The following letter, relative to an error in the position assigned in the Charts to the Lac-kadive Islands and the Shoals in their vicinity, is published for general information,

To,

CAPTAIN JOHN PEPPER,

Act. Superintendent of the Indian Navy.

SIR,

I beg to bring to your notice, that on the arrival report of the Barque "Falcon," on the 8th instant, it is stated that the vessel struck on the Byramgore shoal, of the Lackadives, when by her reckoning her Latitude was 12° 1' North, and Longitude 71° 40' East of Green-tion of the Vessel would appear to the Commander to be 23 miles to the Westward of the shoal, and in the second case 18' 20,"

My object in addressing you, is to point out, that the dangers of the Lackadiyes group, are all placed 18" miles of Longitude too much Easterly, on the Chart of the most recent Survey, executed by Captain Moresby of the Indian Navy in 1828, an error which is likely to prove fatal to some ships passing to the Westprove ratar to some snips passing to the west-ward of the group on their passage to this Port. In justice to Captain Moresby, I would state, that the error arises from the Longitude of Mangalore Flag Staff at the time of the Survey, being allowed to be 18' 18" to the Eastward of the correct position, as determined by the grand trigonometrical operations, with reference to the Longitude of Madras Observa-

The first station at the Lackadives, was the Cherbaniane Bank, and the distance between it and Mangalore Flag Staff was determined by Chronometric admeasurement, after which all the other Islands and dangers were determined, from the Cherbaniane Bank, consequently the relative bearings and distances of each must be correct, but the erroneous Longitude East of Greenwich affects the

I would beg to suggest, that notice be given to Ship Masters (who may be navigating by that Chart) of the necessity of deducting 181 miles of Longitude from the positions assigned to the Banks and Islands of the Lackadives, to obtain their correct position.

The Honorable the Governor in Council having approved of the following Rules for the guidance of the Water Division of Police, in respect to Arab Vessels frequenting this Port, they are published for general information.

Great irregularity appearing to prevail in the arrangements on the departure of Native boats from the harbour of Bombay; the follow-

ing rules are to be hereafter enforced.

I. All Arab boats arriving in Bombay, not using a Pilot, shall report their arrival at the Police Office, when the names of the crew and passengers, and any extraordinary occurrence which may have happened, will be taken down in writing by the Deputy Superintendent of the Water Division, and a report made to the

Senior Magistrate of Police.

II. Two days previous to the departure of the Vessel, the Nacquodah or Tindal shall report to the Police Office, any casualty or other peculiar circumstance which may have occurred on board the Vessel while it has been in the harbour, together with the names of all passengers proceeding in her; this information is, if necessary, to be verified by search under the orders of the Deputy Superintendent of the Water Division.

III. A certificate that this has been duly performed will be given by the Deputy Super-intendent of the Water Division, and without which, the certificate from the Senior Magis-

trate of Police will be withheld.

IV. All boats shall, one day previous to their departure, anchor as near as possible to the Police Hulk, in order that they may be overhauled and their crews mustered before leaving the port.

V. In reference to the embarkation of Pil-grims, the following rules will be in future ob-

When an application for a clearance VI. is made by the Nacquodah of the vessel, he will deliver in a list of the intended Pilgrim passengers, an officer of the Water Division will then proceed on board and inspect the vessel, compare the list with the Pilgrims on board, and certify before the Senior Magistrate the state of the vessel, the correctness of the list, &c.

VII. Until this is done no certificate will

be granted. VIII. The officer who proceeds on this duty of inspection, should inspect personally the place allotted to each Pilgrim in the vessel, and to each Pilgrim should be allowed a space of five feet in length, and two and a half feet in breadth.

IX. If the number of Pilgrims be reported by the inspecting Officer as too great, steps should be taken to ensure the removal of the

extra portion to some other vessel.

X. Vessels should not be allowed to sail, leaving any of their Pilgrim passengers on

XI. The freight and passage money should also be ascertained and noted down, to prevent imposition, and the food and water provided for the Pilgrims on board, should form a subject of proper enquiry to the inspecting Officer.

FORT WILLIAM, HOME DEPARTMENT. LEGISLATIVE.

THE 16TH NOVEMBER, 1844.
The following Act is brought up before the Legislative Council this day .- The Governor General of India in Council being desirous that no time

should be lost in passing the Act-Resolved,—That the Rule requiring that no. Draft of a Law should be ordered to be published till at least one week shall have elapsed from the day on which it was first laid before the Council of India in its Legislative Department, and that the Rules requiring that all Acts of the Governor General of India in Council shall be brought up for second reading in two months, or in three months from the date of the first reading, be suspended in respect to the following proposed Act, and that it be at once passed into Law.

ACT NO. XXI. OF 1844.

An Act for regulating the Emigration of the Native Inhabitants of the Territories under the Government of the East India Company to Jamaica,

British Guiana and Trinidad.

I. It is hereby enacted, that Act No. XIV. of 1839, and all Acts repealed thereby so far as the same are applicable to the Emigration of Natives from the Ports of Calcutta, Madras and Bombay respectively, to Jamaica, British Guiana, and Trinidad, respectively are repealed. Provided always that the aforesaid Act No. XIV. of 1839 shall remain in full force in all the Ports of India, except the Ports aforesaid, and in regard to Emigrants from India proceeding to other places than Jamai-ca, British Guiana, Trinidad and Mauritius. II. And it is hereby enacted, that after the

passing of this Act, Emigrant Laborers, being Native inhabitants of the Territories under the Govern-ment of the East India Company, shall be allowed to pass and to be conveyed to Jamaica, British Guiana, and Trinidad respectively, from the Ports of Calcutta, Madras and Bombay respectively, but

not otherwise.

