No. 27 of 1845.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following extracts from a despatch from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, dated the 15th January last, No. 4.

Para. 1st. We have carefully examined the proceedings, transmitted with your letter No. 59, of the 27th August last, of two Courts Martial convened for the trial of Commander Powell of the Indian Navy, and Acting Master Lamb, respecting charges arising out of their conduct on the occasion of the loss of the Steam Frigate

3rd. We certainly do not approve of the unqualified acquittal of Commander Powell, of the inattention and negligence with which he was charged. His retiring to rest when the Ship, under his command was rapidly approaching the land, would of itself have been a very questionable proceeding, more especially when the weather was very boisterous, and the darkness increasing with the night, but his omission to render the orders issued by him, for the management of the Vessel, during his absence from Deck, incapable of misapprehension, and his failing to provide in those orders for the very probable contingency of the land being neared without being seen, are altogether inexcusable and contrast strikingly with the anxious care he had previously evinced in the navigation of

the Ship.

4th. It is not our intention to disturb the verdict of the General Court Martial before which Commander Powell was tried, but we desire that you make known to him the view which we take of his conduct as well as our surprise and regret, that an Officer of his experience, reputation and standing in the service, should have proved so far unmindful of an important trust, as to relax in his care and vigilance at the very time when those qualities

could least be dispensed with.

5th. The conduct of Commander Powell, after the Vessel struck was however very praiseworthy, and we cheerfully join with Sir Robert Oliver and yourselves in applanding the coolness, judgment and unwearied activity evinced by him subsequently to the Shipwreck, and in attributing in a great measure to his exertions the preservation

of the lives of the Crew and Passengers, and the recovery of part of the stores and effects of the Vessel.

6th. We are still less disposed to acquiesce in Mr. Lamb's entire exoneration from blame. Without dwelling upon his inattention to orders, there can be no doubt, that with the appearance of land before him he ought of his own accord to have endeavored to ascertain its reality by heaving the lead, and he should have taken care that the Commander was thoroughly awakened. But Mr. Lamb's conduct exhibits stronger indications of both carelessness and want of judgment. It is scarcely possible that the ship could have run so close in shore, before the land was distinctly seen, if a good look out had been kept

7th. We cannot too strongly express our surprise and displeasure at his not having ascertained beyond a doubt, that Captain Powell had been thoroughly roused, and made acquainted with the ship's position, and at his not having taken upon himself the responsibility of acting with promptitude, and changing the course of the Vessel while there was yet time to save her from wreck. The safety of the ship ought to have been indeed his first consideration, and the calling of the Commander ought to have been effected through the medium of the Midshipman of the watch; his quitting the Deck a second time we consider quite inexcusable; Mr. Lamb however, denies that he was conscious of the dinger in which the ship was placed; and with the exception of the Affidavit of an absent witness, only strong probabilities could be opposed to his assertion; still as Sir Robert Oliver has pointed out, it would have been highly improper for the Officer of the watch to leave his post under any circumstances, and it is

less easy to find an excuse or his doing so, when the Commander's presence was required on deck.

9th. We highly approve of the several instructions issued by Sir Robert Oliver for the guidance of the Commanders and Officers of our Navy, and every opportunity ought to be taken of inculcating the necessity of vigilance and great caution upon the Commanders and Officers of our Steam Ships. The great command which the power of Steam affords the Navigator in shaping his course and measuring his distance, ought to preclude the possibility of a ship being lost under such circumstances as those attending the wreck of the "Memnon."

The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for general information the following rules, instituted for the guidance of British Vessels visiting the Persian Gulf, and to announce, that if the Commander of any such Vessel shall fail to conform to these rules, he will forfeit all claims to the interference or good offices of the British Political Officers in the Persian Gulf in his behalf

Rules for the guidance of Vessels carrying a

British Pass and Flag to the Persian Gulf.

On the arrival of a British Vessel in Bushire roads, an immediate report is to be made to the Resident in writing of the same, together with the date of sailing from her original port, and any other she may have touched at on her voyage. All Packets and Letters addressed the Residency are to be forwarded along with the above report.

2nd. Three days previous to the date fixed for the departure of any British Vessel from Bushire, a report in writing of the same is to be made to the Resident. In the event of its not being the intention of the Commander to remain three days, this report is to be made

on the day of arrival.

3rd. Previously to any Bristish Vessels leaving Bushire, a copy of the manifest of the cargo imported, and one of the cargo exported is to be

furnished to the Resident.

In the event of a dispute arising between the Commander of any British Vessel and any of the Native merchants of Bushire, and both parties consenting to refer the matter to the Resident, the decision of that officer as to the most advisable method of arranging the disagreement is to be obligatory upon the Commander making the reference.

5th. In the event of any complaints being made against the Commander or any of the Crew of a British Vessel, by any of the inhabitants of Bushire, the Commander is to be guided by the opinion of the Resident as to the measures to

be adopted in consequence.

6th. In the event of any British Vessel purposing to touch at any of the Ports on the Arabian Coast between Burka and the mouth of the River Euphrates, an intimation of the same in writing is to be previously made to the Resident, and the Commander of the Vessel is to be guided entirely by the Resident's opinion.

7th. All British Vessels entering the inner roads of Bushire to pay the established pilotage according to the rates sanctioned by the Go-

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 15th of February 1845, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. 111. OF 1845.

An Act vesting Courts of Appeal with the discretion to require or dispense with Security for Costs from the Appellant.

Whereas it is not now by Law necessary within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, to take any Security for Costs n Appeals before the Sudder Courts-and whereas no Security for Costs is now required by Law in Appeals from the decisions of Moonsiffs, and whereas it is expedient that Appeals from all Courts should be put in this respect upon a uniform foot-

It is therefore hereby enacted, that within the said Territories it shall not be necessary in any Court of Appeal of the East India Company to take any Security for Costs, but it shall be in the discretion of every such Court of Appeal to demand Security for Costs from the Appellant or not, as it shall see fit, before the Respondent is called upon to answer,-any Law or Regulation to the contrary notwithstanding.

ACT No. 1V. OF 1845.

An Act to amend the Law regarding the Registration of Deeds.

It is hereby enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act, Deeds may be registered in any Registry Office within the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, whether such office be in

the District where the property or any part thereof to which such Deeds relate, is situated, or not.

II. Provided always, and it is hereby enacted, that when the Registry Office in which a Deed is registered, is in a District in which the whole of the property to which such Deed relates is not situated, it shall be the duty of the Register of the said Office to forward to the office of the District or Districts in which the whole or any part of such property is situated, a copy of the Deed as registered and endorsed in his office, the said copies to be furnished and attested as prescribed in Clause First, Section 2, Regulation XX. 1812, and the Register of any office receiving such copy so forwarded, shall duly register the same as if it had been presented to him in the first instance by the

party registering.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that for every such copy required for transmission to any office as aforesaid the party registering shall pay the usual fee, and the Register receiving the same shall duly account for the same to the several Registers, to

whose offices copies may be transmitted for registry.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that a Memorial of any Deed shall be held to be duly registered according to Law, in respect to any property which may be situated in any one District, as soon as the original Deed or a copy thereof (as the case may be) shall have been registered in manner aforesaid in the Registry Office of such District, whether or not a copy thereof have been register-ed in all or any of the other Districts in which the property to which the Deed relates may be -situated.
