The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following Compilation of all existing orders under the head " Artillery."

II. (*G. O. G. 6th May, 1824.*) The Regiment of Artillery to consist of Two Battalions of Foot and one Brigade of Horse Artillery of Four Troops or Companies each.

III. To each Battalion or Brigade, one Colonel, one Lieutenant Colonel, one Major, five Captains, ten First Lieutenants, five Second Lieutenants.

IV. The whole of the Officers of Artillery, to whatever branch of the Regiment they may be attached from time to time by the Commander in Chief, shall continue to form one general List for Promotion and continue to rise in one Corps as heretofore at each Presidency.

V. The Non-commissioned Staff, Serjeant Majors, Quarter Master Serjeants, Drill Serjeants or Corporals, Trumpeters, Farriers and others, are all to be effective, and not bonus on the complement of Troops or Companies.

VI. The Commander in Chief deems it necessary to define the particular Duties upon which the Officers of the Artillery are to be employed.

VII. The Officers are not to be exempted from a participation in the General Duties of the Garrison, Cantonment, or Camp, in which they may be serving; but they are never to be required to mount Guards and Piquets except with their own Corps.

VIII. As there are, however, some situations of a very extensive superintendence, and in which more or less responsibility is attached to the Officers of this Corps, who are entrusted with detached Commands, it is ordered, that, (although the Officer Commanding the Artillery is to be at all times included in the General Roster) in instances, where such Commanding Officer can make it appear to the General or Officer Commanding, that he has particular professional occupations which will demand his attention, and which would be interrupted by the performance of other duties, he shall be exempted from such duties, at the discretion of the General or other Officer Commanding.

IX. *Transmit a Memorial from the Commandant of Artillery, praying that the Artillery quartered in the Garrison of Bombay, may be placed under his Command and Control, and that he may be considered a Garrison Officer and entitled to succeed to the Command of the Troops composing it.*

charge of the Detachment of Artillery serving in the Fort, is opposed to the Regulations as established in Bengal, and cannot be complied with.

3. (*H. C. Letter dated 7th August 1841, No. 87.*)

Referring to the communication made to you in our Military Letter of the 25th August 1841, we have to observe, that the Commandant of Artillery, equally with the Chief Engineer, is entitled to be Commandant of the Garrison of Bombay, when the Senior Officer present, but without receiving any additional Allowance on that account. The application of the Commandant of Artillery to be allowed executive

X. *Transmit a Memorial from the Commandant of Artillery, soliciting that the title of Brigadier may be conferred on him. State the circumstances under which a similar application has been repeatedly preferred by him and hitherto negatived by the Government of India, and request the Court to pass a conclusive decision which shall set the matter finally at rest.*

The designation of Brigadier cannot be appropriately conferred on the Commandant of Artillery, at your Presidency, whatever may be his Regimental Rank, unless like the Officers holding similar Commands at Dum Dum and St. Thomas's Mount, he has under his personal Command the Head Quarters of two or more Battalions, in this case the designation will carry with it no additional Allowance.

XI. Officers in Command of Detachments of Artillery, whether in Garrison or in the Field, are ordered to transmit Quarterly Returns of the Ordnance and Stores of every denomination under their charge, to the Military Board.

XII. The Commandant of Artillery will submit on the 1st October annually, a detail of the proposed Artillery Practice for the Season, and after the same shall have been laid before the Commander in Chief and approved, the necessary instructions will be communicated to the several Officers Commanding Divisions and Stations, for their information.

XIII. The Principal Commissary of Ordnance will deliver over charge of the Ammunition and Stores, allotted to the Ordnance on the Works, to the Commandant of Artillery, under whose charge they are henceforth to be considered.

XIV. The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to grant the Commandant of Artillery the same Stationary Allowance as is drawn by a Brigadier of the first class.

XV. The General, or other Officer in Command of the whole Artillery, is not to be considered as in actual executive Command of any one Battalion of the Corps, his duties being obviously of a higher and more general nature, implying superintendence over the whole, and corresponding in this respect rather to that of a Brigadier, or a General Officer Commanding a Division.

