## CADETS.

I. It will be the duty of the Town Major, on the arrival of Ships from England, to send the requisite communication on Board, and cause the attendance of all Cadets at his Office, from whence they will be transferred to the Adjutant General of the Army, to be disposed of as His Excellency the Commander in Chief may direct.

II. Destined for a Military Life, where Honor is the great object to be kept in view, a Profession requiring more requisites than any other to lead to excellence, the Gentlemen Cadets must know, that so desirable an object can only be attained by study and practice. Their conduct, at all times, should be orderly and obedient; they must know, that those who look forward to being well obeyed, should themselves shew a prompt obedience to all lawful Commands.

III. The Cadet (upon his being approved of by the Committee of Shipping) will be ranked according to his actual departure from England, so that the sooner he proceeds to India, the higher his Rank will be above those who may be appointed in the course of the same season as himself. On his arrival at the Presidency to which he is appointed, he will enter into pay and be promoted to a Commission in the Company's Army, according to his seniority, provided he shall not have forfeited his claim to such promotion by any disobedience of the Court's Orders, or misconduct during his passage out.

IV. (H. C. L. dated 23rd January 1833). Having had occasion in our correspondence with the Madras Government, to reconsider the Orders issued by us in our Military Dispatch to your Government, dated the 13th January 1830, on the subject of granting Commissions to Cadets in India, for whom there may be no Regimental vacancies, we herewith transmit Copy of the Revised Orders which we have addressed to the Madras Government.

2. Consequent on the Court's Orders to the Supreme Government, of the 13th January 1830, the Commander in Chief has been directed to submit the Draft of a General Order for revoking the Promotion of Cadets made from the date of arrival in India, and previous to vacancies occurring for their being brought on the Effective strength of the Army, and fixing their Allowances on the Bengal Scale.—Also Paragraphs 16 and 17 of a Letter dated 2nd August 1831, (No. 25), stating that a request from the Commander in Chief to have the subject again referred to the Court, has been overruled.

V. Having in reference to the Appeal made by the Commander in Chief, against the enforcement of the Orders contained in Para. 3 of our letter of the 13th January 1830, called for the opinion of our Standing Council on the subject, we are, in consequence of that opinion, induced to recall those Orders, and to direct that Cadets be promoted to the Ranks of Cornets, 2nd Lieutenants and Ensigns as heretofore, from the dates of their several arrivals in India; the dates of their respective Commissions being finally adjusted on their appointment to Regiments.

VI. The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to direct, that in conformity to the instruction, of the honorable the Court of Directors, bearing the 28th of December 1832, and published to the Army on the 31st of May 1833, Army Rank be assigned to the several Officers promoted to the grade of Ensign under the operation of the rules here referred to, as well as prospectively to all others, from the date of their respective arrivals, and not as at present from the date upon which they may be finally posted to Corps in succession to Vacancies.

VII. It is expected that the Cadet will, upon his arrival in India, conform strictly to all Rules and Regulations of the Presidency to which he is appointed, and that he will endeavour to qualify himself for his further situation, by professional acquirements, and by the attainment of a knowledge of the Language of the Country; in failure of which, he will render himself liable to be dismissed the Service.

VIII. The Cadet, upon his appearing before the Committee, will be furnished with a copy of the Articles of War for the Company's Service; and he is hereby informed, that upon his arrival in India he will be required to sign a Declaration, that he has frequently and attentively perused the same during the Voyage out; and in the event of his having neglected to peruse them, he will not be entitled to his Pay, or, considered as on the strength of the Army, until such written Declaration is given to the Governor.

IX. "We whose Names are hereunto subscribed, do acknowledge that we have received a Copy of the Articles of War for the Military Service of the Hon'ble United East India Company; and we do further declare, that we are willing to serve the said Company upon the Terms which were delivered to us at the time of our Admission, and will strictly conform to all the Rules, orders and Regulations which have been or may be established by the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, or the Governor and Council at the Presidency to which we are respectively appointed as Cadets."

X. And whereas it has been represented to the Court of Directors, by the Governments abroad, that many of the Cadets have manifested a serious disposition to insubordination towards the Superiors, and have been guilty of gross irregularities and ungentlemanlike conduct towards each other; the Cadet is hereby informed, that on his arrival in India, he is subject to Martial Law.

