NOTICE

Is hereby given, that a new-Light House was exhibited at Flag Staff Point, Trincomalee on the night of the 1st of October 1845, and will be continued every night from sunset until daylight. The lantern having a fixed light with two powerful reflectors, when hoisted is 206 feet above the level of the Sea, the light can be seen 15 miles off from any bearings between Pigeon Island and Foul Point comprehending an angle of 140 degrees.

The following remarks are published for general information.

Latitude of the Light..... 8°. 35'. 38" N.
Longitude East of Madras Flag

Staff..... 0°. 58'. 22" E.
Longitude from Greenwich.. 81°. 14'. 52" E.
Variation of the Compass .. 0°. 59'. 37" E.
Foul Point bears from the Light S. 55°, E. distant 5½ miles, and the extreme of the reef off that point S. 60° E. nearly 5 miles.

Ships coming from the S. E. with a fair wind at night and having made the light should on no account in passing Foul Point bring the light to bear to the northward of W. N. W., that bearing will bring a Ship more than half a mile to the Northward of the reef and in not less than 14 fathoms water.

If it is intended to anchor in Back Bay (which ships may safely do between the middle of March and 25th October,) and having brought the light to bear W. N. W. they may steer directly for it rounding Flag Staff Point close, (the point being steep too,) and anchor in 10 fathoms water, with the light bearing about S. by E., small vessels may anchor in 6 or 7 fathoms water with the light bearing S. E. by E.

From the light the outside visible rock off Pigeon Island distant about 9 miles, is in a direct line with Elizabeth Point bearing N. 15° W.

Ships coming from the Northward and wishing to anchor in Back Bay should be cautious not to bring the light to bear to the East-

ward of South, that bearing will lead two miles to the Eastward of Pigeon Island and nearly a mile to the Eastward of Lively Rocks. These rocks lie half a mile to the Eastward of Elizabeth Point leaving 4 fathoms water close to.

When quite sure of being to the Southward of the Lively Rocks, ships may bring the light to bear S. by E. and anchor as before directed. After the 25th October the anchorage in Back-Bay is not safe until the middle of March, as there is frequently towards the end of October before the N. E. Monsoon sets in, a heavy swell with light variable winds.

Ships should not attempt the Inner Harbour during the night except under most favourable circumstances, such as good moon light, and having a person on board possessing local knowledge of the harbour and the entrance to it.

In such a case and being abreast of Flag Staff Point the light kept N. N. W. ¼ W. will lead clear of the Chapel Rocks. The extreme rock which is under water, bears from the light S. 18 E. distant two miles.

to enquire, hear and determine, in like manner, all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done, or committed, by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects, in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependant upon the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India, in alliance with the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place, will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Rabberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound to prosecute, and give evidence, at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend, at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give notice, to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, that they be then and there, in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments and other Remembrances, to do those things, which to their offices in that behalf appertain to be done. JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

Under the provision of Section II. of Act No. XVII. of 1844, the following Rules for the Civil and Criminal Administration of Colaba approved by the Honorable the Governor in Council, are published for general information:—

CIVIL BRANCH.

CHAPTER I.

*Rules in regard to Civil Suits as contemplated in Section II. of Act No. XVII. of 1844.
Of the constitution of the Agent's Civil Court.*

Rule 1st.—The Political Agent for the Governor shall preside over the Civil Court of Colaba, and have general control over the establishment annexed thereto.

Rule 2nd.—The Agent shall ordinarily hold his Court at the principal station Alibagh, but should circumstances render it necessary, he may with the permission of the Honorable the Governor in Council hold it elsewhere.

Rule 3rd.—The Agent shall use a circular seal one inch and three quarters (1 $\frac{3}{4}$ In.) in diameter, having the words COURT OF THE POLITICAL AGENT AT COLABA inscribed upon it in English and Mahratta characters.

Rule 4th.—The Jurisdiction of the Agents Civil Court shall extend to the cognizance of all suits and complaints of a Civil nature, which may arise between natives of Colaba and others, provided that the Suit be not against a person, and in a matter belonging to the Jurisdiction of a Military Court of Requests.

II. Provided that in the case of immovable property it is situated within the limits of Colaba as laid down in Section I. of the Colaba Act and that in other cases, the Defendant shall have resided as a fixed inhabitant, or that the cause of action shall have arisen when the Suit was commenced within those limits.

III. And provided that no Decree has been obtained, and that no Suit is pending on the matter in dispute in any other Court of competent Jurisdiction.

