Is hereby given, that verbal offers from Individuals residing at Poona, Belgaum, and Mhow, will be received at the Commissariat Offices at those stations respectively on Wednesday the 20th day of March next, for the

supply for a period of 3 years, to commence from the 1st May 1844, of a hired establishment of Draught Bullocks, to be maintained at Poona, and to consist of 206 pairs, or 412 Bullocks, and one able bodied Driver to each pair or 206 Drivers. The Bullocks to be of superior size and weight, equal to the draught of Guns, heavy Stores &c., and such other work as may be required, and to be of Mysore or Malwa breed.

2. No person will be allowed to tender for the contract, unless he previously deposits in the Commissariat office the sum of Company's Rupees, (1,000) one thousand, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract, should his offer be accepted. This deposit will be returned on the deed of agreement being duly completed.

3. Sealed tenders will also be received at the above mentioned Commissariat Offices, from distant stations, on or before the 20th proximo, such tenders as are received before the sale commences will be opened at its close, and each offer duly recorded, provided it is accompanied by the 1,000 Rupees deposit.

4. The Bullocks will be subject to the approval of a Committee of Officers, and are not to be entered younger than 5, or older than 8 years of age, and this rule of age, is to govern all Cattle that may be replaced.

5. The Bullocks to be branded in presence of the Committee passing them, with the letters P. D. A. of one inch in length, on the off hip.

6. The Bullocks and Drivers, to be mustered monthly.

7. The Drivers to be settled with monthly, and not to be discharged without the permission of the Commissariat Officer.

8. The hire of the Bullocks to be paid on the 20th of each month.

9. The Bullocks to be fed with good Kurbee or Grass, and to allow each Bullock, daily, at least 30 pounds of good dry Kurbee or Grass, or 40 pounds of green, and each Bullock to receive daily, when marching, 4 pounds of dry gram, and two pounds in camp.

10. The contracting party or his authorized Agent, to attend daily at the Commissariat office, to receive orders.

11. The contractor to be answerable for all losses of Government property, conveyed by the said Bullocks.

12. All casualties of Bullocks by death or otherwise, to be replaced forthwith, and to be also subject to the approval of a Committee of Officers, and branded in the same manner as stated in clause No. 5 of this Notification.

13. The Commissariat Officer at Poona, will at any time be authorized to submit for the inspection of a Committee of Officers, any Bullocks which he may consider unfit for service, and if condemned, to replace them;—should the contractor refuse to do so, recovering the amount paid on that account, from the first monthly bills that may become due to him.

14. The Bullocks will be allowed, at the discretion of the Commissary General, a respite after any particular heavy duty, should satisfactory reasons be shewn for granting this indulgence.

15. The contract to be renewed at the end of 3 years, for 2 years more should Government

deem it advisable to do so. The granting of this indulgence will however greatly depend upon the manner in which the contract is performed, whether satisfactorily or otherwise.

16. The amount of deposit to be lodged by the contractor, to cover any losses Government may sustain either by damage to property during transit, or to provide for cases where he may fail to produce fit and proper Bullocks, will be Rupees 1,000, to be deducted from the hire of the Cattle, in such proportions as may hereafter be determined on.

17. To supply any additional number of Cattle for any period that may be required, for the service of Government, provided not less than twenty (20) days notice is given.

18. Should the contractor disobey any orders of the Commissariat Officers or others set over him, he will be liable to be fined at the pleasure of Government, not exceeding Rupees (100) one hundred for each offence, and in case of any infringement of the conditions of the deed of agreement, it will be optional with Government to order him to be fined, or to put an end to the contract, the amount deposited by the Contractor being in the latter case forfeited.

