PROCLAMATION.

BOMBAY TO WIT. By virtue of a precept to me directed, I hereby proclaim and give notice, that the Sessions of Oyer and Terminer and general Gaol Delivery, will be holden before the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, at the Court House, on Thursday the 25th day of September instant, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses and other Crimes, and Misdemeanors, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, and the Factories subordinate thereto, and also to enquire, hear and determine, in like manner, all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done, or committed, by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects, in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependant upon the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India, in alliance with the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place, will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound to prosecute, and give evidence, at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend, at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give notice, to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, that they be then and there, in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments and other

Remembrances, to do those things, which to their offices in that behalf appertain to be done. Dated this 4th day of September in the Seventh year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

FORT WILLIAM,

 THE 16TH AUGUST 1845.

The following Act is brought up before the Legislative Council this day—The Governor General of India in Council being desirous that no time should be lost in passing the Act.

Resolved.—That the Rules requiring that all Acts of the Governor General of India in Council shall be brought up for second reading in two months, or in three months from the date of the first reading, be suspended in respect to the following proposed Act, and that it be at once passed into Law.

ACT No. XV. OF 1845.

An Act for declaring and enacting the privileges of Native Officers and Soldiers of the Armies of the three Presidencies in respect of Judicial and Revenue proceedings.

I. Whereas doubts have arisen whether the Regulation XV. of 1816 of the Bengal Code is still in force, or how much, if any, of its provisions is still in force :—

It is therefore hereby declared and enacted, that the said Regulation and every provision thereof are still in force.

II. And whereas by virtue of Regulation VIII. of 1817 of the Madras Code, the Law for the Madras Army is the same as the Law hereinbefore declared and enacted for the Bengal Army, and whereas it is expedient and just that the Law should be the same for the Bombay Army also :—

It is therefore hereby enacted, that the said Regulation of the Bengal Code is extended to the Army of Bombay, except in so far as any of its provisions may be in their own nature inapplicable to that Army.

III. And whereas it is just and reasonable to extend the privileges conferred upon Native Officers and Soldiers by the Regulations aforesaid in respect of exemption for Stamps in legal proceedings :

It is hereby enacted, that all the Courts of the East India Company shall receive Plaints in original Suits, not being Suits originating in Loans or in pecuniary transactions of a Commercial nature upon unstamped paper when the plaintiff is a Native Officer or Soldier in the Military Establishment of the Presidency of Fort William, Fort St. George, or Bombay.

IV. Provided that the value of any Stamp from which a plaintiff may be exempted by the last preceding Section shall be charged in the Decree on behalf of Government to the Party cast, or to the Parties respectively in such proportions as may be deemed equitable.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that if any Native Officer or Soldier shall institute a Suit under this Act in which he is not bona fide interested or not interested to the extent alleged in the Plaintiff, for the purpose of enabling some other person to avail himself fraudulently of the advantages conferred by this Act, such Native Officer or Soldier shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five times the value of the stamped paper which the party interested would

have required for the institution of the Suit otherwise than under this Act, such fine to be levied in the manner prescribed for the execution of decrees.

VI. And whereas by Section IV. of Act IV. of 1840 it is enacted, that if any party shall complain to a Magistrate or other Officer exercising the powers of a Magistrate, that he has been without authority of Law forcibly dispossessed of any Land, Premises, Water, Fisheries, Crops or other produce of Land within the jurisdiction of such Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid, whether the same were possessed by such party as Proprietor, dependant Talookdar, Farmer, Under-Farmer, Ryot, or otherwise, the Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid shall require the parties complained against, and any other parties concerned, to appear and make defence in person or by Agent within a reasonable time; and if after the examination of the necessary witnesses and documents the complaint appears to him to be substantiated, he shall record a proceeding ordering the party complaining to be put again into possession of the subject of dispute and maintained in possession until the right to possession be determined by a competent Court; provided that no such order shall be passed unless the party complaining of having been so dispossessed prefer his claim within one month from the time of such dispossession :—

And whereas it is just that when the party complaining is a Native Officer or Soldier, a longer period than one month from the time of dispossession should be allowed for preferring his claim :—

It is therefore hereby enacted, that so much of the above recited Section of Act IV. of 1840, as provides that no such order as is therein mentioned shall be passed unless the party complaining of having been dispossessed in the manner therein mentioned prefer his claim within one month from the time of such dispossession, is repealed so far as regards complaints preferred by Native Officers or Soldiers.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that no such order as is mentioned in the above recited Section of Act IV. of 1840 shall be passed, when the party complaining of having been dispossessed is a Native Officer or Soldier unless such party prefer his claim within such period as may be considered by the Magistrate reasonable with reference to the distance of the party and the difficulty of communication.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 16th of August 1845, is hereby promulgated for general information :—

ACT No. XVI. OF 1845.

An Act for regulating the re-admission of Appeals after dismissal under Act XXIX. of 1841.

