Grant Medical College.

The following regulations of the Grant Medical College which have been sanctioned by the Hon'ble the Governor in Council are published for general information:—

As some months must yet elapse before the College buildings can be completed or the course of instruction entered upon, the Board of Education take this opportunity of calling the particular attention of those desirous of presenting themselves as candidates for admission, to the qualifications required of them as laid down in the 4th & 5th Regulations which will be strictly enforced.

**REGULATIONS OF THE GRANT
MEDICAL COLLEGE.**

1. The Grant Medical College shall be under the Control of the Board of Education.
2. The course of medical instruction in the College will be carried on through the medium of the English language, in strict accordance

with the system followed in Europe, and will, in the first instance, be conducted by three Professors one of whom shall be Superintendent of the College.

3. The details of management of the College, the charge of the Pupils, the Plan of Education, and other arrangements will be entrusted to the judgement and guidance of the Superintendent, subject to the control of the Board of Education.

4. Admittance to the benefits of the College will be accorded, without exception of caste or creed to candidates between the ages of 16 and 20, who are of respectable connexions and general intelligence; who in addition to a grammatical knowledge of their vernacular language and of Arithmetic, as far as the rules of proportion, possess a thorough knowledge of English so as to be able to read and write it with accuracy, fluency and facility. Each candidate will be required to present a certificate of good conduct from the head master of the school in which he has studied; and also one expressly stating that he is possessed of the necessary information and capable of undergoing the examination proposed.

5. Candidates for admission will be examined at a stated annual period (to be afterwards fixed) by the Board of Education or parties deputed by them, the Superintendent and Professors of the College; and the books selected for testing the candidates' knowledge of English will be "Milton's Paradise lost" Robertson's Histories; or works of a similar classical standard. The names of candidates found qualified will be entered in the College register.

6. The Students will consist of two classes:
1st Stipendiary Students.
2nd Free Students.

7. The Number of Stipendiary students will be limited to 20, and will consist of those Native candidates who have been considered the best qualified.

8. The Stipendiary students will each receive a monthly allowance from Government of (7) seven Rupees, to be increased according to the following rules,

9. The Stipendiary students will be divided into three classes and each class will receive a different stipend, viz:—

- 1st Class ~~Rs~~ (7) seven per month.
2nd " " (9) nine ditto,
3rd " " (12) twelve ditto.

The formation of these classes will take place once a year, at the period fixed for the annual admission and registration of candidates, and will be conducted by the Board of Education, the Superintendent and Professors of the College, it being distinctly understood, that the classification will depend upon the acquirements and general conduct of the students, and not altogether upon the length of the period of their studies. Thus no pupil shall, during the first year of his studies, receive a higher stipend than (7) seven Rupees, and every student who at the end of two years is not considered qualified to be placed in the 2nd Class shall be removed to the list of free students, and an eligible free student be recommended by the Superintendent to fill the vacancy thus created in the stipendiary list, students shall not be eligible to the 3rd Class

if they shall have been three years at the College, and those who at the end of four years are not considered qualified to rise to the 3rd Class shall be removed to the list of free students, and an eligible free student or one from the 1st Stipendiary Class be recommended by the Superintendent to fill the vacancy.

10. Stipendiary students will be required to prosecute their studies at the College for a period of not less than four years before they will be entitled to present themselves for examination for certificates of qualification to practice Medicine and Surgery and those who are unable to pass this final examination in six years will cease to receive their stipends.

11. Stipendiary students voluntarily leaving the College before presenting themselves for final examination will be required to refund the total amount received by them from the date of their registration up to the period of their resignation.

12. Stipendiary students will be required to study the principles and practice of medicine and surgery, and the Collateral sciences in strict accordance with the mode adopted in the Medical Schools in Europe.

13. The free students equally with those of the stipendiary class shall enjoy all the advantages of medical instruction which the college will afford.

14. The Board of Education will exercise the right of dismissal of students from the college on just ground being shewn by the Superintendent.

15. All students (stipendiary and free) who shall have been duly enrolled in the college Register and shall have completed their studies according to the rules and course prescribed to the stipendiary class, will be entitled and they only, to have certificates signed by the Superintendent to enable them to present themselves for final examination.

16. The final examination for certificates to practise medicine and surgery will be publicly held at a stated period annually under the instructions of the Board of education, by three or more medical officers unconnected with the College and specially, in each instance, nominated by Government for the purpose.

17. Successful candidates will receive certificates of qualification to practise medicine and surgery signed by the President of the Board of Education, the Superintendent and professors of the college and the professional examiners.

18. In the event however of its coming at a subsequent period, to the knowledge of the Board of Education, and being proved to their satisfaction, that any individual possessed of the certificate of qualification to practise medicine and surgery, has exhibited marked proofs of professional ignorance or been guilty of flagrant moral delinquency, it will be competent to the Board of Education to recommend to Government, to direct that the name of such individual be erased from the list of qualified licentiates of the college, and a notification of his degradation will be published in the Government Gazette.

19. The Superintendent shall make an annual report of the state of the college to the Board of Education for transmission to Government, and shall forward a copy to the Medical Board.

