Public Order.

To regulate the religious procession of the Mohurrum, and for the preservation of the public peace during that festival, sanctioned by the Honorable the the Governor in Council, as provided for by Rule, Ordinance, and Regulation II, A. D. 1827.

1st. Every person desirous of erecting or carrying about a *Taboot*, *Punjia*, or *Dhaleeka Punjia*, at the ensuing Mohurrum, must obtain a license from the Magistrates of Police; and a license will be granted to no persons except Mussulmans.

2nd. The licenses shall bear the signatures of the Magistrates of Police, and all persons obtaining them shall be bound to produce them when demanded by any authority having a

right so to do, and a refusal to do so shall be held to be a breach of these rules.

3rd. Each *Taboot* is to have but one set of "Fassa," one set of "Dholee," one "Kurnah" and fifteen "Hillals."

4th. Any person who may be seen carrying a Sword, Dirk, Bludgeon, or other offensive weapon, will be taken into custody.

5th. *Taboots* meeting on the public road, are to give way to one another in the same manner that carriages do, each *Taboot* keeping to the left.

6th. *Taboots* are not permitted to go abreast on the public road, but they are to follow each other in a peaceable manner.

7th. No *Taboots* are allowed to go in procession on the last night of the Mohurrum before 12 o'clock, or to continue so after 3 o'clock in the following morning. These processions are limited (on the last night and day of the Mohurrum) to the Bhendy Bazar road, Duncan road, Chinch Bunder and Market Streets; and *Taboots* are not to be taken out on the last day before 12 o'clock, and on meeting carriages, and horsemen, are strictly enjoined to cease playing country music, until they shall have passed the *Taboots*, keeping the left side of the road; and it is directed, that they be thrown into the sea, and the ceremony concluded, by 5 o'clock P. M.

8th. No procession of the Zool Junnah or Horse, through the public streets or roads, will be permitted.

9th. The inhabitants of Bombay are enjoined not to assault or insult the Moguls during the celebration of the Mohurrum.

10th. All persons licensed to sell Spirituous Liquors, and all venders of Opium and Bhang, are enjoined to keep their shops closed; and persons found selling any thing of an intoxicating nature, during the aforesaid period, will be taken into custody and punished.

11th. Any persons violating any of the above rules, or behaving in any manner likely to create a breach of the peace, or making a disturbance of

any kind, will be immediately taken into custody and dealt with according to law.

Submit a memorial from Deputy Assistant Commissary Bellew, praying for the appointment of Lieutenant on the Invalid Establishment, state that the appointment solicited is unrepresented on the Bombay establishment, but that if the boon can be conceded it will be well bestowed.

Para. 26. Upon the general question involved in this application we will quote the following para of our Military letter to the Government of Bengal, dated the 3rd of February 1841, (No. 12,) and which is equally applicable to your presidency.

Para. 9. We shall most readily extend to your presidency, the benefit of the arrangement sanctioned at Madras, by which in special instances and on the united recommendation of the Government and Commander in Chief, we have authorized the occasional grant of the Local Commission of Lieutenant on the Invalid establishment, to distinguished Warrant Officers of the Classes above the Rank of Conductor."

Para. 27. In consideration of the long and meritorious services of Deputy Assistant Commissary Bellew, and of the recommendation of your government we now authorize you to grant him the Commission of Lieutenant on the non-effective establishment from the date of your receipt of this despatch.

Agreeably to the instructions conveyed in the foregoing paras. the Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to confer on Deputy Assistant Commissary John Bellew, the Rank of Lieutenant on the non-effective establishment. Date of commission, 13th December 1842.

No. 1 of 1843.—The following Extract, Paras. 1 and 2 of a Despatch from the Honorable the Court of Directors, is published for general information.

1. We regret exceedingly to find from your Letter No. 11, dated 1st February 1842, and its enclosures, that it has been found necessary to bring Commander Nott of the Indian Navy to Trial before a Court Martial on a charge of tyranny and oppression to some Seamen under his command.

