GENERAL ORDERS.

BY THE HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 17TH OCTOBER 1844.

No. 576 of 1844.—Under the authority of the Government of India, the Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to direct, that the following rules regarding Contingent Bills, and the forms of Declaration attached thereto, be introduced under this Presidency, in substitution of those laid down in section 18 Paras. 10 and 12 of Jameson's Code.

Pay and Audit Regulations Page 620.

“When the amount of a contingent charge has been disbursed before Audit of the Bill, the Officer drawing it shall attach thereto a written attestation of such actual disbursement. If the claim be made by a subordinate Officer, he shall affirm upon honor that the charge was actually incurred, and his superior Officer, who warrants the expense, will certify the same according to the best of his knowledge and belief, in countersigning the Bill.

The following is the form of declaration prescribed in such cases.

“I do hereby declare upon my Honor that the sums contained in this Bill have been actually expended by me for the purpose set forth.”

In all cases of contingent Bills, submitted for Audit, previous to actual disbursements of their amount, the drawer will make the following attestation.

“I do declare upon my Honor that the above charges of Company's Rupees—have been necessarily incurred, and will be paid by me for the purpose set forth.

B., Commanding the Southern Division of the Army, and from Lieutenant Colonel Wallace, of the 20th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, announcing the Capture by Storm on the morning of the 13th instant, of the Fort of Samanghur, occupied by a body of Insurgent Ghudkurries; and the defeat by a Detachment of the 5th Madras Light Cavalry, under Captain Græme, of another body of Insurgents who had approached that Fortress, with the object of relieving the Garrison and raising the siege.

In publishing these documents, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council has the greatest satisfaction in expressing the high sense he entertains of the gallantry and Soldier-like conduct displayed by the Officers and Men of all Arms, composing the Force engaged in these operations.

SIR,

Yesterday was occupied in breaching the Walls in two places, in the evening one was reported practicable by the Engineer. It is with heartfelt satisfaction I communicate the following. A storming party was prepared to storm at day break this morning, two columns under the Command of Major Clemons, of the 20th Regiment Madras N. I. At day break the first column entered and stormed the breach, closely followed by the second, all opposition was soon overcome, and in half an hour the storming party had entire possession of the Fort of Samanghur. All have behaved in a most gallant manner. Lieutenant Margary Executive Engineer, was with the leading column. The loss on our side has been trifling; one Sepoy of the 20th Regiment Madras Native Infantry killed, and four privates of the 2nd European L. I. wounded; about 70 were found killed of the Enemy and 150 taken prisoners in the Fort.

On the storming Parties entering the Fort, numbers endeavoured to make their escape, but were cut up by the Cavalry, who were patrolling for that purpose. Numbers have been taken prisoners attempting to escape, among the number the Rebel Subana Nickum, of notoriety, who has been severely wounded by Sabre cuts.

The Cavalry and portion of the storming party had scarcely returned to their lines when the Enemy were discovered on an Eminence in considerable numbers, when I deemed it necessary to send the Cavalry in pursuit, followed by one hundred Europeans and two hundred Sepoys. The Enemy being closely pursued formed into a body to receive the Cavalry who charged them, and killed upwards of one hundred, and brought into Camp nearly two hundred prisoners.

I have only time to make this hasty report the particulars will be forwarded by tomorrow's post for His Excellency's information.

SIR,

With reference to my letter of yesterday's date No. 644, hastily written, reporting for His Excellency's information, the capture of the important Fortress of Samanghur, I now do myself the honor to forward Lieutenant Colonel Wallace's detailed account of the operations of the Siege, and that Officer's arrangements, which from time to time met with my entire concurrence and approbation; the energy, activity and skilful Military knowledge displayed by that Officer, were fully developed in the dispositions made for the attack and storming of the Breach at the dawn of day, to which I attribute the little loss we have sustained; the advance was fired upon from the Breach and flanks, but a feeble resistance was made at the breach; the principal leaders taken in the Fort acknowledge they were taken by surprise; many however defended their houses inside the Fort.

