INSTRUCTIONS

TO THE NATIVE DOCTORS REGARDING THE TREATMENT OF CHOLERA.

Bleeding. This may be employed if the pulse be easily felt and cramps be very severe, but in no case when the pulse is almost gone and cramps are not present.

Mixture with Opium. Of this a dose suited to the age is to be given in a little water, at the commencement of the treatment, and if the purging continue it may be repeated once.

Pills. One is to be given to an adult, and $\frac{1}{2}$ a pill to a person 15 years old, to check vomiting, if the mixture be rejected, and for three quarters of an hour after taking the pill, nothing is to be swallowed. No pill is to be given to a person under 15 years of age.

Mixture without Opium. Of this a dose suited to the age is to be given regularly every hour or two hours, after purging and vomiting have been checked by the preceding medicines, until the pulse improve and the skin become warm.

Hot bricks or bags of hot sand.—Are to be applied along the spine and to the legs, the legs and arms being at the same time constantly rubbed.

Drink. The patient is not to be allowed the free use of water, as drinking it will keep up vomiting and prevent the medicines being retained, a spoonful only of conjee or water may be given now and then.

N. B.—Of this mixture one ounce contains 47 $\frac{1}{2}$ minims of Tincture of Opium, and ten minims contain almost one minim of the tincture.

N. B.—Of this mixture one ounce contains 20 minims of the solution of Ammonia and 25 minims contain $\frac{1}{4}$ minim of the solution.

CHOLERA PILLS.

Extract of Opium.....	36 $\frac{1}{2}$ Grains.
Powder of black Pepper.....	48 $\frac{1}{2}$ "

Mix and divide into 24 equal pills.
N. B.—Each pill contains 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ Grains of Opium.

To persons above 8 years these doses may be repeated once only if no pill shall have been given, and to persons below 8 years a $\frac{1}{2}$ dose only may be given, if the first dose shall have been insufficient to check vomiting and purging.

These doses may be repeated every one or two hours after vomiting and purging have ceased, until the pulse improve and the skin become warm.

Notice to Mariners.

Floating Light off the Roman Rocks in False Bay.

Rear Admiral the Honorable JOSCELINE PERCY C. B., Commander in Chief of Her Majesty's Ships and Vessels on the Cape of Good Hope Station, hereby gives notice, that, in pursuance of Instructions from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a floating light is moored off the Roman Rocks, in 7½ fathoms water, distant therefrom one cable's length, due North, (by Compass.)

It is a bright revolving light, 37 feet above the level of the Sea, and may be seen in clear weather at a distance of 10 miles from a ship's deck. It will be lighted at Sun-set all the year round, and extinguished half-an-hour after day light.

The Light Vessel is painted red, and during day light will hoist a red flag when a Sail is in sight.

The following remarks made by Mr. BROWN, Master of H. M. Ship *Winchester*, are hereunto subjoined, for the guidance of Ships navigating False and Simon's Bay.

REMARKS FOR SHIPS BOUND INTO

SIMON'S BAY.

The Light Vessel is moored on the North side of the Roman Rocks, and distant therefrom one cable's length. It is a bright revolving light, 37 feet above the level of the Sea, and may be seen in clear weather at a distance of 10 miles from a ship's deck.

From this light the Compass bearings are, Whittle S. S. E. distance 7 miles, on which there is only 12 feet water.

Miller's Point, S. ½ W. distance 4 miles.

Seal Island, E. ½ S. distance 6½ miles.

Dock Yard Jetty, W. ¼ N. distance 1½ miles.

Ships steering or beating into False Bay from round the Cape of Good Hope, will open the Light clear of Miller's Point, (which is the point 7 miles and ¼ from Cape Point, off which, but close to, are some rocks above water,) when it bears N. ½ E.; and if intending to beat up inside the Whittle, the light should not be brought to the Westward of N. by W. ½ W., or to the Eastward of North, until you are certain of being within 5 miles of the light, when you must be Northward of the Whittle, and may bring the light, in standing to the Northward, to bear N. W. by W., working up towards her by short tacks, and passing to the North, leaving her on your Larboard hand, distant ¼ of a mile.

