In obedience to a Mandate under the hand and seal of the Right Reverend Father in God Daniel by the Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Calcutta and Metropolitan of India, bearing date the twenty first day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty two, signifying His Lordship's intention to hold his Primary Metropolitan Visitation of the See of Bombay, at the Cathedral in Bombay, on Tuesday the twenty eighth day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty three, all and singular the Ministers and Chaplains, and all Priests and Deacons in Holy Orders of the United Church of England and Ireland, being within the Diocese of Bombay, are hereby cited, if within Fifty Miles from Bombay aforesaid, to appear before the said Lord Bishop of Calcutta, the Metropolitan, at his Primary Metropolitan Visitation, to be held at the Cathedral Church of St. Thomas at Bombay, on Tuesday the twenty eighth day of February next, at the hour of ten o'clock in the morning, and then and there to produce their Letters of Orders of Priests and Deacons, with all Licences and other Faculties relative to their Official Appointment to be by them exhibited, and to hear and receive all such matter

OUR GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL.

1. Lieutenant B. Hall of the 25th Regiment Native Infantry has returned to his duty without prejudice to his rank, by permission of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors. Date of arrival at Bombay, 14th January 1843.

No. 63 of 1843.—The services of Captain H. N. Ramsay of the 24th Regiment Native Infantry, are placed at the disposal of His Excellency the Commander in Chief for Regimental duty.

1. The communications enumerated in the margin, relate to the trial by Court Martial of Lieutenant William Gibbard of the 16th Bombay Native Infantry, and second in command of the Sawunt Warree Local Corps, on the following charge.

“For highly irregular conduct, most disgraceful to the character and reputation of an Officer, in having between the 22nd and 31st Dec. 1838, at or near the village of Kowtanee, within the state of Sawunt Warree, when in Command of a Detachment of Troops on duty there, atrociously caused five persons who had been taken prisoners by a

party of Irregular Troops under his command, to be summarily put to death by being shot, without due authority and warrant for so doing.”

2. The Court found Lieutenant Gibbard guilty of the charge, with the exception of the word “Atrociously” and that four, instead of five Prisoners, were put to death. The sentence passed by the Court was, dismissal from the Company's Service. They however accompanied their Sentence by a recommendation to the favorable consideration of the Commander of the Forces, expressed in the following terms.

“Having thus performed its painful duty, the Court is anxious to bring to the notice of the Commander of the Forces some circumstances of an extenuating nature, which authorize its recommending the Prisoner to his favorable consideration, namely, the extraordinary orders he received from the Political Superintendent of the Sawunt Warree State, the evident conviction that he was acting in strict conformity with those orders, the approbation which he sought and received from the Political Superintendent (under whose orders he acted) from his own immediate Commanding Officer, and those with whom he associated, his youth, the activity he has frequently displayed both prior to, and subsequent to the 24th December 1838, and finally the high character he has received for humanity and gentleness towards the natives generally.”

“The above reasons, lead the Court to believe, that the lamentable error he has fallen into, was one of judgment only, and therefore do recommend him to the favorable consideration of the Commander of the Forces, feeling assured, that the experience he has so dearly earned is sufficient security against a recurrence of such a misfortune.”

3. “The proceedings of the trial were reviewed by two Commanders in Chief. When the sentence was passed, the command of the Army was held by Major General Sir John FitzGerald, who communicated it to your Government with a remark, “that from what is recorded on the face of these proceedings, he feels, it will be his duty to approve and confirm the sentence against the Prisoner without mitigation of punishment” and further, that the evidence in the opinion of the Major General establishes completely the guilt of the Prisoner to the full extent stated in the charge.”

4. Prior to the confirmation of the sentence the Command of the Army devolved upon Lieutenant General Sir Thomas McMahon, who shortly "afterwards approved and confirmed" the sentence, publishing at the same time to the Army, the following remarks.