111. And it is hereby enacted, that at each of the three Ports aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the Government of the Presidency within which the Port is situated, to authorize such persons as may be nominated by the Governments of Jamaica, British Guiana or Trinidad, to act as Emigration Agents at the aforesaid Ports respectively, and to exercise the powers conferred on Emigration Agents by this Act, and every such Emigration Agent shall make Monthly Reports to the Government to which he is subordinate of all matters transacted by him in pursuance of this Act.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that at each of the three Ports aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the Government of the Presidency within which the Port is situated to nominate a proper person to act as Protector of Emigrants at the aforesaid Ports res-

pectively.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall not be lawful to convey any Emigrant, being a Native of India, who may embark for the purpose of laboring for hire in any of the Colonies of Jamaica, British Guiana or Trinidad from any of the Ports aforesaid in any Ship or Vessel, unless a licence be obtained. obtained for carrying Emigrants in such Ship or Vessel from the Government of the Presidency in which the Port is situated. A fee not exceeding One Rupee per Emigrant as may be regulated from time to time by the local Gover ment, shall be demandable in respect of every such licence, which fee shall be carried to the credit of the said Government, and the granting or withholding any such licence shall be entirely discretionary with the Government, and in consideration of such licence the Master of every Ship conveying or destined to convey Emigrants from India, shall execute a Bond binding himself and his Owners in a penal sum of 10,000 Rupees to conform to the several conditions herein provided, and the said Bond shall be exccuted in duplicate that it may be put in suit either at the place of execution or in the Colony to which the Emigrants are to be conveyed, and one copy shall be forwarded to the Government of such Colony to be dealt with as the case may require. And every Ship or Vessel in which any such Emigrant shall be conveyed without a licence being obtained as aforesaid, shall be liable to be forfeited, and the Master thereof shall be liable as for a misdemeanor in a fine of 1000 Rupees for every such Emigrant so illegally conveyed.

And it is hereby enacted, that it shall not be lawful for the Master of any Vessel licensed as above, to receive on board any Emigrant laborer, as above provided, unless such laborer shall have in his possession and show a Certificate or Pass to be given to him by the Emigration Agent of the Port, countersigned by the Protector, stating his name and the name of his father and his age, and certifying that having appeared before such Agent he has declared his willingness to proceed to work for hire in the Colony to which such Vessel is bound, and has been engaged by him as an Emigrant to such Colony on the part of the Govern-

ment thereof,

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that before any Ship or Vessel so licensed to carry Emigrant la-borers as above provided, shall be cleared out from any of the aforesaid Ports, for any one of the three Colonies aforesaid, it shall be necessary for the Master of such Ship or Vessel, provided any Emigrant of the description aforesaid, shall embark therein to obtain from the Emigration Agent so nominated and authorized at such Port as aforesaid, a certificate under the hand of such Agent to the effect following, that is to say-

That such Agent has by personal communication done what is required on the part of such Agent by the 3d Article of the Schedule hereunto annexed, provided always that every such Agent shall make the inquiries specified in such Schedule in an open Court or public office to which all per-

sons shall have admission.

2dly. That all the directions contained in the 4th, 5th, 6th, and 7th Articles of the said Schedule for ensuring the health and safety of Passengers

have been duly complied with.

3dly. That (in addition to the directions contained in the said Schedule) such rules have been complied with as the Governor General in Council shall from time to time frame, touching the medical attendance and medical stores and the proper clothing to be provided, the species of provisions suited to native habits, the number of women that should

accompany the Emigrants, or other matters.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that the probable lengths of the voyages to Jamaica, British

Guiana and Trinidad from the Ports aforesaid respectively, shall for the purposes of this Act be deemed to be

For the Port of Calcutta twenty weeks; For the Port of Madras nineteen weeks ;

For the Port of Bombay nineteen weeks; and that no Ship or Vessel carrying Emigrant laborers to Jamaica, British Guiana or Trinidad shall sail from Calcutta, Madras or Bombay, at any other time than between the 30th day of any September and the 1st of March next thereafter

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that before any Ship or Vessel shall be cleared out from any of the aforesaid Ports for Jamaica, British Guiana or Trinidad, it shall be necessary for the Master thereof to deliver to the Emigration Agent, so nominated and authorized at such Port as aforesaid, the list specified in Article 10 of the said Schedule, and to obtain such duplicate thereof as is required by the said Article.

And it is hereby enacted, that if the Master of any Ship or Vessel shall at any of the Ports aforesaid, take on board such ship or Vessel any Emigrant laborer of the description aforesaid, and shall clear such Ship or Vessel for Jamaica, British Guiana or Trinidad, without having fully complied with every particular hereinbefore required previous to clearance, he shall be liable on conviction before any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, in a penalty of 200 Rupees for every Emigrant laborer so taken

on board his Ship or Vessel,

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that if the Master of any Ship or Vessel shall after having cleared such Ship or Vessel at any such Port as aforesaid for Jamaica, British Guiana or Trinidad, take on board any such Emigrant laborer as aforesaid without having entered such Emigrant laborer in such list as aforesaid, or without having obtained such duplicate as aforesaid containing the entry of such Emigrant prior to clearance, he shall be liable on conviction before any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace in a penalty not exceeding 500 Rupees for every Emigrant so taken on board his Ship or Ves-

XII. And it is hereby enacted, that if any Master of any Ship or Vessel cleared for Jamaica, British Guiana or Trinidad as aforesaid shall after having obtained such Certificate as aforesaid fraudulently do or suffer to be done any act or thing whereby such Certificate shall become inapplicable to the altered state of the Ship or Vessel, its Passengers or other matters to which such Certificate relates, such Master shall be liable on conviction in any Penalty not exceeding 5000 Rupees, beside incurring a forfeiture of any Bond executed in consideration of any licence obtained for the

Vessel as originally.described.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, for the greater security against Emigrant laborers being embarked for Jamaica, British Guiana or Trinidad, contrary to the provisions of this Act, that all the powers vested by law in the Officers of Customs in regard to the searching and detention of Ships or Vessels, or otherwise for the prevention of smuggling on board thereof, may be exercised by such Officers for the prevention of the illegal embarkation of such Emigrants as aforesaid on board Ships or Vessels bound for Jamaica, British Guiana or Trinidad, and of other offences against this Act; and it is further enacted, that all Pilots in the service of the East India Company shall be invested with the same powers and be charged with the same duties as Preventive Officers of Customs in this behalf.

