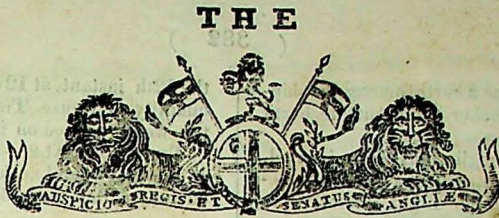

Notice to Mariners.

Floating Light off the Roman Rocks in False Bay,

Rear Admiral the Honorable JOSCELINE PERCY C. B., Commander in Chief of Her Majesty's Ships and Vessels on the Cape of Good Hope Station, hereby gives notice, that, in pursuance of Instructions from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a floating light is moored off the Roman Rocks, in 7½ fathoms water, distant therefrom one cable's length, due North, (by Compass.)

It is a bright revolving light, 37 feet above the level of the Sea, and may be seen in clear weather at a distance of 10 miles from a ship's deck. It will be lighted at Sun-set all the year round, and extinguished half-an-hour after day light.

The Light Vessel is painted red, and during day light will hoist a red flag when a Sail is in sight.

The following remarks made by Mr. BROWN, Master of H. M. Ship *Winchester*, are hereunto subjoined, for the guidance of Ships navigating False and Simon's Bay.

REMARKS FOR SHIPS BOUND INTO

SIMON'S BAY.

The Light Vessel is moored on the North side of the Roman Rocks, and distant therefrom one cable's length. It is a bright revol-

ving light, 37 feet above the level of the Sea, and may be seen in clear weather at a distance of 10 miles from a ship's deck,

From this light the Compass bearings are, Whittle S. S. E. distance 7 miles, on which there is only 12 feet water.

Miller's Point, S. ¼ W. distance 4 miles.

Seal Island, E. ¼ S. distance 6½ miles.

Dock Yard Jetty, W. ¼ N. distance 1½ miles.

Ships steering or heaving into False Bay from round the Cape of Good Hope, will open the Light clear of Miller's Point, (which is the point 7 miles and ½ from Cape Point, off which, but close to, are some rocks above water,) when it bears N. ¼ E.; and if intending to beat up inside the Whittle, the light should not be brought to the Westward of N. by W. ¼ W., or to the Eastward of North, until you are certain of being within 5 miles of the light, when you must be Northward of the Whittle, and may bring the light in standing to the Northward, to bear N. W. by W., working up towards her by short tacks, and passing to the North, leaving her on your Larboard hand, distant ¼ of a mile.

If outside the Whittle do not bring the light to the North of N. N. W. ¼ W. or to the Westward of N. W. by W. ¾ W., on account of Seal Island, and the rocks which lay off 1½ miles to the Southward, turn up by short tacks until you are certain of being within 5 miles of the light, which will insure your being Northward of the Whittle, and may bring the light in standing to the Westward to bear North. With a leading wind bring the light to bear N. by W., you will be well inside the Whittle, and may run up keeping it on that bearing until within ¾ of a mile of the light, when you must open it on your Larboard side, and round it not less than ¼ a mile distant; when the light bears S. S. W. steer in West for the anchorage, and come to in 14, 12 or 10 fathoms according to the weather. If a fine

night, you may choose a berth among the shipping; if otherwise, anchor in an outside berth for the night.

Ships rounding Hanglip must bear in mind, that the Whittle lies nearly in a direct line between that Cape and the Light Vessel, from which it bears, S. S. E.; therefore, if coming up with a fair wind outside the Whittle, bring it to bear N. N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., or N. W. and by N., and run for it.

These remarks are principally intended for seamen not acquainted with Simon's Bay; of course, those who know the passage between Roman Rocks and Noah's Ark need not pass to the North of the former, but I would call their attention to the Phoenix Rock, and recommend their running for the anchorage at all times by a bearing of the light.

As I am aware of the great difficulty in judging of distances at night, and this Light Vessel being moored on the North side of the rocks to protect her from the S. E. gales,—I do recommend it as a fixed rule, that all Ships should at night pass to the Eastward, and haul round the North side of the Light Vessel.

If you pass to the Southward bear in mind the passage between Noah's Ark and the Roman Rocks is barely $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile; and as the light is to the Northward of these rocks two cables' length, do not come within full $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile of the light; but I do not recommend this passage to strangers.

Is hereby given, that verbal offers will be received at the Commissariat Office Belgaum, on Saturday the 31st day of May next for the supply for a period of one year to commence from the 1st September 1845, of a hired Establishment of Draught Bullocks and Camels to be maintained at Belgaum and to consist of 50 pairs or 100 Bullocks, and one able bodied driver to each pair or 50 drivers, and Camels 18 with an able bodied driver to every 2, or 9 drivers in all.