2. It is but too evident from the papers laid before you by the Superintendent of the Indian Navy that Commander Nott had on previous occasions when Commanding the "Euphrate," "Goote" and "Tigris" behaved with excessive severity to his Seamen, and the endeavours of Captain Oliver, to repress this abuse which he states to "have been for a long continuance practised in the Indian Navy to a great extent," and which must therefore produce results highly prejudicial to the discipline and efficiency of the service are only fresh instances of that Officer's anxiety for the character and welfare of the Establishment under his Superintendence. In the particular case under consideration, Commander Nott was accused of having caused three Sailors of the "Sesostris" who had been absent without leave, and had been brought back in a state of intoxication to be drummed out of the Ship, a punishment which it would seem is never inflicted in Her Majesty's Service except on incorrigible offenders or persons guilty of infamous crimes, and then only by order of a Court Martial, or other superior authority. Commander Nott did not deny that he had caused the Men to be discharged and conveyed to the Receiving Ship "Hastings" accompanied by a Drummer playing, and it is also admitted that the tune played was the "Rogue's March" though it is alleged that no orders were given to make choice of this tune. It is difficult to say therefore in what manner the punishment actually administered was to be distinguished from the one termed "drumming out" although Commander Nott declares that it was not his intention to inflict the latter, and that the placing

of the Drummer in the Boat was merely designed as a minor punishment and as a warning to the rest of the Ship's Company. Nevertheless the Court Martial* being composed principally of Military Men without any other Naval advice than that of four Lieutenants of the Indian Navy, viewed Commander Nott's conduct in the manner in which he himself represented it, and merely found him guilty of having caused the three Seamen of the "Sesostris" ordered to join the "Hastings" to be accompanied from one Ship to the other by the Drummer of the "Hastings" playing, and accordingly sentenced him to be admonished at such time and place as the Commander in Chief might be pleased to direct. The excellent remarks of Lieutenant General Sir Thomas McMahon, on this Finding and Sentence leave little for us to add. It is possible that Commander Nott may have erred merely through defect of judgment, but it is certain that he inflicted an ignominious punishment utterly disproportionate to the magnitude of the offence committed, and it cannot be doubted that such conduct would have been not only differently viewed, but far more severely punished by a tribunal better acquainted with Naval usages and the feelings of the British Seamen. We however trust that the admonition which Commander Nott has received from His Excellency the Commander in Chief who withheld his approval from the Sentence of the Court as too lenient, will have the desired effect of rendering him more circumspect in his professional conduct in future.

to be a Court of Enquiry into the conduct of Major Pottinger, subsequently to the death of Sir William Macnaghten, until he became a prisoner to the Affghans.

The Court to have the power of sending for persons, papers and records, and to appoint its own Secretary, and any writers who may be required.

The Secretary to the Government of India will place before the Court, on its assembling, all the papers which are now in the office, apparently bearing upon the matters to be subjected to enquiry.

All evidence taken is to be recorded and reported.

The Court will communicate its opinion upon the question whether the conduct of Major Pottinger, from the death of Sir William Macnaghten, until he became a prisoner, was under then existing circumstances best calculated to secure the safety of the British army at Cabool, and to maintain the honor of the British arms.

The Court will also report their opinion upon the question, whether the bills drawn by Major Pottinger upon the British Government, within the period above mentioned, were drawn by him in the exercise of legitimate authority and of due discretion; and whether the circumstances under which, and any conditions upon which, they may have been drawn and made payable, were duly made known to the several persons to whom they were delivered or by whom they were negotiated.

The Court will assemble on the day subsequent to the date of this Order, at the tent of His Excellency the Envoy to Maharajah Shere Singh, who will act as President of the Court.

LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS.

FORT WILLIAM,
LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT,
THE 25TH NOVEMBER, 1842.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 25th November 1842.

ACT No.—OF 1842.

An Act for the appointment of Official Trustees in certain cases.

I. Whereas the property of Infants, Feme Coverts and others vested in Trustees is exposed to peculiar risks and burthens in this Country, not only from the Insolvency of Trustees, but from the frequent difficulties occasioned by their death or absence;

It is hereby enacted, that in all cases in which Funds are vested in Trustees, and there shall be no Trustee capable of acting within the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court, it shall be lawful for the Supreme Court, upon the application of any of the Trustees or parties interested to appoint the Registrar, or such other Officer of the Court as the Court may from time to time select as the Official Trustee under the provisions of this Act to be a Trustee of such Funds; and that upon such appointment such Funds shall vest in such Officer and his successors in Office; and shall be held by them upon the same Trusts as the same were held previous to such appointment.

II. And it is hereby further enacted, that such Officer shall cause such Funds to be invested in Government Securities or otherwise as the Court shall direct, and that he shall be entitled to a Commission of — per Cent. upon the amount thereof.

III. And it is hereby further enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Court upon the like application to make any orders respecting such Funds or the Interest thereof, and that all such orders shall be made on Petition unless the Court shall direct a Bill to be filed.

