*Rules exempting Vessels trading between Bombay and Scinde forced into any of His Highness the Guicowar's Ports in Kattēwar by Stress of weather, from the payment of the duties heretofore exacted at those Ports:—*

**RULE 1ST.**

Should a Boat on her voyage between Bombay and any Port in Scinde be driven into the Mahals of this Sirkar, by stress of weather, and land its cargo, no duty of any kind, and no Port or anchorage fee will be exacted provided the Vessel remains in the harbour only a reasonable time. If a single package be landed for the purpose of sale or traffic, or if the Vessel refuse to pursue her voyage when able to do so, then the full amount of duty shall be levied on the whole cargo, and every Port or other fee be also levied in the usual manner, and the Vessel treated in every respect as if consigned to the Ports of this Sirkar's Mahals.

**RULE 2ND.**

Should a Boat under the circumstances mentioned at the commencement of Rule 1st put into the Port of Ookhamundul &c. in so bad a state as to be obliged to discharge her cargo into another Boat, which conveys it to its original destination, no duty will be levied, provided nothing is landed for sale, and provided no unnecessary delay takes place in the sailing of the Boat with the transhipped cargo; damaged goods may be landed and sold, under the Sanction of the Custom House Officers, on payment of the usual duties.

**RULE 3RD.**

Should a Boat under the above circumstances put into the Ports of Ookhamundul &c., and undergo repairs, landing her cargo in the mean time, no duty will be levied, provided there is no unnecessary delay, and provided that on re-shipping every package of the original cargo is duly accounted for to the satisfaction of the Custom Master of the Port.

**RULE 4TH.**

Should a Boat put into the Ports of Ookhamundul &c., under the circumstances abovementioned, and undergo slight repairs, without discharging any part of her cargo; no duty whatever will be levied, provided the repairs do not occupy more than a reasonable number of days.

**RULE 5TH.**

Should a Boat put into the Ports of Ookhamundul &c., under the above circumstances, at the close of the season and be compelled to lay up for the Monsoon, security will in the first place be given for the full amount of Cus-

toms due on the whole. Cargo, and all Ports and anchorage Fees shall be paid. The goods may then be landed and warehoused at the expense and risk of the owner or Tindal of the Vessel. The original Invoice of the cargo, or an authentic copy shall be deposited with the Customs authorities, and if on reshipping, it shall be discovered that a single package has been opened, or missing, and cannot be accounted for satisfactorily, the full amount of Customs shall be made good, according to the security previously given. The goods must be reshipped in the same Vessel which brought them, unless she be proved not sea worthy, in which case they may be forwarded on another; all damaged or perishable goods may be sold under the sanction of the Custom House Officers and on payment of the usual duties.

**RULE 6TH.**

When any doubts arise as to the application of any of the above Rules, the chief Guicowar authority of the Mahals, if unable, to settle the matter otherwise, will refer to the Political Agent and act according to his opinion and advice. His Highness the Guicowar reserves to himself the full right of punishing any Tindals, Owners, or Supercargoes of Boats who attempt to evade these Regulations and to take advantage of them for the purpose of defrauding the Revenue of the Durbar. But should the offender belong to foreign jurisdiction the Kamdar must refer the case to the Political Agent and act according to his advice and pending the receipt of that Officer's reply detain the offender in custody. The public must be duly made acquainted with these Rules.

## FORT WILLIAM,

### HOME DEPARTMENT,

### LEGISLATIVE,

THE 7TH DECEMBER 1844.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 7th December 1844:

*An Act to amend the Law regarding the Registration of Deeds.*

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act, Deeds may be registered in any Registry Office within the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, whether such office be in the District where the property or any part thereof to which such Deeds relate is situated or not.

