**ECCLESIASTICAL.**

Viewing the importance to the public of the regularity and completeness of the Official Returns of the Clergy, it is, with the approbation of Government, in future, directed by the Archdeacon.

That any Chaplain or Minister applying for any permanent leave of absence from his Station, or to retire on Furlough, shall forward with his application a Declaration, that he has duly made his Official Returns to the Registrar, or is prepared to do so, up to the date from which he

requests to be permitted so to be absent, or to retire.

That the same Rule is to apply to those removed from one station to another, and that every Chaplain so removed shall, before quitting his station, not only forward his Returns up to the date of leaving, but forward a Declaration to the authorities that he has done so.

That in case of the death of a Chaplain at his station, especially so if at a remote distance, a copy of the Returns from the date of his last Quarterly Returns to the period of his demise be made out by the Clerk, or other local public authority in whose official possession the original public Registers may happen for the time to be lodged or come, and be immediately forwarded, by such local Officer to the Registrar, the same being also duly examined and verified under the signature of the Chief Lay Public authority of the station, as being the best mode at present of supplying such, so as to complete the general Quarterly Returns, transmitted home by the orders of the Court of Directors.

PRIZE ESSAYS AGAINST THE PRACTICE OF INFANTICIDE.

The Hon'ble the Governor in Council has been pleased to authorize the award of two prizes for Essays against the practice of Female Infanticide, vizt. a prize of Rupees (600) Six hundred for the best, and Rupees (400) Four hundred for the second Essay, subject to the following conditions.

1. The prizes to be open to general competition among the Native Students of any of the Public or Private Educational establishments of this presidency.

2. The Essays to be composed in the English language, and accompanied with a Guzerathee translation, to be fairly transcribed and not in the handwriting of the authors, and to be transmitted to the Office of the Secretary to Government before the 1st March 1844.

3. To each Essay a Motto must be affixed, and the Essay must be accompanied with a sealed note bearing on the outside the same Motto as that affixed to the Essay, and, within, the author's name.

4. The Essays will be submitted by Government for the report of a Committee selected for the purpose. The sealed notes which accompany the successful Essays will alone be



opened, and these Essays will become the property of Government; the others will be returned unopened with their respective Essays to the authors.

5. It is to be distinctly understood, that the prizes will not be awarded, unless the best and second Essays be considered worthy of such distinction by the Examining Committee; and in such case all the sealed packets and Essays will be returned.

**B**OMBAY TO WIT. By virtue of a precept to me directed, I hereby proclaim and give notice, that the Sessions of Oyer and Terminer and General Gaol delivery, will be holden before the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, at the Court House, on Monday the twenty-fifth day of September instant at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses and other Crimes, and Misdemeanors, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the limits thereof and the Factories subordinate thereto, and also to enquire, hear and determine, in like manner, all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done or committed, by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects, in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependent upon the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India, in alliance with the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place, will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound to prosecute, and give evidence at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

In witness whereof I the said Commander of the said Ship have affirmed to four Bills of Lading, all of this Tenor and Date, the one of which four Bills being accomplished, the other three to stand void,

4th. The amount of Freight received on account of the conveyance of Treasure shall be divided into eight Parts, and distributed as follows, viz,

If on a Station where there is a duly appointed Commodore or Senior Officer, one eighth is to be apportioned to him, one eighth to the Indian Naval Fund, and the remaining six eighths to the Captain or Commanding Officer of the Ship or Vessel.

If on a Station where there is no properly appointed Commodore or Senior Officer, one eighth is to be appropriated to the Indian Naval Fund, and the balance of seven eighths is to be retained by the Captain, or Commanding Officer of the Ship or Vessel.

It is however to be distinctly understood, that no Commodore or Senior Officer shall be entitled to share in the Freight on Treasure etc : unless he shall have notified his intentions to the Captain or Commander of the vessel bearing the Freight, by furnishing him with an engagement in writing in the following Form.