XVI. On the expiration of the period of Major General — appointment to Command the Artillery the Commander in Chief recommended that that officer should be re-nominated to the Command for a further term of four years, the Officer next in succession being of the rank of Lieutenant Colonel only — The Court's Orders appearing to be peremptory, Government have appointed Lieutenant Colonel — to be the Commandant of Artillery.

(Extract of Hon'ble Court's Letter, dated 6th October, 1824. Para. 15.) Your decision on this case was correct, and in consonance with our orders recently transmitted to the Supreme Government.

XVII. Under the authority of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, the Staff Salary of the Brigade Major of Artillery is raised to Rupees 250 per mensem, from the 17th ultimo.

XVIII. The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to fix the Office Establishment of the Brigade Major of Artillery at Rupees (100) one hundred per mensem, exclusive of the allowance granted to the Serjeants employed in his Office.

XIX. The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is also pleased to grant the Brigade Major of Artillery the Office Ten tage of his rank (50) fifty Rupees per mensem, at all times to enable him to furnish himself with an Office when stationary, and to provide and carry an Office Tent, when moving.

XX. The number of Light Field Guns with the Horse and Foot Artillery, is in futuro to be incorporated in the Monthly Return of the Regiment.

XXI. The Senior Regimental Staff Officer in the Poonah Division of the Army is permitted to draw an allowance of Rupees Twenty per mensem, for performing the Artillery Detail duties of the Division.

N. B.—As it may occasionally happen that the Senior Regimental Staff Officer is not quartered at the same Station as the Divisional Commanding Officer, the latter nominates the Officer who may be most convenient.

XXII. The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to sanction the appointment of a Staff Officer under the designation of Adjutant and Quarter Master to the Details of Artillery in Guzerat.

XXIII. The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased, in assimilation with the practice in Bengal, to establish the following Rules for the performance of Staff duties to Detachments of Artillery.

XXIV. When two or more Troops of Horse or Companies of Foot Artillery or Golundauze detached from Brigade or Battalion Head Quarters, are located together at a Station where there may be no Brigade or Battalion Staff, an Officer will be appointed to act as Adjutant and Quarter Master to the Detachment, upon the usual allowances of that situation, vizt.

XXV. If to a Detachment composed entirely of European Artillery or of European and Native Artillery. } The same as to an Adjutant and Quarter Master of European Foot Artillery, Rupees 222.

XXVI. If to a Detachment composed of Native Artillery } The same as to an Adjutant of Golundauze, Rupees 192. 7 0.

XXVII. Should the Head Quarters of a Brigade of Horse, or of a Battalion of Foot Artillery or Golundauze, be at the same Station with one Troop or more of Horse, or one Company or more of Foot Artillery or Golundauze, not of the same Brigade or Battalion the Staff duties of the whole will be conducted by the Brigade or Battalion Adjutant, who will draw an extra allowance of Rupees 35 per mensem (the present rate) for Writers and Stationery to cover the additional expenses attendant on such duties. But on establishing the foregoing provisions, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council directs, that care be taken to distribute the Head Quarters of Troops and Companies at the various Stations of Artillery so as to prevent the necessity of employing Wing or Detachment Adjutants, except when actually required by the exigencies of the service.

XXVIII. These orders are to have effect from the 1st proximo, except in cases where their application would prove detrimental to Officers who, on the receipt of this order, may be, or acting as Troop or Detachment Adjutants, under former Regulations, the benefits of which they will continue to enjoy, until such Staff appointments lapse, under circumstances which would disqualify them under those Regulations.

XXIX. The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to sanction a temporary increase to the Non-Commissioned Officers of the 1st Battalion of Artillery, to the extent of three Serjeants, three Corporals, and six Bombardiers for every hundred Gunners in excess of the Establishment of the Battalion.

HORSE ARTILLERY.

XXX. The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased direct, that the Non-

XXXVI. Sixty seven Saddles Riding, for Staff Non-Commissioned Officers and Detachments, exclusive of 44 Drivers Saddles which are provided in the scale of Harness. The Troops to which the Trumpet Major and Farrier Major are attached, to be allowed two additional Saddles.

XXXVII. One hundred Single sets of Harness, including Riding and Pad Saddles, according to the following allotment.

XXXIX. The Abstract for these Allowances to be vouched by a Muster Roll of the number of Saddles and Harness kept up, and a certificate that the same are in good order.