"The trial in the absence was closed previously to my assuming Command of the Army of this Presidency, but circumstances have thrown on me the painful duty of confirming the finding and sentence, and it is with deep regret, I observe, that the proceedings develop a matter which makes it impossible for me to accede to the recommendation of the Court, or in any way to avoid giving full effect to the award."

7. Concerning the act itself of which Mr. Gibbard has been guilty, there can be no question. It is no less than that of putting Prisoners to death in cold blood, and the only matter of doubt is, how far the circumstances noticed in the finding of the Court Martial may avail towards extenuating the offence.

8. The principal of these circumstances is, the nature of the instructions which Mr. Gibbard has received from his immediate superior, Mr. Spooner, the Superintendent of Sawunt Warree.

9. According to Mr. Gibbard's statement, these instructions, which were not written but verbal, were "to take no prisoners and not to give quarter" Mr. Spooner, however in his evidence before the Court Martial stated their purport as follows.

"No written instructions were given, as the time and circumstances of the case would not admit of it. He was verbally instructed by me to proceed to the village of Howtanea and other places in the Sawunt Warree State to dislodge and rid the country of a set of Rebels who had taken possession of a great part of that state. Lieutenant Gibbard was also instructed, that the moment he came up with any party of Rebels, he was immediately to order his men to fire on them, that it was not my object with a small detachment like his to seize Prisoners, as by so doing he would not be able to carry into effect the object I had in view, namely, to rid the Country of a body of men who had taken possession of part of the Country and had committed various excesses, and also intended not only to take possession of the whole of the Sawunt Warree Territory, but also part of the Honorable Company's districts. Lieutenant Gibbard was further instructed on no account to permit any Goa subject or particularly any leader of any band of Goa subjects to escape, as part of the Rebels who infested the Warree Territories were Goa subjects, and a few influential men in the Goa Territories had acted in connivance with, and given assistance to the Rebels, and that a representation being made by me direct to the Goa Government, and also by me through the Bombay Government, the Goa authorities had denied that any subject of their state was connected with the Rebels, but as I was aware that this was not correct, it was of the utmost importance to me to be able to establish the truth of my statement."

10. Being asked "Had you any warrant to convey authority to Lieutenant Gibbard, to cause any persons to be put to death who might be taken Prisoners on the above occasion, and did you so invest him with such authority," Mr. Spooner answered. "I had no instructions myself on that specific point and I did not empower Lieutenant Gibbard to put to death any person after he had been seized."

11. The accuracy of these statements is not contested by Lieutenant Gibbard, what is further established in respect to Mr. Spooner's connection with the transaction is, that Mr. Gibbard reported to him, that one of the prisoners, Goondee Puarub, a person of some consequence amongst the insurgents, had been seized by the irregular Sepoys and afterwards shot by them, he, Lieutenant Gibbard telling them, that as they had been ordered by him not to take prisoners, they were to take Goondee Paurub away, as he did not wish to have any thing to do with him, and that he himself did not see Goondee Paurub. Further, that the services of Lieutenant Gibbard's acts in the affair at Howtanea so far as they were reported, received Mr. Spooner's high approbation.

12. With respect to Mr. Gibbard's evident conviction as observed by the Court Martial, that in having ordered the prisoners to be shot, "he was acting in strict conformity with those (Mr. Spooner's) orders," this is rendered at least questionable by his concealing from Mr. Spooner and his brother Officers the fact of his having ordered four prisoners to be shot after they had been brought before him unarmed and bound, and by his having given to Mr. Spooner, and others, only an imperfect account of the circumstances under which Goondee Paurub, one of those four, had been seized and put to death.

13. These are the material facts of the case, and it appears to us, that while they shew great blame to be imputable to Mr. Spooner, they still leave very great culpability resting upon Mr. Gibbard.

14. Mr. Spooner's verbal instructions did not even amount to an order to give no quarter, something being evidently left to Lieutenant Gibbard's own judgment, as to the adequacy of his detachment to guard Prisoners, and at the same time to perform the other duties required of it. But even if he had been enjoined in the most positive terms to take no Prisoners, there is a distinction between this, and putting prisoners to death when taken.