I, A. B. am desirous of partaking in the advantages, with the risks attendant thereon, arising out of the conveyance of Freight of Treasure in any of the Ships or Vessels in the Squadron (or in the particular Ship as the case may be) and I hereby engage to make good to the Captain or Captains, Officer or Officers, Commanding such Ships or Vessels respectively (or Ships or Vessels as the case may be) such part of any loss or damage for which he or they may be liable in respect to the Gold, Silver, Treasure, or other articles so carried on Freight, and which he or they respectively shall have actually paid and satisfied, as shall be in proportion to the Share or Interest in the said Freight money to which I may be entitled.

5. In the event of loss or damage happening to the Gold, Silver, Jewels, or other articles so received on Freight exceeding the Total Freight money, the Indian Naval Fund shall not be entitled to any sum on account of such Freight, and, in cases in which the loss may not amount to the whole of the Freight money, the Indian Naval Fund shall be entitled only to its proportion of the balance of Freight money, over and above such loss or damage.

6. The Captain or Commanding Officer of any Ship or Vessel on board of which Treasure may have been received shall, if under a Commodore or Senior officer, transmit to him a Return, in the following Form, of the amount of Treasure, and of the Freight paid or to be paid thereon; copies of this Return are also to be furnished to the Superintendent Indian Navy, and to the Secretary of the Indian Navy Fund, through the Commodore or Senior Officer, if any; but if there be no Commodore or Senior Officer on the station, they are then to be transmitted direct.

7. When Treasure shall, during the voyage be transhipped into one or more ships or vessels, the Freight shall be divided prorata itineris, among the Commodores or Senior Officers, and the Captains or Commanding Officers according to the services performed by the different Ships or Vessels respectively.

8. The Freight chargeable under the foregoing Rules shall be payable clear of all deductions; and it shall be stipulated, that the Captains or Commanding Officers shall not be liable to any expences attending the shipment of Treasure, or other articles, until the same shall be safe alongside their respective ships or vessels, and their liability shall cease from the moment they shall have landed the Treasure at the Port which the Ships carrying the Treasure shall be destined.

9. In order to prevent any doubt or misunderstanding as to the rate of distribution of Freight on Gold, Silver, Jewels, or other articles received on board any of the Honorable Company's Vessels, and to prevent any private arrangement inconsistent with these Regulations, all Commodores or Senior Officers, Captains or Commanding Officers, are expressly forbidden to receive on board any Treasure, upon any agreement or condition different from these Regulations, or to take, demand, or receive any sum, other than those, established by these Regulations.

10. Should any dispute arise in the adjustment of Freight to be charged on Treasure, or should any case occur not provided for in these Regulations, the subject is to be referred to Government, through the Superintendent, whose decision is to be considered final.

No. 113 of 1843.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council has been pleased to revise the Rules, under which Parcels and Packages are conveyed in the Mail Steamers between Bombay and Suez; and to direct, that the following Rules be established and in force from the 1st October next, in supersession of all former Rules, which have heretofore been published.

- 1st. All Parcels shipped from Bombay by the Red Sea Steamers, must be paid for in advance.
- 2nd. All Parcels received at Bombay by the Red Sea Steamers, must be paid for on delivery.
- 3rd. All Parcels or Packages must be distinctly addressed by name to the parties to whom they are to be delivered and not by marks or numbers.
- 4th. No Package to be larger than one man can conveniently handle, or to weigh more than forty pounds.
- 5th. No Parcel or Package is to contain any merchandize.
- 6th. No Parcel or Package is to contain Letters, Bills or Money.
- 7th. No more Packages will be received on board, than can conveniently be stowed away in each vessel according to the discretion of the Commander.
- 8th. Particulars of the contents may be called for, if thought necessary, and if refused, the Package may be rejected.
- 9th. All Packages sent or received by the Steamers, are to be delivered at the Custom House.
- 10th. The Government will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
- 11th. Private Treasure will be received under the Regulations which have been separately notified for its conveyance; and when so conveyed, no charge for freight will be levied beyond the percentage due to the Commander.
- 12th. The Post Master General and Collector of Customs respectively have authority to open any Parcel that they have reason to suspect, contains articles in contravention of these rules.

# LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS.

FORT WILLIAM,  
HOME DEPARTMENT,  
LEGISLATIVE,  
THE 5TH AUGUST, 1843

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council, in the Legislative Department, is published for general information:

Read again the Draft Act for regulating the levy of Customs Duties, and the Manufacture of Salt in the North Western Provinces of the Presidency of Bengal.

By this Act will be abolished the Duties on 121 Articles, including Piece Goods, and all Embroidered Goods, Iron, Silk Shawls, Indigo, Tobacco, Oil and Oil Seeds. Of the Duties to be abolished, those on 48 Articles produced, on an average of the three years ending in 1841, —42, an aggregate receipt of only 1,500 Rupees.

The additional duty to be imposed by the Act on the Import of Salt into the North Western Provinces, will only raise the duty generally to two-thirds of the amount of that already levied in Bengal, and to the Eastward of Allahabad to the level of the Bengal duty.

The additional powers given to the Customs Department and the increased strength which will be given to the Customs Establishment will, it is to be hoped, prevent any increase of Smuggling on the North West Frontier, and it may be expected, that the result of a measure which gives almost entire freedom to internal Trade, will be a considerable increase of the Revenue.

Resolved accordingly, that the Act in question be passed.

## ACT No. XIV. OF 1843.

*An Act for regulating the levy of Customs Duties and the manufacture of Salt in the North Western Provinces of the Presidency of Bengal.*

I. It is hereby enacted, that Regulation XVI. 1829, Act II. 1838, and so much of Regulation IX. 1810, and of any other Regulation and Act, as affects the Collection of Customs Duties or the Manufacture of Salt in the North Western Provinces of the Presidency of Bengal, shall be repealed from the 1st day of September. 1843.

II. And it is further enacted, that from and after the day abovementioned, the following and no other Duties of Customs shall be leviable upon the Import and Export of Articles into and from the North Western Provinces of the Presidency of Bengal, that is to say:

On the Import of Salt, of all descriptions, two Rupees per maund, and a further duty of one Rupee per maund on the transmission thereof to the Eastward of Allahabad.

On the Import of Cotton, uncleaned, four Annas per maund, cleaned eight Annas per maund.

On the Export of Misree, Kund, Chenee and all clayed and refined Sugar, eight Annas per maund, Goor, Ráb, Sheerah, and all unclayed and unrefined Saccharine produce, three Annas per maund.

The Import of Sugar into any part of the said Provinces, is, and shall remain, prohibited.

III. And it is further enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Government of the said Provinces from time to time to make and issue such orders as may be deemed expedient for the collection of the aforesaid Duties in such manner, and upon such line or lines, and at such places on or near such line or lines as may seem fit, and all such orders shall have the same force as if they formed a part of this Act from the date notified in the Gazette, wherein they shall be published.

IV. And it is further enacted, that from and after the First day of September 1843, the manufacture of alimentary Salt throughout the North Western Provinces of the Presidency of Bengal, without the express sanction of the Government, is prohibited; and

that any person engaging in the manufacture of such Salt, or preparing or causing to be prepared works for the manufacture of such Salt, without such sanction, and all Zemindars or other proprietors of land, or their Agents, conniving at such illicit manufacture, shall on conviction by the Magistrate, within the limits of whose District the offence may have occurred, be punished by a fine not exceeding 500 Rupees, and on non-payment of such fine, by imprisonment not exceeding six months with or without hard labor, and that all works at which such manufacture shall have been conducted, or which are designed for such manufacture shall be destroyed, and any Salt which may be manufactured or stored thereat, shall be seized and confiscated.