XL. Whenever the Establishment of a Troop may be increased for Field Service, the Saddle Allowance to be drawn for the additional number of Men allowed on the Establishment. The Harness allowance remaining as before.

XLI. For the mode of foraging the Horses see section "Cavalry" also the Establishment of Horsekeepers. Vide Paras. XVI and LXII to LXXXVI of that Section.

XLII. All Officers appointed for the first time from the Foot to the Horse Artillery, shall repair to the Head Quarters of the Horse Brigade, for the purpose of being instructed in Cavalry Equitation,

XLIII. In order to promote, in every practicable manner, the efficiency of that important Arm, an object which is in no way so likely to be perfectly attained, as by keeping its full proportion of Commissioned Officers at all times complete; His Excellency the Commander in Chief is pleased to establish it as a Standing Regulation applicable to the Horse Artillery, that any Officer whose absence from his Troop exceeds a period of *three months*, whether occasioned by temporary Staff employment or any other cause not provided for by the existing Regulations of the Service, shall be considered as having forfeited all claim to be longer continued on the Strength of its Returns, and the vacancy thus occasioned will, immediately on the completion of the period above specified, be filled up in the usual manner.

The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to sanction the addition of a Farrier Major to the Head Quarters of the Horse Brigade, on a Staff Pay of Rupees twenty one per month; and, that a Trumpet Major be also added to the Establishment and borne on the strength of the Non-Commissioned effective Staff. The Staff Pay of the Trumpet Major is fixed at Rupees fourteen per month.

FOOT ARTILLERY.

LI. The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to direct, that the Material Equipment of Foot Artillery Batteries shall in future consist as follows:—

LII. The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to sanction three additional Ammunition Carriages with Limbers to every detached Battery of foot Artillery under this presidency not in the vicinity of a Magazine, or when proceeding on service without a park being attached to the force.

LIV. The Hon'ble the Governor in Council has sanctioned an effective Staff Serjeant being appointed to each of the two European Companies of Foot Artillery proceeding to Scind, as also a Serjeant Major for the two Companies in accordance with former practice.

GOLUNDAUZE.

LV. The Honorable the Governor in Council sanctions as a temporary arrangement, pending a reference to the Honorable the Court of Directors in England, the raising for the service of this Presidency, a Battalion of Golundauze.

LVI. It is not intended that the Golundauze Corps should be disbanded at once at any future period; but in the event of a reduction becoming necessary under instructions from the authorities in England, it will be gradually effected by Casualties as they occur among Native Commissioned Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Privates, and not by discharging any of them who are fit for the Service.

Feb. 1840. LXII. Under the authority of the Government of India the Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to sanction an Establishment of Recruit Boys to the Golundauze Battalion to the extent of six Boys.

May 1841. LXIII. Recruits enlisted for the Infantry cannot be transferred to the Artillery without their consent.

Sep. 1841. LXIV. Recruiting for General Service having been prohibited it will be necessary that measures should be taken Regimentally, to keep the Golundauze complete as it may from time to time require.

GUN LASCARS.

June 1834. LXV. The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to direct, that the Gun Lascars attached to each Battalion of Foot Artillery and to the Golundauze Battalion be reduced to the following strength.

May 1834. LXVII. The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to direct, that the Rank of Naique in the Corps of Gun Lascars attached to the Regiment of Artillery, be prospectively abolished.

With reference to the General Order No 295, dated the 30th of June 1834, making a reduction in the strength of the Gun Lascars attached to each Battalion of Artillery and to the Golundauze Battalion, the Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to direct, that a corresponding reduction be made in the number of Lascar Boys, which will in future be six, instead of twelve for each Battalion.

The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council is of opinion that no Gun Lascars should be sent to the Presidency for the purpose of being invalidated who are not by Service entitled to a Pension, and who would not under the ordinary practice of the Service, be discharged with a gratuity.

REPAIRS TO BATTERIES OF HORSE AND FOOT ARTILLERY.

No. 290. LXX. Under the authority of the Supreme Government, and in accordance with the Bengal practice, the Honorable the Governor in Council, is pleased to establish the following system of providing for the Repairs of Batteries of Horse and Foot Artillery, to have effect from the 1st May next.

