FOR THE SUPPLY OF CLOTHING TO NIZAM'S ARMY.

1. The Resident at Hyderabad (on the part of the Nizam's Government) will, until the 31st July 1843, receive tenders for the supply of clothing to the Nizam's Regular Army.

2. The following is to be complete with Pads, Shoulder-straps, Cotton-wings for the Grenadier and Light Companies, Buttons with the number of the Regiments, and to be made up in every respect as worn in the Company's Army and according to a muster Jacket to be forwarded.

9. One third, when the clothing is half furnished, and the other third when it is delivered, surveyed, and approved of at the several stations.

# GENERAL ORDERS.

BY THE HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

## MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 6th JULY 1843.

No. 409 of 1843.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to direct, that the Passage Money of the Officers and their Families proceeding in the Government Steam Vessels between Bombay and Scinde, be paid and recovered under the following rules, which are to take effect from the 1st of August next.

1. The Commander will maintain a suitable table for his passengers and will receive from Government for each passenger, Lady or Gentleman, the sum of Rupees 48, and for each Child above one and under ten years of age, Rupees 24. Children under one year will be taken free.

2. The Commander's abstracts of passage money due to him, on the above account, will be payable at the Presidency Pay Office only; the abstract for the outward voyage may be paid in advance or in arrears, at the Commander's option; for the inward voyage in arrears only; and the latter abstract must be preferred within two days of the arrival of the vessel in Bombay, or the Commander will be himself responsible for any loss that may in consequence follow.

3. The Commander can claim the fare above authorized, for such passengers only as appear on the Quarter Master General's list at the Presidency, or are admitted on board by order of the Commanding Officer through the Senior Naval Officer on the station at Kurrachee or on the Coast of Scinde. The lists and orders, or certified copies, are to be attached to the abstracts of Passage Money, and no claim will be admitted without such voucher.

4. For the guidance of the Pay-master in making the requisite recoveries, the fare is to be regarded as divided into two parts, viz.

Messing Allowance two-thirds, or Rupees .....	32
Wine Allowance one-third, or Rupees .....	16

Total Rupees.. 48

5. When Officers are entitled, under the existing Regulations of the service to a free passage, they will be liable to the charge for Wine allowance, or 16 Rupees only; in all other cases the full fare of 48 Rupees must be made good. Ladies and Children will be charged always with the full fare of 48 and 24 Rupees respectively.

6. For the outward voyage all payments on account of passage money must be made to the Pay-Master in advance. The Quarter Master General will require the production of a certificate from the Paymaster, that the authorized charge has been paid before he admits any name upon his list. When the list is made up, the Quarter Master General will transmit it to the Superintendent of the Indian Navy, and upon this List the Commander's abstract will be discharged.

7. For the inward voyage payments must necessarily be made in arrear. The Government confidently expects that all Officers will be careful to liquidate without loss of time whatever may be due from them, and the Paymaster will report to Government the names of all Officers who have failed to do so within a reasonable time, when measures will be taken to ensure the recovery, and at the same time to mark the displeasure of the Government.

8. The Paymaster is authorized to deduct whatever may be due on account of passage money from any Officer's abstracts; he is expected to use every possible exertion to recover such debts on account of the Government, but he will not be held personally responsible, as in the case of his ordinary disbursements.

9. The fare to Mandavee in Cutch or to Porebunder on the Coast of Katiwar, is fixed at 30 Rupees, 10 Rupees being the Wine, and 20 Rupees the messing allowance.

No. 410 of 1843.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council, with the concurrence of the Government of India, is pleased to notify, that the subordinate Branch of the Department of Public Works, will, from the 1st Proximo, consist of five Classes of the following strength and rates of Pay.

No Soldier from the Corps of Sappers and Miners will hereafter be admitted to this branch of the Service, who shall not be found to possess a sufficient knowledge of English writing and accounts, to enable him to keep and prepare the various Books and Returns required by the existing Regulations, and such a knowledge of Plan drawing as to enable him to frame an estimate and lay down a building from a Plan, together with such a knowledge of the native language as to qualify him to converse in it.

Appointments to the Department will be made by the Military Board under the sanction of the Governor in Council, to the extent of the Establishment authorized, such appointments will depend on reports of the qualifications of individuals recommended by the Officer Commanding the Sappers and Miners as ascertained on examination by an Engineer Officer nominated to that duty, by the Provincial Superintendent. The report to be signed by the Examining Officers, and countersigned by the Superintending Engineer.

Promotions from the lower to the upper grades, will be made on vacancies by Government, on the recommendation of the Military Board, framed on the reports of Superintending Engineers, and with reference to length of service and merit.

Any Overseer, Assistant Overseer, or Sub-Assistant Overseer, found to be ineligible for promotion to the upper grades, will be deemed unqualified for the Department and his services disposed of accordingly.

The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to order the following promotions and appointments in the Department, to have effect from the 1st Proximo.