15. The other considerations which plead in Mr. Gibbard's favor are his youth, and the testimony borne to his merits, and to the valuable service which he had already had the opportunity of rendering, but we feel, that we could not on such grounds admit any relaxation of a principle which cannot be deviated from without sacrificing the high character always maintained by our Army, and weakening the salutary impression made upon the people of India by the observance of rules of warfare consistent with humanity and civilization.

16. We are therefore compelled to refuse the restoration of Mr. Gibbard to the Company's Service.

The men to be so reduced will be borne as Supernumeraries until absorbed in their respective Regiments, unless where they shall be disposed to serve in Corps already diminished by the casualties of the Campaign or otherwise within the limits of the new Establishment.

In regard to the Troops of the Madras Presidency in China and beyond Sea, and the Bombay Troops in Scinde, the order for the above reduction shall not have effect until their return to their respective Presidencies.

FORT WILLIAM.
 LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.
 THE 25TH NOVEMBER 1842.

The following Act is passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council, on the 25th of November 1842, with the assent of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India, which has been read and recorded.

Ordered; that the Act be promulgated for general information.

ACT No. XIV OF 1842.

An Act for giving greater facility in the abatement and prosecution of Nuisances in and through the Towns and Islands of Bombay and Colaba.

I. It is hereby enacted, that no person shall throw, or deposit, or cause to be thrown or deposited any offensive matter or thing whatever on any open space of ground contiguous to any public thoroughfare on the Islands of Bombay or Colaba.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that the owner or occupier of every such open space shall on a written order from the Court of Petty Sessions for such purpose forthwith enclose the same with a fence or wall, and in default thereof for the space of ten days, the said Court shall cause such enclosure to be made, and the expence thereof shall be defrayed by the Municipal Fund, and the said owner or occupier shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twice the amount so expended.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the said Court of Petty Sessions to order and direct, that proper and suitable drains or gutters for the conveyance of wastage, water, filth and other offensive matter proceeding from the houses or premises of any of the inhabitants or occupiers thereof, shall be made and built by the owners of such houses in such manner as the said Court of Petty Sessions shall direct, and upon such owners failing so to do, and also to keep the same in repair, for the space of ten days after notice to that effect shall have been given by the said Court, the said Court may cause such drains or gutters to be built or repaired, and the expence thereof shall be defrayed out of the Municipal Fund, and the said owners shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twice the amount of such expence; provided always, that a default in the making

or repairing such drains or gutters has created or is likely to create a public nuisance.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that the owner or occupier of any house or tenement having a privy erected upon his premises shall have such privy shut out by a sufficient wall or fence from the view of persons passing by.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that every privy, sink, drain, water courses, compound, yard, lane or passage adjoining or belonging to any house or premises shall be kept clean by the owners or occupiers thereof, so that the same shall not become a public nuisance.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that no person shall throw or deposit any filth or rubbish on the roof or weather-boards of any buildings, or suspend therefrom any article whatever so as to project over any street or public thoroughfare. Nor shall any person bathe himself or wash any animal or clothes, or throw any offensive matter, or thing whatever in or into any of the public tanks or wells, and the Governor in Council is hereby empowered from time to time by Proclamation to declare, what tanks or wells shall be deemed Public, and also which of such Public tanks or wells may be used for the purpose of bathing and washing linen therein.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Court of Petty Sessions to require any person, owner or tenant, keeping a public brothel or lodging houses for Prostitutes, or disorderly character of any description in any of the more public roads or streets of Bombay and Colaba, to shut up the same or to remove such tenants from the premises, and on his failing to do so within the time specified in a notice to be given to him to that effect, he shall be deemed to have offended against the provision of this Act.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that no person shall keep a Coffee Shop, Eating House, or any place of public resort, other than a legally licensed Tavern or Spirit Shop, without the permission or license of the Court of Petty Sessions, which Court is hereby empowered to grant such permission or license in writing, and which may be revoked by the said Court on good and sufficient cause.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that all offences against this Act shall be summarily enquired into and decided by the Court of Petty Sessions, and every offence for which there is not a special penalty shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding two hundred Rupees.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that all fines imposed under this Act shall be paid into the General Treasury for the benefit of the Municipal Fund.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 6th of January 1843:—

ACT No.—OF 1843.