And it is hereby enacted, that every person who shall attempt by means of intoxication or by false imprisonment, or other means of crimping to export any Native on beard any Ship or Vessel contrary to the provision of this Act shall be liable to be punished on conviction before a Magistrate in a fine not exceeding 500 Rupees, or imprisonment not exceeding six months, provided that nothing in this Act contained shall prevent the offender from being proceeded against by indictment, but the offender shall only be liable

to one of these courses of proceeding.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever a Vessel shall clear from Calcutta for Jamaica, Rritish Guiana or Trinidad with Emigrant la-borers duly embarked thereon, the Customs Officer on board such Vessel shall countersign the Pass or Certificate brought on board such Vessel, by every such Emigrant laborer, and shall keep a Register of every such Emigrant laborer as may come on board. And such Customs Officer shalt remain on board such Vessel until she shall arrive in Saugor Roads and shall not come away until a muster of the Crew and Passengers and Emigrant laborers has been made in his presence and in that of the Pilot in charge of the Vessel; and after the Customs Officer has taken muster and quitted the Vessel the Pilot shall continue to exercise the duties indicated in Section XIII. of this Act, and it shall be lawful for him if he shall deem it necessary to require the Master or Commander to take a general muster of the Crew and Passengers and Emigrant laborers on board and to sign a muster roll so taken, and every such Custom House Officer and Pilot shall make a complete report of the Emigrant laborers on board of any Ship at the time of his quitting the same, and such report shall contain a declaration that to the best of the Declarant's belief, no additional Emigrant laborers have been received on board since obtaining the Certificate, and that nothing else has been done or omitted to be done in the Ship or Vessel contrary to the provisions of this Act, and every such report or muster, if any, shall be transmitted without delay to the Emigration Agent of the Port. And any Custom House Officer or Pilot who shall wilfully make a false, erroneous or in-complete Report of the Emigrant laborers on board of any Ship, or who shall connive at the unauthorized embarkation of any such Emigrant laborers, shall be liable, besides dismissal, to a fine of 500 Rupees, commutable, if not paid, to imprisonment in the Calcutta Jail for six months and the penalty shall be adjudged in like manner as similar penalties are adjudged for offences committed in respect to the Custom Revenue.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that if any person shall forge or shall use knowing it to be forged, any document required by this Act such person shall be liable to be imprisoned for any

period not exceeding seven years.

XVII. And it is hereby enacted, that all the several penalties to which the Masters of Ships or Vessels are liable by this Act, shall be enforced by information laid before any Justice of the Peace at the instance of the Emigration Agent or of any Officer appointed for the purpose by the Government of the Place or Presidency, or may be enforced by putting in suit the Bond given by the Master, if such Bond has been given in consideration of the licence granted to the Ship.

SCHEDULE.

1. The Governors of Jamaica, British Geiana and Trinidad may from time to time nominate such persons as they shall see fit to act as Emigration Agents at Calcutta, Madras and Bombay.

2. The remuneration to be given to any such Agent in In lia, shall not depend upon or be regulated by the number of the Emigrants sent by him but shall be in the nature of an Annual

Salary.

3. Every such Enigration Agent shall ascertain by personal communication with every Emigrant previously to his or her embarkation from the Port or Place for which such Agent shall have been appointed, that such Emigrant has not been induced to emigrate by any fraud, false or unreasonable expectation, and is aware of the distance of the Colony to which he or she is about to emigrate from the place where he or she is about to embark; and such Agent shall explain the real advantages likely to be derived by such Emigrant from a removal to such Colony, at the same time eautioning such Emigrant against unreasonable and unwarrantable expectations; and such Agent shall also ascertain that every such Emigrant is in good health, and not incapacitated from labour by old age, bodily infirmity or disease.

It shall not be lawful to ship on board of any Ship or Vessel carrying Emigrants from India to any of the Colonies aforesaid, any number of Passengers exceeding the proportion of one person . for every two tons of the registered burthen of such Ship or Vessel, and no such Ship or Vessel carrying Emigrants and having more than one deck, shall have less than the height of six feet at the least between decks, and in case such Ship or Vessel shall have only one deck, a platform shall be laid beneath such deck and in such manner as to afford a space of the height of six feet at the least, and that such platform shall not be so laid as that the lower beams shall project above the same, and that no such Ship or Vessel shall have more than two tiers of berths, and that no such Ship or Vessel shall carry Passengers on any such voyage to any of the Colonies aforesaid, unless there shall be an interval of six inches at least between the deck or platform and the floor of the lower tier throughout the whole extent thereof; and whatever may be the tonnage of the Ship or Vessel, no greater number of Passengers shall be taken on board of such Ship or Vessel than shall be after the rate of one such person for every twelve superficial feet of the lower deck or platform unoccupied by goods or stores not being the personal luggage of such person.

5. In the computation of the number of Passengers within the meaning of these Regulations, two Children under the age of ten years shall be considered as equal to, and shall be reckoned as

one person only.

There shall be actually laden on board of every Ship or Vessel, conveying Emigrants into any of the Colonies aforesaid at the time of departure of such Ship or Vessel from the Port or Place at which such laborers shall be embarked. good and wholesome provisions for the use and consumption of the said Passengers over and above the victualling of the Crew, to the amount or in the eroportion following, that is to say, a supply of water to the amount of five gallons for every week of the computed Voyage for every Passenger on board such Ship or Vessel, such water being carried in Tanks or Sweet Casks, and a supply of Rice, Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Oatmeal, or Bread stuffs to the amount of seven pounds weight to every week of the computed voyage for every such Passenger; provided always that when any such Ship or Vessel shall be destined to call at a Port or Place in the course of her voyage, for the purpose of filling up her Water Casks, a supply of water at the rate beforementioned for every week of an average voyage to such Port or Place of calling shall be deemed

to be a compliance with this Regulation, and provided that the preceding Regulation regarding food shall be dremed to have been complied with in any case when it shall be made to appear, that by the special authority of the Governor General of India in Council any other articles of food were substituted for the articles above enumerated as being in his judgment equivalent thereto.