If outside the Whittle do not bring the light to the North of N. N. W. ½ W. or to the Westward of N. W. by W. ½ W., on ac-

count of Seal Island, and the rocks which lay off 1½ miles to the Southward, turn up by short tacks until you are certain of being within 5 miles of the light, which will insure your being Northward of the Whittle, and may bring the light in standing to the Westward to bear North. With a leading wind bring the light to bear N. by W., you will be well inside the Whittle, and may run up keeping it on that bearing until within ½ of a mile of the light, when you must open it on your Larboard side, and round it not less than ¼ a mile distant; when the light bears S. S. W. steer in West for the anchorage, and come to in 14, 12 or 10 fathoms according to the weather. If a fine night, you may choose a berth among the shipping; if otherwise, anchor in an outside berth for the night.

Ships rounding Hanglip must bear in mind, that the Whittle lies nearly in a direct line between that Cape and the Light Vessel, from which it bears, S. S. E.; therefore, if coming up with a fair wind outside the Whittle, bring it to bear N. N. W. ½ W., or N. W. and by N., and run for it.

These remarks are principally intended for seamen not acquainted with Simon's Bay; of course, those who know the passage between Roman Rocks and Noah's Ark need not pass to the North of the former, but I would call their attention to the Phoenix Rock, and recommend their running for the anchorage at all times by a bearing of the light.

As I am aware of the great difficulty in judging of distances, at night, and this Light Vessel being moored on the North side of the rocks to protect her from the S. E. gales,—I do recommend it as a fixed rule, that all Ships should at night pass to the Eastward, and haul round the North side of the Light Vessel.

If you pass to the Southward bear in mind the passage between Noah's Ark and the Roman Rocks is barely ¼ of a mile; and as the light is to the Northward of these rocks two cables' length, do not come within full ½ a mile of the light; but I do not recommend this passage to strangers.

2. The following is to be complete with Pads, Shoulder Straps, Cotton Wings for the

Grenadier and Light Companies, Buttons with the number of regiments, and to be made up in every respect as worn in the Company's Army and according to a muster jacket to be forwarded.

6. The person or persons to whom the contract is eventually given, will be expected to furnish the security of a respectable house of agency for the due fulfilment of their contract, in the sum of Company's Rupees (20,000) twenty thousand.

7. The mode of payment will be as under.

8. One-third of the estimate on the contract being closed and approved of, and the receipt of the clothing indents acknowledged.

9. One-third when the clothing is half finished, and the other third when it is delivered, surveyed, and approved of at the several stations.

THE 26TH APRIL 1845.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 26th April 1845: ACT No. — of 1845.

An Act for amending the law of offences relating to the Coin within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay.

I. It is hereby enacted, that Sections LXXIII. LXXIV. and LXXV. of the Statute 9 Geo. IV. C. 74, shall, from and after the passing of this Act, cease to have effect within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act, the Act No. XXXI of 1839 shall cease to have effect within the said Territories.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that Sections XVIII. and XIX. Regulation XIV. 1827 of the Bombay Code, be repealed.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act whoever commits within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay any of the offences for which penalties are provided in the following Sections shall be tried and punished by Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature or by the Courts of the East India Company, according to the jurisdiction of the said Courts, and that when any person so committing any of the said offences is tried by the said Supreme Court, the offence committed by such person shall be held by such Court to be a misdemeanor, And in an indictment for any such offence, an averment that the offender committed it "against the form of the Act of the Supreme Government of India in that case made and provided" shall be a sufficient averment that the offender committed the offence against the form of this Act.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever counterfeits coin shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to three years, and must not be less than six months, and shall also be liable to fine.

