FINANCE.

The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for general information the following amended Rule in substitution of Rule 13th of the Rules of the Government Savings Bank.

13. No person or persons to deposit money for the benefit of any other person or persons, except Parents on behalf of, and on account of, their Children, being minors. If such deposits are made in the Children's names, they cannot be withdrawn without an authority from the Children—no trust will be allowed to appear on any deposit. Provided, however, that this Rule shall not be construed to prohibit Individuals, resident out of Bombay, or Females, who, according to the manners and customs of the Country, do not usually make their appearance in public, from making their deposits in their own names, by the hands of other persons, as Agents on their behalf.

PUBLIC ORDER.

To regulate the religious procession of the Mohurrum, and for the preservation of the public peace during the festival, sanctioned by the Honorable the Governor in Council, as provided for by Rule, Ordinance, and Regulation II, A. D. 1827.

1st. Every person desirous of erecting or carrying about a *Taboot*, *Punjia*, or *Dholeeka Punjia*, at the ensuing Mohurrum, must obtain a license from the Magistrates of Police; and a license will be granted to no persons except Mussulmans.

2nd. The licenses shall bear the signatures of the Magistrates of Police, and all persons obtaining them shall be bound to produce them when demanded by any authority having a right so to do, and a refusal to do so shall be held to be a breach of these rules.

3rd. Each *Taboot* is to have but one set of "Tassa," one set of "Dholee," one "Kurnah" and fifteen "Hillals."

4th. Any person who may be seen carrying a Sword, Dirk, Bludgeon, or other offensive weapon, will be taken into custody.

5th. *Taboots* meeting on the public road, are to give way to one another in the same manner that carriages do, each *Taboot* keeping to the left.

6th. *Taboots* are not permitted to go abreast on the public road, but they are to follow each other in a peaceable manner.

7th. No *Taboots* are allowed to go in procession on the last night of the Mohurrum before 12 o'clock, or to continue so after 3 o'clock in the following morning. These processions are limited (on the last night and day of the Mohurrum) to the Bheudy Bazar road, Duncan road, Chinch Bunder and Market Streets; and *Taboots* are not to be taken out on the last day before 12 o'clock, and on meeting carriages, and horsemen, are strictly enjoined to cease playing country music, until they shall have passed the *Taboots*, keeping the left side of the road; and it is directed that they be thrown into the sea, and the ceremony concluded by 5 o'clock P. M.

8th. No procession of the *Zool Jannah* or *Horse*, through the public streets or roads, will be permitted.

9th. The inhabitants of Bombay are enjoined not to assault or insult the *Moguls* during the celebration of the Mohurrum.

10th. All persons licensed to sell Spirituous Liquors, and all vendors of Opium and *Bhang*, are enjoined to keep their shops closed; and persons found selling any thing of an intoxicating nature, during the aforesaid period, will be taken into custody and punished.

11th. Any persons violating any of the above rules, or behaving in any manner likely to create a breach of the peace, or making a disturbance of any kind, will be immediately

FORT WILLIAM. LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT. THE 10TH JANUARY, 1842.

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General in Council, in the Legislative Department, under date the 10th of January 1842, is published for general information.

Read a second time the Draft of a proposed Act, dated 31st May 1841, and published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 2d of June, for consolidating, amending and extending the law relating to the Registration of Assurances.

Resolution.—The Right Hon'ble the Governor General in Council resolves that the following Amended Draft on the subject be republished for general information :

ACT No.—OF 1842.

An Act for consolidating, amending and extending the law relating to the Registration of Assurances.

