PROCLAMATION.

BOMBAY TO WIT. By virtue of a precept to me directed, I hereby proclaim and give notice, that the Sessions of Oyer and Terminer and general Gaol Delivery, will be holden before the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, at the Court House, on Thursday the 18th day of March next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses and other Crimes, and Misdemeanors, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, and the Factories subordinate thereto, and also to enquire, hear and determine, in like manner, all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done, or committed, by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects, in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependant upon the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India, in alliance with the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place, will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound to prosecute, and give evidence, at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend, at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give notice, to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, that they be then and there, in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments and other

the above mentioned list, and others of less urgency must be complied with within the period stated in the requisitions made upon him, in failure whereof, the articles or such others as may be required in lieu may be purchased at his risk and loss, and in all such cases an advance of Rupees (30) thirty per cent upon the amount of expences incurred, or a fine of Rupees (50) fifty at the option of the executive officer will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract as often as the same may occur; and the contract may also in all such cases be put an end to on the part of the East India Company.

Notice is hereby given, that by a Treasury Warrant under date 11th September 1845, among other Regulations, certain rates of British Packet Postage have been established upon all Letters, Newspapers and Prices Current, conveyed from Port to Port in the East Indies, China &c. by the new lines of Packet boats recently put in operation under the additional contract made by Her Majesty's Government, with the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company,

These rates of Packet Postage are as follows.

One Shilling per half ounce for letters, according to the scale of weight now in operation in the united Kingdom,

One Penny for each Newspaper, whether British, Colonial or Foreign, conveyed between any of Her Majesty's Colonies and a Foreign Port, or between any two Foreign Ports.

One Penny for each British or Colonial printed Price Current, or printed Commercial List conveyed between any of Her Majesty's Colonies.

Two Pence for each printed Price Current or printed Commercial list, whether British, Colonial or Foreign, conveyed between a British Colony and a Foreign Port or between two Foreign Ports.

British or Colonial Newspapers passing by these packets between any of Her Majesty's Colonies will not be liable to any postage for the sea conveyance,

The prepayment of the British Packet postage on letters, is optional, when conveyed between the Indian Offices of Bombay, Aden, Calcutta, Madras, Penang & Singapore, and the Islands of Ceylon and Hongkong, or between any two of the Indian offices above enumerated; but when dispatched to a foreign country or possession, such as China, Manilla &c, the above postage must be paid in advance at the Despatching Office.

The postage chargeable on Newspapers and Prices Current and Commercial lists forwarded by these packet boats must in all cases be paid in advance.

The public are requested to take notice that by this Warrant, Letters &c. sent from Bombay to Point de Galle for dispatch thence to any Port in India or China, or to any of the settlements to the eastward by the Peninsular and Oriental Company's Steamers will be liable to the above rate of British packet postage in addition to the postage at present leviable from hence to Galle; and also that when addressed to a foreign country or possession the postage in question, must in all cases be paid in advance at the despatching office

General Orders.

BY THE HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 10TH MARCH 1847.

No. 181 of 1847.—Lieutenant H. Vincent, Acting Sub Assistant Commissary General is confirmed as Sub Assistant Commissary General, vice Captain De Vitre proceeded to Europe.

No. 182 of 1847.—The following appointment is made.

Lieutenant H. Weston, of the 14th Regiment Native Infantry, to be line adjutant at Kolapoor.

No. 183 of 1847.—The following appointment is made.

Captain J. G. Forbes, of the 23rd regiment native light infantry, to act as Barrack Master of Bombay, during the absence of Captain Parr, or until further orders.

Bombay Castle 11th March 1847.

No. 184 of 1847.—The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to cancel the existing orders relative to the supply of private carriage for payment to troops in Art. 64 to 73, Section 10, pages 94 to 96 of Jameson's Code, and the Government General Order No. 403, dated 8th June last, granting carriage at the public expense to European troops under certain circumstances, and to substitute the following rules.

Carriage at Public Expense

1. Whenever European troops move on duty carriage for the conveyance of 40lbs weight of baggage for each Non-commissioned officer and rank and file shall be provided, on indent, at the public expense.
2. Regimental Serjeant Majors and Quarter Master Serjeants to be allowed carriage for 160 lbs of baggage each. The same benefit to be extended to the European Non-commissioned staff of native corps.
3. No additional carriage allowed at the public expense for married men, who must make their own arrangements, and indents on the Commissariat for carriage for extra baggage are not to be complied with.