Rule 5th.—But with reference to the foregoing Rule, it is hereby declared that Suits on the following subjects shall not be cognizable in the Civil Court of the Political Agent, viz:—

All claims for damages against persons in authority under the late Government, for abuse of power during that period.

All claims against Government on account of Enams.

All claims against Government on account of Jagheers, Wurshas, Pensions, Nemnooks, and other advantages not hereditary.

All disputes regarding public Rent or Revenue payable to Government, and all complaints of exaction by Mamludars, or District, or Village Officers.

All claims on account of Village debts; all Boundary disputes and disputes regarding the use of Wells and Water-courses.

Rule 6th.—The following persons of rank are, by order of Government, exempted from the Jurisdiction of the Agent's Civil Court in all matters partaking of the nature of a Civil Suit, viz:—

1. Cumlabaee Sahib Angria.
2. Yeshodubae Sahib Angria.
3. Umbikabae Sahib Angria (widow of the late Ragoonjee Angria.)
4. Guzrabaee or Tye Sahib Angria (widow of the late Manajee Ragoonjee Angria.)
5. Luxmeebaee Sahib Angria (widow of the late Kanajee Ragoonjee Angria.)
6. Ruckmabae, the eldest daughter of the late Ragoonjee Angria, and widow of the late Deshmokh of Sungumnair.

II. And all claims partaking of the nature of Civil Suits preferred against any of the persons of rank enumerated in this Rule, shall be referred for investigation and settlement as the Hon'ble the Governor in Council shall please to direct.

Rule 7th.—As a general Rule, the Agent should not entertain any Suit with respect to any claim or matter, upon which a final decision may have been previously pronounced under the late Government, by any authority competent at the time to pronounce such decision.

II. But it shall be competent to the Court to receive applications made in due form, for executing the whole or any part of such original Decrees, passed in writing as shall be produced by the applicant, and shall be certified upon reference to have emanated from competent authority. Upon satisfaction of this point, the Court shall direct execution to be carried out in the usual manner, provided that the decision referred to shall have been passed within a period of 12 years antecedent to the promulgation of these Rules, and that means are left of executing the Decree.

Rule 8th.—The Agent shall exercise a control over all the servants employed in the Court with regard to their suspension or dismissal, observance being paid to the General Orders of Government in the case of the dismissal of a servant receiving Rupees 30 per mensem and upwards.

Rule 9th.—The Agent to have control over the Civil Jail of Colaba, which he shall visit from time to time. He shall moreover issue the necessary orders with regard to the economy thereof, and the accommodation, management, health and security of the prisoners.

Rule 10th.—The Agent shall obey all precepts or orders issued to him by the Suddur Dewanee Adawlut, and shall at the requisition of that Court forward such returns of Suits filed or decided, or of any other Judicial matters as may be required by that authority. Whenever the Agent requires for the decision of a case before him, an exposition of the Hindoo or Mahomedan Law, he shall obtain the same by application to the Judge of Tannah from the Law Officers of that Zillah.

Rule 11th.—With the view of affording assistance to the Agent in disposing of the Suits filed in his Court, a Nyayadeesh or Moonsif, may be appointed by the Hon'ble the Governor in Council, and he shall subscribe before the Agent in open Court, a declaration to the effect that he will administer Justice without fear and with strict impartiality. The Nyayadeesh shall use a circular seal 1 inch in diameter, inscribed "NYAYADEESH OF COLABA."

II. In the event of the misconduct of the officer appointed Nyayadeesh, he may be suspended either by the Suddur Adawlut or by the Agent, pending a report to Government, in the one case by the Suddur Adawlut or in the other to the Suddur Adawlut by the Agent.

III. The Suddur Adawlut after considering such proceedings as may have been held, may restore such officer or confirm his suspension pending a reference to Government.

Rule 12th.—The cognizance of the Nyayadeesh shall extend over original Suits to such an amount as may from time to time seem advisable to, or be recommended to Government by the Agent and sanctioned accordingly.

II. In the event of the Agent's temporary absence, or indisposition, the Nyayadeesh may with the permission of Government exercise such part of the duties of the Agent as may be necessary for filing Suits, issuing Summonses, receiving pleadings or detaining Defendants in Suits on failure of security in cases of emergency.

Rule 13th.—The Court shall have a Nazir, and such other inferior officers, whether writers or peons, as the extent of business may require.

II. The Nazir shall provide such securities, and take, and subscribe such solemn declaration as may be deemed necessary.

III. It shall be the duty of the Nazir, either personally or by means of his inferior officers to serve Summonses, and to fix up notices issuing from the Court, to take all securities required by the Court, and to execute all written orders or process, to him directed, more especially for the apprehension or custody of persons, and for the sequestration, attachment, or sale of property, to answer the Courts Decrees.