XI. (*H. C. L. 2d March 1798; Para. XI.*) "We have resolved, that such Gentlemen, who may in future be appointed Cadets upon your Establishment, while abroad, shall severally produce to the Governor in Council, the Certificate of their Appointment from our Secretary here, and likewise a satisfactory proof of their being within the Age prescribed; and that the Governor in Council shall be satisfied that such Gentlemen are not exceptionable in any respect."

XII. (*H. C. L. 17th Jan. 1810, Para. CLIII.*) "No Officer or Cadet can legally enter His Majesty's Service without having first obtained permission from us, or our Government, to quit our Service."

XIII. (*H. C. L. 20th April 1811, Paras. IV&V.*) "In consequence of our having come to the resolution to abolish the Military Institution which has been established at your Presidency, for educating our Cadets in the Oriental Languages previous to their being posted to Regiments, we feel it now highly necessary that the Rank of all Cadets should in future be so clearly defined, that upon their actual arrival in India, you should be enabled to post them immediately to such Corps in which they are to remain."

XIV. At a Court of Directors, held on Friday the 27th February 1818. Resolved; that Cadets and Assistant Surgeons be in future ranked according to the seniority of the Directors nominating them, from the date of sailing of the several ships from Gravesend, by Lloyd's list; and that, those who may embark at any of the out-ports be likewise ranked upon the same principle from the date of the ship's departure from such out-ports by Lloyd's list.

XV. At a Court of Directors held 21st May 1821. Resolved, that all the Cavalry and infantry Cadets and Assistant Surgeons, who shall fail to apply at the Cadet Department for their orders for embarkation within Three Months from the date of their being passed and sworn before the Committee, or shall not actually proceed under such orders, be considered as having forfeited their appointments, unless special circumstances shall justify the Court's departure from this regulation.

XVI. By a Resolution of Court of the 4th December 1833, all direct Cadets appointed or sworn in between the 10th March and 10th June, or between 10th September and 10th December, for the days which may be fixed on for the public examination of the Seminary Cadets, do rank after the Seminary Cadets who may pass their said examination, provided the latter sail for their respective destinations within three months after passing said examinations.

XVII. (*H. C. L. 12th Aug. 1818, Para. III.*) "We have to call your particular attention to the Lists of Rank of our Cadets and Assistant Surgeons of the present season (1817) and we direct that no alteration may be made therein, as every Gentleman is ranked agreeably to our Regulations, with reference to his actual departure from England."

XVIII. (*Para. IV.*) "This observation is intended to apply equally to those Cadets, and Assistant Surgeons, who have held His Majesty's Commissions; as to those who have not, due attention having been already paid to that circumstance; as we have been careful to place those who have been in His Majesty's Service, at the Head of the List of each period of departure from Europe, and beyond this indulgence we do not intend their priority of Rank should extend."

XIX. (*H. C. L. 6th June 1814, Para. CII.*) "As the Local Militia has been established by the Legislature, upon a principle that constitutes it part of the permanent Military Resources of the Empire; we direct, as a general rule, that all Cadets be considered entitled to precedence of Rank in consequence of having served in a Corps of Local Militia."

XX. (*Para. V.*) "It is quite a mistaken idea, that those Cadets, who have held His Majesty's Commission for one year, are entitled to rank above all the Cadets of the season in which they are appointed; the only preference we give them, is, Rank above those who sail at the same period with themselves."

XXI. (*H. C. L. 17th December 1833.*) Having determined upon sending some Cadets of Infantry, direct to your Presidency, we take the earliest opportunity of apprising you, that we have deemed it expedient, that some general principle as to their Rank should be established, to protect the interests of those who are pursuing their studies at the Company's Military Seminary. We have accordingly resolved:

XXII. That those Cadets who may pass their Public Examination at the Seminary on the 13th of December instant, do take Rank of all the direct Cadets of the present season (1833); although the latter may have actually sailed for their respective destinations prior to the 13th December, provided the said Seminary Cadets embark and sail for their destinations within Three Months of passing their Examination, as aforesaid. And in order to preserve to the Seminary Cadets a due advantage of Rank over the Cadets appointed direct for India at any future period, we have resolved:

XXIII. That all direct Cadets appointed or sworn in before the Committee for passing Military Appointments, between the 10th of March and the 10th of June, or between the 10th of September & the 10th of December, (the days fixed on for the Public Examinations,) do Rank after the Seminary Cadets who may pass their said Examinations, provided the latter sail for their destination within Three Months from the date of their passing such Examinations.