I. It is hereby enacted, that Regulations XXXVI. 1793. XXVIII. 1795. XVII. 1803. and Section 17. Regulation VIII. 1805 so far as it relates to Regulation XVII. 1803. also Section 32. Regulation XI. 1805. Regulation XX. 1812 and Regulation IV. 1824 of the Bengal Code, Regulation XVI. 1802 and Regulation XI. of 1831 of the Madras Code, and Regulation IX. 1827 of the Bombay Code and Act No. XXX. 1838. be repealed, from the first day of in the year of our Lord

II. And it is hereby enacted, that the Local Government of each Presidency shall on or before the day and year aforesaid, establish at and for each Presidency Town, and each Zillah Station, and such Districts of smaller extent as may be deemed necessary an Office for the Registering of Assurances, and shall appoint such persons to superintend those offices, and shall assign to them such salaries and establishments, and shall take such securities for the due performance of their duties, and shall frame such rules for their guidance not inconsistent with this Act, as may seem fit. And every original and final judgment, decree or order of any Court and every Will or Codicil, or written authority from any husband to a wife to adopt after his decease, any son, when any interest in land may be claimed by virtue of such adoption, and every Contract, Memorandum, Receipt or other writing whatsoever by which any estate or interest in any lands or any interest in the produce growing, or to be grown upon any lands shall be created, transferred or otherwise affected, and every writing which shall be the evidence of any act or matter whereby any such estate or interest shall be created, transferred or otherwise affected, shall be considered as an Assurance affecting such lands within the meaning of this Act.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that all Assurances to be made, passed or executed after the day and year aforesaid by which any lands within the said Presidency, Towns or the said Zillahs shall be in any way effected at Law or in Equity may be registered at the local Register Office of the Town or Zillah or other district in which the said lands or the greater part of them may be situated in the manner hereinafter directed.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that where any Will, Codicil, or written authority as aforesaid, by which any lands within the said Presidency, Towns or the said Zillahs shall be in any way affected at law or in Equity, shall have been made, passed or executed on or before the day and year aforesaid, and the Testator shall die after the same day and year, such Assurance may be in like

manner registered at the local Register Office of the Town or Zillah as the case may be.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that where any lands shall form part of the personal estate of any person deceased, every Will or Codicil duly proved or Letters of Administration or written authority as aforesaid by which the personal representative of such person deceased shall be appointed, or by which the appointment of such personal representative shall be revoked, or by which the right to the personal representation of such person deceased shall be in any way regulated, shall be considered as affecting such land.

VI. And whereas it may often happen that some time will elapse pending the negotiation for a sale or other contract in regard to interests in land, and that often by reason of the illness or absence of parties or from other causes, the written transfer of such property will be delayed for want of due execution by all the requisite parties : And whereas when conveyances are executed for a temporary purpose merely it may often be inconvenient and occasion unnecessary expense to register a conveyance, containing all the particulars of the transaction, it is hereby enacted, that any person may require a Caveat according to form A appended to this Act, to be entered in the Register for any Town or District, against his own acts and in favor of any other person, for the protection of any Assurance affecting any lands within such Town or District, which shall have been made and executed, or shall be in progress, or shall have been in contemplation at the time of entering such Caveat.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that every requisition for a Caveat shall be made in writing, and shall be signed by the grantor thereof, and shall name or describe the person in whose favor the Caveat is to be entered, and shall specify or describe the lands which it is intended should be affected thereby, and the time during which such Caveat shall remain in force, which time shall not exceed six months from the date of the Caveat.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that in order that the establishment of the said Office shall be neither a source of expense nor revenue, it shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council from time to time to determine the fees which shall be paid to the Registrar of every Register Office within the respective Presidencies, for the acts and things authorized or required by this Act ; provided that such fees shall be in proportion to the length of the assurance or other document registered, and that a Schedule of the same and of all alterations made at any time in the amount thereof shall be published in the Gazette ; provided also, that in addition to such fees a charge may be demanded according to the ordinary rates of section writing when the assurance or other document, copy, or extract, shall be written in any European language.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that every requisition for a Caveat at which may be deposited at the Register Office, shall be registered in the same Register, and under the same head, and in the same manner as the Assurance to be protected by such Caveat would, under the provisions of this Act, have been registered if the same had been registered the time of entering such Caveat.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that the Registrar to whom an Assurance may be presented for registry shall immediately note upon it the day, hour and minute of presentation, and shall cause an exact copy of it to be entered in a book according to the order in which it is presented, or if two

or more Assurances shall be received at the same time, then according to their respective dates, and shall attest the copy with his signature and with the signature of the party by whom the deed is presented, and shall then return the original with a certificate under his signature endorsed thereon specifying the day, hour and minute of receipt and of registry with references to the book containing the registry thereof, and the page, number under which the same shall have been entered therein.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that every Assurance by this Act authorized to be registered (except as hereinafter provided) shall, so far as regards any lands to be affected thereby, be void as against any person claiming under any subsequent Assurance duly registered, unless the prior Assurance shall have been duly registered before the registration of the subsequent Assurance; any alleged notice of such prior Assurance notwithstanding.