IV. The Nazir shall return the Summons, or Order, on the day appointed with an endorsement specifying the manner in which it has been executed, or the cause that has prevented its execution.

V. The Nazir shall be ex-officio keeper of the Agents Civil Jail, and shall be responsible for the safe custody of the prisoners, and for the due observance of the orders of the Agent on all points connected with their treatment.

Rule 14th.—The Agents Court shall have a Sheristedar, and writers subordinate to him, as the extent of business may require.

II. The Sheristedar shall take and subscribe in open Court, the solemn declaration prescribed in Section XXXI. of Regulation II. of 1827, of the Bombay Code.

III. It shall be the duty of the Sheristedar to keep a Register of all plaints filed in the Court, and to receive and file all pleadings, exhibits and other papers in Civil Suits.

IV. To take down in writing minutes of the proceedings of the Court, the depositions and examinations taken in it, and all orders and judgments that may be passed.

V. The Sheristedar further shall examine in presence of the parties interested, all matters of account referred to him by the Court, and prepare such abstracts or statements, as the order of reference may require.

VI. He shall also prepare all Summonses, Orders, Warrants, Decrees, Proclamations or other writings issuing under the Seal and signature of the Court, and copies of such papers in Court as may be required.

VII. The Sheristedar shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Court and shall arrange each paper according to its number in the respective Suit.

Rule 15th.—Bribery, Extortion, and generally all acts of Abuse, or neglect of duty on the part of the Servants of the Agent's Court, shall be punished under the criminal powers conferred upon the Agent.

Rule 16th.—Persons of good character may be allowed to practise as Wukeels or pleaders in the Agent's Civil Court, but the Agent may exercise his discretion in prohibiting persons of loose character from pleading in Court. It is moreover to be understood that, whilst the remuneration of Wukeels will be left to the parties employing them, the Court reserves to itself the right of imposing a fine at discretion, (but never exceeding in amount 500 Rupees) upon any Wukeel, against whom unnecessary delay, evasion, or extortion in the exercise of his functions or collusion with the opposite party may be proved, and in the event of such fine not being paid, the Agent shall sentence the offender to imprisonment for a period not exceeding three (3) months, or until such fine be paid.

II. Orders imposing fines under the first clause of this Rule, shall emanate from the Agent himself whether the offender be Wukeel in a case pending before himself, or before the Nyayadeesh.

III. The Agents order imposing a fine under this Rule shall without staying execution in the interim be open to appeal to the Suddur Dewanee Adawlut, and the decision passed on such appeal shall be final.

Rule 17th.—A pleader, when his Wukeelatnama has been filed, shall be held to represent his client in all matters connected with the prosecution, or defence of the Suit, or proceeding in Court; and acts done by, and notices served upon, the pleader shall be equally valid as if done by or served upon the party unless they be to procure the personal attendance of the said party, or the fulfilment of a Decree.

II. It shall be incumbent on a pleader, at the time of receiving any accounts, writings, or documents from his client, to give a written receipt for them, and the omission of this shall subject the pleader to a fine at the discretion of the Court, as laid down in the preceding Rule. And further the refusal of a pleader to restore such papers to his client shall subject him, according to the nature of the case, to the general rules of the Criminal Code.

Rule 18th.—The remuneration of pleaders will be left to the discretion of the parties employing them, but whenever it becomes necessary to embody the amount of costs of a Suit in the Decree thereof, the Court will not generally award more than 3 per cent, and only so much within that per-centage as shall appear just and proper.

II. In cases withdrawn, or compromised the Court, will, in like manner only award from the party found liable in costs, half the amount specified in the 1st Clause.

III. The party found liable in costs will, on no occasion be held answerable for more than the remuneration decreed to one pleader engaged by the opposite party.

CHAPTER II.

Of Civil process in the Political Agent's Civil Court.

Rule 19th.—In the absence of Fees upon stamped paper, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to declare that Fees upon the scale laid down in Appendix A. to these Rules, shall be levied upon all original Suits filed in the Political Agent's Civil Court, the same fees recurring upon all appeals made in conformity with the hereinafter mentioned provisions.

II. No Suits will be admitted upon the file, unless accompanied with a receipt for the fees duly paid into the hands of the Nazir or other appointed Treasurer of the Court.

III. But it shall be competent to the Agent to remit, upon all process, the fees to any suitor who upon proper enquiry shall appear to possess no means whatever of defraying the same.