VI. And it is hereby declared and enacted, that whoever causes a genuine coin to appear like a different coin shall be deemed to counterfeit coin within the meaning of this Act.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever counterfeits the Queen's or the Company's coin shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to seven years, and must not be less than two years, and shall also be liable to fine.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever makes any die for the purpose of counterfeiting coin, or of enabling any other person to counterfeit coin, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to three years, and must not be less than six months, and shall also be liable to fine.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever makes any die for the purpose of counterfeiting the Queen's or the Company's coin, or of enabling any other person to counterfeit the Queen's or the Company's coin shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to seven years, and must not be less than two years, and shall also be liable to fine.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever is in possession of any implement or material with the intention of employing the same for the purpose of committing any of the offences defined in any of the five Sections last preceding, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to three years, and must not be less than six months and shall also be liable to fine.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever previously abets within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay the counterfeiting without the said Territories of the Queen's or the Company's coin, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to seven years, and must not be less than two years, and shall also be liable to fine.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever imports into the Territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay, or exports from the said Territories, any coin which he knows to be counterfeit intending or knowing it to be likely that such coin may pass as genuine, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to three years, and must not be less than six months, and shall also be liable to fine.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted that whoever imports into the Territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay, or exports from the said Territories, any coin which he knows to be a counterfeit of the Queen's or the Company's coin, intending or knowing it to be likely that such coin may pass as genuine, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to seven years, and must not be less than two years, and shall also be liable to fine.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever having any counterfeit coin which at the time at which he became possessed of it he knew to be counterfeit, delivers the same to any other, or attempts to induce any other to receive it, with the intention that such counterfeit coin shall pass as genuine, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to three years, and must not be less than six months, and shall also be liable to fine.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever, having any counterfeit coin which is a counterfeit of the Queen's or the Company's coin, and which at the time at which he became possessed of it he knew to be a counterfeit of the Queen's or the Company's coin, delivers the same to any other, or attempts to induce any other to receive it, with the intention that such counterfeit coin shall pass as genuine, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to seven years, and must not be less than two years, and shall also be liable to fine.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever knowing any coin to be counterfeit, delivers the same to any other person as genuine, or attempts to induce any other to receive it as genuine, shall be punished with fine to an amount which may extend to ten times the value of the coin of which such counterfeit coin is a counterfeit.

XVII. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever is in possession of counterfeit coin, having known at the time when he became possessed thereof that such coin was counterfeit, and intending or knowing it to be likely that such counterfeit coin may pass as genuine, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to three years, and must not be less than six months, and shall also be liable to fine.

XVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever is in possession of counterfeit coin which is a counterfeit of the Queen's or the Company's coin, having known at the time when he became possessed of it that it was counterfeit, and intending or knowing it to be likely that such counterfeit coin may pass as genuine, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to seven years, and must not be less than two years, and shall also be liable to fine.

XIX. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever being employed in any Mint, lawfully established within the said Territories; does any act or omits what he is legally bound to do with the intention of causing any coin issued from that Mint to be of different weight or composition from the weight or composition fixed by law, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to seven years, and must not be less than two years, and shall also be liable to fine.

XX. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever performs on any coin any operation which diminishes the weight, or alters the composition of that coin with the intention that the said coin shall pass

as if its weight had not been so diminished or its composition so altered, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to one year, and must not be less than three months, and shall also be liable to fine.

XXI. And it is hereby declared and enacted, that whoever scoops out part of a coin and puts any thing else into the cavity, shall be deemed to perform on that coin an operation which alters its composition within the meaning of this Act.

XXII. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever performs on any of the Queen's or the Company's coin any operation which diminishes the weight or alters the composition of that coin with the intention that the said coin shall pass as if its weight had not been so diminished, or its composition so altered, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to three years and must not be less than one year, and shall also be liable to fine.

XXIII. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever is in possession of any implement or material, intending to employ the same for the purpose of committing any of the offences defined in any of the four last preceding Sections, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to one year, and must not be less than three months, and shall also be liable to fine.

XXIV. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever having coin in his possession with respect to which the offence defined in Section XX. has been committed, and having known at the time when he became possessed of such coin that such offence had been committed with respect to it, delivers such coin to any other or attempts to induce any other to receive the same, with the intention that such coin may pass as if no such offence had been committed with respect to it, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to one year, and must not be less than three months, and shall also be liable to fine.

XXV. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever having coin in his possession with respect to which the offence defined in Section XXII. has been committed and having known at the time when he became possessed of such coin that such offence had been committed with respect to it, delivers such coin to any other or attempts to induce any other to receive the same, with the intention that such coin may pass as if no such offence had been committed with respect to it, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to three years, and must not be less than one year, and shall also be liable to fine.