XII. Provided however, and it is hereby enacted, that every Will, Codicil, Letters of Administration, or written authority as aforesaid, which shall be registered within the space of one year after the death of the Testator, shall be as valid & effectual as if the same had been registered immediately after the death of such Testator.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that where any Assurance for the protection of which a Caveat shall have been entered shall be executed by the grant or of such Caveat, or by any person who shall claim under him, and shall also be executed by the person in whose favor such Caveat shall have been entered, or by his Executors, Administrators, or any other person entitled to the benefit thereof, and shall be duly registered within the time not exceeding six months for which the Caveat shall have been registered, such Assurances shall be entitled to the same preference and protection as if the same had been registered at the time of entering the Caveat.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that any persons may apply to a Register Office for an office copy or extract of any Assurance or other document registered thereat; and thereupon such copy or extract shall be prepared and a certificate signed by the Registrar shall be written or endorsed thereupon, which certificate shall state that such copy or extract is an examined copy or extract of the Assurance or other document registered; and shall specify the book and the place in which such Assurance or other document has been registered.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that any person may on application at a Register Office, be allowed to inspect and search any of the registers to be kept at the said offices; and to take extracts from any such registers, subject to such Regulations as shall be made in pursuance of this Act.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that all office copies, extracts and certificates to be provided under this Act, and all receipts to be given under this Act for the payment of fees and for deposits, unless the same be required to be given in evidence in a Court of Civil Justice, shall be exempted from Stamp duty.

XVII. And it is hereby enacted, that every copy of, or extract from any Assurance or other document registered at any Register Office, shall, if certified under the signature of the Registrar be admitted in all Courts as evidence of the due registration of such Assurance or other document, or of such part of such Assurance or other document as such copy or extract shall purport to contain, without proof of the hand writing of the certifying Officer.

XVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that the fees for registering any Assurance or for entering any Caveat, shall be brought or sent to the Register Office, with the document to be registered and the fees for making office copies of, and extracts from any registered documents, shall be paid before such office copies or extracts shall be delivered, and the fees for the several other acts and things for which fees are in the said Schedule expressed to be payable, shall be paid before such acts or things respectively shall be done or permitted; and no person shall be entitled to the delivery from a Register Office, of any compared or examined document, office copy, extract or certificate, or to make any search in the said Register Office, until the fees payable thereon shall have been paid.

XIX. And it is hereby enacted, that in case of the death or absence on leave of any person appointed by the Local Government to register Assurances under this Act, it shall be lawful for the Zillah Judge or other Officer specially authorized by the Local Government, to appoint any person whom he may think proper to take temporary charge of the office and to register Assurances in the same manner as if such person had been appointed to the office by the orders of the Local Government.

XX. And it is hereby enacted, that any person fraudulently removing any registered copy of any Assurance or other document from the office of Registry, or fraudulently making any alteration or erasure therein, or fraudulently destroying, tearing, or effacing the same, or any part thereof, shall be liable to be imprisoned with hard labor for any period not exceeding fourteen, nor less than four years.

The following Act passed by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council on the 10th of January 1842, is hereby promulgated for general information:

ACT No. 1. OF 1842.

An Act for better regulating the sale of Opium and other intoxicating drugs within the Town of Calcutta.

It is hereby enacted, that all Laws and Regulations prohibiting the sale of Spirituous Liquors within the Town of Calcutta except under licenses, and regulating the granting such licenses, and for inflicting penalties for breach of the conditions thereof, or for selling spirituous Liquors without having obtained such licenses, shall be applicable to the sale of Opium and other intoxicating drugs within the Town of Calcutta.