XXIV. (*H. C. L. 4th Jan. 1811, Para. V.*) "We have now to acquaint you, that we shall hereafter look solely to our own Establishment for a sufficient number of well educated young Men for our Engineer and Artillery Corps; and we have resolved that there shall be two public Examinations during the year,

XXV. (*Para. VI.*) "With the view to encourage genius and superior talents, and to stimulate our young Men to exertion, close application, and good behaviour during their residence in the Institution; we have further resolved to select from the most promising, among those who are reported qualified at the public Examinations before mentioned, a certain proportion expressly for the Corps of Engineers; and we have determined that they shall be permitted to remain at our Seminary (without prejudice to their rank) a further time beyond the said examination, to render them more eminently qualified for that particular line of Service, which, according to all experience, requires more time for instruction than the Artillery Service. It is therefore our express desire that you should in no case fill up from the Artillery, Cavalry, or Infantry, the Vacancies that may occur either in your Artillery, or Engineer Corps; but that upon receiving the List of Cadets intended for the latter Service, you do immediately post them to such vacancies as shall appear to have existed at the time when the said List was dated."

XXVI. (*Para. IX.*) "As we are under no apprehension, but that in future we shall be able to send annually, a sufficient number of well qualified young Men to meet every contingency which may occur in the Corps of Artillery, or Engineers at our several Presidencies, we again desire that it may be clearly understood, that the case must be urgent indeed, which can warrant our admitting of the Removal of Officers *even pro tempore*, from any other Corps to the Artillery or Engineers."

XXVII. (*H. C. L. 18th December 1812. Para. XII.*) "From the evident success which has attended the plan of sending (for a few months) our Engineer Cadets on the Trigonometrical Survey carrying on throughout England, after they have passed their public examination at our Military Institution; we now acquaint you of our intention to adopt this measure for all our Cadets who may hereafter be selected for the Corps of Engineers, from a conviction that they will acquire much practical experience in every branch of Surveying, whether Military or Civil, as also be made perfect in the useful art of reconnoitring Ground, and be initiated in the measuring, and laying down from measurement, Engines and Work appropriate to Civil Engineering.

XXVIII. (*H. C. L. 17th April 1816. Para. XI.*) "With the view to give every encouragement to those Cadets who have been, or may hereafter be, selected for our Corps of Engineers to pay close attention to their studies, and to qualify themselves more eminently for their particular branch of duty; we have come to the resolution that their detention in this Country, (after passing their public examination) for the purpose of proceeding on the Trigonometrical Survey, or on any other public duty tending to their advancement in Military Science, shall not prejudice their claim to return to their Native Country at the time they would have been entitled so to return, had they not been detained for the above extra duty."

XXIX. (*Para. XII.*) "With the view of enabling you to determine, from what period the presumed residence of every Engineer Cadet who has been detained on the Survey before stated, shall be considered to commence, we have transmitted a List of those who have passed at the several Examinations since the Survey was adopted by us, as well as a List of the Artillery Cadets who passed with them under the same examination; and our desire is, that the first arrival at your Presidency of the Artillery Cadets, in any one season, shall decide the period from whence the arrival of the Engineer Cadets of the same season shall be supposed to have taken place, had they not been detained in England by us."

XXX. (*Para. XIII.*) "By this arrangement you will perceive that the Artillery Cadets who were their Juniors in the Seminary at the respective periods of passing, will not have a prior claim to retire from our Military Service, or to return to their Native Country; but you will observe that this indulgence is not to constitute a claim on the part of our Engineer Cadets, to any Pay or Allowances from the date of their presumed arrival in India, because our Allowances for their detention on public duty have not only been ample, but liberal; it is therefore merely intended to afford them the privilege of returning to Europe, at the same period as their juniors who passed for the Artillery."

XXXI. (*H. C. L. 12th October 1836, No. 42*) In our Military Letter of 17th April 1816 (paras. 11 and 13) we directed that the first arrival at your Presidency of the Artillery Cadets educated at Addiscombe in any one season, shall decide the period from which the arrival of the Engineer Cadets of the same season, also educated at Addiscombe, shall be supposed to have taken place, had they not been detained in England by us. The principle of this Regulation is equally, or rather more, strongly applicable with reference to the Cadets appointed to the Line after having been educated at Addiscombe, we therefore desire that it may be applied both prospectively and retrospectively so as to ensure to the whole of the Cadets passing at Addiscombe, whether for the Engineers, the Artillery, or the Line, seniority in Army Rank when first Commissioned, corresponding with their relative Rank when reported qualified at the Seminary.