The bullocks to be of superior size and weight, equal to the draught of guns, heavy stores &c. and such other work as may be required, and to be of Mysore or Malwa breed.

2nd No person will be allowed to tender for the contract, unless he previously deposits in the Commissariat Office the sum of Company's Rupees (400) four hundred, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract, should his offer be accepted. This deposit will be returned on the Deed of agreement being duly completed.

3rd Sealed tenders will also be received at the abovementioned Commissariat Office, from distant stations on or before the 31st May, such tenders as are received before the sale commences will be opened at its close, and each offer duly recorded, provided it is accompanied by the 400 Rupees deposit.

4th The bullocks will be subject to the approval of a Committee of Officers, and are not to be entered younger than 5 or older than 8 years of age, and this rule of age is to govern all cattle that may be replaced.

5th The bullocks to be branded in presence of the Committee passing them, with the letters S. D. A. of one inch in length on the off hip.

6th The bullocks and drivers to be mustered monthly.

7th The drivers to be settled with monthly, and not to be discharged without the permission of the Commissariat Officer.

8th The hire to the bullocks to be paid on the 20th of each month.

9th The bullocks to be fed with good kurbee or grass, and to allow each bullock daily, at least 30 pounds of good dry kurbee or grass, or 40 pounds of green, and each bullock to receive daily when marching, 4 pounds of dry grain and two pounds in Camp.

10th The contracting party or his authorized agent, to attend daily at the Commissariat Office to receive orders.

11th The contractor to be answerable for all losses of Government property, conveyed by the said bullocks.

12th All casualties of bullocks by death or otherwise, to be replaced forthwith and to be

also subject to the approval of a Committee of Officers and branded in the same manner as stated in the clause No. 5 of of this notification.

13th The Commissariat Officer at Belgaum, will at any time be authorized to submit for the inspection of a Committee of Officers, any bullocks which he may consider unfit for service, and if condemned, to replace them, should the contractor refuse to do so, recovering the amount paid on that account, from the first monthly bills that may become due to him.

14th The bullocks will be allowed, at the discretion of the Commissary General a respite after any particular heavy duty, should satisfactory reasons be shewn for granting this indulgence.

15th The camels to be of a good breed fully equipped with Saddles, Jhools, Seletahs, Ropes &c. and to have an able bodied driver to each pair and the camels to be branded on the right hip with the letters S. D. A.

16th The amount of deposit to be lodged by the contractor to cover any losses Government may sustain either by damage to property during transit, or to provide for cases where he may fail to produce fit and proper bullocks and camels, will be Rupees 400, to be deducted from the hire of the cattle in such proportions as may hereafter be determined on.

17th To supply any additional number of cattle for any period that may be required for the service of Government, provided not less than (20) twenty days notice is given.

18th Should the contractor disobey any orders of the Commissariat Officer or others set over him, he will be liable to be fined at the pleasure of Government, not exceeding Rupees (25) twenty-five for each offence, and in case of any infringement of the conditions of the deed of agreement, it will be optional with Government to order him to be fined, or to put an end to the contract, the amount deposited by the contractor being in the latter case forfeited.

19th No reasons will be assigned for the rejection of any offer.

20th Further particulars will be made known on application at the above office from 10 A. M. to 5 P. M. daily Sundays excepted.

ACT No. V. OF 1845.

An Act concerning the Examination and Appointment of Hindoo and Mahomedan Law Officers.

- I. It is hereby enacted, that Section 5, Regulation XI. of 1826, of the Bengal Code, be repealed.
 II. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act, any person may be appointed to be a Hindoo or Mahomedan Law Officer in any of the Courts of Justice under the Presidency of Fort

William in Bengal, who shall have successfully passed through such an examination as the Government of the said Presidency shall from time to time prescribe.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 5th of April 1845, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. VI. OF 1845.

An Act to amend the Law regarding the issuing of Commissions of the Peace.

Whereas it is inconvenient to issue a new General Commission of the Peace whenever the Executive Government of any of the Presidencies of Fort William in Bengal, Madras or Boubay shall nominate and appoint any persons not named in the General Commission last issued to act as Justices of the Peace—It is hereby enacted, that the Supreme Court of Judicature of each of the said Presidencies shall and may from time to time upon the order or warrant of the Executive Government of such Presidency, issue separate Commissions to any persons not named in the General Commission of the Peace last issued, who by law are capable of being appointed to the office of Justice of the Peace, and who shall be nominated and appointed by such Executive Government to act as Justices of the Peace within and for such Presidency and the places subordinate thereto, or within and for the Presidency Town. And all such Commissions shall be issued in the name of the Queen's Majesty, her Heirs and Successors, under the Seal of the Supreme Court, and tested in the name of the Chief Justice of such Court and shall be filed of record in the Court of Oyer and Terminer of the Presidency or place where-in and for which the same shall be issued, as Supplementary to the General Commission of the Peace last issued which shall remain in full force.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 12th April 1845, is hereby promulgated for general information;

ACT No. VII. OF 1845.