IV. In all cases in which a party suing as a pauper may win his Suit, the amount of fees leviable, and all extra expenses defrayed by the Court, on his or her account, shall be computed and levied from the defendant.

V. Provided that upon satisfactory evidence being shewn of the party's ability to defray them, the Agent shall at any stage of the proceedings direct the levy of the regulated fees in arrears, and in default of payment reject the Suit.

VI. Such expenses of a Suit as may be incurred by a pauper party beyond the remission of the fees leviable upon process, may be defrayed by the Agent, provided that, in no one Suit the amount exceed Rupees Twenty-five (25.) When the extra expenses shall exceed this amount the previous sanction of the Suddur Dewanee Adawlut shall be held necessary to a disbursement.

Rule 20th.—The Agent shall be subject to all orders of the Suddur Dewanee Adawlut with respect to admitting or rejecting applications to be allowed to sue in *formâ pauperis*. But in Suits falling within the cognizance of the Nyayadeesh or Moonsiff, the orders of the Agent upon this point shall be final.

Rule 21st.—Suits filed in the Agent's Court to be numbered, dated, and recorded, and *ceteris paribus*, priority to be allowed according to date.

II. But suits in which the defendant is imprisoned, are entitled to priority over all others without reference to their order upon the file.

III. Also Suits instituted to establish a right to attached property shall be heard in priority.

Rule 22nd.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the provisions of Regulation III. of 1827, made for the sittings of Courts and for certain other matters connected with their official proceedings in general, shall be adopted, in so far as may be practicable, for the guidance of the Agents Civil Court.

Rule 23rd.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the Rules for "summoning and arresting defendants and for sequestrating their property" as laid down in Chapter III. of Regulation IV. of 1827, and the Rules enacted for "the continuation and completion of the pleadings" contained in Chapter IV. and for withdrawing of Suits," contained in Chapter V, also of "fixing the time of trial, of defaults, of trial," and of the course to be followed, as contained in Chapter VI. also the Rules, respecting "Commissions for, ascertaining facts depending upon local circumstances, comprised in Chapter VIII. Rules applicable to "Witnesses," given in Chapter IX. of notice to be given to Co-heirs in Suits which have been instituted without their participation given in Chapter X. of "contempts," given in Chapter XI. of "costs," given in Chapter XII. of "enforcing security Bonds taken in Suits," as laid down in Chapter XIII. of the above quoted Regulation, or as each or any of these Rules respectively may have been modified by subsequent enactment or interpretations of the Suddur Dewanee Adawlut, shall, for all practicable purposes, be taken and acted upon as the Rules of the Agent's Court.

II. And in the case of absent witnesses, the Agent shall be guided by the provisions of Act VII. of 1841.

Rule 24th.—And with respect to the Decree, and its enforcement, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that, in the Territory subject to the Agent at Colaba, attachments and sales of land, or of any interest in land or of any specific, or moveable property, or the performance of any particular act, or the arrest and imprisonment of the Defendant in satisfaction of the Decree, or other process of the Agent's Court or of any authority subordinate thereto, shall be made ordered, and carried into effect by the Agents Courts, and under its directions. And the Agent shall follow the Rules under this head comprised in Chapter XIV, of Regulation IV. of 1827 as far as may be practicable and according to any subsequent modifying enactments, and under the correction of interpretations passed by the Suddur Dewanee Adawlut.

II. Provided that, in no case shall land or its product be sold, in execution of a Decree of the Agent's Court, previous to the full satisfaction of the demands of Government.

III. Provided also, that if the emoluments of "Wuttuns," that is to say of District or Village hereditary offices, be made the subject of an award, by a Decree or any other process of the Agent's Court, which would have the effect of alienating the emoluments applicable to the remuneration of such "Wuttun," or hereditary office the Agent shall award, or cause to be awarded only such surplus amount thereof as shall leave the emoluments of the Wuttun sufficient for the proper discharge of the duties thereof.

IV.* And provided that no Decree passed in the Agent's Court shall, in any manner compel the servitude of any person in satisfaction of a pecuniary obligation, any written bond or agreement relative thereto notwithstanding.

Rule 25th.—The Agent may, at his discretion take for his guidance the provisions of Regulation V. of 1827 for "limiting the time of prosecuting Civil actions and respecting acknowledgments of debts executed without receipt of a full consideration in value and regarding the rate of interest, the effect upon interest by tenders of payment, and the disposal of pledged or mortgaged property" in all matters which may come under his cognizance.