7. Before any such Ship or Vessel shall be cleared out on any such Voyage, the Agent appointed for the Port or Place from which such Ship or Vessel shall be cleared out, shall survey or cause to be surveyed by some competent person, the provisions and water hereinbefore required to be on board for the consumption of Passengers. and shall ascertain that the same are in good and sweet condition, and also that over and above the same there is on board an ample supply of water and stores for the victualling of the Crew of the Ship or Vessel, and shall also ascertain that such Ship or Vessel is generally reputed Sea-worthy and that the directions hereinbefore contained for ensuring the health and safety of the Passengers have been complied with, and shall grant a Certificate thereof under his hand to the Master of such Ship or Vessel.

8. The Master of every Ship or Vessel conveying Emigrants to Jamaica, British Guiana or Trinidad shall be bound to provide for and furnish to every such Emigrant and his wife and children, a sufficient quantity of good and wholesome Provisions for his, her and their daily maintenance during such voyage, and during the space of 48 hours next after the arrival of such Ship or Vessel

at the place of destination.
9. Two copies of these Regulations authenticated by the signature of the Agent at the Port or Place at which such Emigrants shall embark, shall be delivered to the Master by such Agent on demand at the time of clearance, and shall be kept on board of every Ship or Vessel carrying such Emigrants as aforesaid, and one of such copies shall upon request made at reasonable times to the Master of the Ship or Vessel be produced to

any Passenger for his perusal.

10. The Master of every Ship or Vessel carrying Emigrants from India to any of the three Colonies aforesaid, shall before clearing out such Ship or Vessel, deliver to such Agent at the Port or Place from which such Vessel is cleared out, a list in writing, together with a duplicate of the same, specifying as accurately as may be, the names, ages and occupations of all and every the Emigrants on board such Ship or Vessel, and such Agent shall thereupon deliver to the said Master the counterpart of such lists, signed by such Agent, and the said Master shall on the arrival of such Ship or Vessel at the place of destination, and previous to the disembarkation of any such Emigrants give notice of the arrival of such Ship or Vessel, and deliver the said counterpart of such list to the Protector of Emigrants appointed or to be appointed at the Colony at which the said Ship or Vessel may have arrived.

11. Provided always that nothing in these Regulations contained shall apply to any Ship or Vessel in the service of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, or to any of the Her Majesty's

Ships of War.

POLITICAL DEPARTMENT.

The Honorable the Governor in Council, is pleased to publish for general information, the following despatch with its enclosures, from Major General DeLamotte c. B., Commanding the Southern Division of the Army, dated the 3rd instant, announcing the Capture by Storm on the 1st instant, by a Force under his immediate command, of the strong Fortress of Punalla, and that the adjacent Fortress of Pawaghur was also on the same day taken possession of, by a portion of the Troops under his command, both of these Forts were occupied by a large body of insurgent Ghudkurrees and Seebundies, belonging to the Kolapore State,

In publishing these documents, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council performs a gratifying duty in expressing his high admiration of the gallantry and good conduct displayed by all ranks, European and Native, composing the Force, engaged in these operations.

The Hon'ble the Governor in Council begs in particular to offer his best thanks to Major General DeLamotte c. B. Commanding the Field Force; to Lieutenant Colonel Wallace of the 20th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, Commanding the 1st Brigade; to Lieutenant Colonel Brough, of Her Majesty's 2nd Regiment or Queen's Royals, Commanding the 2nd Brigade, and who gallantly led the storming party; to Lieutenant Colonel Harvey of Her Majesty's 14th Light Dragoons, who on the lamented death of Lieutenant Colonel Hickes, of the 2nd or Grenadier Regiment Native Infantry, succeeded to the command of the 3rd Brigade; to Lieutenant Colonel Poole, c. B. Commanding Her Majesty's 22nd Regiment, and to Lieutenant Colonel J. Outram, c. B. of the 23rd Regiment Bombay Native Infantry, who volunteered his services, and was among the foremost who entered the Fort of Punalla,

The thanks of Government are also specially due to Lieutenant Colonel Lloyd C. B., who commanded the Artillery, and to Major Peat C. B. commanding Engineer of the force, for the skill and judgement with which they conducted their respective departments.

The Hou'ble the Governor in Council is also pleased to publish a further despatch from Major General DeLamotte, c. B. of the 30th ultimo, with its enclosures, detailing the operations of a portion of the force under his command in capturing the Petta of Punalla, in the course of which Lieutenant Colonel Hickes of the 2nd Grenadier Regiment Bombay N. I. fell mortally wounded at the head of the 3rd Brigade.—

The Governor in Council deeply regrets the loss of this highly respected and meritorious officer, who after forty years of faithful and Honorable service, has thus closed his career, gloriously in the service of his Country.

THE ADJUTANT GENERAL OF THE ARMY.

Bombay.

No. 1 from Lieut. Col. Wallace, Commanding 1st Brigade. No. 2 from Lieut. Col. Brough, Commanding 2nd Brigade. No. 3 from Lieut. Col. Harvey, Commanding 3rd Brigade. No. 4 from Lieut. Col. Lloyd, Commanding the Artillery. With reference to my letter of yesterday's date I now do myself the honor to forward the several reports as noted in the margin, of the operations before the Forts of Punalla and Pownghur.