Serjeant John Dwyer, to be Sub-Conductor, vice Munro remanded to his Corps.

Serjeant P. Donohoe to be Overseer, vice Dwyer.

4. For the guidance of the Paymaster in making the requisite recoveries, the fare is to be regarded as divided into two parts, viz.

# LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS.

FORT WILLIAM, HOME DEPARTMENT.

LEGISLATIVE,

THE 14TH JUNE, 1843.

The following Act is passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council on the 14th June 1843, with the assent of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India, which has been read and recorded.

Ordered, that the Act be promulgated for general information.

ACT No. IX. OF 1843.

*For the Incorporation of a Bank at Madras.*

Whereas the Hon'ble Court of Directors of the East India Company, by and with the approbation of the Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of India, has directed the abolition of the present Government Bank at Madras, and in lieu thereof has sanctioned the establishment of a Bank at Madras on the principles hereinafter set forth, and has required the Government of India to pass an Act of Incorporation for the same;

I. It is therefore hereby enacted, that from the 1st day of July next ensuing, in the year of our Lord 1843, the persons whose names are included in the Schedule hereunto annexed, having severally subscribed and signed their acceptance of the terms of incorporation specified in this Act, and with the Government of Madras on the part of the East India Company having paid into the Government Treasury the amount of Capital Stock subscribed by them respectively and taken receipts for the same from the Sub-Treasurer to the Government of Fort Saint George shall, together with the Governor in Council for the time being of the Presidency of Madras, be a Corporation Body Corporate and Politic by name of the Bank of Madras, with perpetual succession to them and their successors as Proprietors for the time being of the said Bank as hereinafter mentioned and provided, and shall possess and enjoy all the rights, privileges, and immunities incident by law to a corporation aggregate.

Provided however that it shall be lawful to the Governor General of India in Council at any time before the 1st of September next, to rectify any errors in the Schedule of the said Proprietors by notice in the Official Gazettes of Calcutta and Madras, so that no alteration be made in the principles upon which such Schedule has been framed.