XXVI. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever is in possession of coin with respect to which the offence defined in Section XX. has been committed, having known at the time of becoming possessed thereof that such offence had been committed with respect to such coin, and intending to cause the same to be in circulation, shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to one year, and must not be less than three months, and shall also be liable to fine.

XXVII. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever is in possession of coin with respect to which the offence defined in Section XXII. has been committed, having known at the time of becoming possessed thereof that such offence had been committed with respect to such coin, and intending to cause the same to be in circulation shall be punished with imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term which may extend to three years, and must not be less than one year, and shall also be liable to fine.

XXVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that whoever aids or abets any person in the commission of any of the offences specified in this Act shall be punished with the punishment herein provided for such offence.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information,

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 26th day of July next.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 17th May 1845, is hereby promulgated for general information :

ACT No. IX. of 1845.

An Act for amending the Schedules of Import Duties annexed to Act XIV. of 1836, to Act I. of 1838, and to Act VI of 1844, and for repealing Act XV. of 1844.

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the First day of June 1845, so much of Schedule A annexed to Act XIV. of 1836, so much of Schedule A annexed to Act I. of 1838, and so much of Schedule A annexed to Act VI. of 1844, as relates to the rates of duty to be charged on the Goods next hereinafter specified, be repealed.

Marine Stores, the produce or manufacture of the United Kingdom or of any British Possession.

Marine Stores, the produce of any other place or country.

Metals, wrought or unwrought, the produce or manufacture of the United Kingdom or of any British Possession.

Metals, wrought or unwrought, excepting Tin, the produce or manufacture of any other place.

Woollens, the produce or manufacture of the United Kingdom or of any British Possession.

Woollens, the produce of any other place or country.

Cotton and Silk Piece Goods, Cotton Twist and Yarn, the produce of the United Kingdom or of any British Possession.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the said First day of June 1845, all the provisions of the three above mentioned Acts, which have reference to so much of the Schedules A to those Acts respectively annexed as is repealed by this Act, shall from and after the said day be taken to have reference to the Schedule annexed to this Act, as if the Schedule annexed to this Act had been part of each of the Schedules A above mentioned.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that Act XV. of 1844, entitled an Act for amending the Schedules of Import Duties annexed to Act XIV. of 1836, to Act I. of 1838, and to Act VI. of 1844, be repealed.

The following Act No. XI. of 1845, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 24th ultimo, is republished for general information:—

**FORT WILLIAM,

THE 24TH MAY, 1845.

The following Act passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 24th May 1845, is hereby promulgated for general information:

ACT No. XI. of 1845.

An Act for the better collection, management and disbursement of certain Public Funds and Monies for Police and Municipal purposes throughout the Islands of Bombay and Colaba.

I. It is hereby enacted, that Sections 16, 27 and 28, and Chapter 3 of Regulation XIX. of 1827, of the Bombay Code, be repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that the powers of Her Majesty's Justices under Section 158 of 33, Geo. 3, Chapter 52, shall be held to extend over the whole of the Islands of Bombay and Colaba.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that any person chargeable with any rate or tax on account of any Houses, Buildings or Grounds or of any Shop or Stall, or of any Carriages, Carts or Horses, or any other matter or thing, shall upon the order of any two or more Justices make a true return in writing of the annual value of all such Buildings, Houses and Grounds, & of all such Shops or Stalls, Carriages, Carts or Horses, and other matter or thing, and any person who shall refuse or neglect to deliver such return within eight days after being required, so to do, or shall wilfully make a false return, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding two hundred Rupees.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Justices for the better identifying of any House or Building chargeable with any Assessment, to cause a number to be painted or fixed upon such House or Building, and it is hereby enacted, that any person who shall obliterate, deface or destroy such number shall be liable to a fine not exceeding two hundred Rupees.

