GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to establish the following Rules in regard to the Salaries of Native Officers of whatever Department, while under suspension, pending investigation into their official conduct.

1st. When a native servant is suspended, his salary shall cease from the date of suspension, and if restored to the situation which he held, he shall receive that portion of his salary which may remain after the payment of the expense of providing for the performance of the duties of his office.

2nd. When a native servant is suspended, and, though allowed to return to the service of Government, is not restored to his previous situation, he shall be entitled to no salary for the time he was under suspension.

3rd. When a native servant, having been suspended, is restored to his situation, and his innocence of the charge against him shall be fully and entirely established, so as to admit of no doubt, the case must be referred to Government, in order that, if Government see fit, his full salary, or a larger portion of it than would be left to him under Rule I. may be admitted to him, as a special case.

4th. Servants acting for servants under suspension shall receive acting allowances, as in the case of those acting for servants on leave.

5th. In laying down these Rules, Government reserves to itself the right of deciding as it may deem fit on any particular case.

The Governor General in Council is pleased to direct, that the following Resolution prescribing the terms on which leave of absence on private affairs, or on medical certificate will be granted hereafter to Medical Officers holding Civil appointments, be published for general information.

Resolution.—Any Medical Officer in Civil Medical employ who shall proceed on leave of absence from the station to which he is attached, whether on private affairs or on medical certificate, shall forfeit, during the period of such absence, the whole of his Civil Salary, and shall be entitled to draw his Military Pay and Allowances only, subject to the Rules in the Military Department. The Medical Officer performing the duties of the absentee shall receive the entire allowances of the Situation in which he may be appointed to officiate, unless he be in Medical charge of a Regiment, or the Wing of a Regiment at the same station, in which case he will receive his allowances for such charge, and 100 Rupees a month additional for the performance of the civil duties.

Any Medical Officer in Civil Medical employ who shall be absent from his duty, whether on medical certificate, or on account of his private affairs for a period exceeding 6 months at one time, shall not be permitted to return to his Civil appointment without a fresh nomination thereto, and shall be considered from the date of the expiration of the six months to be at the disposal of the Commander in Chief.

An Act for repealing Regulation IX. of 1808 of the Bengal Code.

Whereas the Provisions of Regulation IX. of 1808 of the Bengal Code "for the apprehension of persons concerned in the offence of Gang Robbery, and especially the Sirdars of Leaders or Gangs of Dacoits," have by reason of their extreme severity become nearly obsolete:

It is hereby enacted, that the said Regulation be repealed.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 2d day of February 1844.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 2d December 1843.

ACT No.—OF 1843.

An Act for legalizing the infliction of Corporal Punishment in cases of Petty Larceny generally, and when committed by offenders of tender age.

I. Whereas it is expedient until adequate improvements in Prison Discipline can be effected to substitute corporal punishment for imprisonment in the case of certain offences:

It is hereby enacted, in modification of C. 1, S. 2, Regulation II. of 1834, that it shall be competent to a Magistrate on conviction in cases of thefts of property not exceeding in value the sum of Fifty Rupees, to sentence the person convicted to corporal punishment not exceeding twenty stripes of a rattan.

II. And whereas it is also expedient, that offenders of tender age should be punished rather in the way of School discipline than of ordinary criminal justice:

It is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to a Magistrate, and he is hereby required, on conviction in cases of theft of property not exceeding in value the sum of Fifty Rupees, if the person convicted shall appear to him by inspection or other evidence to be of such tender years as to require punishment rather in the way of School discipline

than of ordinary criminal justice, to sentence such person to corporal punishment with a light rattan, not exceeding ten stripes.

III. And it is hereby further provided and enacted, that no female shall be subject to corporal punishment, and that in cases of infliction of corporal punishment, no other punishment shall be superadded, and that the punishment shall be inflicted on all occasions in the presence of the Magistrate.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 2d day of March 1844.

Meerpoor 5th April 1843.

MY LORD,

I have the honor to report to your Lordship, that yesterday the fortress of Oomercote, opened its gates to the British force sent against it, and is in our hands. I have ordered a small garrison to hold it till further orders.

Considerable difficulties have prevented our sooner getting hold of this most important place; but the zeal and ability of the officers employed, (Captain Whitley, commanding in the first instance, and Major Woodburn afterwards,) overcame these difficulties. In justice to Lieutenant Brown, my Aid-de-Camp, I must say, that this success has been chiefly owing to his exertions and zeal. Having myself remained in a central position, to receive the earliest reports of the progress made by the inundation caused by the river Indus, and to direct the movements of the troops, which a deficiency of water towards Oomercote obliged me to divide, I was unable to command in person the detachment which proceeded to Oomercote. Being at Jourbee I received a despatch from Oomercote, saying, that it was defended by a powerful garrison; and at the same moment I received another from Hyderabad, to say, that the river, was rising with unusual rapidity. It therefore became necessary to give up the idea of attacking Oomercote, and I ordered a retreat, returning myself to this town. Just as my orders to retreat reached the advancing force, (then within 20 miles of Oomarcote,) another report reached the Commanding Officer that the fortress was abandoned! Between this report and my order for him to retreat, the Commanding Officer was embarrassed, upon which Lieutenant Brown mounted his horse, and under the burning sun of this climate, rode 40 mile, to Meerpoor, received my orders and instantly returned, taking the supporting troops on the road along with him, and Oomercote was taken!

Justice to this Officer has made me enter into a detail otherwise unnecessary; but the man who rides 80 miles without stopping, and in broad day under a Scindian sun, deserves this complement.

The importance of having Oomercote in our possession is so great, that it repays every inconvenience. Emam Ghur does not exist, and I believe that no other rallying point remains in the desert for the defeated Ameer Shere Mahomed, who, as is generally supposed, will fly to the Punjab.

Thus, my Lord, I think I may venture to say. Scinde is now subdued. The Scindian population every where express their satisfaction at the change of masters.

POLITICAL DEPARTMENT; AGRA, THE 13th MARCH 1843.

The Governor General is pleased to appoint Major General Sir Charles Napier, K. C. B., Governor of the Province of Scinde.

No. 2.

The Governor General is pleased to direct, that all Acts of Parliament for the abolition of Slavery and for the suppression of the Slave Trade, shall have full force and effect in every part of Scinde, which now is, or hereafter may be occupied, by the British army.

The Governor of Scinde will take such measures as to His Excellency may appear best calculated to carry the order into effect, and to make it known to the people.

No. 3.

The Governor General is pleased to direct the immediate and total abolition of all Duties of Transit in every part of Scinde, which now is, or hereafter may be occupied by the army.

The navigation of the Indus is free to all nations.