XXXII. The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for observance at this presidency, the following copy of a letter addressed by the Hon'ble the Court of Directors to the Governor of the Presidency of Fort William.

XXXIII. It is our wish and desire, that Regimental rise should in every case be brought into full operation at the earliest practicable period after the arrival of the Cadet at the Presidency for which he is appointed.

XXXIV. With this view, the lists of Rank of Cadets are forwarded by the first opportunity after they can be finally arranged, and upon an average, no Cadet has been more than two or three months in India before you are apprised of the Order in which he stands for succession to a Regimental vacancy. If there be then a vacancy, and he stand first of the unposted Cadets he should be immediately appointed to fill it, so that his participation in the chances of Regimental rise may at once commence.

**XXXV.** The supply of Cadets being duly apportioned to the wants of the service, it will seldom happen, if the above rule be carefully acted upon, that any one Regiment has more than one Vacancy at a time, and consequently, that under ordinary circumstances, no necessity will arise for the transfer of Cornets or Ensigns from one Regiment to another.

**XXXVI.** Should cases arise hereafter, in which there are two or more vacancies in any one Regiment, whilst other Regiments of the same arm are complete, we concur in opinion with the Commander in Chief that the Senior Cornet, or Ensign who would gain one step by removal, should, if he desire it, be granted that advantage.

**XXXVII.** No Cornet or Ensign is removable for purposes of promotion, except at his own request; and as there are difficulties in the way of ascertaining the wishes of individuals in this respect at the time when the contingency arises. We desire that it be established as a regulation, that every Cornet or Ensign who may wish to be removed to any Corps, by removal to which he would gain one or more steps shall notify his wish to that effect to the Adjutant General of the Army within one month from the date of his being first posted should he afterwards desire to alter this determination, he may notify the same to the Adjutant General. The Commander in Chief will thus at all times be in possession of the necessary information, to enable him to equalize the number of Cornets or Ensigns in each Corps, with due attention to the interests of all concerned.

**XXXVIII.** (*H. C. L. dated 2d December 1840. No. 79 Para 35.*) We forward a number in the Packet, Copy of our Resolution dated the 22d November 1837, under which the Cadets who were then in course of instruction at the Military Seminary, and who might thenceforward be appointed to that institution are entitled to count the time passed by them at the Seminary after they attain the age of 16, as so much time passed in India in calculating their period of service for retiring Pensions on Full Pay.

**XXXIX.** At a Court of Directors, the 22d November 1837.

Resolved by the Ballot, that having had under consideration the nature and extent of the advantages accorded to the Cadets who receive their education at the Military Seminary by the Court's Resolution of the 4th December 1833, under which such Cadets in passing their public examination take rank above all Cadets sworn in on direct appointments within the three months preceding the dates of such examination, and by the orders contained in the Court's Military circular Despatch of the 17th April 1816, under which Cadets who pass for Engineers are permitted to reckon the commencement of their Service in India from the date at which they would have arrived in that country, had they proceeded to their destination instead of remaining to carry on their professional studies at chatham, the Court are of opinion, that the Cadets studying at the Seminary should be still further protected from the loss which they may be considered to sustain as compared with those who proceed upon direct appointments,

**XL.** That on advertizing to the Regulations framed at the time when Cadets were educated for the Company's Service at the Royal Colleges of Marlborough and Woolwich, the Court observe, that such Cadets were placed on the same footing as the Cadets who, not having received their education at those Institutions proceeded at once to India, and that as "direct" Cadets could then so proceed at the age of fifteen, the period at which the college Cadet should take rank was fixed at fifteen years and a half, thus allowing six months for their arrival in India.

**XLI.** That the Court are of opinion, that upon the same principle Cadets who may continue at the Military Seminary after they have attained the age at which "Direct" Cadets may now proceed to India, namely, sixteen years, should not lose the advantage in respect to retiring Pension on full Pay, which they would derive if they immediately proceeded to their destination.

**XLI.** That accordingly, all the time during which Cadets actually continue at the Military Seminary after attaining the age of Sixteen, and before they pass their public examination (provided they pass within the fixed period of four terms) shall count as a portion of the period which may eventually entitle them to retire upon Full Pay under the Regulations as now established.

