THE 7TH NOVEMBER 1845.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 7th of November 1845:

ACT No. — OF 1845.

An Act regarding Lands gained from the Sea or from Rivers by alluvion or dereliction.

I. It is hereby enacted, that all the Regulations and Laws of the Bengal Code which prescribe the course to be followed in the Resumption of Lands gained from the Sea or from Rivers, by alluvion or dereliction, are repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that after the expiration of ten years from the date of the passing of this Act, it shall be lawful for the Governor of Bengal, in all Zillahs and Districts, of which a Revenue Survey may have been completed and approved, and in no other, to direct an enquiry to be made by Officers appointed for that purpose, into the condition of the Lands on the banks of Rivers, and on the shores of the Sea, in order to ascertain the changes that may have taken place in the same since the date of the Survey and to correct the Maps accordingly.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever it shall appear to the Local Revenue Authorities on inspection of the Maps so corrected, that Land has been washed away from or lost to any Zemindary, Talook, or other tenure, paying Revenue directly to Government, they shall without loss of time make a suitable deduction from the Sudder Jumma of the said tenure, either according to the actual Jumma of the Lands lost, if that be known and recorded, or rateably according to the proportion of the Land lost to that left, as compared with the Sudder Jumma of the whole tenure. And this deduction with the reasons thereof shall be forthwith reported by the Local Revenue Authorities for the information and orders of the Sudder Board of Revenue, whose orders thereupon shall be final.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever it shall appear to the Local Revenue Authorities on inspection of the Maps so corrected as aforesaid, that Land has been added to any Zemindary, Talook, or other tenure paying Revenue directly to Government, they shall without delay assess

the same with a Revenue payable to Government according to the Rules in force for assessing alluvial increments, and shall report their proceedings forthwith to the Sudder Board of Revenue whose orders thereupon shall be final.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever it shall appear to the Local Revenue Authorities on inspection of the Maps corrected as aforesaid that an Island has been thrown up in a large and navigable river, liable to be taken possession of by Government under Clause Third, Section IV. Regulation XI. 1825, the said Local Authorities shall take immediate possession of the same on behalf of Government, and shall assess and settle the land according to the Rules in force in that behalf, reporting their proceedings as aforesaid for the approval of the Sudder Board of Revenue, whose orders thereupon in regard to the assessment shall be final. Provided however that any party aggrieved by the act of the Revenue Authorities in taking possession of any Island as aforesaid, shall be at liberty to contest the same by a Regular Suit in the Civil Court.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that in every case comprehended in the three last foregoing Sections, the corrected Map of the lands signed by the Officer appointed by Government to make the investigation and correction of the same, shall be deemed in all Courts conclusive evidence of the alluvion or dereliction, or of the formation of an Island as the case may be, and of all particulars thereof in each instance.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful to make a like enquiry and correction of Maps and a like abatement of Jumma or assessment of new lands, and to take a like possession of all Islands in unfordable channels, at the expiration of every ten years from the date of the completion of the enquiry and correction of Maps last preceding but not oftener.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that nothing in this Act contained shall affect Resumption Suits for Alluvial Lands now pending in appeal before the Special Commissioners, or such as, having been decided by the Lower Resumption Courts, are still at the date of the passing of this Act open to appeal to the Court of the Special Commissioners according to the Laws heretofore in force. All such cases shall proceed as if this present Act had never been passed. But all Resumption cases of Alluvial Lands now pending undecided before the Collectors or Deputy Collectors shall be struck off the file from the date of the passing of this Act, and all proceedings in them shall cease and determine.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that except as regards the proprietary right to Islands surrounded by unfordable Channels no suit or action in any Court of Justice shall lie against the Government or any of its Officers on account of any thing done in conformity with the provisions of this Act.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 7th day of May next.