The breaching Battery having opened on the morning of the 1st within 350 yards of the walls of Punalla, which in two hours began to progress rapidly, I was convinced that a practicable breach would be effected in sufficient time to carry the place by storm with sufficient daylight to enable precautionary measures to be

taken to prevent the escape of the Insurgents during the night, I therefore ordered the storming party to be held in readiness under Lieutenant Colonel Brough, who had urgently solicited to command it, (two hundred of his own men composing the assaulting column) which I readily assented to; about 4 r. M. the breach was reported practicable, when I immediately ordered the advance from the breaching Battery: they were covered by the Field Pieces and Mortars most judiciously arranged to keep down the fire of the enemy, which was most efficiently carried into execution by Lieutenant Colonel Lloyd Commanding the Artillery.

The difficulty of reaching the walls was very great from the rugged and steep ascent which led to a ledge or path by which they were obliged to proceed, flanked by a very heavy fire from the walls, and large stones hurled down upon them as they advanced, which they did in a most gallant manner to the breach. Among the first and foremost I noticed Lieutenant Colonel Brough, Lieutenant Graham and the galfant Lieutenant Colonel Outram, c. B.; (Major Peat, c. B. when at the head of the storming party being temporarily disabled by a stone) Lieutenant Mardall and some Riflemen who I had observed had got close under the walls from the gateway side, after which I could not discriminate individuals. About half the storming party had entered the breach when the reserve advanced under Lieutenant Colonel Wallace, who seeing the difficulty of the ascent and time taken by the storming party, inclined to the right by a much easier route up a road which led to the gateway from whence the breach was reached.

In about an hour the place was entirely in our possession and every precautionary measure taken to prevent the escape of any of the insurgents during the night; but no correct information could be obtained regarding Babajee Ahirakur, the leader of the rebels: the following morning the bodies of Babajee Ahirakur and Appa Manga, the former the chief and latter one of the principal leaders of the Rebel Sebundies were found among the slain. Upwards of 2,000 Prisoners have been taken, two of the most important are Babajee Saloonker and Luximon Naik Jaddow, also the Killadars (Havildars) of Punalla and Pownghur.

The difficulty of closely investing these two forts has been very great from the magnitude and extent of the place, but many obstacles were overcome by the storm and taking of the North Pettah, by the 3rd Brigade under the late much to be lamented Lieutenant Colonel Hickes, who was killed on that occasion, Lieutenant Colonel Poole, c. B. Her Majesty's 22nd Regiment, and subsequently Lieutenant Colonel Harvey, Her Majesty's 14th Dragooms, who succeeded to the command of the 3rd Brigade; the vigilance of that Brigade throughout the siege contributed greatly to our success.

I beg now to bring to the favorable notice of His Excellency the Commander in Chief, Lieutenant Colonel Lloyd c. B. Commanding the Artillery, who conducted that branch of the service with great zeal and 'ability and who was most ably and zealously assisted by his staff Officer Captain Glasse; scattered as the Artillery not cessarily were between Camp and the several positions, his duties were difficult; but performed in a manner highly creditable to that Officer. Major Peat c. B. Commanding the Eugineers, whose zeal and indefatigable exertions, scientific skill and judgment are beyond all praise, ably assisted by Lieutenants Graham and Munbee of the Engineers and Lieutenant Aitchison of the 2nd European L. I. Acting Assistant in that Department, Brigadier Brough of Her Majesty's 2nd Queen's Commanding 2nd Brigade, who led the storming party in a most gallant manner, Brigadier Wallace of the 20th Regiment M. N. I. who commanded the Reserve, closely followed the storming party.

Lieutenant Colonel Outram, c. n. who on all and every occasion tendered his services and from whom I received valuable information and suggestions which I acted on with every confidence.

I followed the track of the storming party and entered the breach with the Reserve accompanied by the Assistant Adjutant General Captain Donnelly, the Assistant Quarter Master General Captain Adams, Captain Threshie of the Commissariat Department, and my Aid de Camp Lieutenant DeLamotte, whose aid and assistance gave me great satisfiction throughout in restoring order and checking excesses, which were less than could be possibly expected on such an occasion.

Where all have nobly performed their duty with a zeal and gallantry not to be surpassed, with that cordiality and good feeling, a proof of discipline and devotion to the service, I must refer His Excellency to the several reports herewith forwarded, wherein individuals are particularly named for His Excellency's consideration.

I beg to conclude with a short account of our progress from Budderghur, from the base of the hill, we marched on the 20th November, a distance of forty-seven miles, six furlongs to our present position. At day light on the 1st December the guns were in position at 350 yards, and at 4 r. M. the place was carried by assault, which compared with an extract from a confidential letter from Lieutenant Colonel Welsh in 1827 to Lieutenant Colonel Hardy, the Qr. Mr. General of the Bombay Army, who was well acquainted with the fort of Punalla, states, "with my present knowledge however of the only defects, I would undertake to capture it in 2 or, 3 months by excessive but certain labour," and is a Gibraltar on the Neilgherries.

The important capture of these Fortresses will be duly appreciated I have no doubt by his Excellency and the Government, and will I trust, be a sufficient proof that every exertion was made, and the siege carried on in a most vigorous and judicious manner.

I have the honor to forward the Return of killed and wounded, which, considering the extent of the operations carried on, it is gratifying to state are few in number, considering the strength of the Garrison and resistance made. Returns of the Ordnance and Ordnance Stores captured in both Forts are also herewith forwarded.

my command as per margin, assembled im-mediately behind the storming party near the breaching battery, and on the signal from the Major General for the advance of the Reserve to the breach, I moved forward, taking a road somewhat to the right of the breach, which I was induced to do in consequence of the difficulty which I observed was experienced by that portion of the storming party that advanced by the left.—The Reserve was thus enabled to enter the breach before a portion of the storming party.

The Major General having himself observed the conduct of all the troops engaged in the storming of Poonallaghur, renders any detailed report from me relative thereto superfluous.

In compliance with the desire of the Major General commanding, I do myself the honor to report that the *storming party which he did me the honor to place under my command last evening performed their duty with the utmost gallantry and devotion, but of this the Major General was himself a near observer.

