Is hereby given, that sealed tenders will be received at this office until 2 o'clock P. M. on Saturday the 16th instant, for a contract for the feed and keep of Remount Horses, under transmission to outstations overland, for the term of two years from the 1st day of February next.

All persons desirous of tendering for the above contract, may, on application at this office from 10 A. M. till 5 P. M. obtain daily (Sundays excepted,) a list of the stations &c. with the rates affixed and such other information relating there-to as they may require.

The Tenders must specify both in words and figures the rates per cent below the prices in the list above adverted to, at which the tenderers will undertake the contract.

It is to be understood, that all retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractor's bills are to be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment by the contractors, but in the event of such retrenchments being subsequently removed, the amount thereof will be returned to them.

The contractor will be required to sign and seal a contract stipulating to the above effect, and that he shall comply immediately with all emergent demands for the dispatch of the horses to outstations, and others of less urgency within the period stated in the departmental orders furnished from this office, and that on his failing to do so, the horses may be despatched by the government to their destination at his risk and loss, and in which latter case an advance of Rs (30) thirty per cent upon the amount of expenses incurred or a fine of Rs (50) fifty at the option of the executive officer may be levied as liquidated damages for every such breach of contract as often as the same may occur, and that the contract may also in all such cases be put an end to on the part of the East India Company.

A farrier is to accompany all batches of horses whose number is above twenty-five, to be furnished at the expense of the contractor.

Every person submitting a tender for the above contract will be required to lodge with it the sum of Rupees (200) two hundred in cash, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract; and should his offer be accepted he must be prepared to add thereto a farther sum of Rupees (305) three hundred and five making Rupees (505) five hundred and five in cash, and unexceptionable bonded security to the extent of Rupees (2016) two thousand and sixteen to be held by the government as security for the due performance of his contract.

The tenders will be opened at the time already specified in presence of the parties concerned, or of such as may be in attendance, but none can be taken into consideration which are not accompanied with the requisite deposits.

The annual outlay on account of the above contract is estimated at Rupees (10,331) ten thousand and eighty-one, or thereabouts. All further particulars will be communicated on the receipt and opening of the tenders, and no reason will be assigned in the event of their rejection.

# General Orders.

BY THE HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 30<sup>TH</sup> DECEMBER 1846.

No. 826 of 1846.—Under instructions from the Supreme Government, Aden has been constituted a Brigade command of the 2nd Class, to belong alternately to the Bombay and Madras Presidencies, for the term of five years, commencing with Bombay.

No. 827 of 1846.—Lieutenant Colonel Spiller is appointed a Brigadier and to command the second class Brigade at Aden.

No. 828 of 1846.—The following gentlemen are admitted to the service in conformity with their appointments by the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, as a Cadet of Artillery and an Assistant Surgeon on this establishment.

No. 829 of 1846.—The regimental orders by Captain Jacob, Commanding Scinde Irregular Horse, dated the 1st November last, making promotions of native officers in the 1st and 2nd Regiments are confirmed.

No. 830 of 1846.—First Grade apprentice P. McGrath of Her Majesty's 17th Regiment, is appointed an Acting Assistant Apothecary and placed at the disposal of the Superintendent Indian Navy, vice White dismissed.

No. 1 of 1847.—The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to republish the following extract from the Honorable Court's letter, in the Military department, dated the 16th December 1807.

4th. The frequent applications that have been made to us by officers of our several Military establishments in India when in Europe for advances of money on loan, under the plea of their being otherwise unable to return to their duty, have not only caused much trouble and inconvenience, but in some instances the Company have sustained loss by the death of the parties to whom such advances have occasionally been made, and this practice has of late years increased.

5th. As under the Regulations of 1796, the Military officers are allowed to come home on furlough and to receive their pay, & in regard to Subalterns, are further indulged with passage money home, their situations have been considerably improved, and they cannot reasonably expect any additional indulgence of the nature above mentioned, to prevent therefore all expectation of the like in future, we direct that you publish in General Orders to the army, that we have been under the necessity of coming to the resolution of declaring that officers at home are not hereafter to expect, that applications for advances of money beyond what they are allowed by the existing Regulations of the service will be attended to.