II. And it is hereby declared and provided, that if any of the persons whose names are in the said Schedule shall have failed to make good their subscriptions on or before the 1st day of May last past, the Shares to which such names are attached were claimable and might be taken by the persons who having made applications for Shares which were received after the prescribed amount of Capital had been taken and subscribed for by the parties in the said Schedule, had been permitted to have their said applications registered as received: and the Shares which shall have so lapsed having been tendered to such applicants in the order of such registry according to the list given in to the Governor in Council at Fort Saint George, shall be and are the property of such persons provided they shall have in the manner heretofore mentioned paid up their subscriptions on or before the 20th day of May last past. And in the event of there having remained any unpaid Shares after the parties whose names had been so registered had thus had the option of completing the payments due on such Shares, then such remaining unpaid Shares are declared to have been at the disposal of a General Meeting of the Proprietors convened for that purpose: And it is hereby enacted, that the persons, who shall have become the Proprietors of the lapsed Shares in the manner above provided or under an appropriation made at such General Meeting of Proprietors by payment of the amount subscribed shall be considered to belong, and shall to all intents and purposes belong to the Corporation Body Corporate and Politic by name of the Bank of Madras, and shall possess and enjoy all the rights, privileges and immunities the same as the persons according to the Original Schedule who shall have paid up their subscriptions on or before the 1st day of May last past. And it is hereby declared and required that as soon after the promulgation of this Act, as may be practicable, the Governor in Council at Fort Saint George shall publish in the Official Gazette of that Presidency a Schedule of the Proprietors of the Bank of Madras as incorporated under the provisions of this Act, and that the same shall be transmitted to be republished in the Official Gazette of Calcutta.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that the Capital Stock of the Bank of Madras shall be Thirty Lakhs of Rupees, whereof Three Lakhs shall be the property of the Governor in Council of Madras, for the time being on behalf of the East India Company, and the persons whose names are in the Schedule hereunto annexed, or in any Schedule corrected in the manner provided for in the 1st Section of this Act, or whose names shall be in the Schedule published by order of the Governor in Council at Fort St. George in the Official Gazette of that Presidency as required in Section II. of this Act, shall be Proprietors of the Shares of the said Capital Stock set against their names respectively.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be in the power of the Governor General of India in Council, from time to time, by an Order duly published in the Official Gazettes of Calcutta and of Madras, to authorize the said Capital Stock to be increased, and to make such order and direction for the opening of Subscriptions towards such increase of Capital as to him may seem fit, giving due notice thereof to the Proprietors of the said Bank for the time being, and allowing to them a period of not less than twelve months to fill up such Subscription themselves, and likewise to prescribe in what manner and form the Proprietors shall subscribe and pay into the said Bank the proportion of New Stock to which they may respectively be entitled, and also to make such order and direction as to him the said Governor General in Council may seem fit for the disposal of the amount of New Stock that may not be subscribed for, and paid up by the Proprietors in the manner and form that may be so prescribed.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that the Capital Stock of the Bank of Madras shall be divided into Shares of One Thousand Rupees each, which shall be numbered accordingly, and Three Hundred of the said Shares numbered from No. 1 to 300 shall be the property of the Governor in Council of Madras, for the time being, on behalf of the East India Company, and the remainder shall be the property of the Proprietors who shall have paid up the same, and no separate interest or Share in the Stock of the said Bank of less amount than 1,000 Rupees shall be created or held by any Proprietors, and if at any time the Capital of the said Bank shall be increased, the new Stock added thereto shall in like manner be divided into Shares of 1,000 Rupees each, and no Proprietor shall be entitled to claim a share of such new Stock of less amount than 1,000 Rupees.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that on the said 1st day of July 1843, or on some early day after that date, provided the Subscriptions have been paid up as above prescribed, the Governor in Council of Madras shall notify in the Official Gazette of that Presidency that the Bank of Madras being incorporated as above provided, shall from the date of such notification be opened for the transaction of all manner of business authorized by this Act, and the said Bank shall and may sue and be sued by its Corporate name, and shall and may use such common Seal as the Directors of the said Bank shall from time to time appoint, and shall be competent to acquire and hold either absolutely or conditionally, for a term or in perpetuity, any description of property whatever, and to transfer and convey the same.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that immediately on the opening of the said Bank of Madras the business of the present Government Bank of Madras shall cease, and it shall proceed to wind up its affairs as soon as possible, and all Cash Notes of the Government Bank of Madras which shall be then outstanding shall be payable thenceforth at the Bank of Madras which shall pay them on being verified by such Officers as the Governor in Council of Fort St. George may appoint for the purpose, on presentment, as if they had been issued by the Bank of Madras.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that on Monday of every week, so long as there are any Notes of the Government Bank outstanding, the Bank of Madras shall cause to be made up a Statement of the Notes of the Government Bank paid by them in the course of the preceding week, and transmit the same to the Governor in Council of Madras with the Notes, who shall thereupon cause the amount, with all reasonable expedition, to be repaid to the Bank of Madras.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that after the delivery by the Sub-Treasurer at Madras, to whom all Subscriptions on account of the Capital of this Bank will have been paid, as above provided, of the amount of Capital Stock to the Directors of the Bank, the receipt which may be granted by the Sub-Treasurer to the Subscribers respectively shall be cancelled, and a Certificate signed by three Directors of the Bank of Madras shall be delivered to each Proprietor, and any person who is a proprietor of more than one Share of the Capital Stock, may at his option demand a Certificate for each of his Shares, or one Certificate for all his Shares, or several Certificates, each of which may be for any number of his Shares.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that no Proprietor shall be allowed to increase his share in the Capital Stock of the said Bank beyond the Amount of Fifty Thousand Rupees, excepting on occasion of any increase being made to the Capital Stock of the said Bank under the Authority of the Governor General in Council, in the manner prescribed in Section IV. of this Act, in which case any Proprietor holding Stock to the full Amount of Fifty Thousand Rupees shall, notwithstanding, be entitled to subscribe to the increased Capital Stock in a rateable proportion; and excepting any addition to his interest in the said Capital Stock arises from Succession, Bequest, or Marriage.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Share or Shares of the Capital Stock of the said Bank shall be of the nature of personal Estate of the Proprietors thereof respectively, and that the same shall be transferable by endorsement to be made on the Certificates thereof, respectively under the hand of the Proprietor or Proprietors, or his or their Attorney duly authorized, which endorsement shall specify the name of the person or persons to whom the said transfer shall be made, but no such endorsement shall be effectual to transfer any such Share or Shares, until such endorsement shall have been registered at the Bank of Madras, and such registration shall have been noted on such endorsement under the hand of an Officer appointed for that purpose, by the Directors of the said Bank.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Corporate body of the Bank of Madras shall consist and be composed of the Registered Proprietors for the time being of the said Shares of the Capital Stock of the said Bank, and of no other person or persons whatsoever.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that the business of the said Bank shall be managed by nine Directors, of whom three shall be appointed and be removable by the Governor in Council of Madras, and the remaining six shall be elected by the General Meeting of the Proprietors of the said Bank, and shall be removable by vote of the majority of a General Meeting of the said Proprietors.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that the first Directors of the said Bank shall be such three persons as may be appointed by the Governor in Council of Madras to be Directors of the Bank, together with six persons of those whose names are inserted in the Schedule of Proprietors published in the Official Gazette of Fort St. George, in the manner prescribed by Section II. of this Act, and who being entitled to not less than six shares or 6,000 Rupees of the Capital Stock of the said Bank shall be elected at a General Meeting of the persons whose names are inserted in the said Schedule to be held at such time and place as the Governor in Council of Madras may fix by public notification in the Official Gazette of that Presidency, and the election shall be made by the persons who according to the said Schedule of Proprietors may be entitled to Shares of the Capital Stock of the Bank, and the said persons shall vote at such election in person or by proxy according to the quantity of Stock respectively held by them, and the Directors so appointed shall appoint Officers, and take all necessary steps for opening the Bank when this Act shall take effect for its incorporation, and the rotation amongst the six Directors first appointed under the next preceding Section, shall be established according to the number of votes the two Directors elected by the fewest votes first vacating and the next two in the year following, and so in succession in the third year.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that two of the six Directors elected as provided in Section XIV, and to be elected by the Proprietors, shall in rotation go out of Office on the Second Monday in the Month of December in every year, on which day in every year a General Meeting of Proprietors shall be held for the election of two Directors in their stead; but no Director going out by rotation as aforesaid shall be re-elected at the election which takes place thereupon though he shall be eligible for a future election.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that in case of the death, resignation or absence from Madras for more than three months, or disqualification under Section XVII., or removal as aforesaid of any Director elected as provided in Section XIV., or to be elected by the Proprietors after the incorporation of the Bank of Madras, the Directors shall call a General Meeting of the Proprietors, to be held within fifteen days of the day of notice, for the purpose of choosing a successor, and such successor shall come into the place in rotation above mentioned of the late Director.