It would be an injustice to the gallant few I had an opportunity of particularly noticing if I did not bear testimony to their conduct by notifying their names to the Major General.

The man who had the honor of first reaching the summit of the breach was Lieut. Graham of the Bombay Engineers; but an accident prevented his being the first to descend beyond it.—The heroic Lieut Colonel Outram c. B. was in his accustomed place, the front rank, and with him my Major of Brigade, Lieut. Addison 2nd or Queens Royal Regiment.—Capt. Jephson commanding the portion of the Queen's storming party, Capt. Price of the same Regiment, Capt. Gillanders commanding the portion of the 2nd Bombay European Lt. Infantry and Lieuts. Campbell and Saville of the same Regiment, Major Peat c. B. and Lieut. Munbee of the Bombay Engineers, crowded, I might say on to the same rank; I am unable to particularize further.

The individuals amongst the inferior grades whom I had an opportunity of particularly noticing were Serjeant Benjamin Dorkings, Privates Francis Connor, Peter McFarlane, Christopher Mooney, Hugh McAney, Michael McCutcheon, of the 2nd or Queen's and No. 6 Private Nicholson, No. 1 Private Forest of the 2nd Bombay European Light Infantry, and I know that Corporal John Jameson. Queen's, was particularly forward.

It gives me great satisfaction to state that the covering party formed by the Rifle Company of the 16th Madras Native Infantry, vied with the advance of the storming party for the post of honor.

I trust the Major General and Lieutenant Colonel Wallace, will excuse me referring to an Officer who for the moment ceased to be under my command .- I allude to Major Gilland in command of the Queen's, who from dangerous illness rose from his sick bed to lead his Regiment and was carried up the steep ascent and the breach by his men.

This circumstance could hardly have been known to Lieutenant Colonel Wallace, and will I trust serve as my excuse for mentioning the name of the old and gallant officer.

Camp of the 3rd Brigade of the Field Force, Northern side, Fortress of Punalla, 1st Dec. 1844.

I have the honor to state to you for the information of Major General DeLamotte, c. B. that having at past two P. M. received your intimation that the storm of the fortress of Punalla might probably take place soon after three, I immediatly carried into effect the arrangement I had previously made, namely, that Lieutenant Colonel Poole c. n. Commanding Her Majesty's 22nd Regiment and second in Command of the 3rd Brigade, should march upon the Post at the North Western end of the Pettah or village, for some days past occupied by Major Conway c. B., Her Majesty's 22nd Regiment with a strong Detachment of 300 mcn. Lieutenant Colonel Poole was requested to bring with him without loss of time the whole of the available Reserve force of the Brigade, consisting of about 200 men of his own Regiment and of less than half that number of the 2nd or Grenadier Regiment of Bombay Native Infantry, under Captain Hogg in chargesof the Head Quarters of that

This force united with the 200 of Her Majesty's 22nd and the 100 Grenadiers already in the Pettah under Major Conway, I knew, was fully sufficient to meet any force which the enemy could oppose directly to us in the position we should take up, if he chose to issue in force from the North Eastern gate and it was my intention thus to prevent the egress of any body of the enemy by thus opposing to him the whole mass of Major Conway's party closely supported by the Reserve, and to have met him face to face in the road leading from the gateway. It was necessary in the mean time to keep this advanced party well under cover from the incessant firing of Match-locks, Wall pieces, and large Guns, to which they had uninterruptedly been subjected for five days and nights locks, Wall pieces, and large Guns, to which they had uninterruptedly been subjected for five days and nights whenever they showed themselves, and not only from the North Eastern face of Panalla-Ghur but of heavy Guns on the North Western face of the adjoining fortress of Pawunghur. Having arranged with Lieutenant Colonel Poole c. B. to march immediately I at once preceded the Reserve, and took personal direction of Major Conway's advanced party with whom I arrived at about three P. M. I took with me also a small Detachment of Her Majesty's 14th Light Dragoons, and Bt. Capt. Chambré, who was placed at my disposal by Captain Shaw. At Major Conway's Post, there were 2 six pounder guns under Lieutenant Crawford, Bombay Artillery, very judiciously placed, and which had occasionally thrown spherical case shot with excellent effect over the enemy's parapets. These 2 guns I directed at once to be brought into a forward position which I had reconnoitred in the morning with Major Conway, and to be loaded with grape: my wishes were most ably and instantly seconded and attended to by Lieutenant Crawford.

These preliminaries were scarcely completed, and the Reserve were scarcely over the first range of Hills and

These preliminaries were scarcely completed, and the Reserve were scarcely over the first range of Hills and were eagerly ascending the second, being separated now but a short interval from the advance, when a cheer and a thrilling shout from the parapets of Punalla announced to us that the breach had been stormed.

We immediately rushed forward in the direction of the gateway, a few fugitives escaped down the hill by the ravine on our front and left, but no mass of the enemy came down from the gateway, and our own troops were distinctly seen in possession of Punalla; I therefore allowed the men no time for firing but pushed them on as rapidly as possible round the ravine in the direction of Pawunghur, and I am happy to be able to add briefly, that we succeeded in capturing that fortress. In advancing along the Pettah or village and round the head of the ravine by points much exposed to fire, I was surprised that we were not opposed by any guns from Pawunghur, and I concluded the enemy were evacuating the place. I therefore hurried on the men as much as I could, and was vigorously seconded by Major Conway, Captain (hambré and Lieutenant Bronnan, who cheered on the leading Sub-division of Her Majesty's 22nd. The officers and men of the Bombay 2nd Grenadiers under Captain Hogg, were climbing up the steep side of Pawunghur, as well as the nature of the ground would permit, in the hope of effecting an entrance over the lower part of the scarp by the neck of land connecting the two forts, or of surprising the gateway on the north west side, situated at a considerable elevation. This latter object we effected, for the enemy in their hurry to get away had not sufficiently barricaded it, and it was forced in by our soldiers; but few shots were interchanged, and consequently I am happy to say our casualties are few. The results of our capture were a few Guns and a body of prisoners. It gives me great gratification to add, that notwithstanding the provocations they had received for some days past our men ! chaved with the greatest humanity and for bearance; the prisoners taken in the fort threw away their arms and I believe not one was injured, though a considerable deal of firing took place on a few armed people escaping down the slopes of the hills. In a very short time we were joined by our Reserve, under Lieutenant Colonel Poole, with Captain Hogg, Commanding Grenadiers and Lieutenant Grimes of the same Regi-Major Clemons also of the Madras 20th Native Infantry and a few of his men, and I believe also tain Bailey and another Officer of the Madras Infantry belonging to the 1st Brigade, and the latter named Officer of whom I have omitted to mention I had previously observed very forward below the fort of Punalla, reported themselves to me in Pawunghur.