Forwards proceedings relating to a complaint preferred by a Parsee against Brigadier Gibbon, Commanding at Baroda, for an assault, and reports the circumstances under which Government have resolved on that Officers removal from the staff of the Army pending the Court's decision. Also to Letters dated 18th, 28th and 30th September 1844, No. 91, 97 and 104, enclosing further proceedings on the same subject, and a memorial from Colonel Gibbon, praying to be restored to the staff.

Para. 1. The proceedings transmitted by you with these Letters, confirm the statement of facts as published in your General Order of the 9th August 1844, relating to a complaint preferred by a Native Inhabitant of the cantonment of Baroda against Brigadier Gibbon, the Commanding Officer of the station, viz:—

The complainant in the first instance applied to the Bazaar Master for relief from a creditor who had practised upon him an act of extortion. The Bazaar Master investigated the case and finding the man's representation to be correct, reported the matter to his Commanding Officer. But Brigadier Gibbon having pre-

“viously received a different account of the case conveyed to him in an irregular manner by the Chowdry of the Bazaar, and disregarding the assurance given to him by the Bazaar Master, that the man's statement had been found on enquiry to be accurately true, directed the complainant to be brought to his quarters, and on his appearance, the Brigadier in the presence of the Bazaar Master and other persons, struck the complainant several blows, and caused him to be confined in the Bazaar Guard.”

2nd. Upon a full consideration of the particulars of this transaction you resolved to remove Brigadier Gibbon from the staff of the Army, and to make his future employment dependent upon our decision. This measure has our full approval.

3rd The Commander in Chief reports that Colonel Gibbon has now served for the very protracted period of 43 years, without the records of this Army bearing any evidence to show, that he has on any previous occasion committed himself in a similar manner.”

4th. That the conduct of Colonel Gibbon was in this instance, inconsistent with his general character, we are also led to believe from our examination of the records of your Government. Upon one occasion we observe that

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 21st December 1844.

ACT No. — OF 1844.

An Act concerning the Examination and Appointment of Hindoo and Mahomedan Law Officers.

I. It is hereby enacted, that Section 5, Regulation XI. of 1826, of the Bengal Code, be repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act, any person may be appointed to be a Hindoo or Mahomedan Law

Officer in any of the Courts of Justice under the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, who shall have successfully passed through such an examination as the Government of the said Presidency shall from time to time prescribe.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 21st day of February next:

THE 28TH DECEMBER, 1844.

The following Act is brought up before the Legislative Council this day, the Governor General of India in Council being desirous that no time should be lost in passing the Act.—

Resolved, that the Rule requiring that no Draft of a Law should be ordered to be published till at least one week shall have elapsed from the day on which it was first laid before the Council of India in its Legislative Department, and that the Rules requiring that all Acts of the Governor General of India in Council shall be brought up for second reading in two months, or in three months from the date of the first reading, be suspended in respect to the following proposed Act, and that it be at once passed into Law.

ACT No. XXII. OF 1844.

An Act for regulating the Copper Coinage of the Mints in the Territories of the East India Company.

1. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act the following Copper Coins only shall be issued from any Mint within the Territories of the East India Company:

with such devices as shall be fixed for the same by the Governor General in Council.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act the said Pice shall be a legal tender throughout the Territories of the East India Company for $\frac{1}{4}$ of the Company's Rupee, and the said Double Pice for $\frac{1}{2}$ of the Company's Rupee, and the said Pie for $\frac{1}{12}$ of the Company's Rupee.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that all Copper Coins of the weights specified in Section I of this Act, which may have been issued since the passing of Act XXI, of 1835, from any Mint within the Presidency of Bombay, shall be legal tender respectively for the values specified in Section II. of this Act within that Presidency.

VI. Provided always, that none of the said Copper Coins shall be legal tender except for fractions of a Rupee.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 4th of January 1845.

ACT No. — OF 1845.

An Act to amend the Law regarding the issue of Commissions of the Peace.

Whereas it is inconvenient to issue a new General Commission of the Peace whenever the Execu-

tive Government of any of the Presidencies of Fort William in Bengal, Madras or Bombay shall nominate and appoint any persons not named in the General Commission last issued to act as Justices of the Peace—It is hereby enacted, that the Supreme Court of Judicature of each of the said Presidencies shall and may from time to time upon the order or warrant of the Executive Government of such Presidency, issue separate Commissions to any persons not named in the General Commission of the Peace last issued, who by law are capable of being appointed to the office of Justice of the Peace, and who shall be nominated and appointed by such Executive Government to act as Justices of the Peace within and for such Presidency and the places subordinate thereto, or within and for the Presidency Town, And all such Commissions shall be issued in the name of the Queen's Majesty, her Heirs and Successors, under the seal of the Supreme Court, and tested in the name of the Chief Justice of such Court and shall be filed of record in the Court of Oyer and Terminer of the Presidency or place wherein and for which the same shall be issued, as supplementary to the General Commission of the Peace last issued which shall remain in full force.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 4th day of April next.