An Act for regulating the levy of Water Rent, Tolls and Dues on certain Canals for irrigation and navigation, constructed by Government in the North Western Provinces, and for the protection of the said Canals from injury.

Whereas numerous Canals have been constructed, and are in progress of construction at the public expense in the North Western Provinces of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, for the purpose of irrigation and also for navigation so far as it may be practicable to unite the two objects, and whereas it is requisite to regulate the levy of rents, tolls or dues, on such Canals, and to provide for their protection from injury—

I. It is hereby enacted, that the Lieutenant Governor of the Northern Western Provinces shall be competent, by proclamation to be made in the Government Gazette, to declare the Provisions of this Act applicable to any such Canal.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Lieutenant Governor of the North Western Provinces shall be competent to draw out rules to regulate the levy of water rent, and the supply of water for irrigation, and the payment of tolls and dues on boats, rafts or floats, and admission to the benefits of navigation on such Canals, as may be found most suitable to the peculiar circumstances of each. The rules thus drawn out shall be published for general information in the Government Gazette.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that any acts done by private individuals in contravention of the rules so published, shall be punishable either by

temporary deprivation of the benefits of the Canal, or by the penalties hereinafter described.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that all balances of water rent due for lands irrigated by the Canal shall be levied, either by temporary deprivation of the benefits of the Canal, or by the same process as is prescribed for the recovery of balances of land revenue.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever willfully causes any obstruction to any of the said Canals, or to any of the water courses drawn and supplied therefrom, or damages the banks of the Canal or the works constructed for its maintenance, or willfully defiles the water in the Canal, shall be liable to the penalties hereinafter described.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that all persons offending against the provisions of this Act, or of the rules passed under this Act, shall be punishable on conviction before the Magistrate by imprisonment without labor for a term not exceeding fourteen days, or fine to an amount not exceeding 50 Rupees, or both; and in default of payment of such fine, by additional imprisonment for fourteen days.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that if the Owner of any boat, float, or raft, navigating any such Canal, shall refuse to pay the prescribed toll, it shall be lawful for the Officer charged with the levy of tolls on the Canal, to detain such boat, raft, or float, and if the toll be not paid, in the course of ten days, then it shall be lawful for the said Officer under the direction of the Superintendent of the Canal, on the 10th day after the seizure, to sell such property, or so much thereof as may be necessary, or to declare the whole confiscated; provided that in all such cases no confiscation shall be carried into effect till the circumstances have been reported to the Commissioner of the Division and his sanction obtained thereto.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor of the North Western Provinces to appoint Officers for the collection of the rent toll and dues, hereinbefore mentioned, and to confer on such Officer the powers of Deputy Collectors for the levy of such rent, and of Joint Magistrates for the enforcement of such penalties as have been hereinbefore specified.

An Act for amending Section 75 and Chap. XVII, of Regulation IV. of 1827 of the Bombay Code.

Whereas it has been deemed expedient to amend Section 75 and Chapter XVII. of Regulation IV. of 1827 of the Bombay Code, under which Security for the payment of costs or the performance of the

orders of a Civil Court is demanded from public Officers in cases of Appeal which are carried on under the Authority and at the expense of Government:

It is hereby enacted, in modification of the Law above mentioned, that from the date of promulgation of this Act, no Security shall be demanded for the payment of costs or the performance of the orders of a Civil Court from any public Officer in cases of Appeal which are carried on under the Authority and at the expense of Government in the Bombay Presidency.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 19th April 1845:

ACT No. — OF 1845.

An Act to provide for the appointment of Nazirs in the Moonsiff's Courts.

I. It is hereby enacted, that so much of Clause 4, Section 5, Regulation VII. of 1832 of the Bengal Code, as enacts that certain duties assigned to the Nazir of the Judge's Court shall in the Moonsiff's Courts be performed by the Moonsiffs themselves, and that the Tullubannah levied in the Moonsiff's Court shall only be three-fourths of what is levied in the Judge's Court, is repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, the Moonsiffs shall from and after the passing of this Act retain on their Establishments Nazirs to whom the provisions of Clause 8, Section 14, Regulation XXVI. of 1814 of the said Code shall be applicable.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 19th day of June next.