Rule 26th.—The principle involved in the Provisions of Regulation VIII. of 1827. with respect to the recognition of heirs, executors and administrators and to the appointment of an administrator by the Zillah "Courts, where there is no heir or executor competent or willing to be placed in possession," shall also be observed by the Agent and the management and trust of all unclaimed property shall vest in such persons (being in the employ of Government) as may be deemed best on each occasion; and should no authorized claimant appear within a reasonable time, the Agent will exercise his discretion in reporting the circumstances to the Sudder Dewanee Adawlut.

Rule 27th.—It shall be competent to the agent, or to the Nyayadeesh, acting under his immediate control, to refer the parties in an original suit, brought before them, respectively to an Arbitrator or to a Panchayet of their own voluntary nomination and if the parties agree to the same in writing, it is to be clearly understood that the decision of the Arbitrator, or of the Panchayet, is to be final and the case is to be struck off the file as decided accordingly.

II. And the Agent and the Nyayadeesh may, with the view to avoid unnecessary delay, after the parties have given their written assent to an arbitration or Panchayet inclusive of the condition aforesaid, appoint, respectively a reasonable period within which the award shall be delivered in Court and if the award should not be delivered within the specified time, the Arbitration shall be considered cancelled, and the parties to be in the same relation as if no such Arbitration had existed.

III. The process of summoning witnesses shall, at the requisition of the Arbitrator, or of the Panchayet be carried into effect by the orders of the Court and upon the final award being filed the expenses of summoning the witnesses shall be recovered from the losing party. But no other fees will be levied by the Court upon any papers, or exhibits in a Suit referred to Arbitration. But the petition for the enforcement of the decree must be accompanied by the established fee.

Rule 28th.—The Agent may, for obvious reasons, as an error, or omission being apparent on the face of the proceedings, or the discovery of new matter or evidence not previously within the knowledge or compass of the party, revise his decree, or cause one passed by the Nyayadeesh to be revised, and such revision may also be made at the instance of either plaintiff or defendant. In respect of the revision of decree the Agent will be guided by the provisions laid down in Section LXXI. of Regulation IV. of 1827.

Rule 29th.—A decree issued in the Agent's Court may be enforced in any Zillah or Political Jurisdiction subject to the Bombay Presidency under the general rules thereof, and vice versa in respect of executing legal process issued in his Court, against persons residing within the limits of Her Majesty's Supreme Court in Bombay the Agent will be guided by the provisions of Act No. XXIII. of 1840.

Rule 30th.—The Agent will be guided by the provisions of Section I. of Act No. XII. of 1843, with respect to minuting in English, at the time of pronouncing his decision, so much of all Decrees as consists of the points to be decided and the decision thereon, and the reasons of such decision.

II. In a similar manner the Nyayadeesh, or Moonsiff will act conformably to Section III. of the same act, with regard to recording his decisions in his own vernacular language.

Rule 31st.—Every suit originally tried by the Nyayadeesh or Moonsiff shall be open to an appeal to the Agent, provided such appeal be made within thirty (30) days from the date of passing the Decree, and the Decree of the Agent, shall in every such case be final.

II. Every suit originally tried by the Agent shall be open to an appeal to the Sudder Dewanee Adawlut, if the appeal be made within the space of ninety (90) days from the date of passing the Decree, and the Decree of that Court shall be final.

III. It shall nevertheless be competent to the Agent, after the expiration of the prescribed period, if the appeal is to himself to grant the same upon sufficient cause being shewn, and if it is to the Sudder Dewanee Adawlut to admit it temporarily subject to the decision of that Court and to enable the Sudder Dewanee Adawlut to decide upon the admission or rejection of the reasons set forth, the Agent shall for that purpose cause enquiry to be made and endorse the same together with his opinion upon the petition and forward the same to the Superior Court.

Rule 32nd.—The appeal to the Sudder Dewanee Adawlut may be made either to the Agent, or to that Court direct. In the one case the Agent shall cause the established fees to be levied (excepting in the case of parties) who having been allowed to sue in Formâ Pauperis in the original suit, may be permitted also to appeal in the same manner from the party appealing, and shall forward the petition accompanied by a receipt to the Appellant Court. If the petition is made direct to the Superior Court, the fees shall be levied upon its transmission to the Agent's Court and so on with regard to all other process directed by the Appellant Court.

NOTE.—Bonds regarding personal servitude are common throughout Colaba, and petitions are frequently made in the Political Agents Court to have them enforced. The rate of servitude is in general, 1 year and 1 month for every 5 Rs. the persons bound, whether male or female, performing any service commanded of them in the creditor's house, and receiving from him a stipulated amount of food and clothing.