6th. This regulation is to be considered as extending to the Marine officers of your establishment.

No. 2 of 1847.—The station order by Captain B. Heyne, Commanding, dated Ruttongherry the 20th November 1846, directing two companies and details of the 16th Regiment Madras Native Infantry to proceed from Ruttongherry to Vingorla by sea, is confirmed.

No. 3 of 1847.—Assistant Surgeon T. B. Larkins has been appointed Civil Surgeon at Broach.

*Bombay Castle, 2nd January 1847.*

No. 4 of 1847.—Lieutenant Colonel W. Cavaye, is appointed to be Commandant of the Fortress of Asseerghur, vice Spiller appointed to the Aden Brigade.

No. 5 of 1847.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to notify, that under instructions from the Government of India, the present regiment of Poona Auxiliary Horse is to be prospectively re-organized from the 1st of January 1847, and placed on the same footing in point of establishment and pay as the Guzerat Irregular Horse, thus eventually assimilating the corps to the Bengal Irregular Cavalry Regiments, with the sole exception of the pay of its Sowars, which will be Rupees (25) twenty-five, instead of Rupees (20) twenty, as in Bengal.

The new levy of the Poona Auxiliary Horse being already in respect of the same rates of Pay as the Guzerat Irregular Horse, is to be at once incorporated into the former corps from the date of its re-organization. The European commissioned and native commissioned, and Non-commissioned officers and men, at present in the receipt of superior pay, will continue to draw the same, but all appointed and enlisted on and after the 1st January 1847, will draw the rates laid down in the annexed scale.

The men of Skinner's and of the old Levy, will continue, after promotion to higher grades, to receive the superior rate of pay now drawn by them, until by further advancement they become entitled to an equal, or a greater amount, thus a Sowar of Skinner's Levy receiving 40 Rupees per mensem, will not be entitled to any higher rate of pay until he attains the rank of Jemedar; nor will a Sowar of the old levy, on Rupees 30 per mensem receive any additional pay until he is promoted to Kote Duffadar.

All men now on the strength of the corps as well as those who may hereafter be enlisted, will be entitled to all the privileges in respect to family pensions, and to pensions for service and wounds, enjoyed by the Bengal Irregular Cavalry. This grant cancels article 153 | 4 Section XLII, page 646 of Jameson's Code.



The pay of men on furlough will continue to be regulated agreeably to Articles 175 and 176, Section XXVI, page 360 of Jameson's Code.

The designation of the corps will be changed to that of the "Poona Irregular Horse," from the above date, and the expense of altering the cypher and badge on the regimental appointments, will be borne by the State.

The stationary, matchlock and mess allowances, are to be drawn from the 1st of January 1847, as per the annexed Table.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief will be pleased to take the necessary measures for the reduction of the corps to the establishment now sanctioned, and a proportion of the Native commissioned and Non-commissioned officers to complete the new establishment may be promoted from the date of its re-organization, provided the aggregate expense does not exceed that now authorized for those ranks.

The following Draft Act to regulate distresses for Small Rents in Calcutta, having been published by mistake with a Schedule which was not that intended by the President in Council, is now re-published with the proper Schedule.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 7th of November 1846.

ACT No — OF 1846.