V. And it is further enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Collectors of Customs and the Collectors of Land Revenue within their jurisdictions, to destroy all works for the manufacture of Salt, and to seize the Salt stored thereat, and to apprehend the persons concerned in the manufacture thereof, and make them over for trial to the Magistrate within the limits of whose District the offence may have occurred.

VI. It is further enacted, that all Sugar imported into the said Provinces, and all Articles imported or exported without payment of the duties imposed by this Act, or in contravention of the orders which may be made and issued under the provisions thereof, and all Boats, Carriages and Conveyances, and all animals used in transporting the same, shall be liable to be seized and confiscated in the manner herein-after mentioned.

VII. And it is further enacted, that all persons evading or attempting to evade the payment of the duties imposed by this Act, and all persons aiding or abetting such attempts or evasions, or in any manner acting in contravention of this Act, or of any order made and issued under the provisions thereof, and all Zemindars and other Proprietors of land, or their Agents, who shall wilfully connive at such attempts or evasions or aid such acts, shall on conviction by the Magistrate within the limits of whose District the offence may have occurred, be punished by a fine not exceeding 500 Rupees, and on non-payment thereof by imprisonment not exceeding six months with or without hard labor.

VIII. and it is further enacted, that it shall be lawful for all Officers of the Customs Department to search any carriages and conveyances, and any packages upon reasonable grounds of suspicion that such carriages, conveyances or packages, contain any articles made subject to duty, or prohibited to be imported by this Act, and to detain all such articles as may be liable to confiscation under the provisions thereof.

IX. and it is hereby enacted, that whenever any articles or goods shall be seized or detained under the provisions of this Act the Collector or Deputy Collector of Land Revenue or Customs, within whose jurisdiction such seizure or detention shall occur, shall, with all practicable expedition, report the case for the determination of the Commissioner of Revenue, and it shall be lawful for such Commissioner to declare such articles or goods to be confiscated, or to impose such lesser penalty in lieu thereof as to him may seem fit.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for all Officers in the Customs Department to apprehend any person upon reasonable grounds of suspicion that such person is liable to punishment under this Act, and to make him over for trial with all practicable expedition to the Magistrate within whose jurisdiction the offence may occur.

XI. Provided always, that any Officer of the Customs Department who shall without reasonable grounds of suspicion search any carriage or conveyance or any package, shall upon conviction thereof before the Magistrate within whose jurisdiction the offence may have been committed, be punished with fine not exceeding 250 Rupees, which fine shall be



paid over to the party aggrieved, and on non-payment of such fine, with imprisonment not exceeding three months; and provided also, that any Officer of the Customs Department who shall under color of this Act apprehend any person without reasonable ground of suspicion that such person is liable to punishment under this Act, shall upon conviction before the Magistrate within whose jurisdiction the offence may have been committed, be punished with fine not exceeding 500 Rupees, which fine shall be paid over to the party aggrieved, and on non-payment of such fine, with imprisonment not exceeding six months.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, that all Magistrates, or persons exercising the powers of Magistrate, shall be competent to receive and determine all charges against persons thus made over to them for trial on account of offences against this Act, and that all sentences passed in pursuance of this Act, shall be open to appeal under such Rules as may from time to time be laid down for the cognizance of appeals in ordinary cases.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that all Officers of Police, and all Officers of the Government engaged in the Collection of the Land Revenue, are empowered and required to aid and assist the Officers of the Customs Department in the execution of this Act.

XIV. And it is further enacted, that nothing in this Act contained shall be deemed to apply to the Saugor and Nerbudda Territories, or to the District of Ajmere.

The following Act, passed by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council, on the 12th August 1843, is hereby promulgated for general information:

ACT No. XVI. OF 1843.