XVII. And it is hereby enacted, that no person shall be capable of serving as a Director by election of the Proprietors who shall not be Proprietor in his own right unincumbered of six Shares or Six Thousand Rupees of the Capital Stock of the Bank of Madras, or who shall be a Director of any other Bank issuing notes payable on demand within the Town or Suburbs of Madras.

XVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that at a General Meeting of the Proprietors, every election and other matter in question shall be decided by a majority of votes, and that no person shall be allowed to vote at any such Meeting in respect of any Share of the said Capital Stock acquired by transfer, or purchase, or otherwise than by Act of Law, unless such transfer shall have been completed Six Months at the least before the time of tendering such vote.

XIX. And it is hereby enacted, that at all such General Meetings the Proprietors shall vote according to the following scale:

and no Proprietor shall be entitled to more than four votes.		

XX. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council of Madras to give a proxy in writing, signed by one of the Secretaries to Government, to any person whom the Governor of Madras may appoint to attend any General Meeting of the Proprietors, and that the holder of such proxy shall be entitled to give four votes upon all matters or questions that may be submitted to such Meeting, except upon the election or removal of such Directors as are elected by the said Proprietors.

XXI. And it is hereby enacted, that any Proprietor or Proprietors entitled to vote at any General Meeting may give a proxy in writing, either General or Special, under his, her or their hand, or the hand of his, her, or their Attorney

( )  
duly authorized to any other Proprietor, and that such proxy shall be produced at the time of voting, and that such proxy shall entitle the person to whom it is given, to vote, on such matter or matters, as shall be authorized by the tenor of such proxy.

XXII. And it is hereby enacted that at the first Meeting of the Directors, after their election, in every year, they shall choose a President from among themselves, and if the office of President shall become vacant they shall at their next Meeting choose a successor for the remainder of the Current year, and that during any vacancy, or in the absence of the President, the Senior Director shall be Vice President for the time being, and that such President, or Vice President shall have the casting vote in all cases of an equal division of votes at Meetings either of Directors or Proprietors.

XXIII. And it is hereby enacted, that the presence of at least three Directors shall be necessary to form a Board for the transaction of business, and the said Directors shall establish a weekly rotation among themselves, so that not less than three Directors may attend every Meeting of Directors, provided always that nothing herein contained shall be held to preclude any Director from attending any Meeting of Directors.

XXIV. And it is hereby enacted, that all Accounts of the said Bank, and all instruments not under Seal whereby the said Bank can in any manner be bound, except the Cash Notes of the said Bank shall be signed by three Directors, and shall be of no validity unless so signed, and that the Seal of the said Bank shall not be affixed to any instrument except in the presence of three Directors who shall sign their names on the instrument in token of their presence, and that such signing shall independent of the signing of any person who may sign the instrument as a witness, and that unless so signed by three Directors, such instrument shall be of no validity.

XXV. And it is hereby enacted, that the said directors shall have power to appoint such Officers as may be necessary to conduct the business of the said Bank and to remove any Officer of the said Bank and to fix the Salaries of such Officers, provided that the whole expense of the Establishment of the said Bank shall not, in any one year exceed 50,000 Rupees, without previous authority from the General Meeting of the Proprietors.

XXVI. And it is hereby enacted, that no person who shall hold the Office of Secretary, Treasurer, Head Accountant, or Head Shroff of the Bank of Madras, shall engage in any other Commercial business, either on his own account, or as Agent for any other person or persons, or act as a Broker for the sale or purchase of Government Securities, and that every person appointed to any one or more of the said Offices shall give security to the Directors for the faithful discharge of his duty in the sum of 50,000 Rupees.

