee.