An Act for declaring and amending the law regarding the condition of Slavery within the Territories of the East India Company.

I. It is hereby enacted and declared, that no public Officer shall in execution of any decree or order of Court, or for the enforcement of any demand of Rent or Revenue sell or cause to be sold any person or the right to the compulsory labor or services of any person on the ground that such person is in a state of slavery.

II. And it is hereby declared and enacted, that no rights arising out of an alleged property in the person and services of another as a slave shall be enforced by any Civil or Criminal Court or Magistrate within the Territories of the East India Company.

III. And it is hereby declared and enacted, that no person who may have acquired property by his own industry or by the exercise of any art, calling or profession, or by inheritance, assignment, gift or bequest shall be dispossessed of such property or prevented from taking possession thereof on the ground that such person or that the person from whom the property may have been derived was a slave.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that any Act which would be a penal offence if done to a free man, shall

be equally an offence if done to any person on the pretext of his being in a condition of slavery.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 6th day of April next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 6th of January 1843.

ACT No.—OF 1843.

An Act for regulating inquiries into the truth of matters implicating the public conduct of Officers not removable without the sanction of Government within the Presidency of Fort St. George in Madras.

I. Whereas it is expedient to amend the provisions contained in the Regulations concerning inquiries into the truth of matters implicating the public conduct of European Officers, and to extend the same to all Officers not removable without the sanction of Government:

It is hereby enacted, that Regulations III. of 1809, II. of 1810, VI. of 1811, and VIII. of 1822, of the Madras Code, be repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that in the Territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George in Madras, whenever either the Courts of Suddur and Foudjaree Adawlut, or the Board of Revenue, shall be of opinion that substantial grounds exist for making a regular and formal inquiry into the truth of any imputation of official misconduct affecting any Officer subject to their controul respectively, and not removable without the sanction of Government, they shall submit the documents on which their opinion may be founded, together with a statement of the charges reduced to distinct articles which they may propose to be made the subject of a regular investigation, to the Governor in Council of Fort St. George, for his consideration and orders.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that any charge or information, of the description aforesaid, may be preferred direct to the Courts of Suddur and Foudjaree Adawlut, or to the Board of Revenue, respectively, who shall examine the complainant or informant circumstantially upon oaths, or upon solemn affirmation if he be entitled to be exempted from taking an oath, and require the party accused to explain or reply to any matters they may deem to need explanation and make such further inquiries, upon oath or affirmation upon the subject as they may judge proper.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that any charge or information may also be made before any Judge, Magistrate, or Collector, for any acts of the description beforementioned committed within their jurisdiction respectively, who shall examine the complainants or informants circumstantially upon oath, or upon solemn affirmation if he be entitled to be exempted from taking an oath, and shall transmit the deposition so taken to the Suddur and Foudjaree Adawlut, or to the Board of Revenue, according as the person accused may be subject to those Authorities respectively.

V. And it is hereby provided, that it shall not be lawful for the Courts of Suddur and Foudjaree Adawlut, or the said Board, respectively, to act upon any such charge or information, unless the person preferring the same shall make oath or solemn affirmation in case he be entitled to be exempted from taking an oath, that he believes the facts on which the charge is grounded to be true.

VI. And it is hereby provided, that it shall be lawful for the Courts of Suddur and Foudjaree Adawlut and for the said Board, respectively, to dismiss any such charge or information, where they do not see any substantial reason for entering further into the inquiry. Provided, that on every occasion when they shall dismiss any such charge or information, they shall submit the same, together with all the circumstances of the case, in like manner, as is provided in Section II. of this Act.