XXVII. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Bank of Madras shall not be engaged in any kind of business, except the kinds of business hereafter specified, that is to say—

- 1st. The discounting of Negotiable Securities.
- 2d. The keeping of Cash Accounts, including the realization of Dividends and Interest on Government Securities to the Credit of Constituents of the Bank.
- 3d. Buying and Selling of Bills of Exchange payable in India.
- 4th. The lending of Money on short Loans.
- 5th. The Buying and Selling of Bullions.
- 6th. The receiving of Deposits.
- 7th. The issuing and circulating of Cash Notes and Bank Post Bills.
- 8th. The selling of Property or Securities deposited in the Bank as Security for Loans and not redeemed, or of Property or Securities recovered by the Bank in satisfaction of Debts and Claims.

XXVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that the Directors of the said Bank shall discount no Negotiable Security and make no Loan, unless the amount of Cash in possession of the said Bank and immediately available, shall be equal to at least one-fourth of all the claims against the said Bank outstanding for the time being and payable on demand.

XXIX. And it is hereby enacted, that the Directors of the said Bank of Madras shall not discount any Negotiable Securities which shall have a longer period to run than three months, or lend any money for a longer period than three months, and that they shall make no loan or advance on any Bank Share or Certificate of Shares, nor on Mortgage, or in any other manner on the Security of any Lands, Houses or immovable Property, nor on any Negotiable Security of any Individual or Partnership Firm, which shall not carry on it the several responsibilities of at least two persons or Firms unconnected with each other in general Partnership, nor be in advance at one and the same time, to any Individual or Partnership Firm, either by way of discount, loan, or in any other manner (saying by loans upon the deposit of Government Securities, or Goods not perishable as hereinafter mentioned) beyond the Amount of Three Lakhs of Company's Rupees—Provided always that the advances upon Bills of Exchange accepted by the Government or upon other Government Obligations, shall not be considered as an advance within the meaning of this restriction.

XXX. And it is hereby enacted, that the Directors of the said Bank shall make no loan other than such loans as are described in the clause next preceding except on deposit of Public Securities in the full amount of the loan, and which Public Securities shall be so endorsed or otherwise transferred as to put them at the absolute disposal of the said Bank of Madras, or on deposit of Goods not of a perishable nature, and of an estimated value exceeding the amount of the loan by at least one-fourth.

XXXI. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Bank shall not be at any time in advance to the Government more than Seven Lakhs and a Half of Company's Rupees, provided always that the holding of Government Securities, or of Bills of Exchange drawn upon the Government or of other Government Acceptances or Obligations derived to the said Bank from Individuals and not overdue, or subscribed and paid for by the Bank, shall not be construed as being in advance to the Government within the meaning of this Clause.

XXXII. And it is hereby enacted, that the Directors of the said Bank of Madras shall not suffer any person or persons or body corporate keeping cash with the said Bank of Madras to overdraw his, her, or their account.

XXXIII. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Bank of Madras may issue Promissory Notes payable either on demand, or at a date not exceeding thirty days after sight, which Notes shall and may be signed on behalf of the said Bank by such person as the Directors of the said Bank may appoint or authorize in that behalf, provided always that the total amount of such Notes in circulation at any one time shall not exceed One Crore of Rupees, and provided also that no such Note shall be for a smaller amount than Ten Rupees.

XXXIV. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall not be lawful for the said Bank to make issue, or negotiate any Note, Bill, or other instrument containing any promise, undertaking or order for the payment of Money elsewhere than within the limits of India.

XXXV. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Directors of the said Bank of Madras to receive in deposit Goods not of a perishable kind, and to contract for the safe keeping of the same.

XXXVI. And it is hereby enacted, that the Directors of the said Bank shall cause the Books of the said Bank to be balanced on the 30th day of June and the 31st of December in every year, and that a Statement of the Balance

on every such day signed by a majority of the said Directors, shall be forthwith transmitted to one of the Secretaries to the Governor in Council of Madras, and that the Governor in Council of Madras shall at all times be entitled to require of the said Directors any information touching the affairs of the said Bank, and the production of any documents of the said Bank, and that the said Directors shall comply with every such requisition.

XXXVII. And it is hereby enacted, that an account of the profits of the said Bank shall be taken half yearly on the 1st day of January and the 1st day of July in every year, and that a Dividend thereof shall be made so soon thereafter as conveniently may be, and that the amount of such Dividend shall be determined by the Directors of the said Bank on the ground of the actual profits made by the said Bank during the Six Calendar Months preceding the day up to which such Half Yearly Account shall be taken; provided that such reasonable expenses as have been incurred in procuring this Act of Incorporation, shall, upon being audited and admitted by the said Directors be paid out of the Funds of the Bank as soon as it is opened for business, and that the amount so paid shall be defrayed out of the future profits of the Bank at the discretion of the Directors, and provided that the said Directors, subject to the control and sanction of the Proprietors at the General Meetings, shall have power, when they see fit, to set apart from such profits, a sum not exceeding Five per Cent. on the Capital Stock of the Bank as a reserve against Contingencies.

XXXVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that on the first Monday of the Month of March in every year a General Meeting of the Proprietors of the Capital Stock of the said Bank shall be held, at which the Directors of the said Bank shall submit to the said Proprietors a Statement of the affairs of the said Bank made up to the preceding 31st of December, and such General Meeting shall be competent to pass resolutions, and frame rules and directions relative to the affairs and conduct of the said Bank which shall be binding on the Directors and Officers of the Bank and on the Proprietors thereof until rescinded or modified respectively by any subsequent General Meeting.

XXXIX. And it is hereby enacted, that any three of the said Directors of the said Bank, or any ten Proprietors of the Capital Stock of the said Bank may at any time convene a General Meeting of the Proprietors, upon giving fifteen days previous notice of such Meeting, and of the purpose or purposes for which the same shall be convened, as well to the Directors of the said Bank for the time being as also by public Advertisement in the Official Gazette of Madras. And any General Meeting so convened shall have the same powers and authorities as prescribed in the preceding Section of this Act for the Annual General Meeting to be held in the month of March.

XL. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Bank of Madras, with the sanction of the Governor in Council of Madras, and with the approbation of the Court of Directors of the East India Company, to establish Branch Banks at such places, and under such rules and restrictions as shall be determined by the Proprietors at their General Meetings. Provided however that such Branch Banks when so established, besides being subject to the rules and restrictions that may be imposed by the Proprietors, and to the control and orders of the Directors of the Bank of Madras, shall be bound by the same rules as to the description of business in which they are to engage, and the manner of conducting such business, and likewise in respect to the issue of Notes payable on demand, and the retention of Cash to meet the same, and in all transactions and matters herein above referred to, as are prescribed for the Bank of Madras by this Act.

XLI. And it is further enacted, that if any of the Proprietors shall become indebted to the said Bank, it shall be lawful for the said Bank to withhold payment of the Dividends on the Share or Shares of such Proprietor registered as his, or her own property, and not as held in trust, or as Executor or Administrator, until payment of such debt, and to apply such Dividends towards payment thereof, and that after demand and default of payment and notice in that behalf given, either to such Proprietor, or his or her Constituted Agent, or by public Advertisement in the Official Gazette, it shall be lawful for the said Bank to refuse registration of the transfer of any such Share or Shares of such Proprietor until payment of such debt, and if the same shall remain unpaid for the space of Six Months after such notice, to advertise for public sale and to sell such Share or Shares, or so many as may be necessary, and to apply the proceeds there of towards payment of such debt, with interest at the rate of Six per Cent. per Annum, paying over the surplus if any to such Proprietor, or his, or her lawful representative.

XLII. And it is further enacted, that the said Bank shall continue as hereby constituted until the 1st day of July which will be in the year of our Lord 1850, and shall thereafter continue in like manner until duly dissolved or modified; provided however that after the said 1st day of July 1850, the said Bank shall not, except upon the application or by the consent of the Proprietors of the said Bank be dissolved, or any wise modified without previous notice of twelve months at the least being given by the Governor General of India in Council, or by the Government of the Presidency of Fort Saint George to the Directors of the said Bank for the time being of such intended dissolution or modification. Provided also, that in the event of the said Bank at any time suspending any Cash Payments, the benefits granted to the said Bank by the present Act of Incorporation shall be thenceforth forfeited.

Extract from a letter from His Excellency Major General Sir C. J. Napier, K. C. B., Governor of Scind, dated Hyderabad, 30th May 1843.

"As Shere Mahomed found that he could not recruit his troops in Scind, he resolved to draw reinforcements from the mountains of Beloochistan; I therefore sent Lieutenant Anderson of the 1st European Regiment, with a Steamer and 100 men, to destroy the boats collected on the right bank for the Belooches of Sukkur to cross over to Sind. This Officer has performed his duty in a brilliant manner; and he speaks highly of the way in which Master Miller of the Steamer manœuvred his vessel. The rumour of this skirmish in Beloochistan will have good effect in Scind."

SIR,

Above the Luckie Pass, 27th May, 1843.

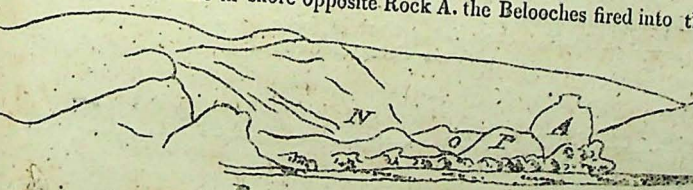
I had the honor to inform His Ex: Sir C. Napier, K. C. B. Governor of Scind, this morning, that I had expectations of finding some 500 Belooches of Meer Sha Mahomed assembled below the Luckie pass, to give us fight on our arrival there.