II. Provided always, and it is hereby enacted, that when the Registry Office in which a Deed is registered, is in a District in which the whole of the property to which such Deed relates is not situated,



it shall be the duty of the Register of the said Office to forward to the office of each District in which the whole or any part of such property is situated, a copy of the Deed as registered and endorsed in his office, the said copies to be furnished and attested as prescribed in Clause First, Section 2, Regulation XX. 1810, and the Register of any office receiving such copy so forwarded, shall duly register the same as if it had been presented to him in the first instance by the party registering.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that for every such copy required for transmission to any office as aforesaid, the party registering shall pay the usual fee, and the Register receiving the same shall duly account for the same to the several Registers to whose offices copies may be transmitted for registry.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that a Memorial of any Deed shall be held to be duly registered according to Law, in respect to any property which may be situated in any one District, as soon as the original Deed or a copy thereof (as the case may be) shall have been registered in manner aforesaid in the Registry Office of such District whether or not a copy thereof have been registered in all or any of the other Districts, in which the property to which the Deed relates may be situated.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 7th December, 1844.

*An Act for the better management of the Collection and Disbursement of Assessments for the Town of Calcutta*

1. It is hereby enacted, that all the powers and duties in regard to the Collection and Disbursement of the Assessments which by the Statutes 33, Geo. 3, C. 52, and by Act XXIV. of 1810, are authorized to be made for the Town of Calcutta, and in regard to the lighting and watering the roads and streets,

and cleansing and repairing the same and the drains of the said Town, which powers and duties are now by Law exercised and performed by the Justices of the Peace within or for the Presidency of Fort William, at their General or Quarter Sessions, shall from and after the day of 1845, cease to be exercised and performed by the said Justices, and shall be exercised and performed by the Chief Magistrate for the Town of Calcutta.

11. Provided always, that nothing in this Act contained shall be construed to affect the power conferred on the Governor of Fort William in Bengal by Section IV. of Act XXIV. of 1840, to authorize at his discretion two-thirds in number and value of the rate payers of any of the Divisions described in Section III. of the last mentioned Act, to undertake themselves the Assessment, Collection and Management of the rates of such Division, or any or either of those trusts.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 7th day of February, 1845.

Wallace, of the 20th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, to the address of the Acting Assistant Adjutant General of the Southern Division of the Army, dated the 9th and 11th instant, together with an extract from a letter dated the 10th instant, reporting the occupation of the Fort of Rangna by the Brigade under his command.

THE ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL, SOUTHERN DIVISION OF THE ARMY.

*Camp Before Punnallaghur*

Sir,

I do myself the honor to report for the information of the Major General, that in obedience to instructions, I marched on the afternoon of the 5th instant with the Light Field Force placed under my orders, and arrived at the Village of Chicklee on the Bank of the Punj Gungah, at which place the Force was halted for a few hours, and at 3 o'clock on the morning of the 6th marched again, crossed the river and arrived at Walwa, from thence the Force proceeded to Shengaum where it arrived on the morning of the 7th; from Shengaum the Force proceeded on the morning of the 8th to Patgaum and formed a junction with Captain Prior's Detachment. Having received information from Captain Prior, that a position strongly stockaded and about five hundred yards from the Fort of Rangna was held by a large body of the enemy, I immediately determined to dislodge them, and made my arrangements to effect that object.

The attacking detachment was divided into three columns, the right under the command of Captain Bayley, of the 20th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, the centre under Captain Gillanders, of the 2nd Bombay E. L. I., the left under Captain Prior, of the 21st Bombay Native Infantry, with the Troops as per margin under their respective commands. The Troop of the 5th Madras Light Cavalry under Captain Fraser followed the three attacking columns. and the reserve composed of the remainder of the Troops under command of Major Clemons, of the 20th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, followed a short distance in the rear of the Cavalry.

*Right or Captain Bayley's Column of attack.*

Captain Church, Lieut. Aitken and Ensign Robson, 150 Rank & File of the 20th Regiment M. N. I.

*The centre or Captain Gillanders's Column of attack.*

Lieutenants Brassey, Savile and Ensign Hazard, 100 Rank and File of the 2nd Bombay European Light Infantry.

*The left or Captain Prior's Column of attack.*

150 Rank and File of the 21st Bombay Native Infantry.

The three Columns under the immediate command of Captain Arthur, of the 20th Regiment M. N. I.