V. And it is hereby enacted,—

1. That it shall be lawful for the Collector of Land Revenue of Bombay, to make a Quarterly Assessment on each and every Shop and Stall within the Islands of Bombay and Colaba, according to such rates as the said Governor in Council

shall fix by Proclamation in the Government Gazette,

2. That the amount of such Assessment shall be collected by the Collector and received in the first instance by such person or persons as he may appoint, such security having been given for the due discharge of the office as the said Collector may require, and the same liabilities and responsibilities as attach to individuals employed in the collection of Land Revenue of the said Presidency shall apply to all persons engaged in collecting the Tax.

3. That the Tax shall be collected quarterly, and for each payment made, a receipt signed by the Collector shall be given by the person receiving the amount.

VI. And it is hereby further enacted, that all religious Edifices all temporary Houses, Bungalows, or other temporary buildings situated within the limits of Military Cantonnments and occupied by European and Native Officers or by the Soldiers and Servants of Her Majesty's and the Company's Army, shall be exempted from the payment of any Assessment.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that the several Sums of Money specified under the following heads, shall in future be disbursed in the manner provided by this Act, viz.

Rule, Ordinance, and Regulation II. of 1812, Art. 2. and 6.

Rule, Ordinance, and Regulation II. of 1813.

Proclamation dated 23rd July 1817, by the Governor in Council of Bombay, of an Order of the Court of Directors, dated 29th January 1817, made under the authority of the Charter of the Court of Requests of Bombay, dated 8th January 1753, save and except the Fees thereby made payable to the Clerk of the said Court for his own benefit.

Rule, Ordinance, and Regulation I. of 1818.

Rule, Ordinance, and Regulation II. of 1827.

Regulation XIX. of 1827, C. 2, 4, 5, and 6.

Act No. XXVIII. of 1839.

And Section 5 of this Act.

All sums of Money which shall be levied by the Court of Petty Sessions, or by the Magistrates of Police of Bombay, or by any of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace within the Islands of Bombay and Colaba on account of any fines or penalties imposed by them for the breach of any Rule,

Ordinance or Regulation, or of any Act of the Parliament of Great Britain, or of any Act of the Government of India.

All sums of Money which shall be collected under Act V. of 1842, on the granting of any Licenses for the Sale of Spirituous or other Liquors within the Town and Islands of Bombay and Colaba, after payment thereof of the expenses of such Office Establishment and of such expenses incidental thereto, as may be fixed and approved by the Governor in Council of Bombay.

And all unapplied balances which at the time of the passing of this Act may be in the General Treasury to the credit of the County or Assessment Funds, or in the possession of the said Court of Petty Sessions, or of the Magistrates of Police, or any of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace derived from any of the above enumerated sources.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, and provided that nothing in this Act shall extend or apply to any fines imposed by the Collector of Customs of Bombay in his office and character of Collector, nor to such portion of any of the fines which the Court of Petty Sessions, or either of the Magistrates of Police may, in their discretion order, and which they are hereby authorized to order, to be paid to any Prosecutor or his Witnesses as and for compensation for loss of time, or for costs necessarily incurred by him in prosecuting the offences for which such fines or penalties may have been ordered to be paid.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that all Sums of Money which are by the said Act No. XXVIII. of 1839, ordered to be paid out of the Fund, therein called the County Fund, for the purposes in such Act specified, shall henceforth be paid out of the Fund in this Act designated the Municipal Fund.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that the several Sums of Money referred to in Section VII. of this Act, shall when collected and received, save and except so much as is otherwise provided for, be paid into the General Treasury, and form a Fund to be denominated, The Municipal Fund, and such Fund shall be placed under the supervision and control of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in Sessions assembled, or such other persons as to the Government of Bombay may seem most fit, & that for the administering the same and carrying this Act into effect, an executive body shall be formed, which shall be denominated the Board of Conservancy, which shall be composed of Seven Members, of whom the Senior Magistrate of Police shall be Chairman, and the Collector of Bombay Ex-Officio a Member, and the other five Members shall consist of two European and three Native Resident Justices, who shall be elected by Her Majesty's Bench of Justices, or by such other persons as the Government of Bombay may appoint to supervise and control the Fund, and shall remain in office for a period of three years, when a fresh election of five other Justices to form such Board of Conservancy shall be made by the said Bench, or persons appointed for the purpose by the Government of Bombay, and so on at the end of every three years successively a like new election shall take place, but nothing shall prevent the re-election of the same Justices, or any one or more of them to form the said Board if in the discretion of the Bench, or other persons appointed to superintend and control the Municipal Fund, it shall be deemed advisable for the interests of the public, and in the event of a vacancy occurring by death or otherwise among any of the said five Members, the said Bench of persons vested with the power by the Government of Bombay shall as soon as convenient elect some other Justice of the Peace