I have also entirely omitted till now to mention our left wing or rather our left post under the North West Angle of Pawunghur, which I had placed under Major George, c. s. Her Majesty's 22nd Regiment, the 3rd Officer in seniority of this Brigade. They consisted of an Infantry Picquet under Lieutenant Carrow, Her Majesty's 22nd Regiment (the same Officer who captured a rebel with a document of some importance upon him) and also of a Cavalry Picquet, under Lieutenant Fitzgerald, Her Majesty's 14th Light Dragoons. I am much indebted

to Major George for his superintendence of these important Posts.

Having placed the fortress under the Command of Lieutenant Colonel Poole, c. n., and withdrawn the Grenadiers, I returned with the latter to Camp where, from the extreme ruggedness of the paths and darkness we

My extreme Right Infantry Picquet of 150 Her Majesty's 22nd and 30 Grenadiers under Ensign Black, opposite or rather near to a blocked up gate near the Northern Angle of the Punalla Fort, whence it was expected many of the enemy would endeavour to escape, was commanded by Captain Mainwaring, Her Majesty's 22nd Regiment. Beyond ravines on the North Western side of Punalla, and in a direction leading to the Conkan, I had placed Captain Bromwich, and Lieutenant Prettejohn with a strong picquet of Her Majesty's 14th Light Dragoons and in connection with Captain Bromwich, on the one side, and with the sentries of General DeLamotte's own Camp on the other, I placed a long line of Horsemen, belonging to his highness the Raja of Sattara, and Commanded by Rao Sahib Buckshee, a relation of the Raja's, and Jozree Singh Rissaldar. My Brigade Major Captain Clarke, of the 2nd Grenadier's with great zeal, and much personal exertion did me the favor himself to place this long chain of Sattara Irregular Horsemen. I am much indebted to Captain Clarke, for the judicious manner in which this service was performed. From an eminence far in advance on the right, he watched the manner in which this service was performed. From an eminence far in advance on the right, he watched the progress of the operations of the 1st and 2nd Brigades, and of the Guns; and I believe, could distinguish the storming party proceeding to the Breach; thus putting the Sattara Troops particularly on the alert at the

Captain Stuart, Her Majesty's 14th Light Dragoons, Commanding the Squadron with my Brigade, having made arrangements for the protection of our Camp during the absence of our Reserve, himself took one Troop or rather more, 14th Light Dragoons, and placed them near the gorge of the ravine, between the two hills of

Punalla and Pawunghur, and held this Troop in hand to act as circumstances might require.

Thus for many miles of circuit, these Fortresses were hemmed in by a complete line of sentries and videttes, extending from the Head Quarter camp on the Southward and Westward, by our extreme Right, along the North West, and North East faces of Punalla; and North West and North of Pawanghar to my extreme left, where my Cavalry parties communicated with Captain Arthur, commanding several detachments, I believe from

the 1st Brigade.

I venture to hope that Major General DeLamotte c. B. Commanding our Force, will recommend to the most favorable notice of His Excellency the Commander in Chief of this Presidency, the Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and men, European and Native of this Brigade, which I have had the honor to command, and whose zeal and gallantry on this occasion, it is impossible too much to commend. -It would be presumptuous of me, unless called upon more particularly than I have done, to specify names.

I beg to enclose Captain Clarke's letter of his operations.

Camp before Punalla, 2nd December 1844. SIR.

In continuation of my report of the 30th, I beg to inform the Major General that the working parties during the night of that date, succeeded in advancing the 18 Pounders to a position fixed upon by Major Peat and myself, within about 350 yards of the walls. The field guns were also moved to a more commanding position on the left flank. In the meantime the 8 Inch Mortars which had been got into position by dusk, continued to play during the night at intervals of about an hour on the gateway and its vicinity. At an early hour yesterday morning, I opened fire, on the walls, on a point about 100 yards to the right of the gate: the field guns keeping down the Enemy's fire. The Masonry was very solid and resisted our shot for sometime, but about 8 o'clock the accuracy of our fire began to tell, and the wall to crumble. From this time the Breach progressed rapidly, and by 4 r. M. was pronounced practicable. After this as the Major General himself witnessed the operations, no report is necessary.

During the day the Mortars kept up a fire on different parts of the Fort where the Enemy was reported to be: but towards the afternoon the fire was confined to the rear of the Breach, some 51 and 44 Mortars brought into position also played on the Breach. During the Afternoon to cover the advance of the Storming party, I separated my field guns placing half on the right of the Breaching Battery, and advancing those on the left as much as possible. Towards the close of our operations the 18 Pounders were employed dismantling the flanking defences, on the breach, the field guns propelling shell to cover the advance of the Troops.

Camp near Punalla, 29th November 1844. The command of the 3rd Brigade having devolved upon me in consequence of Lieutenant Colonel Hickes being mortally wounded, I called on Major George c. B., Her Masjesty's 22nd Regiment, the next Senior Officer (in command of the Detachment sent to take possession of the Pettah's near the gate of Fort Punalla), to furnish a detailed statement for your information, of the operations on the occasion.