*An Act to regulate distresses for Small Rents in Calcutta.*

I. It is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners of the Court of Commissioners for the Recovery of Small Debts in and for the Settlement of Fort William in Bengal to appoint four or more persons to be Bailiffs and Appraisers for the purposes of this Act, and to fix such remuneration for the services of the said Officers as shall appear to the said Commissioners expedient, and that such persons shall be duly sworn before the said Commissioners, and shall also give security to be approved by the said Commissioners faithfully to discharge the duties of their office, and that the said Commissioners shall have power to suspend or remove such persons so appointed, provided that it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners to appoint the Bailiffs who may be attached from time to time to the said Court to the office of Distraint Bailiffs and Appraisers for the purposes of this Act, and to award to the said Officers such remuneration in addition to their respective salaries drawn from the said Court as to the said Commissioners shall appear expedient.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for any Commissioner of the said Court upon the Affidavit of any party claiming to be entitled to arrears of rent of any House or Premises situate in Calcutta not exceeding the amount of 100 Rupees, stating the amount of such arrears and for what time and at what rate the same became due, to issue a warrant under his hand and seal in the Form contained in the Schedule to this Act Annexed (marked A.) addressed to any one of such Officers directing him to levy the amount of such rent, together with the costs of the said distress in the manner therein mentioned, provided that it shall be lawful for any of the said Commissioners upon personal examination of the party applying for such warrant to grant or withhold the same at the discretion of the said Commissioner.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that by virtue of such warrant it shall be lawful for such Officer to seize the whole or such part of the Goods and Chattels upon the said premises as shall be sufficient to cover the amount of the said rent, together with the costs of the said distress and that he shall thereupon make an Inventory of the Goods and Chattels so seized, and shall give a notice in writing in the Form in the Schedule to this Act annexed (marked B.) to the party from whom such rent is claimed to be due, or to any other person upon behalf of such party upon the said premises that the said Goods and Chattels will be appraised and sold in manner therein mentioned. And that the said Officer shall file in the said Court true copies of the said Inventory and Notice, provided that it shall be lawful for the party from whom such rent is claimed to be due, at any time within five days from such seizure, to apply to any Commissioner of the said Court to discharge or suspend such warrant, and it shall be lawful for such Commissioner to discharge or suspend such warrant accordingly, with or without costs, provided always that it shall be lawful for any of the said Commissioners in his discretion to give reasonable time to such party to pay the said rent.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that in default of such application it shall be lawful for any two of such Officers at the expiration of five days from such seizure to appraise the Goods and Chattels so seized and to give notice of the sale thereof at such time and place as they shall direct, after an interval of not less than two days, and that they shall file in the said Court a true copy of the said Notice, and that the same shall be sold accordingly, and that the said Officers shall forthwith after realization of the produce of the said sale, pay over the amount thereof to the Chief Clerk of the said Court, and the amount of such produce shall be applied in satisfaction of the sum claimed to be due, together with the costs of the said distress, and that the surplus, if any, shall be returned to the party from whom the said rent was claimed to be due, provided that it shall be lawful for such party to direct that such sale shall take place in any other manner, such party giving security for any extra costs attending such mode of sale.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that no costs shall be taken or demanded for such distress except those contained in the Schedule to this Act annexed (marked C.) and that it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners to apply the sum so raised as costs, towards the payment of the contingent charges and remuneration of the said Bailiffs and Appraisers as shall appear to the said Commissioners expedient, and that the Chief Clerk of the said Court shall keep a book in which all sums received as costs upon distresses made under the provisions of this Act, and all sums paid as remunerations to the said Bailiffs and Appraisers, and all contingent charges incurred in respect of such distresses shall be duly entered, and that the Chief Clerk of the said Court shall also enter in the said book the sums realized by sale of the Goods and Chattels distrained and paid over to the landlords under the provisions of this Act.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that after the passing of this Act no distress shall be levied for arrears of rent amounting to Rupees 100, or less, except under the provisions of this Act, and that any person, except such Officer as appointed levying or attempting to levy any such distress shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be liable to be punished by fine and imprisonment for the same in addition to any other liability he may have incurred by such trespass.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that this Act shall not extend to any arrears of rent exceeding 100 Rs. nor in respect of any House or Premises situate out of Calcutta, nor to any rent due to Government, nor to any seizure except on the Premises in respect of which such rent is claimed.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 7th day of January next.

ACT No. VI. OF 1846.

*An Act for the more convenient administration of the Government of the Country called the Bhuttee Territory.*

Whereas much inconvenience has resulted from maintaining as a part of the Delhi Division, the large and thinly peopled tract of country called the Bhuttee Territory, extending from the borders of the Hissar District to the Ghana or Sutlege :

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the First day of January 1847 the provisions of Regulation V. of 1832 of the Bengal Code, shall cease to have effect in the said Bhuttee Territory, consisting of the following Pergunnahs :