IV. And it is hereby further enacted, that where any Infant shall be entitled to any Legacy or Residue or share thereof, it shall be lawful for the Executor or Administrator by whom such Legacy or Residue may be payable, or any Trustee thereof, to pay the same to such Official Trustee; and that the Receipt of such Official Trustee shall be a Discharge for the same; and that the same shall be subject to the like Provisions as are contained in this Act as to other Funds vested in such Official Trustee under the Provisions thereof.

V. And it is hereby provided, that nothing in this Act contained shall prevent the Re-transfer of the said Funds to the original or any subsequently appointed Trustees, or otherwise as the Court shall direct.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 25th day of February next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time, on the 9th of December 1842.

ACT No. — OF 1842.
An Act for the Administration of Justice and Collection of the Revenue in the Districts of Kurnool and Bunganapilly.

Rules for Administration of Koory to take effect from —, I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the day of 184 , the following Rules for the Administration of Civil and Criminal Justice, and for the Collection of the Revenue shall have effect within the Districts of Kurnool and Bunganapilly.

Administration of Civil and Criminal Justice and Police and Superintendence of all Revenue affairs vested in a Special Commissioner appointed by Government of Fort St. George as Agent of the Governor.

With Assistants similarly appointed.

Assistants, as may be appointed by the Governor in Council as Agent to the Governor of Fort St. George.

Government of Fort St. George may prescribe rules for guidance of Agent and his Subordinates.

And may fix the limit of final Civil Jurisdiction and of Appeals.

And may define authority of Agent in Criminal trials, and what cases shall be submitted to Foujdaree Udalut.

Agent in Criminal trials, and what cases he shall submit to the decision of the Foujdaree Udalut.

On trials referred, Foujdaree Udalut shall pass judgment or pass order as in cases referred from a Judge of Circuit.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the receipt of any Criminal trials referred by the Agent under the Rules which may be hereafter prescribed by the Governor in Council, the Foujdaree Udalut shall proceed to pass a final judgment, or such other order as may after mature consideration, seem to the Court requisite and proper, in the same manner as if the trial had been sent up in ordinary course from a Judge of Circuit.

Civil Appeals to be decided by Suddur Udalut as appeals from Provincial Courts.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the receipt of any Appeal from a decree of the Agent, duly preferred under the rules to be prescribed as aforesaid, the Court of Suddur Udalut shall proceed to try and determine it, in the same manner as Appeals from the Provincial Courts.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the Governor in Council of Fort St. George, by an Order in Council, to make from time to time with the previous sanction of the Governor General of India in Council, such alterations in the limits of the aforesaid Districts placed under the jurisdiction of the said Agent, as he may deem expedient.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 9th day of March next.

An Act concerning the terms of Leases granted by Zemindars and Proprietors.

It is hereby enacted, in modification of Sections II. and III. Regulation XIV. of 1812, of the Bengal Code, that Zemindars or other Proprietors of Land may grant leases, or fix the rent of any land tenure, for any period not exceeding the terms of their own respective engagements with Government. Provided always, that in case any lease shall be granted, or the rent of the land be fixed for any longer period, the lease or engagement fixing the rent shall be null and void only for the excess beyond such terms respectively.

ACT No. XVII. OF 1842.

An Act relative to the number and powers of the Revenue Commissioners. under the Presidency of Bombay.

I. It is hereby enacted, that so much of Regulation V. of 1830, of the Bombay Code, as provides that one Revenue Commissioner shall be appointed for the Territory subordinate to Bombay, and that the Southern Mahratta Country shall be excluded from his jurisdiction, is repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that one or more Revenue Commissioners shall be appointed for the whole of the Territory composing the Presidency of Bombay, each of whom shall be vested with all the powers possessed by the single Revenue Commissioner, under Regulation V. 1830, and shall be empowered to act within the Presidency of Bombay, or over such portion as the Governor in Council of Bombay may, from time to time, prescribe by an Order published in the Gazette.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that each Revenue Commissioner shall have such number of Deputies and Assistants, as the Governor in Council may deem it expedient to appoint.

ACT No. — OF 1842.

An Act regarding the powers to be exercised by the Superintendent of Police, in respect of offering rewards for the apprehension of Offenders.

It is hereby enacted, in modification of Secs. 2 and 3, Reg. IX. 1808 and Secs. 16 and 17, Reg. XVI. 1810 of the Bengal Code, that applications from Magistrates for authority to offer rewards for the apprehension of Offenders in the Districts under the jurisdiction of the Superintendent of Police for the Lower Provinces, shall be made in future to such authority or Officer, as may from time to time be ordered by the Local Government. And such authority or Officer shall be governed in respect of such applications, by such directions as they may from time to time receive from the Local Government.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 23d of March next.