Carriage for Hire.

4. When any body of native troops exceeding 100 men is moving on duty, and difficulty is experienced in procuring private carriage for hire, the civil authorities nearest to the military station whence the troops have to march, will provide it, on indent countersigned by the commanding officer (transmitted through the Superintendent of Bazaars where there is one.)—The subjoined table shows the weight of baggage considered sufficient for each class. That for European officers is exclusive of their camp equipage, the carriage for which they are expected to keep complete agreeably with existing orders. The benefit of this rule to be extended to the *officers* of European corps.

5. The Collectors or other civil officers, will be guided by this table, as exhibiting the utmost amount of baggage for which they are authorized to procure carriage, which is only to be supplied on regular indent.

6. Individuals with families requiring additional carriage are invariably to make their own arrangements through the Bazar Master or otherwise.

7. To prevent interference with the commerce or agriculture of the country, the carriage is only to be hired to the nearest station, civil or military in the adjoining districts beyond which it is not to be taken, unless the Collector of that district shall certify that a relief cannot be furnished.

8. In order to prevent impediment to the public service it will be the duty of the Collector furnishing the carriage, to forward immediately to the Collector of the adjoining districts the indent or a copy, in order to the preparation of the relief of cattle &c. and the military staff officer whose duty it is to apprise the civil authorities of the movement of troops, will invariably report to each, the probable date they may be expected to arrive within their respective collectorates.

9. As carriage cannot always be procured at short notice, and as it is equitable that the owners thereof should be remunerated from the date on which it may be furnished, it is hereby directed that batta for demurrage shall be paid from that time to the day of marching, when the full hire is to commence. From the day succeeding the date of arrival batta is to be paid for the return cattle or carriage if not employed by the relieved regiment, at the rate of 15 miles per day. The rate for hire and batta is to be fixed by the civil authority and the Commanding Officer will be held responsible that all claims are fairly and speedily adjusted.

No. 187 of 1847.—With reference to the Government General Order dated the 29th of October last, No. 670 the Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased, until further orders, to fix the rate payable for porter issued from the Commissariat stores at Rupees 36 per hogshead, instead of Rupees 43-1-11 the empty hogsheads being returned to the Commissariat Department.

Arrangements are in progress for the issue of porter to the canteens of European corps in bottles, on the completion of which, it will be supplied from the Commissariat stores at 3 annas per quart bottle, or 2-4-0 per dozen, and of this sum 12 annas will be refunded by the Commissariat for every dozen of empty serviceable bottles returned into store, thereby reducing the price to be paid by the soldier to 2 annas per bottle.

Subsequent to the departure from India of His Excellency Sir Thomas McMahon, all reports and returns of the army are to be made to Major General Morse, until the arrival of His Excellency's appointed successor as Commander in Chief, or until further orders.

Notice is hereby given, that in addition to the sum of £ 800,000 advertised on the 5th October last, as to be provided in India for the service of the Home Treasury during the course of the official year 1846 | 47, and of which the larger proportion has already been purchased, a further amount of £ 455,000, being the unsupplied balance of the year 1844 | 45, will, in pursuance of instructions received from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, be raised on the hypothecation of Goods either wholly within the remainder of the current official year, should the trade of India require it, or in portions within the present and the ensuing official years, viz: 1846 | 47 and 1847 | 48, and that, in addition thereto, a still further sum of £ 600,000 will be raised in India for the service of the Home Treasury by bills on the hypothecation of goods during the course of the official year 1847 | 48, in full, so far as is at present known, of the requirements of the Home Treasury up to the 30th April 1848.

Advances of Cash will accordingly be made for this purpose by the Governments of Bengal, Madras, and Bombay, and the rate of exchange at which bills are to be drawn will continue to be 2 shillings per Company's Rupee, until further notice.

In all other respects the existing terms and conditions of the advances to be made by the respective Governments will remain in force, and be the same as published in the Calcutta Gazette under dates the 1st April 1842 and the 23rd August 1844.