I have now the pleasing task of reporting the valuable services of Captain Græme, and the wing of the 5th Regiment of Madras Cavalry under his Command, who arrived from Sholapore, just in time, after a most arduous and fatiguing march, to render us most important aid, in preventing the escape of the Garrison, which was most successfully carried into execution, and immediately after, the complete destruction of a body of the enemy, who had the temerity to approach within three Miles of our Camp, to succour the Garrison of Samanghur, and which I was an Eye witness to.

Captain Græme's report is attached to Lieutenant Colonel Wallace's, together with Major Clemon's and other Officers, employed on this occasion in Command of their several parties, to which I beg to refer His Excellency, together with the report of casualties, which I am truly happy to state, are few in number.

To Lieutenant Colonel Wallace, I am particularly indebted for his Zeal and persevering exertions on all occasions; and I should not be doing justice, were I to omit to bring to His Excellency's notice, the praiseworthy conduct of every Officer and individual composing this Force, who have on all and every occasion, under great privation, fatigue, and inclemency of the weather, carried on their duty in a most cheerful and soldier-like manner.

Camp before Samanghurh.

Sir,

In continuation of my report up to the 7th Instant, I have now the honor to state, that working parties were sent down daily from the 8th to the 12th Instant, for the purpose of dragging up the Breaching Guns, aided by Elephants and Gun Bullocks; two eighteen Pounders having been by very great exertion brought up to the Tote in front of Bheemas Temple late in the evening of the 10th, and kept during the night under cover, were placed in Battery before daylight in the morning of the eleventh, it being considered advisable to knock away the enemy's defences, flanking the approaches to the proposed Breaches. During these days, shelling continued throughout the day, and occasionally during the night; at noon of this day, a third Eighteen pounder was brought up and immediately placed in Battery with the others; after knocking away the defences, the Guns commenced breaching the South Western Bastion opposite the Bheema Temple; on the 12th, the Breaching was continued, on the forenoon of which day the fourth eighteen pounder was brought up and immediately placed in battery.

At 3 o'clock p. m. this day, the Commanding Engineer closely reconnoitred the two Breaches, and recommended that all the Guns should be turned upon the smaller breach which had been made in a tower to the right of the South West Bastion, and at sunset, he having reported this breach practicable, and the one on the South West sufficiently prepared for escalade, immediate arrangements were made for the storming of the Fort at day light the following morning.

I directed the * Troops, divided into two Columns, under the Command of Major Clemons of the 20th Regiment N. I. to be in readiness at half past 4 O'clock; the first column under Captain Jones to assemble in a tope a little in advance of the Bheemah Temple; and the second Column under Captain Gillanders, at the base of the hill upon which the Fort stands, and immediately fronting the right breach.

The Artillery Detachment under Lieutenant Jones, one hundred men of the 20th Regiment Madra's Native Infantry, 50 men of the 23rd Light Infantry, under Ensign Nightingale, the whole under command of Captain Middlecoat of the Artillery was held in reserve at the Breaching Battery. Orders were sent to Lieutenant Snow, Commanding the Detachment in the Pettah consisting of thirty-two men of the 2nd Bombay European Light Infantry, one Company of the 20th Regt. M. N. I. under Ensign Hutchinson, and one Company of the 21st Bombay Native Infantry, to be in readiness a little before day-break and to make a diversion before the gateway on that side of the fort, with skirmishers in advance. Similar orders were sent to Captain Strettle, Commanding the detachment, as per margin, at the Commanding hill, to make a diversion from that side by advancing in two Columns with Skirmishers in front. Instructions were likewise sent to the Officer Commanding the post near the gate on the East side of the Fort to place the men in extended order under the

80 Men of the 2nd Bombay European Light Infantry Commanded by Capt. Jones.

The Grenadier & Light Company of the 20th Regt. M. N. I. the latter by Captain Church, with Lieutenant Coleridge and Ensign Wallace, the former by Lieut. London, with Ensign Robson, Grenadier Company of the 21st B. N. I. Commanded by Captain Prior.

The Rifle Company Commanded by Lieut. Shaw, was sent forward with orders to place the men under the natural cover afforded close to the Fort near our left Breach as circumstances would admit.