**XLI.** At a Court of Directors held on the 30th of November 1836, Resolved that this Court entirely concur in the propriety and expediency of the suggestions which are offered in the letter from Colonel Stannus, with a view to the encouragement of young men, of talent at the Military Seminary, to persevere in the diligent Study of the various branches of science pursued at that institution.

**XLIV.** That as from the want of vacancies in the scientific Corps, there is not at the present period sufficient object for emulation, it is desirable, as an incentive to increased application on the part of the Gentleman Cadets, to grant Honorary certificates of diligence and good conduct to those, who, although they may have been unsuccessful in attaining Engineer appointments, may be considered to merit some testimony of approbation for their exertion in study, and regularity of behaviour while at the institution.

**XLV.** That honorary certificates be accordingly granted to such Cadets appointed to the Artillery and Infantry as may have attained to the required standard of qualification, by the fulfilment of the following conditions, which shall be deemed requisite to render a cadet eligible thereto, vizt.

- In Mathematics..... To have gone through the course, to the end of Fluxions.
- , Fortification..... To have completed the course.
- , Military drawing..... The surveys to be well and correctly finished and to have attained a fair proficiency in Military Drawing.

- In Civil drawing..... To have observed unremitting diligence and industry.  
 " Hindustani..... To be able to read and translate at the public examination.  
 " French..... To have observed every diligence and industry in these branches.  
 " Latin.....  
 " Character..... To have borne in the reports generally, a character of diligence and good conduct.

**XLVI.** That the Gentlemen Cadets obtaining these certificates (which are to be engraved in a suitable manner) be allowed the privilege of selecting the Presidency to which they shall be posted, and that their names, with a suitable statement of their merits, be communicated by the Court, for the observation of Local Governments, and also publication in General Orders to the Army.

**XLVII.** (*H. C. L. to the S. G. dated 5th June 1839. Paragraph 1st.*) We forward in Packet; Copies of printed forms to be duly filled up and signed by cadets, who in consequence of being abroad when nominated to their respective appointments are unable to pass the required examination in this Country, upon every future occasion when you shall be called upon by us to admit a Cadet so circumstanced under the Regulations, you will cause the form to be duly executed in duplicate, and you will transmit one copy for record in this House.

**REGULATIONS**  
FOR THE  
**ADMISSION OF CADETS INTO THE EAST-INDIA COMPANY'S SERVICE**  
BY THE  
**LOCAL GOVERNMENTS OF INDIA**  
UNDER AN  
**APPOINTMENT OF THE HONORABLE THE COURT OF DIRECTORS:**

**AGE.**

**XLVIII.** The Cadet must not be under sixteen or above Twenty-two years, in proof of which he must produce an extract from the Register of the Parish in which he was born, or his own Declaration and other Certificates agreeably to the annexed Form.

**XLIX.** Where the person to be appointed a Cadet has held a Commission in Her Majesty's Service, for the term of one year at least, or in the Militia or Fencible Corps when embodied, and shall have joined his Regiment and been called into actual service, or shall have been in the Company of Cadets of the Royal Regiments of Artillery, such Person is eligible for the appointment of Cadet in the Company's Service, provided his age does not exceed Twenty-five years of which, circumstance he must, nevertheless, produce the several Certificates before-mentioned, as also his Commission together with a Certificate, from the War-office, or Commanding Officer of his Regiment, of his having actually joined and done duty with the Regiment for the full Term of one year, or upwards; and that he was neither dismissed nor resigned his Regiment in consequence of any misconduct.

**HEALTH.**

**L.** The Cadet must produce a Certificate from the Medical Board, according to the annexed Form, that he has no mental or bodily defect whatever to disqualify him for Military Service.

**RANK.**

**LI.** The Cadet will take rank from the date of the departure from England of the Dispatch announcing his appointment. Should this, however, take place within the period of three months preceding each of the half-yearly examinations at the Military Seminary, he will then take rank after the Seminary Cadets who may, pass at the preceding Public examination at Addiscombe, provided the latter sail for their respective destinations within three months after passing their said Examinations.

**LII.** No Person who has been dismissed or obliged to retire, from the Army or Navy, the Royal Military College at Sandhurst, the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich, or from any other Public Institution, on account of immoral or ungentlemanly conduct can be appointed a Cadet.

**N.B.** The Cadet is required as a condition to his appointment to subscribe to the Military Fund at his Presidency, and to the Orphan Fund if on the Bengal Establishment.