*An Act regarding the offering of Rewards for the Apprehension of Offenders.*

Whereas inconvenience has been experienced from the Rules in force which provide that Magistrates shall apply to the Courts of Sudder Nizamut Adawlut and the Courts of Circuits, or Courts exercising the powers of the old Courts of Circuit when it may appear advisable to offer a reward for the apprehension of a known offender, or the discovery of unknown offenders in cases of magnitude. And whereas it is expedient that all such applications should be made to such Officer or Officers as from time to time may be empowered by the Local Governments to authorize the grant of rewards;

It is hereby enacted, that Sections 2 and 3, Regulation IX. of 1808, and Sections XVI. and XVII. Regulation XVI. 1810 of the Bengal Code, be, and the same are hereby repealed.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 12th August 1843.

ACT No. — OF 1843.

*An Act for making the Provisions of 5 and 6 Vic. C. 47, Sec. XI. applicable to India.*

Whereas doubts have arisen as to whether so much of an Act passed in the 5th and 6th year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, entitled "an Act to amend the Laws relating to the Customs," as provides "that from and after the 5th day of January 1843, any Articles of Foreign Manufacture, and any packages of such Articles imported into the United Kingdom or into the British possessions abroad bearing any names, brands or marks purporting to be the names, brands or marks of Manufacturers resident in the United Kingdom, shall be forfeited," is applicable to the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company:

It is hereby declared and enacted, that from and after the day on which this Act is passed, any Articles of Foreign Manufacture and any packages of

such Articles imported into the Territories subject to the Government of the said Company bearing any names, brands or marks, purporting to be the names, brands or marks of Manufacturers resident in the United Kingdom, shall be forfeited.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 12th day of November next.

The following Act, passed by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council, on the 19th August 1843, is hereby promulgated for general information:

ACT No. XVII. OF 1843.

*An Act for the Appointment of Official Trustees in certain cases.*

Whereas the property of Infants, Femme-Coverts and others vested in Trustees, is exposed to peculiar risks and burthens in the Territories, subject to the Government of the East India Company, not only from the Insolvency of Trustees, but from the frequent difficulties occasioned by their death, or absence, or refusal, or incapacity to act:

I. It is hereby enacted, that in all cases in which any property is subject to any Trust, and there shall be no Trustee willing to act, or capable of acting within the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Courts in the said Territories, it shall be lawful for the Supreme Court of each of the Presidencies in the said Territories, on petition to appoint the Registrar, or such other Officer of the Court, as the Court may from time to time select as the Official Trustee, under the provisions of this Act to be a Trustee of such Property, and that upon such appointment such Property shall vest in such Officer and his successors in office, and shall be held by them upon the same Trusts as the same was held previous to such appointment.

II. And it is hereby further enacted, that such Officer shall cause such Property to be invested in Government Securities or otherwise, as the Court shall direct, and that he shall be entitled to a Commission of one per cent. upon the amount thereof.

III. And it is hereby further enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Court to make any orders respecting such Property so vested in such Official Trustee or the Interest or Produce thereof, and that all such orders shall be made on petition unless the Court shall direct a Bill to be filed.

IV. And it is hereby provided, that nothing in this Act contained shall prevent the Re-transfer of the said Property to the Original or any subsequently appointed Trustees, or otherwise, as the Court shall direct.

V. And it is hereby further enacted, that where any Infant or Lunatic shall be entitled to any Gift, or Legacy, or Residue, or Share thereof, it shall be lawful for the Executor or Administrator, by whom such Legacy or Residue may be payable or transferrable, or the party by whom such Gift shall be made, or any Trustee thereof to pay or transfer the same to the Official Trustee appointed under this Act, and that the receipt of such Official Trustee shall be a discharge for the same, and that the same shall be subject to the like Provisions as are contained in this Act, as to other Property vested in such Official Trustee under the Provisions thereof.

VI. And it is hereby further enacted, that the Provisions of this Act, except as to the Commission to be allowed under the same, shall extend to any Property of Infants or Lunatics in the hands of the Ecclesiastical Registrar of each of the said Courts as Official Administrator.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 2d September 1843.

ACT No. — of 1843.