Rule 33rd.—The rules regarding petitions of appeal, their admission and rejection, the returns of proceedings and exhibits and the intermediate proceedings shall be regulated in the Agent's Court in accordance with those comprised in Section LXXIV. to LXXX. of Regulation IV. of 1827.

II. And further the Rules laid down in Chapter XVII. for "staying and executing Decrees under appeal" and in Chapter XVIII. of procedure and trial in appeal, and in Chapter XIX. of the Decree in appeal, and in Chapter XXI. touching applications to the Sudder Dewanee Adawlut in incidental complaints, and in Chapter XXII. of the same Regulation on the subject of special appeals, shall as the same may be modified by subsequent enactments, and interpretations of the Sudder Dewanee Adawlut, be adopted for all practicable purposes as the guiding Rules of the Agent's Court.

Rule 34th.—It shall be competent to the Hon'ble the Governor in Council to close by a Notification in the Government Gazette the Agent's Civil Court when circumstances may render such expedient.

Rule 35th.—And whereas it is necessary to make provision for the disposal of Civil cases now pending before the Political Agent, the Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to declare that all cases which may be pending in the Political Agent's Civil Court, on the date of the promulgation of these rules shall be transferred to the jurisdiction of the Agent and of the Nyayadeesh respectively in the same manner and under the same Rules as the said cases had been filed originally under the foregoing provisions, and the said transferred cases shall as regards the extent of Civil process left undone on such date, be considered in all respects as under the Rules, provisions, and charges herein laid down for original suits.

Rule 36th.—The provisions of Regulation XXVI. of 1827, are declared applicable to all Cazees in the Colabah Territory.

CRIMINAL BRANCH.

CHAPTER III.

(Magisterial)

Rule 1st.—The Agent for the Governor shall exercise the functions of a Magistrate throughout the Territory subject to his control and he shall co-operate with the different Zillah Magistrates, or with any constituted Political Authority under the Bombay Presidency, (and vice versa) with regard to procuring evidence, furnishing information, securing offenders, and executing process in general, the Agent referring disputed points of jurisdiction, or of process for determination by the judges of the Sudder Foujdaree Adawlut.

II. And in the case of witnesses residing, or process requiring to be served within the local limits of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Bombay, the Agent will be guided by the provisions of Act No. XXIII. of 1840.

Rule 2nd.—The Agent shall, with the sanction of Government, invest the Mamludars, or Mahalkuries appointed to collect the Revenue in the district under his control with the powers of District Police Officers, and Officers so appointed shall be under the Superintendence of the Agent and shall be amenable to him for misconduct.

II. The District Police Officers, so appointed, shall exercise the functions and be bound by the rules laid down for their guidance in Chapter V. of Regulation XII. of 1827, as interpreted from time to time by the Judges of the Sudder Foujdaree Adawlut; and the powers of the District Police Officers so appointed shall be those conferred by Regulation IV. of 1830, Section V. and by Act XX. of 1835, respectively.

III. With the sanction of the Hon'ble the Governor in Council, there shall also be appointed one or more Joint Police Officers for the district under the Agent's control whose powers and functions shall be those laid down in Regulation III. of 1833.

Rule 3rd.—Heads of villages shall be named by the Agent throughout Colaba, and shall be furnished with a commission by him for the Superintendence and Police control of their respective villages and the powers and functions of such heads of villages shall be those specified in Chapter V. of Regulation XII. of 1827.

Rule 4th.—The Agent shall exercise control over all the officers employed in the Police, whom he may suspend or fine for neglect of duty; and bribery, extortion, or abuse of power shall be treated as Criminal offences. With regard to the dismissal of an officer in the receipt of 30 Rupees per mensem and upwards, observance must be paid to the general orders of government.

Rule 5th.—In exercising the functions of Magistrate, the Agent will in so far as they are practicable, take for his guidance the general Rules laid down in Chapters II. III. and IV. of Regulation XII. of 1827, as they may be modified by subsequent enactments, and by interpretations passed from time to time by the Judges of the Sudder Foujdaree Adawlut.

II. And whenever mention is made of the power and jurisdiction of the Magistrate in those Chapters, the said powers are to be held as regards the Agent to be commensurate with the absolute Criminal Jurisdiction conferred upon him by the Governor in Council, and any sentence passed by the Agent in excess of that shall be referred to the Sudder Foujdaree Adawlut.

Rule 6th.—And with the view of protecting the public revenues from embezzlement or abuse, and also the Ryots from undue exactions, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to extend to Colaba the provisions of the following enactments viz :—

Section XI. XIV. Clause II. of Section XV. and Section XXVII. respectively of Regulation XVI. of 1827, together with the supplemental Regulation XV. of 1831, and V. of 1833.