to supply the said vacancy for the remainder of the three years, and until the next general election shall take place.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that from and out of the said Municipal Fund, an Annual Sum of Rs 45,000 shall in the first instance be deducted and paid by equal monthly instalments, and carried to the credit of the Governor in Council of Bombay in the General Treasury, to be applied by the said Governor in Council for and on account of the expenses of the General Police throughout the Islands of Bombay and Colaba, and in the event of such expenses being at any time hereafter increased by a necessary augmentation of the Police Force, or through any other good cause, a further sum of Money, bearing the same proportion, such increased expenses of the Police aforesaid, the sum of 45,000 bears to the present expenses of the Police aforesaid, shall be in like manner deducted and appropriated out of the said Funds.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, that after the deduction and payment of such sum of Money as aforesaid, the residue of the said Fund shall be appropriated and disbursed by the said Board under and subject to the control of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, or other persons appointed for that purpose by the Government, for the following purposes:

1. Defraying the expenses of the Establishments necessary for the purposes of this Act.
2. Repairing, Cleansing, Draining and Lighting the Public Roads, Streets, Bridges, Tanks, Market Places and other public places of a like kind.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the said Board, with the approval of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, or other persons vested with that power by the Government, to construct any new Roads or Streets or other Public Works, tending to the improvement of the said Islands, connected with the comfort and health of the inhabitants thereof, which in their discretion they shall deem necessary, and for that purpose to cause Estimates and Plans to be framed and to be submitted to the Governor in Council of Bombay for his sanction, but no such new Road or Street, or other Public Work, shall be constructed without such sanction of the Governor in Council first had and obtained.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the said Board, with the sanction of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in Sessions assembled, or with the sanction of such other persons as may be vested with the control of the Municipal Fund by the Government of Bombay to nominate and appoint, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council of Bombay

One or more Superintendents of Repairs, Clerks to the Markets, Overseers and Scavengers, and any other officer that may be found necessary for carrying out the purposes of this Act.

And such persons shall be under the immediate orders and control of the said Board, and shall receive such salaries to be paid out of the said Fund, as the said Justices or other authorities appointed by the Government of Bombay shall fix, and the Governor in Council of Bombay shall approve.

XV. And it is hereby enacted and directed, that for better enabling the said Bench or persons empowered by the Government of Bombay to supervise and control the Municipal Fund, to ascertain the amount of fines payable to the said Fund, from any of the sources aforesaid, there

shall in every month be laid before them a summary of all convictions and punishments pronounced and determined by the said Court of Petty Sessions, or either of the Magistrates of Police or any Justice of the Peace respectively, during the preceding month.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that the sums authorized to be collected under the provisions of Chapter 4 of Regulation XIX of 1827, shall in future be collected by such person as the Governor in Council shall appoint.

XVII. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Board shall bring to account all items of receipt, shall as soon as practicable after 30th April of each year, render to the Governor in Council of Bombay and the Controlling Authorities, a Yearly Account of their Receipts and Disbursements under this Act, and the same shall be audited by such persons as the said Governor in Council shall appoint.

XVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that in the event of the body vested with the supervision and control of the Fund, rejecting any measure sub-

mitted for their sanction by the Conservancy Board, it shall be lawful for the said Board, if they see fit, to refer the subject to the Governor in Council of Bombay, whose decision thereon shall be final.

XIX. And it is hereby enacted, and declared that the terms "Police Fund," "County Fund" and "Assessment Fund," used in any Rule, Ordinance or regulation or in any Act of the Government of India in force in the Islands of Bombay and Colaba, shall be taken to mean the "Municipal Fund" hereinbefore, described.

XX. And it is hereby enacted, that all fines imposed under this Act, the recovery of which is not otherwise specially provided shall be recovered and levied under Act No. II. of 1839.