*An Act to amend the Law respecting the period of the Execution of Persons convicted of the crime of Murder.*

Whereas by an Act passed in the ninth year of the reign of his late Majesty King George the Fourth, intitled an Act for improving the Administration of Criminal Justice in the East Indies, it was amongst other things enacted that every person convicted of Murder should be executed according to Law on the day next but one after that on which the sentence should be passed unless the same should happen to be Sunday and in that case on the Monday following, and that sentence should be pronounced immediately after the conviction of every Murderer unless the Court should see reasonable cause for postponing the same, and such sentence should express not only the usual judgment of death but also the time thereby appointed for the execut on thereof: and it was by the said Act provided that after such sentences should have been pronounced it should be lawful for the Court or Judge to stay the execution thereof if such Court or Judge should so think fit: and whereas for the ends of justice, and especially more effectually to preserve from an irrevocable punishment, any persons who may hereafter be convicted upon erroneous or perjured evidence it is expedient to alter and amend the said recited Act in these respects.

I. It is therefore hereby enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act so much of the said Act as is hereinbefore recited shall cease to have effect within the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company.

II. And it is hereby further enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act, sentence of death may be pronounced after convictions for Murder by any Judge of any of Her Majesty's Court of Justice within the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company in the same manner, and the Judge shall have the same power in all respects as after convictions for other capital offences.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 2d day of November next.

THE 2D SEPTEMBER, 1843.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 2d September 1843.

ACT No. — of 1843.

*An Act for the better prevention of the Crime of Dacoity.*

Whereas it has been considered necessary to adopt more stringent measures for the conviction of professional Dacoits, who belong to certain Tribes, systematically employed in carrying on their lawless pursuits in different parts of the country, and for this purpose to extend the Provisions of Acts XXX. of 1836, XVIII. of 1837, and XVIII. of 1839, for the prevention of Thuggee, to persons concerned in the perpetration of Dacoity:

I. It is hereby enacted, that whosoever shall be proved to have belonged either before or after the passing of this Act to any gang of Dacoits, either within or without the Territories of the East India Company, shall be punished with transportation for life, or with imprisonment for any less term with hard labor.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that any person accused of the offence of Dacoity with or without murder, or of having belonged to a gang of Dacoits, or of the offence of unlawfully or knowingly receiving or buying property stolen or plundered by Dacoity, may be committed by any Magistrate within the Territories of the East India Company, and may be tried by any Court which would have been competent to try him if his offence had been committed within the Zillah where that Court sits.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that no Court shall, on trial of the offences specified in this Act, require any Futwa from any Law Officer.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 2d day of November next.

THE 9TH SEPTEMBER, 1843.

The following Act passed by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council on the 9th September 1843, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. XVIII. of 1843.

*An Act for the better custody of persons, convicted of Thuggee and Dacoity.*

Whereas it often happens that the offences of Thuggee and Dacoity are committed by gangs, as well within the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company, as in those of Native Princes or States in alliance with the said Company, and it may be necessary for the safety of persons and property within the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company, that persons convicted of the like offences within the Territories of such Princes or States, should be kept in secure custody, which cannot always be done within the last mentioned Territories;

It is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the local Government of any part of the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company to authorize the reception and detention in any part of these Territories, for the periods specified in their respective sentences, of persons sentenced to imprisonment or transportation for the offences of Thuggee, Dacoity, or the offences of belonging to any gang of Thugs or Dacoits, within the Territories of any Native Prince or State in alliance with the said Company. Provided always, that such sentences shall have been pronounced after trial before a Tribunal, in which a Covenanted Servant of the East India Company, duly authorized in that behalf by such Prince or State, shall be one of the presiding Judges. And it is hereby enacted, that every Servant of the East India Company so authorized as aforesaid, shall forward with every Prisoner a certificate of his conviction, and a copy of the proceedings held at the trial that the same may be forthcoming for reference at the place where the sentence of imprisonment may be carried into effect.