19. No reasons will be assigned for the rejection of any offer.

18th day of March instant, at eleven o'clock
in the forenoon, for the trial of all Treas-
ons, Murders and other Felonies, Perjuries,
Trespasses and other Crimes, and Misdemean-
ors, had, done, or committed within the Town
and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof,
and the Factories subordinate thereto, and also
to enquire, hear and determine, in like manner,
all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries,
Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors,
Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had done or
committed, by any of Her Majesty's British
Subjects, in any of the Territories which now are
subject to, or dependent upon the said Govern-
ment of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions
of the Native Princes of India, in alliance with
the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place,
will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the
trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robber-
ies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other
Crimes and Offences, had, done perpetrated or
committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound
to prosecute, and give evidence, at the above
Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that
they are to attend, at the time and place above
mentioned, and not to depart without leave of
the Court.

And I hereby give notice, to all Justices of
the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all
Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and
Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, that
they be then and there, in their own persons,
with their Rolls, Records, Indictments and other
Remembrances, to do those things, which to
their offices in that behalf appertain to be done.

THE 3D FEBRUARY, 1844.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 3d February 1844.
Act No. — of 1844.

An Act for the Administration of Justice and Collection of the Revenue in the Territory which formed the State of Colaba, and which has lapsed to the British Government.

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the First day of the Administration of Civil and Criminal Justice, the Superintendence of the Police, and the Collection and Superintendence of the Revenues of every description within the lapsed Territories of Colaba, shall vest in such Agent to the Governor of the Presidency of Bombay as shall be appointed by the Governor in Council, and shall be exercised by the said Agent with the aid of such Assistants as may be appointed by the said Governor in Council.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the Governor in Council of Bombay, by an Order in Council, to prescribe such Rules as he may deem proper for the guidance of the Agent aforesaid, and of all the Officers subordinate to his control and authority, and to determine to what extent the decision of the Agent in Civil Suits shall be final, and in what Suits an Appeal shall lie to the Sudder Udalut, and to define the authority to be exercised by the Agent in Criminal Trials, and what case he shall submit to the decision of the Foujdaree Udalut.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the receipt of any Criminal Trials referred by the Agent under the Rules which may be hereafter prescribed by the Governor in Council, the Foujdaree Udalut shall proceed to pass a final judgment or such other order as may, after mature consideration, seem to the Court requisite and proper, in the same manner, as if the trial had been sent up in ordinary course from a Sessions Judge.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the receipt of any Appeal from a decree of the Agent duly preferred under the Rules to be prescribed as aforesaid, the Court of Sudder Udalut shall proceed to try and determine it in the same manner as Appeals from the Zillah Courts.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the Governor in Council, by an Order in Council, to make from time to time, with the previous sanction of the Governor General of India in Council, such alterations in the limits of the aforesaid Territories placed under the jurisdiction of the said Agent, as he may deem expedient.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 3d day of May next.

The following Act is passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council, on the 17th February 1844, with the assent of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India, which has been read and recorded.

Ordered, that the Act be promulgated for general information.

Act No. II. of 1844.

An Act respecting the expense of preparing Copies of Proceedings in Appeals.

Whereas it is just and necessary that the expense of preparing copies in the English Language of the proceedings in Cases appealed to the Queen in Council, as now required by the Section 5, Regulation XVI. 1797, and Section 34, Regulation V. 1803, of the Bengal Code, Section 5, Regulation VIII of 1818, of the Mauras Code, and Clause 6, Section C, of Regulation IV. of 1827, of the Bombay Code, should be borne by the parties prosecuting those Appeals:

I. It is hereby enacted, that in all cases of Appeals to the Queen in Council from judgments delivered by the Courts of Sudder Dewanny Adawlut at Fort William, Fort St. George, Bombay and at Allahabad, the expense of preparing two copies of all the proceedings held, and judgments or orders given in the case appealed, including the whole of the evidence and documents, and of translating into the English Language such of the aforesaid proceedings, as may have been originally drawn out in the country languages, shall be defrayed by the parties prosecuting the Appeal.

II. And it is hereby further enacted, that the Courts of Sudder Dewanny Adawlut are empowered and required to cause the deposit by the appellant within the time allowed for furnishing Security for Costs of Appeal of such a sum as shall be sufficient to cover the expense of making the two aforesaid copies, and when such deposit shall have been made, and not till then, to declare the Appeal admitted, and to give notice thereof to the Appellant and Respondent respectively.