**EXTRACT RESOLUTION passed by the Court of Directors, the 9th August 1809.**

**LIII.** RESOLVED, That any person who shall in future be nominated to a situation, either Civil or Military, in the service of this Company, and who shall have obtained such nomination in consequence of Purchase, or agreement to purchase or of any corrupt Practice whatever, either direct or indirect, by himself or any other Person, with or without his Privy, shall be rejected from the Service of the Company, and ordered back to England, if he shall have proceeded to India before a discovery of such corrupt Practice be made; and if such situation shall have been so corruptly procured by himself or with his privy, he shall be rendered incapable of holding that, or any other situation whatever in the said Service. Provided always, that if a fair disclosure of any corrupt transaction or practice, of the nature before described, wherein any Director has been concerned, shall be voluntarily made by the party or Parties engaged in the same with such Director, the appointment thereby procured shall be confirmed by the Court.

If a Cadet produces a false Certificate, or the Dates are found to have been altered, for the purpose of making him appear to be of a proper age, he is rendered ineligible to hold any situation in the Company's Service.

XI. The attention of Commanding Officers is called to that most essential part of their duty, which requires, that they shall be responsible for the Arms and Accoutrements of their Corps.

XII. Soldiers are, at all times, to keep their Arms perfectly clean and in good order; the inside of the lock must be well oiled; the brasses, bayonet, and ramrod, must be bright and polished; attention must also be paid to keeping the inside of the barrel and socket of the bayonet very clean, otherwise it will be impossible to fix and unfix the latter with the necessary quickness. When Firelocks are not in use, the cocks are to be let down, as keeping them constantly on the half cock weakens the mainspring. The Flints are always to be screwed firm between the plies of a thin piece of lead; besides a good one in his piece, a Soldier must always have two in his pouch, and also a bit of wood, shaped like a flint, to use at exercise in practising the firing motions. Every man to be furnished with a Worm and Turnkey, to clean the inside of the barrel of his Firelock, and for managing the screws of the lock, as the edge of the bayonet must never be used for the latter purpose; small Vices to be also provided for the Soldiers,

G. O. C. 31st. XIII. The Firelocks are to be lettered for the Companies, and numbered for the Men; Dec. 1788. that when a Man's Musket is mended, he may get the same one again, and not be for ever obliged to take another. They are to be kept in good order, and always ready for service.

are to be mixed together, the Vitriol having been previously dissolved in a sufficient quantity of water to make, with the other ingredients, one quart of mixture.

XVII. The Barrel, with the Socket and Neck of the Bayonet only are, to be browned; they should be rubbed over either with a fine File, or with coarse Emory Paper, previous to their receiving the Browning Liquid, in order that its effect may be the greater.

XVIII. Previous to commencing the operation of Browning the Barrel, it is necessary that it be well cleaned from all greasiness and other impurities, and that a plug of wood be put into its muzzle; and the vent well stopped; the mixture is then to be applied with a clean sponge or rag, taking care that every part of the Barrel be covered with the mixture, which must then be exposed to the air for twenty-four hours, after which exposure the Barrel must be rubbed with a steel scratch-brush and rag, to remove the Oxido from the surface. This operation must be performed a second, and a third time (if necessary) by which the Barrel will be made of a perfectly Brown Colour. It must then be carefully brushed, wiped and immersed in boiling water, in which a small quantity of Alkaline matter has been put in order that the action of the Acid upon the Barrel may be destroyed, and the impregnation of the water by the Acid neutralized.

XIX. In removing the Oxide from the surface of the Barrel, &c. a Steel Scratch-Brush will be found more effectual than the hard Hair Brush; the use of the Steel Scratch Brush is therefore to be adopted. This part of the operation must be done with great care as upon it depends the proper Browning of the Barrel.

XX. The Barrel when taken from the water must, after being perfectly dry, be rubbed smooth with a burnisher of hard wood, and then heated to about the temperature of boiling water; it then will be ready to receive a Varnish made of the following Materials:-

Spirits of Wine. . . . . 1 Quart,  
 Dragon's Blood powder. . . . . 3 Drams,  
 Shel-lac bruised . . . . . 1 Ounce,

and after the Varnish is perfectly dry upon the Barrel, it must be rubbed with the burnisher to give it a smooth and glossy appearance.

XXI. In moist weather, the operation of Browning must be performed in as dry a situation as possible, for humidity upon the Oxide weakens its effect, which must be carefully guarded against.