Skirmishers consisting of 20 Rank and File from the three attacking columns, under the command of Lieutenant Snow, of the 20th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, (with Lieutenant Elphinstone of the 20th, Lieutenant Campbell, of the 2nd European L. I. and Ensign Leathes of the 21st Bombay Native Infantry under his orders.) were thrown out in front of the three attacking columns and in this order the Troops advanced to the attack, the whole under my personal directions, my position being in the centre between the skirmishers and the attacking columns, until the Troops arrived near the Stockade, when a fire from Matchlocks was opened, previous to which the Fort fired several guns, the balls falling among the Troops, but fortunately without doing any injury; when nearing the Stockade I perceived a body of the Enemy assembled on my right flank, I directed Captain Bayley to dislodge them by moving his column towards them; the Enemy perceiving this movement immediately retreated. The stockade was then attacked simultaneously in front and on both flanks, and the Gate which had been partially barricaded, was broken open with the spirit and gallantry that has always been manifested by the Troops belonging to the 1st Brigade, and which I have the honor to command; immediately the stockade was carried, the Pettah beyond it was ordered to be attacked, which was also carried, and is now retained as my advanced post, about two hundred and fifty or three hundred yards from the Fort, the towers affording ample shelter and protection to the Picquet there stationed. During these operations I am happy to report that only two casualties have occurred, this trifling loss may, under Providence, be attributed to two circumstances, first, the prompt and spirited nature of the attack, and secondly simultaneous front and flank attacks of the stockaded position.



I beg to express my thanks to all the Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Rank and File engaged this morning in the attack and capture of a strong stockaded position and the Pettah, as also to Captain Brockman, my Major of Brigade, and to Lieutenant and Adjutant White, who attended me as staff officer during the whole affair.

Whilst on my way this morning from Patgaum towards the Hunooman Ghaut, a Trooper brought a note from Lieutenant Barker commanding at that Post, that a Sepoy had been shot by some of the Enemy. I immediately pushed on with the Troop of cavalry, but had not proceeded far, when a second Trooper brought a verbal message that Lieutenant Barker was also wounded; I continued my rapid advance and on arrival discovered that some sharp shooters of the Enemy had advanced close to the Post under cover of the jungle; I immediately ordered out some skirmishers and had them driven back; previous to my arrival, a Havildar of the 5th Light cavalry was killed, Lieutenant Barker most dangerously wounded in the right arm and side, and a Private of the 21st Bombay N. I. also severely in the leg, which has since been amputated.

This post had been placed by Captain Prior some days before my arrival, and considering it a most important one, have re-inforced it and placed it under the command of a Captain, to whom I have given such instructions as will, I hope, prevent any future annoyance from the Enemy. I beg to enclose a Return of casualties that occurred this morning.

In my letter of date the 9th instant, No. 19, I reported that in conformity to orders, I marched at 4 o'clock on the afternoon of the 5th instant from Punnalla Ghur, and the arrival of the Light Field Force, after a march of about seventy miles, before Rangna on the morning of the 9th, when a strong stockade with a strong gate in the centre, a stone wall some feet high, embracing the Pettah from Scarp to Scarp on both flanks, with a fine ditch in its entire front, was immediately stormed and carried, and during the night of the same day, the two 9 Pounder guns, and two 5½ inch mortars having been placed in battery, which opened their fire early on the morning of the 10th, with such effect that the Fort guns were soon silenced;—the shelling was also admirable, and so judiciously thrown that it was evident the enemy could not long endure it.—I have now the honor to convey the information that the enemy during the night of the 10th instant evacuated the Fort, but which was only ascertained after day-light this morning, when Serjt. Gallagher of the Ordnance Department of the Bombay Army, and Gunner Peter Smith of the A. Company 2nd Bat. of the Madras Artillery, voluntarily and gallantly went forward up to the outer gate, and the officer on duty at the Battery (Lieutenant Green, of the 21st Bombay Native Infantry,) seeing the advance of the Serjeant and Gunner both of whom continued with great difficulty to scramble up over the outer wall and opened the wicket, moved forward with the Picquets under his command, and got possession of the principal gate of the Fort, where he remained until my arrival, which was as soon as I could reach the Fort after receiving information of the event; there was not a man, woman or child found within the Fort, only a few of the killed of the enemy.



I have to express my thanks to Lieutenant Grubb, and 2nd Lieutenant Jones, and to the Non-Commissioned, Rank and File of the A. Company of the 2nd Bat. of Madras Artillery, for the admirable practice of the Guns and Mortars, and for their cheerful performance of their laborious duties at the Battery during the entire day and night of the 10th Instant.