Section XVI. and XXV. of Regulation XVII. of 1827, and the penal provisions of Act XXVII. of 1837, and of Act I. of 1838, together with the interpretations applicable thereto passed from time to time by the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut.

II. And with the view of securing the efficient discharge of their duties by hereditary District or Village Revenue Officers, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council is also pleased to declare the provisions of Act XI. of 1843, applicable to the Territory of Colaba.

Rule 7th.—The Agent shall be empowered to fine all persons proved guilty of breaches of local or established rules, or contracts for the manufacture and sale of spirituous liquors, Opium and Ganja, and in default of payment of the fine, the Agent shall proceed according to the provisions of Act II. of 1839, and this rule shall be held to include Proprietors, Farmers, or managers of land who may be proved guilty of breach or connivance of any such local or established rule or contract.

II. And it shall be competent to the Agent to award a moiety of any fines or any lesser portion thereof which may be levied under this rule to the persons, through whose means the illicit proceeding may have been detected.

III. *Provided, that (without staying process) an appeal shall lie against such fine to the Hon'ble Governor in Council, or to such other authority to which the Hon'ble the Governor in Council shall delegate the Appellant Jurisdiction in such cases.*

CRIMINAL BRANCH

JUDICIAL.

CHAPTER IV.

Of the constitution of the Agent's Criminal Court.

Rule 8th.—The Agent for the Governor shall preside over the Criminal Court of Colaba, and shall ordinarily hold a Court for the trial of offences at Alibagh, but its station may be temporarily altered with concurrence of the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut.

II. The Agent's seal shall be that prescribed in Rule 3rd for the Civil Court.

Rule 9th.—The Ministerial officers of the Agent's Civil Court shall officiate in the Criminal Court each in his own station, and shall if necessary qualify by oath and security.

II. The Officers of the Agent's Criminal Court shall be punishable for misconduct under the Rules prescribed for the Civil Branch.

Rule 10th.—The Agent shall have cognizance in his Judicial capacity over all crimes and offences perpetrated within the limit of his control, but in capital cases the Agent shall sit with three Assessors chosen from amongst different castes and classes of the respectable inhabitants of Colaba who shall attend during the whole of each trial, and shall, at the end of the same, give in their written opinions which shall then be incorporated with the record of the proceedings. In all trials however, the decision of the Court shall rest exclusively with the Agent.

II. With the view of selecting Assessors to sit with him in trials of capital offences, the Agent shall cause a descriptive list to be framed from time to time, containing the names of such of the Inhabitants of the district or of any part thereof, as may from known respectability of character be qualified to act as Assessors, and from this list the Assessors shall be chosen in turn. A copy of this list shall be forwarded by the Agent to the Register of the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut for the information of that Court.

III. It being necessary that the persons selected to act as Assessors shall promptly attend the Agent's summons it shall be competent to the Agent in the event of needless delay, or refusal of the party summoned to attend, to treat that offence as a contempt of Court.

Rule 11th.—A prisoner placed upon trial for a capital offence in the Agent's criminal Court may, upon good cause shewn, be permitted to challenge the names of the Assessors to the extent of three, and if the challenge be admitted by the Court, other Assessors shall be directed to attend.

Rule 12th.—The absolute jurisdiction of the Agent in criminal cases shall extend to fine and to imprisonment for 5 years with or without hard labor, and sentences involving a punishment beyond that period must be submitted for the confirmation of the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut.

II. Whenever sentence shall be passed by the Agent's Court, awarding the punishment of transportation, such punishment shall be awarded in cases only when transportation for life may be commensurate with the offence committed.

Rule 13th.—The Agent will obey all injunctions and orders of the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut, and will return process duly executed, as required by that Court and will forward from time to time such periodical or other returns, as may be called for by the Judges of the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut.

Rule 14th.—The Agent's criminal Court, shall, except on very emergent occasions be closed on the days specified in clause IX. of Regulation XIII. of 1827.

Rule 15th.—The Agent shall record his proceedings in all criminal trials in English, and shall also keep a Minute Book of all his criminal proceedings in the language of the District which he shall authenticate daily by his signature, and the Record shall be kept after the manner prescribed in Section XIV. of Regulation XIII. of 1827.

Rule 16th.—The Rules given in Section XXXIV. XXXV. and XXXVI. of Chapter VI. of Regulation XIII. of 1827, for the examination of witnesses, the penalties for non-appearance of witnesses, and the subsistence of witnesses shall be taken as those applicable to the Agents Court as the same may be modified by enactment, or the practice of the Zillah Courts. Provided that all evidence received in any trial before the Agent shall be taken afresh ; any previous depositions given before subordinate Police authorities notwithstanding.