VII. And it is hereby provided, that the said Courts of Suddur and Foudjaree Adawlut, and the said

Board, respectively, may at any stage of the inquiry into such matters as aforesaid, require the person preferring such charge or information as aforesaid to furnish such security as may be deemed reasonable that he will attend and prosecute the charge to a conclusion, and in the event of security being so required all proceedings shall be stayed until the same shall be furnished accordingly.

VIII. And it is hereby provided, nevertheless, that if any matter of the nature aforesaid, affecting such Officer as is mentioned in the second Section of this Act, shall appear in the course of any proceedings, whether preliminary or otherwise, which shall come before or be reported to either of the Courts of Suddur and Foudjaree Adawlut, or the said Board, respectively, those authorities shall act upon such matter, or institute such inquiry upon oath or affirmation as aforesaid, into the same as they shall deem proper for the purpose of such reference as aforesaid to the Governor in Council of Fort St. George, although no charge or information be preferred as aforesaid; and in such cases it shall not be necessary, before acting upon or instituting any inquiry concerning any matter so appearing in the course of proceedings, to require any oath or affirmation in regard to the truth of such matter.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that if the Governor in Council of Fort St. George, upon such reference as is mentioned in the second Section of this Act, shall concur with the Authority by which it may be submitted, or if such Governor in Council shall, from information of the description aforesaid that may be laid before him in respect of any Officer not directly subject to the Courts or Board above named, deem it necessary to institute proceedings against any such Officer, he shall appoint a Commissioner or Commissioners; for making a regular and formal inquiry into the truth of the matters referred. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the Governor in Council by an Order of Council to determine in all cases where such Commissioner or Commissioners shall hold their sittings—as well within the local limits of Her Majesty's Supreme Court, as beyond those limits.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that on the appointment of every such Commission, the said Governor in Council shall direct whether the Commission shall be placed under the control of any of the Authorities aforesaid, or shall act immediately under the authority of Government, and all Commissions appointed as aforesaid shall be guided by the instructions which they may receive in this behalf from the Government.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that the Commissioner or Commissioners appointed as aforesaid, before entering on the discharge of his or their duties, shall take the following oath.

I, A. B., Commissioner for the purpose of (here state the object of the Commissions) do solemnly swear that I will faithfully and impartially perform the duty committed to me without fear, favor, or bias, to the best of my ability, knowledge, and judgment, so help me God.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever a charge shall be referred for investigation to a Special Commission, the said Governor in Council will determine whether the conduct of the prosecution shall be left to the accuser, or be undertaken on the part of Government. In the latter case, the said Governor in Council will nominate such person or persons as may be deemed proper, to conduct the prosecution on behalf of Government.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be the duty of Commissioners appointed under this Regulation, after receiving the plaint or charge, and the documents from which the same may have been prepared, to call upon the person accused for his reply to the accusation, to examine upon oath, or under a solemn declaration, the witnesses named by the accuser or the accused; to receive any further written documents offered in support of, or against the accusation; and to call for and take any further requisite evidence which may be indicated by the witnesses adduced or documents exhibited by either party, and may appear to be necessary for the ascertainment of facts, or the discovery of the truth or falsehood of the charges, or of any part thereof.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that for the discharge of the duties specified in the preceding Section, or any other functions which may be delegated to a Commission under this Regulation, such Com-

mission when holding its sittings without the local limits of the Supreme Court of Madras shall be vested with the same powers as are exercised by the Zillah Courts, except that all process to cause the attendance of witnesses, or other compulsory process, shall be served through the Zillah Judge in whose jurisdiction the Commission may be held, and executed by the Zillah Judge in whose jurisdiction the witness or other person upon whom the process is to be served may reside.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever such Commission shall hold its sittings by order of Council as aforesaid, within the local limits of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature, such Commissioners shall be vested with a power to examine on oath or solemn affirmation to call for documentary and all other evidence, which they deem necessary for the purpose of their enquiry, to summon and enforce the attendance before them of all witnesses wheresoever resident, to punish contempts, to commit for perjury, and to punish by fine and imprisonment, the refusal to attend on summons duly served, or the refusal to give evidence.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that the provisions of Act XXIII. of 1840 shall be applicable for all the purposes of such Commissions aforesaid, in the same way as that Act is now applicable to Courts within the Provinces.

