BY THE HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

No. 350 of 1844.—With reference to G. G. O. No. 173 of the 8th March last, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following subsidiary orders, respecting the different officers and persons entitled to share in the Scinde Donation Batta :—

- Major General Commanding the Scinde Force.
- Brigadiers or Officers having Staff or Official Rank.
- Superintending Surgeon.
- Chaplains.

The rate of Donation Batta, is the Staff allowance and Tentage drawn by the Major General.
 The Batta of their Regimental Rank.
 The Batta of Captain.
 Chaplain Major's Batta, Assist. Chaplain, Captain's ditto.
 Officers, both for the battles and for service in Scinde, are held on the 28th February last, notwithstanding that any back rank which they may obtain, may extend beyond that date.

Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers promoted, to receive the Batta of the Regimental Rank which they held on the 28th February last, notwithstanding that any back rank which they may obtain, may extend beyond that date.
 Heirs of deceased officers and men.
 of European officers and men ; not to those of Native Troops, whose Heirs are provided for by existing regulations.
 Subordinate medical servants, including Native Hospital assistants and apprentices.

The donation will be extended to the Heirs and Assigns of European officers and men ; not to those of Native Troops, whose Heirs are provided for by existing regulations.
 Batta of their Rank.

Regimental Followers of European and Native Corps, Artificers of the Ordnance Department.
 Commissariat Native Establishments, and clerks in public offices, European and Native.

Not entitled.

Sepoys and other native ranks.

Batta at the rate of 3 Rupees per mensem for all Classes.
 The established rate of dry Batta Rs. 6-5-4 per mensem.

European soldiers.

The same rate of Batta as the Bengal Irregular Cavalry.

Scinde Irregular Horse and Poona Auxiliary Horse.

Donation Batta comprehends Full Batta, whether claimable by Europeans or Natives in receipt of Batta.
 The amount of Batta for deceased European officers and men, is to be drawn in a separate abstract by officers commanding Regiments or Detachments, accompanied by a nominal Roll, shewing whether the Heirs or Assigns of the men are present as only in the event of their presence, the amount will be issued by Pay Masters, for the purpose of being paid over under the orders and responsibility of the Commanding Officers. In cases where the Heirs and Assigns are not present, the amount will be transferred by Pay Masters to the General Treasury for deposit, until legally claimed.

European soldiers and native officers and men absent from their corps, will be drawn for on rejoining.
 Paymasters of Her Majesty's Troops are to draw the amount of Donation Batta due on account of officers and men deceased in this country without Heirs, and also on account of officers who have gone home, and remit the amount to the Regimental agent in the same manner, as the effects of deceased officers and men are usually remitted.