Gondah.  
Mullot.  
Wuttoo.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the said day the administration of Civil and Criminal Justice, the Superintendence of the Police, and the Collection and Superintendence of the Revenues of every description within the said Territory, shall vest in such Agent as the Governor General of India in Council shall appoint, and shall be exercised by the said Agent with the aid of such Assistants as shall be appointed by the said Governor General of India in Council.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the said Governor General of India in Council to prescribe such Rules as he may deem proper for the guidance of the Agent aforesaid, and of all the Officers subordinate to his controul and authority, in all Judicial and Revenue proceedings,

and to determine to what extent the decision of the Agent in Civil suits shall be final, and in what suits an appeal shall lie to the Sudder Dewany Adawlut, and to define the authority to be exercised by the Agent in Criminal trials, and what cases he shall submit to the decision of the Nizamut Adawlut.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the receipt of any Criminal trials referred by the Agent under the Rules which may be hereafter prescribed by the said Governor General of India in Council, the Nizamut Adawlut shall proceed to pass a final judgment, or such other order as may, after mature consideration, seem to the Court requisite and proper and in conformity with the prescribed rules.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the receipt of any appeal from a decree of the Agent duly preferred under the Rules to be prescribed as aforesaid, the Court of Sudder Dewany Adawlut shall proceed to try and determine it as to them may seem right and proper and in conformity with the prescribed rules.

*An Act for determining the duration of the existing Settlement of the North Western Provinces.*

Whereas the settlement of the several Districts of the North Western Provinces has been made for different periods, and whereas from several causes the duration of the settlement as stated in the engagements of the Malgoozars does not always agree with that sanctioned by the Government,



and whereas it is necessary to avoid the confusion and litigation which may hence arise, and also to provide for the continuance of the existing settlements till a fresh revision shall take place :

I. It is therefore hereby enacted, that the Jummah of all villages included on 1st May 1846, within the limits of the Districts in the said Provinces noted below, shall be considered fixed till the date inserted opposite to each District, so far as regards the claim of the Government to any increase upon the Jummah determined at the time of settlement, or as it stands subsequently altered by Government prior to 1st May 1846.

And it is hereby enacted, that in the said Provinces, Mouzahs standing transferred on the above date of May 1st 1846, from Districts or Pergunnahs not permanently settled, to districts or Pergunnahs permanently settled, shall not be held liable to any increased demand on the part of the Government, but shall be held for ever on the highest Jummah determined at the time of settlement, or as it stands subsequently altered by Government prior to 1st May 1846.

III. Provided always and it is hereby declared, that persons holding land on special grants or on

leases for longer periods than those specified in Section I, shall continue to hold them according to the terms of their several grants or leases.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever a Malgoozar may be desirous to relinquish his lease on the expiration of the term of his engagement he shall be at liberty to do so, provided that he give notice thereof in open Court and in writing to the Collector and to the Commissioner of the Division within one year before the 1st of July immediately preceding the expiration of the engagement.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that when such notice shall not have been given as aforesaid, the Malgoozar shall be held bound to pay the Jummah determined at the time of settlement, or as it stands subsequently altered by Government prior to the 1st of May 1846, for the period which may be applicable to his case according to Section I, and subsequently from year to year till the settlement be revised, or in perpetuity according to Section II.

VI. Provided however, and it is hereby declared, that nothing in this Act shall bar the right of the Government to demand revenue from any resumed rent-free land, alluvial Towfcer, or other land which was not assessed at the time of settlement.

I. It is therefore hereby enacted, that the Governor in Council of Fort St. George may from time to time make, in respect of each Port or other Place of anchorage within the Territories subject to the Government of the said Presidency, such



Regulations for the management of Boats and Catamarans and such other matters as are provided for by the said Act IV. of 1842 in respect of the Madras Roads, as to them shall seem expedient, being similar in principle to the provisions contained in the said Act, but varying in detail, if local circumstances require such variation. And all such Regulations shall be submitted for confirmation or disallowance to the Governor General of India in Council, and every such Regulation shall have the force of Law after it shall have been confirmed by the Governor General of India in Council.