XVII. And it is hereby enacted, that in the event of any witness duly summoned by ordinary subpoena, or by subpoena duces tecum, through the medium of the Supreme Court (according as is prescribed in Act No. XXIII. of 1840) not attending before such Commissioner or Commissioners aforesaid, refusing to give evidence, or to produce such documentary evidence as may be called for by such Commissioners, that it shall be lawful for such Commissioner or Commissioners to issue process of arrest and search, and such process shall be executed through the Supreme Court, in the same manner as is prescribed in the Act for the execution of other process through the instrumentality of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature.

XVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that the provisions of Act XV. of 1835 shall be applicable (in cases of a Commission sitting within the limits of the Supreme Court) to the purposes of this Act—Provided, however, that in the case of any European British subject, rendering himself amenable to any of the penalties set forth in this Act, the Commissioner or Commissioners shall have the power to commit such person to the custody of the Superintendent of Police, for eventual trial before the Supreme Court, in the case of perjury or for temporary imprisonment under the award of such Commissioner or Commissioners.

XIX. And it is hereby enacted, that on the close of the evidence for the prosecution and defence, the accused shall be at liberty to record any observation upon the result of the inquiry which he may think necessary for the vindication of his conduct and character. The accuser, or the person appointed to conduct the prosecution on the part of Government, shall also be at liberty to record any remarks on the subject of the prosecution which he may deem requisite.

XX. And it is hereby enacted, that as soon after the conclusion of the proceedings as circumstances shall permit, the Commissioner or Commissioners shall when the Commission shall be instructed to act immediately under the authority of Government, submit directly to the Government to which he or they may be subordinate, and in other cases to the Controlling Court or Board, the proceedings under the Commission, accompanied by translations of papers not in the English language, together with a summary of the pleadings and evidence, and his or their opinion of the merits of the case.

XXI. And it is hereby provided, that it shall be lawful for the said Governor in Council, or the Controlling Court or Board, upon consideration of the report of any such Commission as aforesaid, to direct the Commissioner or Commissioners to take further evidence, or to give further explanation of his or their opinion or opinions connected with the case investigated, and the Commissioner or Commissioners are authorized and required to take such further evidence, and to give such further explanation.

XXII. And it is hereby enacted, that the *Sudder* and *Foujdaree* *Adawlut*, or the Board to which any report of a Commissioner or Commissioners may be submitted as aforesaid after due consideration of the same, and after obtaining such further evidence or explanations as they may require, shall submit the whole of the proceedings and documents received by them to the Government, together with their opinion whether any and what charges have been established against the accused.

XXIII. And it is hereby provided, that whenever a Special Commission may be appointed under the Provisions of this Act, the said Governor in Council will determine, on a view of the nature and circumstances of the case, whether the accused Officer shall be suspended from the discharge of the functions of his office; and if so, whether he shall be permitted to draw the established allowances of his office, or otherwise.

XXIV. And it is hereby provided, that the Governor in Council on consideration of the report and proceedings submitted to him in pursuance of Sections XX. and XXII. of this Act, will pass such decision on the case as may appear to him most consonant to the principles of justice and consistent with the powers possessed by Government in matters of this description; and in the event of his deeming it necessary that the party accused should be brought to trial by a public prosecution before a competent Court of Law, will issue the necessary instructions for that purpose to the Law Officers of Government. But whatever proceedings may be held, or whatever decision or order may be passed by Government, individuals deeming themselves aggrieved by any public Officer, will be at all times at liberty to seek redress according to the ordinary forms prescribed by law.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 6th day of April next.