LXXI. An allowance of Rupees fifteen for each Gun, and its corresponding Ammunition Waggon, and Rupees five for each additional spare Carriage or Waggon is authorized to be drawn by the Officer in charge of the Company or Troop, from which he will supply Water, Tar, Grease, Iron, Steel, Wood, Charcoal, and such other articles as are required for repairs. This allowance however, will not be drawn for Guns stationed at the Presidency, where Batteries will be kept in repair, by the Ordnance Department as heretofore.

LXXII. It is expected that the allowance above granted will provide for every kind of ordinary repair required for Carriages, and consequently from the 1st May next, no requisition will be sanctioned on arsenals for repairs, although under peculiar circumstances, Officers will be permitted to indent for such articles as may not be otherwise procurable, the value of the Stores thus supplied being recovered from the indenting Officers by Divisional Paymasters, under existing Regulations.

LXXIII. When Officers have occasion to transfer or return into an Arsenal, for deposit or any other purpose, any of the Ordnance or Carriages for which they have been drawing

the monthly allowance, the same are to be surveyed, and any repair required (accidents arising from service excepted) made at the expense of the Officer delivering over charge.

LXXIV. The Gun contingent allowance will be drawn on monthly certificates, countersigned by the local Commanding Officers of Artillery enumerating the Carriages &c. and certifying their efficiency. The state of the wheels to be particularly noticed in the certificate.

LXXV. No allowance will be granted for Ordnance Carriages lent from Arsenals for annual practice, all repairs of such being undertaken by the local Commissary.

LXXVI. The following list shews the articles required to be repaired from the contingent allowance, but supplied or renewed at the expense of Government on indent:—

- Axes, felling, and all tools immediately attached to the ordnance.
- Boxes Ammunition } Clains of all kinds.
- Ditto Store Limber } Drag Ropes.

LXXVII. The following articles are to be kept in repair and renewed from the contingent allowance:—

LXXVIII. All planks, felloes, spokes and other articles, which may be indented for upon arsenals, in consequence of supplies not being otherwise procurable, will be issued for payment at rates fixed by the Military Board, by whom the Indents will be passed and recoveries arranged under existing regulations.

LXXIX. All damage done to carriages by an enemy, will be repaired at the expense of Government.

LXXX. Officers in charge of Batteries will immediately indent for such articles of equipment as are necessary to complete the established proportion of stores allowed to each Gun &c. all deficiencies in which, will, from the 1st May, be replaced by the Officer, drawing the contingent allowance.

LXXXI. All field ordnance carriages attached to Batteries of Horse or Foot Artillery are, from 1st May next, to be painted with two Coats of good paint, at least once annually. Painters and materials to be furnished from the nearest arsenal under the authority of the Military Board.

LXXXII. With reference to G. G. O. No. 280, of this day's date, and with the view of a further assimilation of the Regulation in force under this Presidency as regards the preservation and repair of Field Batteries with those of Bengal, the Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to sanction train Establishments of Artificers for the use of the Guns, attached to the Horse and Foot Artillery of this Army, in the following proportions, modifying so much of the scale laid down in G. G. O. 30th Sept. and 27th Decr. 1830, as is affected thereby.

LXXXIII. These Artificers will be entirely independent of Quarter Master's Establishments allowed per Battalion for repairs of Arms, &c.

LXXXIV. In the event of it being found necessary at any time to entertain temporary Establishments in excess of the above scale for a Field Battery divided on service, the Divisional or Station Commanding Officer authorizing the increase, will obtain, through His Excellency the Commander in Chief, the sanction of Government for the same.

LXXXV. It is expected that the Establishment of Artificers now sanctioned, together with the contingent allowance for materials &c. granted under this date, will be adequate to the performance of all ordinary repairs. Where two or more Batteries are stationed together, the Senior Officer of Artillery in the Division is authorized to join the Artificers of the whole, for the purpose of executing any heavy work that may be required; and it is only when the necessary repairs cannot be effected by calling into requisition the United Services of the Several establishments present, that the Carriages &c. will be surveyed and repaired on the report of the Committee, in the nearest Arsenal.