When we came in shore opposite Rock A. the Belooches fired into the Steamer, and to judge from their fire, they must have been 300 or 350 strong. The Steamer immediately returned their fire doing some execution. We then ran down to B, and landed the Sepoys of the 25th Regiment strength as per margin who chased the enemy out of their position N. O. P. A, and drove them up the steeps beyond. It being useless to pursue them any further, the Sepoys returned leisurely on board, after having killed and wounded about 10 of them. During the skirmish the steamer kept up a splendid fire of grape and round shot, at the retreating Belooches, killing and wounding it is supposed 40 men.

- 2 Soobedar,
- 5 Havildars,
- 5 Jemedars,
- 21 Sepoys.

Mr. Lowry received a slight wound leading on his men, and 2 Sepoys were killed and 7 wounded carrying the heights.

On board the steamer Captain Miller received the slight wound, and two European sailors and 1 Stoker were severely wounded.



I must beg to express my thanks to all parties for their activity during the affair, which lasted together 3 hours, from 1 to 4 P. M. of this day.

Camp Sha-Dad-Poor.

Dated Camp Shad-Dad-Poor, 14th June 1843.

SIR,

I have the honor to report, that I yesterday morning arrived at this place with the Force under my command. During the day, I received information that Meer Sheer Mahomed had marched from Hala, to a Fort by name Oocleyra, some 16 or 17 miles South East from that place, I have not as yet been able to communicate with Colonel Roberts, but concluded, that this movement of the Ameers to the Southward was caused by the approach of the Force under the Colonel from the North, and that in endeavouring to escape from it, he would inevitably fall into the hands of the Troops, advancing from Hyderabad.—Wheretore, believing this place to be an excellent position, for enabling me to intercept the Meer, should he attempt to escape to the Eastward, I determined to halt here.

At about eleven o'clock last night, a Brahmin Servant of Sheer Mahomed, came to my Camp, and informed me, that the Meer was coming to attack me, with his whole Force, amounting, he said, to 8,000 or 10,000 Men.

At about 3 o'clock this morning my Pickets perceived the Enemy coming on in considerable Force, and after sending several parties to reconnoitre, finding that the Enemy advanced very slowly, I left a Troop and Company to protect my Camp, and went out with the rest of the Force, under my command to attack him; as I advanced, the Beloochees formed on the Bank of a Nullah, in considerable strength, both Horse and Foot, with 3 Guns, which immediately opened on us. The ground in front was of the most difficult nature, being rugged in the extreme, and intersected with deep ravines; as soon as I had formed my line & our Guns commenced firing with some effect, I perceived the Beloochees moving off, & on my advancing with the Scinde Horse, they broke, dispersed, & fled in every direction, leaving their Guns and several Standards in our hands; from the nature of the Country, covered as it is with Jungle, and sand hillocks, and intersected with canals full of water, effective pursuit was impossible. Five or Six of the Beloochees were killed by our Artillery fire, and two Horses of the Scinde Irregular Horse by that of the Enemy.

We have taken Five Prisoners, from whom, as well as from the Brahmin above mentioned, I learn that Meer Sheer Mahomed has fled with ten Horsemen back to the River, and I therefore (I am happy to say) have succeeded in preventing his flight to the Desert, although unsuccessful in the attempt to capture his person.

The undermentioned Sirdars were present with Sheer Mahomed's Army.

The number of Beloochees actually present, was about 4,000. The remainder of Sheer Mahomed's Army and one Gun were left at Andeyrah, or deserted him in the road.

The Meer had but four Guns in all.

The three taken are of Brass and well equipped. The conduct of all Officers and Men under my Command has been most steady and excellent throughout, but in an action such as that of this morning, there is no room for the display of much Military prowess.

My intention is to remain at this place until I can communicate with Colonel Roberts, or until I shall receive other orders from yourself. I have good information that Sheer Mahomed's Family &c. are at a Fort called Kunnene in the middle of the Hills, about 12 Miles from Schwan, and that the Meer will certainly attempt to cross the River to join them, and not fly to the Desert without them.

I have the honor to inform you, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, that I marched at 12 o'clock A. M. this morning, with the details as per margin, to attack Meer Shah Mahomed, who was encamped at "Peer Arres" a place under the Hills about 14 Miles to the Westward, with 2000 men.

2d. At day light, we were still at a distance of between two & three Miles, and on approaching near his position which was a large oblong enclosure of fine Trees, surrounded by a thick and almost impenetrable Hedge, I could perceive the Enemy were retreating, and at this time I requested Captain Walter to lead his Troop to the left, and if possible prevent their doing so, and turn them across our right.

3d. I have the honor to enclose Captain Walter's account of his proceedings.