ACT No. XVIII. OF 1842.

An Act for facilitating preliminary investigations of Criminal Cases connected with the Collection of the Revenue within the Presidency of Bombay.

I. It is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent for the Revenue Commissioner or his Assistant within the Presidency of Bombay, to exercise the same powers as the Collector and Magistrate of any Zillah under that Presidency in all matters touching the collection and management of the Revenue, and the conduct of Revenue Officers in their official capacities; except that they shall not pass any sentence of punishment; but when the preliminary inquiries are concluded, shall, if the charge be not dismissed, forward the accused to the Magistrate for trial or for committal according to the nature of the case.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that a Revenue Commissioner or his Assistant, or a Collector of Land Revenue or his Assistant, or a Sub-Collector, may, by written order, delegate in any case, to any native servant regularly employed on their respective Establishments, not being of an inferior grade to a Karcoon, any of the above powers of preliminary investigation, provided they be the same as are exercised by District Officers of Police under the Regulations. And the proceedings under this Act of all such servants shall be sent to the delegating authority for revision, and after such revision, if the charge be not dismissed, the case shall be forwarded to the Magistrate as aforesaid.

III. And it is hereby provided, that nothing in this Act contained shall prevent any Magistrate from making preliminary enquiries and proceeding under the Regulations in all the cases aforesaid, both where the charge has not been investigated under the aforesaid powers, and where it may have been dismissed.

I beg to report to you, for the information of Major General Pollock, C. B., that the force of the 2d column, under my immediate command, and as detailed in the margin, was attacked by the predatory tribes of the mountains on its march from Tezeen, from which point it was separated from your head-quarters up to the date of its arrival at Gundamuck.

The most serious opposition which it encountered, was in the defiles of Jugdulluck, celebrated for the previous conflicts between the Ghilzies and our troops last year, and during the late advance on Cabool.

my force reached the crest of the position, and after despatching flanking detachments on the domineering height to the right and left, I waited the approach of Brigadier Monteath with the main body of the column, before I descended into the lower ground beyond. The necessity for this caution was soon demonstrated, for as the Brigadier took up his position on the plateau, partly occupied by the ruins of the well known fort, he observed the enemy collecting in force around him, he therefore, very properly determined to hold the head of the pass, until the whole of the baggage and material had moved down towards the plain below, and the rear guard under Lieut. Colonel Richmond should have joined him on the eminence. He placed his guns in battery, and their fire and that of the troops completely held the enemy, who were very numerous, in check, and he reports with much satisfaction, that though the attempts of the Ghilzies were obstinate and persevering, they did not succeed in making themselves masters of a single article of baggage or military store; a sharp conflict was, however, sustained upon particular points, whilst the rear guard was coming up in the one direction, and our long train of animals descending in the other. The Brigadier finally gave over charge of the position to Lieutenant Colonel Richmond, and his rear guard whom he counselled to retain it one quarter of an hour after his own troops advanced beyond it; the succession of lower eminences on either flank, had, in the mean time been crowned, so far as our limited means permitted, under my personal directions, by parties from the advance guard from Jugdulluck to the valley of Soorkhab, and the baggage was thus protected from the attacks of the predatory bodies which were hovering around it, along that whole line of road: Lieutenant Colonel Richmond and the rear guard were vigorously pressed by the Ghilzies, as they finally came down from the plateau, but every where most creditably repelled the enemy, and made their way, late in the evening, to our encampment at Soorkhab; I have to regret that Captain Burnett, 54th N. I., who had been recently relieved from a captivity commenced at Ghuznee, was severely wounded on the heights, having volunteered his services with a party of the 16th N. I.; Brevet Captain Pender, H. M.'s 31st foot, had received a bad hurt in a previous skirmish near Seh Baba. Throughout these affairs the conduct of the troops employed, including the 2d and 16th N. I., temporarily attached to me, has deserved my highest approbation, and I feel it to be my duty to record that in the advance to Cabool, and in retiring from it, the bravery of that portion of the 4th brigade which took part in the active operations, viz. H. M.'s 31st regiment, and a wing of the 33d N. I., the remaining wing and the 6th N. I., having been detained to garrison Jellalabad and Gundamuck; as well as their endurance of privations and fatigue have been beyond all praise. No troops could in every respect have behaved better, and I feel myself to be deeply indebted to Brigadier Monteath, C. B., and to Lieutenant Colonel Bolton, of H. M.'s 31st, and to Lieutenant Colonel Richmond, 33d N. I., for the able and gallant manner in which they have been led. I enclose a return of killed and wounded.