70th Men of the 2nd B. E. Regt. L. I. Commanded by Lieutenant Savill, with 150 men

of the 23rd L. I. Commanded by Capt. Tapp, with Lieutenant Dickson, and Ensign Nightingale, 50th Men of the 23rd L. I. were ordered to be placed under the natural cover afforded, and as close to the right Breach as circumstances would admit.

One Company of the 20th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, under Ensign Cornwall, one Company of the 21st Bombay Native Infantry, under Ensign Proctor, with a nine pounder Gun, with a proportion of Artillery.

the circumstance, of numbers of the enemy killed, wounded and Prisoners taken during the storm.

I beg to report that the arrangements directed by me during the night of the 12th, were fully carried out on the morning of the 13th, by the several Officers Commanding, and completely succeeded by the zeal and gallantry displayed by the Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, Rank and File, both European and Native, of each arm of the service employed upon this occasion, to all of whom my thanks are specially due.

To Major Clemons of the 20th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, Commanding the Storming Party, and to Captains Gillanders and Jones, of the 2nd Bombay European Light Infantry, Commanding the Right and Left attacking columns, I feel highly indebted for the manner the storming party was led, and the arrangements made to beat the enemy out of the Fort, after the troops had carried the Breach.

To Captain Græme of the 5th Madras Cavalry, my thanks are due for the effectual measures he adopted to prevent the escape of the Garrison during the storm, and for the prompt movement and energetic attack, subsequently made upon a large body of the enemy, assembled about two miles upon a hill in his front, having been present and seen the zeal and gallantry displayed by Captain Græme and his Wing, when charging the Enemy, enables me to express my thanks and acknowledgments to Captain Græme and his Wing for their conduct on this brilliant occasion, by which a large body of the enemy were completely broken, and dispersed, leaving between two and three hundred of their number dead upon the field, and about one hundred and fifty prisoners. My thanks are also due to Captain Middlecoat, for the measures he adopted, to knock away the defences and effecting the two Breaches, as also to Lieutenant Margary, the Commanding Engineer, who altogether with Lieutenant Campbell, of the 2nd European Light Infantry, first ascended the Breach, closely followed by the storming party.

I cannot conclude without giving expression to the feelings of pride and gratification. I cannot but entertain when an Officer of Lieutenant Colonel Outram's high Character, well known gallantry, and established fame, placed his valuable services at my disposal not only during the storm of the Fort of Samangurh, but during the subsequent operations, of the same day of the Wing of the 5th Light Cavalry under Captain Græme, against a large body of the enemy, on both these occasions Lieutenant Colonel Outram's services were valuable, and I have requested Lieutenant Colonel Outram c. b. in this day's order to accept my best thanks and grateful acknowledgments.

During the several operations carried on yesterday, both against the Fort of Samangurh and on the plains, the losses sustained by the Enemy in killed may be computed at between five and six hundred, and of Prisoners about the same number, making a total of about eleven or twelve hundred Men, among whom are several Chiefs and influential Men; whilst the loss on our side was trifling, which I entirely attribute to the zeal and ability of the several Officers and the energetic gallantry of the Troops engaged under the protection and guidance of a merciful providence.

I beg to append Reports from Major Clemons, Captains Græme, and Strettell marked A. B. C. D. and E.

The return of killed and wounded is herewith transmitted.

It is a source of great satisfaction to me that the Major General Commanding the Division was present, and observed the several operations carried on against the Fort of Samangurh, and the Cavalry attack on the plains.

Agreeably to the orders received from the Officer Commanding Field Force, I have the honor to report I took command of the storming party this morning, which was divided into two separate columns, the first as per margin, was commanded by Captain Jones 2nd B. E. L. I. and the second as per margin by Captain Gillanders 2nd B. E. L. I. By day break the first party entered and stormed the breach, closely followed by Captain Gillanders. All opposition was soon overcome, and in half an hour the storming party under my command had entire possession of the Fort of Samangur. When all have behaved with gallantry, it is difficult to particularize, but I feel much pleasure in bringing to the notice of the Officer Commanding the gallant conduct of both Captain Gillanders and Captain Jones Commanding the two parties, nobly and ably supported by all the officers under their respective commands. Also the Rifle Company of the 16th Regiment under Lieutenant Shaw, which did good service in covering our advance. My thanks are due to Lieutenant and Adjutant White, who ably supported and was present with me when Ensign Robson planted the British ensign on the breach and which was carried there by Havildar Nuraiyin Abidiah.