I have the honor to enclose the statement together with a casualty return and I have every reason to believe the

position was carried in the most gallant manner.

It has since been held by a Detachment of 200 of Her Majesty's 22nd Regiment and 100 of the 2nd Grenadiers with a proportion of Officers under a constant fire of guns, and small arms.

The main body of the party were then halted under cover on the edge of the Pettahs, the advance parties half European and half Natives moving on under Ensign Budd, Her Majesty's 22nd Regiment and Ensign Black 2nd Grenadiers, led by Lieutenant Colonel Outram, c. n. and attended by Captain Clarke 2nd Grenadiers Acting

The enemy were speedily driven up into the Fort of Punalla, the party then passed close under the gate of the Fort, enabling Colonel Outram to make a full and satisfactory reconnoissance, then moving on took post under cover, just below the neck of land connecting the two Forts, from whence Captain Clarke was despatched by Colonel Outram to the main body, which was conducted by that Officer under Colonel Hickes's orders through the whole of the Pettahs in succession to the spot where Colonel Outram was posted; the enemy during the whole time keeping up a heavy fire of Artillery and Matchlocks from the walls, fortunately without effect owing to the rapid movement of the men and the cover afforded by the irregular nature of the ground at this time, being in a nullah, the enemy after many unsuccessful efforts, at last got the proper range and our lamented Brigadier fell, the only casualty on our side, with the exception of one Private H. M. 22nd Regiment severely wounded, with the advance party under Ensign Budd, though I have reason to believe from the statements made to me by both Officers and men, with considerable loss to the enemy, many of whom were seen to fall.—The whole party were then reunited near the part which had been held in its absence by a party of 50 men H. M. 22nd Regiment, and 20 of the Grenadiers under Lieutenant Smith H. M. 22nd Regiment—and were relieved about 4 P. M. by a Detachment from Camp under Bt. Major Canway C. B. H. M. 22nd Regiment Conway c. B. H. M. 22nd Regiment.

In conclusion, I beg to add, that the conduct of both Officers and men of the whole Detachment, European and Native, who were constantly intermixed, was characterised by the greatest coolness and intrepidity throughout the day, under a very heavy and almost incessant fire of all arms; the fatigue and exertions required of them (which where much increased by the nature of the ground) during ten hours, being borne with the utmost cheer-

Having expressed myself fully satisfied with the conduct of all, it was not my intention to have mentioned the names of any, but must in justice state, that the very conspicuous gallantry of Color Serjeant Burke, Her Majesty's 22nd Regiment was especially reported to me by the Brigade Major, and Captain Hogg, and that of Naique Jerdah 3rd Company 2nd Grenadiers, by Ensign Budd Her Majesty's 22nd Regiment.

I beg to enclose a report from Captain Hogg, 2nd Grenadiers, who throughout the day rendered me every

assistance.

Commanding the storming party on the Pettaks of the Northern side of the Forts.

I have the honor to report for your information that agreeable to Brigade orders by the late Lieutenant Colonel Hickes, I proceeded in command of a Company of the 2nd Grenadiers and accompanied the party you commanded to storm the Pettahs on the Northern side of the Fort of Punalla, which after some skirmishing was effected in a gallant manner and the whole of them carried without any casualty in my detachment, the conduct of which I had every reason to be satisfied with.

In particular I have to notice the able manner in which Ensign Black and Jemedar Toolah Ram when detached

skirmishing, led on their parties, which reflects great credit on those two officers.

I beg also to mention the names of Naique Jeewan, 3rd Comp. Naique Pursnac Durmnac 3rd Comp. Privates Kannak Kalnak 3rd. Comp Gunga Deen 3rd Comp. Hermaiter Dalmaiter 3rd Comp Ramjee Humnee 7th Comp.

whose conduct was most conspicuous throughout the day and was particularly brought to my notice.

If I may be permitted to mention H. M. 22nd. it has been brought to my notice by Ensign Black, and many others that Colour Serjeant Burke's gallantry was the admiration of all, and at different times when the men of H. M. 20th were int mixed with the Grenadiers their steadiness and behaviour in every manner was most praiseworthy, under a heavy fire of both Artillery and Wall pieces from the forts.

I do rayself the honor to report for the information of the officer commanding the Brigade, that in compliance with the orders personally given me by Major General DeLamotte, c. B., I yester-

day proceeded with a Force named in the margin, to occupy the village below the ridge to the West of the Fort, at about 4 r. m. Shortly before reaching the village, I found the enemy posted on the heights in front of, and which command the village, and also on grounds between the heights and the village; on perceiving this I continued the on grounds between the neighbours and the dilage, in order to turn it. The advance under Lieutenant Oldham, 2nd or Queen's Royal Regiment consisting of a subdivision of the Grenadier Company 2nd Queens, and a subdivision of the 6th Company, 3rd Regiment P. L. I. Immediately on approaching, the enemy retired towards the heights as our Skirmishers neared them. As soon as the main body was on a line with the village, seeing our skirmishers at the foot of the heights,

and the enemy still giving way, I desired Lieutenant Oldham to continue the advance up the heights and Lieutenant Haultain 3rd Regiment P. L. I. to move on with a support for them, and took the main body myself to the Right, and occupied the village.—The Skirmishers continued their advance, and drove the enemy completely off the heights, and remained in possession of the Table-land, on the top of which, according to orders received from the Major General an advanced picquet was established,

I am not aware whether much loss was sustained by the enemy, but owing to the extremely difficult nature of the ground and steep ascent, I am inclined to think it could not be much. To the same cause is attributable, our meeting with no loss, tho' the enemy kept up throughout a very brisk and regular fire.

Three prisoners were taken on the heights, but, as the Major General informed me the object was only to secure the Hill as a post, I did not think it desirable to pursue the enemy further. They continued their retreat in a very regular order towards the Fort.