Whereas the Provisions of Act XXIX. of 1841 are inconveniently severe as regards Appeals and it is expedient to mitigate the strictness thereof :—

I. It is therefore hereby enacted, that whenever an Appeal in any of the Courts of the East India Company in the Presidencies of Bengal or Madras, shall after the passing of this Act have been dismissed under the Provisions of the said Act XXIX. of 1841, it shall be competent to the Court which shall have dismissed such Appeal to re-admit the same if the Appellant shall make application for that purpose on the Stamp prescribed

for miscellaneous Petitions, within three months after the Appeal shall have been dismissed if dismissed by the Sudder Court, and within one month after the Appeal shall have been dismissed if dismissed by any other Court, and shall satisfy the Court that the dismissal was occasioned by the default of his Vakeel or by unavoidable accident.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to any of the said Courts to re-admit any Appeal which may have been dismissed before the passing of this Act under the Provisions of Act XXIX. of 1841, if the Appellant shall make application for that purpose on the Stamp prescribed for miscellaneous Petitions, within three months after the passing of this Act, and shall satisfy the Court that the dismissal was occasioned by the default of his Vakeel or by unavoidable accident.

III. Provided always and it is hereby enacted, that no Appeal which has been re-admitted under this Act, and again dismissed under the Provisions of Act XXIX. of 1841, shall be again re-admitted.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 16th of August 1845, is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XVII. OF 1845.

An Act for the better enforcement of the attendance of Witnesses in the Courts of the Moonsiffs, within the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

I. It is hereby enacted, that Clauses 1 and 2, Section XXXI. and Clause 1, Section XXXII. of Regulation XXIII. of 1814, of the Bengal Code, are repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, if any Moonsiff shall require the evidence of a person not within his local jurisdiction, and such person shall not attend at the requisition of the parties, the Moonsiff shall issue the necessary process for procuring the attendance of such person, and send the same to the Moonsiff within whose local jurisdiction such person is, who shall endorse such process and cause it to be duly served and executed.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that within the said Territories all powers now exercised by Zillah Judges for enforcing the attendance of any person upon whom a summons to appear as a witness has been duly served, and who has failed to attend in their Courts, shall from and after the passing of this Act, be exercised by Moonsiffs for enforcing the attendance of any person upon whom a summons to appear as a witness has been duly served, and who has failed to attend in their Courts.—Provided that all orders passed by Moonsiffs under this Act shall be subject to an appeal to the Zillah or City Judge, whose decision thereon shall be final.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th of August 1845.

ACT No. — OF 1845.

An Act for the establishment and maintenance of field boundary marks in the Presidency of Bombay.

Whereas it is desirable, with a view to the better definition and security of landed property, the prevention of encroachments and disputes, and the identification of lands assessed to, or exempted from, the public revenue, that provision should be made for the establishment and maintenance of permanent marks to distinguish the boundaries of fields:

I. It is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful, within the territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay, for such Revenue Officers as the Governor in Council may entrust with that authority, to require that marks be erected and maintained by the Owners or Occupants on the boundaries of fields, of such materials, and in such number as may appear to such Officers sufficient for permanently distinguishing the limits of those fields.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that the requisition shall be served on the persons owning or occupying each field according to the Form A annexed to this Act, and in the event of these persons not being found in the Village, that the said requisition shall be posted at the Village Chowree or other conspicuous place in the Village, which shall be held to be a sufficient service.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that in default of the Owners or Occupants of the fields complying with the requisition, the said Revenue Officers shall give directions for the erection and repair of such field boundary marks, the cost of which shall be equitably apportioned on the fields which they serve to distinguish, and shall be charged to the persons possessing a right of ownership or occupancy in such fields, of if there are no such persons forthcoming (or willing to defray the charge) to the revenues of the Village in which the fields are situated.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that no person being out of possession and claiming a right of ownership or occupancy in fields, the cost of erecting or maintaining whose boundary marks has been charged to the revenues of the Village, in consequence of his neglecting to defray the same, shall have his claim allowed until he makes good all sums so charged.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that any person who may be convicted of wilfully erasing, removing, or injuring field boundary marks, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty Rupees for each mark so erased, removed, or injured, one half of which fine may be awarded on conviction to the informer, and the other half shall be chargeable with the cost of restoring the mark.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that authority for the assessment and realization of all sums due under the provisions of this Act, whether as costs or penalties, shall be vested in Revenue Officers authorized to provide for the erection and maintenance of field boundary marks, and shall be exercised by them in conformity with the rules prescribed for the assessment and realization of Revenue demands in general, and that the proceedings of those Officers in all such matters shall be recorded in writing, and shall be subject to appeal to the Revenue authorities to whom they are subordinate.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 16th day of November next.

ACT No. XVIII. OF 1845.

An Act for the punishment of offences committed by Convicts sentenced to imprisonment for life.

Whereas it is expedient that offences committed by Convicts sentenced to imprisonment for life,

should be punished with greater severity than such offences are punished with in other cases:—

I. It is hereby enacted, that within the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company, except within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts, and except within the Settlements in the Straits of Malacca, any convict sentenced to imprisonment for life, or to transportation for life, who does any act with the intention of thereby causing, or with the knowledge, that he or she is likely thereby to cause the death of any person, shall, upon conviction thereof, before the Sessions Court, subject to confirmation by the Sudder Court, be punished with death, or with transportation for life, or with Corporal punishment not exceeding 39 stripes, whether such Convict does or does not by such act cause the death of any person.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that any such Convict as aforesaid who commits any offence whatever other than the offences mentioned in the preceding Section, or who is guilty of violent or disorderly conduct after having been punished by the order of the Superintendent of the Jail, in which he or she is confined, shall, upon conviction thereof, before the Sessions Court, subject, if the Sentence be transportation for life, to confirmation by the Sudder Court, be punished with transportation for life, or with Corporal punishment not exceeding 39 stripes.