II. The Agent may grant a pardon to an accomplice in the manner laid down in Clause V. of Section XXXIV. of Regulation XIII. of 1827, and the accomplice so admitted to give evidence, shall be liable to the same rules in giving testimony as other witnesses are liable to.

III. The competency of witnesses shall be determined by the Rules laid down in Section XXXIII. of Regulation IV. of 1827.

IV. And it shall be competent to the Agent under the provisions of Clause III Section XVI. of Regulation XIV. of 1827 to report to the Judges of the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut the case of witness committing perjury before him, and the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut shall direct to what tribunal the case shall be referred for trial.

Rule 17th.—The provisions relative to the defence of prisoners, and their sentence in the Agents Criminal Court, shall be those prescribed in Section XXXVII. and XXXVIII. of Chapter VI. of Regulation XIII. of 1827, as modified by subsequent enactments, and interpretations of the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut.

Rule 18th.—If the sentence include a punishment, coming within the Jurisdiction appointed for the Agent, the warrant shall be addressed under his seal and signature to the Nazir of the Court, and shall specify the period and the conditions for and upon which the prisoner is to be confined, and whether the imprisonment is to be simple, or to be accompanied with hard labour.

II. At the expiration of the time included in the warrant, or immediately, if the prisoner should die, or escape, the Nazir shall certify by endorsement, and return the warrant to be deposited in the records of the Court and in all cases of warrants issued by the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut, the Agent shall certify the due execution of such to that Court.

III. And in the event of a sentenced prisoner effecting his escape, the Agent shall report the circumstances to the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut.

Rule 19th.—If the punishment awarded by the Agent shall exceed his own absolute Jurisdiction, he shall record the punishment awarded, but shall forward the case in original to the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut, which Court shall proceed under the provisions of Section III. of the Act passed for Colaba ; and the instructions conveyed to the Agent from the superior Court shall be carried into effect by the Agent.

III. And in the event of a sentence, passed by the Agent being referred for the confirmation of the superior Court, the prisoner shall be kept in simple confinement under a warrant addressed to that effect to the Nazir, which temporary warrant shall give place to the final orders of the superior Court.

Rule 20th.—The Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut shall be empowered to call for the Agent's proceedings in any case, appealed to that Court by any party against whom a sentence may have been passed by the Agent and the superior Court, may thereafter proceed according to the provisions of Section III. of the act passed for Colaba.

Rule 21st.—The Agent shall exercise a control over the criminal Jail of Colaba under the general instructions of the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut, and shall visit it from time to time, and shall issue such orders as may appear to him necessary for the accommodation, health, and security of the prisoners. The Agent shall also direct the application of the labor of such convicts, as may be sentenced to hard labor, towards works of public benefit and improvement.

II. The general Regulations contained in Chapter VII. of Regulation XIII. of 1827 added to the practice of the Zillah Courts, shall be held applicable to the discipline, food and clothing of the prisoners in the Agent's criminal Jail, subject to the alterations and general orders promulgated by the Judges of the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut.

CHAPTER V.

Of crimes and offences punishable in the Agent's Criminal Court.

Rule 22d.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to declare that the crimes and offences specified in Regulation XIV. of 1827, and supplements 1st and 2d together with the punishments applicable thereto, are hereby promulgated for the territory subject to the control of the Agent at Colaba, and the Agent shall in all cases be guided by the provisions of that Regulation, as they may be modified by subsequent enactments or by interpretations passed from time to time by the Judges of the Suddur Foujdaree Adawlut.

Rule 23d.—And to meet the hypothetical case of inhabitants of Colaba perpetrating any of the crimes and offences comprised in the foregoing Regulation XIV. of 1827 within the limits of Districts not under the control of the Agent, whether domestic or foreign, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to declare the provisions of Section IV. of Chapter I. of Regulation XI. of 1827 applicable to the Territory of Colaba.

Rule 24th.—And with the view of seeing that all the foregoing rules are properly attended to, it shall be competent to the Hon'ble the Governor in Council to appoint one of the Judicial Commissioners, as visitor to Colaba.

And upon every petition or application presented in the Agent's Court relative to any matter not in a suit then current, a fee shall be levied upon such petition of 8 annas, and if the petition be to the Sudder Dewanee Adawlut the fee shall upon transmission of the petition from the Superior Court, be increased to 1 Rupee.