4th. At the same time the Detachment advanced steadily on the right, and Major Blood's Battery and the Right Wing of the 15th Regiment Native Infantry, under Major Benbow, covered by the Light Company of the 20th

Regiment Native Infantry, under Captain Baynes, and the whole supported by the Grenadier Company 20th Regiment Native Infantry, under Captain Keily, two Companies of the 6th Regiment Native Infantry, under Lieutenant Johnstone advanced in Echelon on the centre, and right of the Enemy's position, on gaining which, we halted, and the others (the Light Company) advanced a considerable distance.

5th. A party of the Grenadier Company 20th Regiment Native Infantry, were ordered to scour the enclosure, and here, I am happy to say, they discovered Meer Shah Mahomed under some very thick Bushes. He at first refused to surrender, but he eventually did so, to Captain Fraser, 23d Regiment Bombay Light Infantry. I beg to enclose a letter from Captain Keily, on this subject.

6th. The result of the Expedition has been the capture of Meer Shah Mahomed, his Guns, and Standard, and the total dispersion of his Force, together with the release of some Horsemen of His Highness Meer Ali Moorad, taken Prisoners by the Enemy, on the 6th instant.

7th. The loss of the Enemy was great, about ninety (90) dead on the Field, and we have (17) seventeen Prisoners; our own loss, as you will observe by the return, has been trifling.

8th. I beg to bring to the notice of His Excellency, the valuable services rendered me by Major Benbow, 15th Regiment Native Infantry, Major Blood, Artillery, Captain Keily, 20th Regiment Native Infantry, and Lieutenant Johnstone of the 6th Regiment Native Infantry, and I cannot sufficiently express my admiration of the gallant conduct of Captain Walter, who charged with his small, but intrepid band into the midst of a large body of the Enemy.

9th. I have also to bring to the notice of His Excellency, the great assistance rendered me by Captain Mayor, Major of Brigade, Captain Baynes, Assistant Quarter Master General, who also took command of the advance, consisting of the Light Company 20th Regiment Native Infantry, and of Captain Fraser's 23d Regiment Light Infantry, Assistant Commissary General, who kindly volunteered his services on my Staff.

10th. I must not forget to mention the important services I have received from a Patan by name Aliff Khan, well known to many Officers, at the Sukkur Agency. His information principally led to the success we have met with, and when with Captain Walter; he killed four of the Enemy.

11th. I regret extremely to have to inform you, that two European Artillery Men, died of "Coup de Soleil," the heat after nine o'clock became most awful, and the whole detachment much distressed by the time we returned to this place at 1 o'clock P. M. Had we moved with Camp equipage, &c. the operation could not have been accomplished with that secrecy, necessary to ensure success.

12th. There was no valuable property, and I burned as much as I could not remove from the spot, a few Camels I have transferred to the Commissariat Department; some Tattoos, Mules, Swords and Matchlocks, will be sold this evening by Public Auction.

In accordance with orders received from Lieutenant Colonel Roberts, I advanced on the morning of the 8th of June with the Troop under my Command, for the purpose of holding in check the Enemy under Meer Shah Mahomed, until the arrival of the remainder of the Force; on approaching the spot towards which I had seen small bodies retreating, and perceiving larger parties dispersing to the right and left, I attacked a Party of Horse and Foot to the number of about 250, who were drawn up in rear of two Guns, which they discharged at the moment of my passing. I succeeded in cutting up between 70 or 80, and their loss would have been greater, but for the thick Jungle which favored their escape. I am happy in being able to report, that all under me did their duty. I do myself the honor to forward Casualty Rolls of Men and Horses.

Sir,

In compliance with yesterday's orders, I do myself the honor to state, that the Sub-Division of the Grenadier Company which I detached, at the desire of Lieutenant Colonel Roberts, Commanding, for the purpose of searching the Garden or Burial Ground, occupied by Meer Shah Mahomed, and his Followers, fortunately discovered him concealed in some thick underwood, together with three or four Servants.

On seeing the Sepoys he raised his Gun, and one of his Followers drew his Sword, the men supposing that he intended opposition, levelled their Muskets, and would have shot him, had he not called out that he was the Meer, and Captain Fraser's coming up at the time, he delivered up his Sword to him.

I consider that the men shewed great forbearance in not firing, as they had been much exasperated at the conduct of a Beelooch, who only a few minutes before (after firing was over) had jumped out of a bush and severely wounded

Lieutenant Lancaster, the Acting Adjutant, in the arm.—He was however immediately afterwards killed by a Sepoy named Khyroola Khan, who most probably saved that Officer's life.

I beg to forward the Arms taken from the Meer & his followers, vizt :—

- 1 English Double Barrel Gun.
- 1 Matchlock with Flint Lock & Silver Clasps.

Two Swords, one with a Gilt handle, the Meer's Sword was delivered over to him yesterday.