I must beg to bring to the notice of the Officer Commanding that Lieutenant Margary, Engineers, was present with the leading column and ably supported the attack.

The loss on our side, I am happy to report, is trifling, one Sepoy Light Company 20th Regiment killed, and four Privates of the Europeans wounded; about 70 of the Enemy were killed, and I conceive about 150 Prisoners were taken in the Fort.

I have assumed command of the Fort agreeably to the orders of Lieutenant Colonel Wallace, and have made the necessary arrangements for its protection and the preservation of order.

Agreeably to instructions received last evening, I marched shortly before day break for the purpose of keeping up a chain from the Pettah towards Major Clemon's hill, and preventing the escape of the Enemy on that side. I had scarcely time to form different outposts when the enemy were seen coming over the high ground within musket shot of my detachments. Each party immediately advanced to the attack, and I have every reason to believe that few escaped. At a rough guess, I should say about 70 or 80 of the Enemy were left dead on the field, and 155 Prisoners, all well armed when taken, are in my camp. I have every reason to be satisfied with the conduct of every one under my command, and trust the major general Commanding will be so also.

SIR,

I have the honor to report, for the information of the Major General Commanding the Division that under instructions conveyed to me by Colonel Outram, by order of Brigadier Wallace, to keep a large body of armed men, who had made their appearance immediately to my front, about 1½ mile distant, in play, until such time as the Infantry could be sent down, I mounted the Wing of the Regiment under my Command, which had but just returned from the heavy morning's work already reported, and proceeded at once towards them. The Enemy seeing me advance immediately made off at a slow pace to their right towards a large Village situated at the foot of the hill on which they had formed. I kept on at a brisk pace, through wet grain fields, Quagmires and Morasses, and just before my crossing the Hurrikary River the Enemy formed up and threw out to all appearances skirmishers; seeing however that the River was no impediment to me, they again made off as soon as they saw the head of my Column debouching from its bed. Here I gave the Horses a little breathing, and then continued the pursuit about two or three miles from the River, the main body of the Enemy formed up in line, and I was in hopes they were going to contest the Field with me, but after sounding a Trumpet and beating a Drum (both captured) and discharging a few shots, I replied to them by sounding the charge, and in less than 10 minutes, the Field was strewn with dead. Here I was joined by Brigadier Wallace and Lieutenant Margary, who continued with me during the pursuit. Such of the Enemy as had not here fallen, endeavoured to escape through the high grain, but were overtaken and either killed or made Prisoners, with the exception of some 15 to 20 Men, who taking advantage of the very bad ground intersected with Nullahs, almost impassable, made off in the direction of the Hills. These it was not considered necessary to follow much further, the pursuit having already extended about 10 miles; so collecting the Prisoners to the number of 138, I retraced my steps to camp. On a moderate calculation, I should say not less than 250 of the Enemy were killed and wounded on the field. I am happy to say the casualties are very trifling; a return accompanies this report. I cannot conclude this statement without expressing my sense of the obligations I feel myself to lie under to Colonel Outram, who accompanied me throughout, and to whose experience and guidance I attribute much of the success of the day. Of the conduct of all the Officers (European and Native) and men under my command, I cannot speak in too high terms of praise, and I feel an inward conviction that every man did his duty most willingly and with credit to the service.

SIR,

I have the honor to send you 32 Prisoners, and I have to report for the information of the Officer Commanding the Field Force that an equal number of men were killed by the Detachment under my Command. I have no doubt that the whole of the rebels who attempted their escape would have fallen to the share of my men, had not the Cavalry come up at the time. I was engaged with them, but fearing lest my men should injure the Cavalry, I was obliged to sound the "Halt" and "Cease fire." The effective assistance I have rendered on this occasion, I can ascribe only to the able instructions I had previously received from Colonel Wallace. I have the honor to mention that my party consisted of one hundred and twenty (120) rank and file of the 20th M. N. I. and 21st B. N. I. (50 of the 21st B. N. I. and 70 of the 20th M. N. I.)