*An Act for regulating the proceedings in certain cases of distraint for Arrears of Rent.*

I. It is hereby enacted, in modification of Section 9, Regulation VII. of 1799, Section 9, Regulation V. of 1800, and Clause 2, Section 17, Regulation XXVIII. of 1803, all of the Bengal Code, that if any person not being such a defaulter as is therein mentioned or responsible for him, shall claim as his right property which has been distrained for arrears of rent due from the said defaulter, and shall within five days, reckoning from the day after attachment, enter into a bond before the Collector of the Zillah or the Commissioner appointed under Act I. of 1839, with good security binding himself to institute before the Collector within fifteen days from the date of such bond, a summary suit against the distrainer and defaulter for the trial of the right, and to restore the property or make good its value in case the claim be disallowed with all costs of suit and damages, the distrainer shall immediately withdraw the attachment.

II. Provided always and it is hereby enacted, that if the claimant shall not within the said fifteen days institute such summary suit, it shall be lawful for the distrainer to recover the value of the property distrained, together with the expenses of the attachment, by attachment and sale of the personal property of the claimant, or his surety, or both, unless the claimant shall restore the property, or, if the distrainer prefer it, make good its value.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that no suit to set aside the summary award of the Collector under this Act, shall be brought after the expiration of one year from the date of such award.

Whereas it has been deemed expedient to exempt from the jurisdiction of the Civil and Criminal Courts of the Bombay Presidency certain portions of the Purgunnahs of Nundoorbar, Sooltanpoor and Kookurmoondah in the Province of Candeish and the Zillah Ahmednuggur :

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the First day of February 1847, so much of Appendix A. of Regulation XXIX. of 1827 of the Bombay Code as declares the Villages contained in the Schedule annexed to this Act, and the lands attached thereto (being parts of the Purgunnahs of Nundoorbar, Sooltanpoor and Kookurmoondah, in the Province of Candeish and the Zillah Ahmednuggur) subject to the Regulations established for the administration of Civil and Criminal Justice in the Bombay Presidency, be repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the said day the administration of Civil and Criminal Justice, the Superintendence of the Police and the Collection and Superintendence of the Revenues of every description within the said portions of Territory shall vest in such Agent to the Governor of Bombay as shall be appointed by the Governor of Bombay in Council, and shall be exercised by the said Agent with the aid of such Assistants as may be appointed by the said Governor in Council.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the said Governor in Council, by an Order in Council, to prescribe such rules as he may deem proper for the guidance of the Agent aforesaid and of all the Officers subordinate to his controul and authority, and to determine to what extent the decision of the Agent in Civil suits shall be final, and in what suits an appeal shall lie to the Sudder Dewannee Adawlut, and to define the authority to be exercised by the Agent in Criminal trials and what cases he shall submit to the decision of the Sudder Foujdaree Adawlut.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the receipt of any Criminal trials referred by the Agent under the Rules which may be hereafter prescribed by the Governor in Council, the Sudder Foujdaree Adawlut shall proceed to pass a final judgment, or such other order as may, after mature consideration, seem to the Court requisite and proper in the same manner as if the trial had been sent up in ordinary course from a Session Judge.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the receipt of any appeal from a decree of the Agent duly prepared under the Rules to be prescribed as aforesaid, the Court of Sudder Dewannee Adawlut shall proceed to try and determine it in the same manner as appeals from the Zillah Courts.

The 19th December 1845.—The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 19th December 1846.

ACT No.—of 1846.

An Act for repealing the Law which authorizes the imposition of fines on Moonsiffs and Sudder Ameens.

Whereas it was enacted, by Clause 3, Section 9, Regulation XXIII. of 1814, of the Bengal Code, that in cases of misconduct and neglect of duty which might not be of a nature to require the suspension or dismissal of a Moonsiff from his office, the Judge should be authorized to impose on the Moonsiff a fine not exceeding Twenty Rupees in amount, and that the order of the Judge in such case should be final:

And whereas by Section 67 of the said Regulation of provision above recited, was declared amongst other things to be applicable to the office of Sudder Ameens as well as to that of Moonsiffs:

And whereas the provision above recited, is no longer adapted to Moonsiffs and Sudder Ameens, in the more elevated Judicial position which they now occupy:

It is therefore hereby enacted, that Clause 3, Section 9, Regulation XXIII. of 1814, and Section 67 of the said Regulation, so far as it declares the said clause to be applicable to Sudder Ameens are repealed.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.
