The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for general information the following Extract from a Treasury Warrant, dated 28th November last.

EXTRACT, TREASURY WARRANT,
Dated 28th November 1844.

Whereas by an Act passed in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation "of the duties of postage," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, and at any time after the passing of that Act, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage, or inland postage, payable by law, on transmission by the post of foreign or Colonial letters, or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant; and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof; and by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates that might be payable were to be paid:.....

And we further direct, that every Seaman employed abroad in the service of the East India Company, may, whilst such Seaman shall be actually employed in the service of such Company, both send and receive letters, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, by the post, on his own private concerns, at a postage of one penny for each letter; but we declare, that the letters of Officers Commissioned by the said Company, or Warrant Officers, or Midshipmen, or Master's Mates, in the service of the said Company, are not included in this present provision.

And with respect to letters sent by any such Seaman, the following conditions shall be observed; (that is to say,) the postage of each letter (unless sent from parts beyond the Seas, as hereinafter mentioned) shall be paid, or if posted within the United Kingdom, be duly and properly stamped on being put into a Post Office established under the authority of the Post Master General, and upon such letter shall be superscribed the name of the writer, and his class or description in the vessel to which he shall belong; and upon every such letter there shall be written in the hand writing of, and signed by, the officer having at the time the command of the vessel to which the seaman belongs, the name of such officer, and the name of such vessel.

And with respect to letters received by the Post by any such Seaman, the following conditions shall be observed, the postage of each letter (unless sent from parts beyond the Seas as hereinafter mentioned) shall be paid, or (if posted within the United Kingdom) be duly and properly stamped upon putting it into a Post Office, established under the authority of the Post Master General; and it shall be directed to such Seaman, specifying on the superscription thereof the vessel to which he shall belong; and the Deputy Post Master of the place to which such letter shall be sent to be delivered, shall not deliver such letter to any person except to

the seaman to whom it shall be directed, or to some person appointed to receive the same by writing, under the hand of the Officer in command; and whenever the letters sent or received by any such Seaman shall be sent from parts beyond the Seas, without the said Postage of one Penny being prepaid, every such letter shall be charged to the party receiving the same with a rate of two Pence; and any letters received by the Post under this Warrant by any such Seaman which may have been re-directed shall not be charged any Postage on, or in respect of such re-direction.

And we further declare, that any such Seaman may both send and receive letters, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, by private ships, between the United Kingdom and places beyond the Seas, or between places beyond the Seas, on their own private concerns, at the like postage for each letter, and subject to the like conditions and regulations, in all respects, as are hereinbefore mentioned in respect of letters sent and received by any such Seaman by the Post; but whenever the letters sent or received by any such Seaman shall be conveyed, or be intended to be conveyed, by private ships, the gratuities payable by law to the Masters of such vessels, in respect of such letters, shall, in all cases, be paid to the Post Office, in addition to such postage.

And we further declare, that the said privilege shall not extend to any foreign rates of Postage to which any such letters may be liable, all which foreign rates shall be chargeable and payable as if no such privilege had been granted.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 15th of March 1845.

ACT No. — OF 1845.

An Act for regulating the re-admission of Appeals after dismissal under Act XXIX. of 1841.

Whereas the Provisions of Act XXIX. of 1841 are inconveniently severe as regards Appeals and it is expedient to mitigate the strictness thereof:—

I. It is therefore hereby enacted, that whenever an Appeal in any of the Courts of the East India Company in the Presidencies of Bengal or Madras, shall after the passing of this Act have been dismissed under the Provisions of the said Act XXIX. of 1841, it shall be competent to the Court which shall have dismissed such Appeal to re-admit the same if the Appellant shall make application for that purpose on the Stamp prescribed for miscellaneous Petitions, within three months after the Appeal shall have been dismissed if dismissed by the Sudder Court, and within one month after the Appeal shall have been dismissed if dismissed by any other Court, and shall satisfy the Court that the dismissal was occasioned by the default of his Vakeel or by unavoidable accident.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to any of the said Courts to re-admit any Appeal which may have been dismissed before the passing of this Act under the Provisions of Act XXIX. of 1841, if the Appellant shall make application for that purpose on the Stamp prescribed for miscellaneous Petitions, within three months after the passing of this Act, and shall satisfy the Court

that the dismissal was occasioned by the default of his Vakeel or by unavoidable accident.

III. Provided always and it is hereby enacted, that no Appeal which has been re-admitted under this Act, and again dismissed under the Provisions of Act XXIX. of 1841, shall be again re-admitted.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 15th day of June next.

An Act for extending the power of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay in regard to the admission and enrolment of persons to act as Attorneys of the said Court.

Whereas the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras is by Her Majesty's Charter authorized and empowered to admit and enrol such persons having been admitted Attorneys or Solicitors in one of Her Majesty's Courts at Westminster, or being otherwise capable to act in the character of Attorneys in the said Court:

And whereas the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay is by Her Majesty's Charter authorized and empowered to admit and enrol only such persons having been admitted Attorneys or Solicitors in one of Her Majesty's Courts at Westminster to act in the character of Attorneys of the said Court and is not by the said Charter authorized and empowered to admit and enrol persons otherwise capable to act in the character aforesaid:

And whereas it is expedient that the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay should have as large a discretion in regard to the persons to be admitted as Attorneys as the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras:

It is therefore hereby enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay is authorized and empowered to admit and enrol persons having been admitted as Attorneys in any of Her Majesty's Courts at Westminster, and also persons being otherwise capable, to act as Attorneys of the said Supreme Court of Bombay.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 22nd day of June next.