**XXII.** The Locks are on no account to be made of the hardening colour, as the repetition of the operation of hardening has a very injurious tendency.

## *To Repair and Retain the Brown upon Barrels.*

**XXIII.** When the Barrel is much rubbed from use, a little Vitriolic Acid may be applied to it, and then it must receive the treatment that Barrels undergo in Browning, care being taken to deaden the action of the Acid by means of boiling water.

XXIV. When Brown Barrels are in constant use, the Brown might be continually kept perfect by means of the application of Vinegar, which should remain upon the surface for a day, and then be washed well with boiling water.

**XV.** If this operation be repeated monthly, a Barrel which has been properly Browned in the first instance, will continue in a perfect state for many years.

**XXVI.** The Commander in Chief desires it may be generally understood, that the issue of repaired Arms and Accoutrements by the Ordnance Department, is perfectly consistent with the Regulations and usages of the Service; and that the circumstance of these articles not being new, when otherwise perfectly serviceable, does not warrant their rejection, when issued in lieu of others returned into Store.

**XXXI.** It having been brought to the notice of the Commander in Chief, that Accoutrements and other Articles of Military Equipment have been Indented back into Store as unserviceable, before they have been in use the period proscribed for their duration by the General Orders of the Army (vide G. O. C. 17th July 1812 and G. G. O. 16th August 1827,) without a satisfactory reason being assigned for their thus early becoming so, His Excellency calls the attention of Officers Commanding Divisions, Stations, and Regiments to the orders above quoted, and desires it may be understood that, in all future instances of infringement of the Regulations on this head, without adequate cause being assigned for the deviation, the Commander in Chief will consider it his duty, in order to impress in a more forcible manner, the serious responsibility incurred by Regimental Commanding Officers, by negligence or inattention to so important a part of their duty, to recommend to Government to cause all losses sustained by the public on this account, to be made good from their private pecuniary resources.

**XXXVII.** At stations where there may be an Arsenal or Dépot, a returning indent prepared in duplicate according to the prescribed form is established as the Voucher on which Stores requiring repair, or no longer needed, by Corps or Departments, are to be returned into Stores, thrice each year, (viz. on the 1st March, 1st September and 1st December) Receiving Officers being required carefully to examine the Stores produced, and to reject any which appear to be tendered on insufficient grounds, unless required to receive them by the Station Commanding Officer, whose signature will in this case be passed upon the Indent.

**XXXVIII.** Military Stores in charge of Regiments or Detachments, becoming repairable or unserviceable at stations at a distance from an Arsenal or Dépot, shall be surveyed by Committees assembled under the orders of Station Commanding Officers on the dates specified in the above para. whose proceedings shall be drawn out in duplicate according to the annexed form, and the confirming authority will on the face thereof, give instructions regarding the disposal of the Stores surveyed; such as can be repaired on the spot are to be so dealt with, and a Contingent Bill preferred under the sanction of the Officer ordering the repairs, for the expense incurred; such only as cannot be thus repaired, are to be returned into Store. Unserviceable Stores (exceptions, vide para. XLII) are to be disposed of by public sale on the spot. A sale list, duly received by the Divisional Pay Master, together with a copy of the Contingent Bill, and the Committee's proceedings on which the two documents have been framed, will be forwarded as vouchers to the next Quarterly Return of Stores.

2 Light Grapnel with 20 fathoms of 3 inch Cable and a strong Chain of 10 feet long, for removing large Choppers, it should have 5 or 6 arms and be of such a weight as may be easily carried up to the slope of a roof and attached to the ridge pole.

1 Drag Ropes without cross pieces, from 15 to 20 fathoms of 3 inch Cable with a strong Chain and Hook 20 feet long, to be used for the same purpose as the Grapnel, and also for pulling down walls &c.

2 Light Ladders if possible of Bamboo, from 12 to 13 feet long, to give easy access to the roofs of Buildings.

4 Kentish Bill Hooks for cutting away rafter ties &c.

4 Common Bill Hooks for opening Choppers from the out-side, in order to attach the Grapnel or Drag-rope.

2 Hook Knives on long Poles, to cut Ties which cannot otherwise be reached.

1 Felling Axe.

4 Long handled Sapforks for removing the Choppers of low huts.

8 Crow Bars for undermining or breaking through walls.

16 Pick-axes and Shovels for removing ruins, breaking down walls, throwing earth or burning rubbish &c.
