Those students whose English exercises, written during the Session, shew a marked want of attention to improvement in composition, will also be debarred from competing for these scholarships.

The holders of the Carnac and Anderson scholarships of the Session 1846-47, are ineligible for those now announced.

The following extract from the new Post office ordinance recently passed at the Mauritius, is published for general information.

ART. 22.—The following premiums shall be given to the Masters or Commanders of Vessels bringing Mails or Overland Newspapers to Mauritius under the annexed condition.

£ 30 for any vessels touching expressly for the purpose of landing the Overland Post office Mail, upon proof of the vessel having sailed from the Port at which such Mail was taken on board within five days after the arrival thereat of the said mail.

£ S0 for any vessel bringing the same, upon proof of the vessel having sailed within 48 hours of the arrival of the Mail as above described.

£ 20 for any vessel upon proof of the vessel having sailed within five days of the said arrival.

And £ 10 for any vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an Overland newspaper of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication and be made public in the exchange room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel.

Ordered, that the Act be promulgated for general information.

ACT No. VI. of 1846.

An Act for establishing a Cooper Currency in the Settlements of Penang, Singapore and Malacca.

It is hereby enacted, that from and after the date of the passing of this Act the provisions of Acts XXI. of 1845 and XXII. of 1844, shall not be deemed to apply to Copper Currency of the Settlements

of Penang, Singapore and Malacca II. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the 1st day of January 1848, the following Copper Coins only shall be received at or issued from any

Coins only shall be received at or issued from any Government Treasury within the said Settlements:

1. A cent weighing 144 grains troy.

2. A haif cent, weighing 72 grains.

3. A quarter cent weighing 36 grains.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the date of the passing of this Act the said cent. shall be legal tender throughout the said Settlement for vor of a Dollar and the said half cent. for vor of a Dollar, and the said quarter cent. for Too of Dollar.

IV. Provided always and it is hereby enacted, that none of the said Coins shall be legal tender ex-

cept for fractions of a Dollar.
V. And it is hereby enect

V. And it is hereby enected, that after the first day of January 1848, no other Copper Coins or To-kens than those specified in Section II. of this Act shall be legal tender of payment for the fractional parts of a Dollar within the said Settlements.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that with the exception of the Copper Coins specified in Section II. of this Act the circulation in the said Settlements after the said day of all Copper Coins or Tokens not being the authorized legal Coinage of any British or Exercise Covernment is conshibited.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that after the said day any person who shall circulate, or attempt to circulate, in the said Settlements, any Copper Coins or Tokens other than those specified in Section II. of this Act, and not being the authorized legal Coinage of any British or Foreign Government shall on summary conviction before a Magistrate be liable to a fine not exceeding Ten Rupees and in default of payment any person so convicted shall be subject to

imprisonment for a term not exceeding one month.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the Governor General in Council in his executive capacity to direct the coining and issume and to receive the coining and issume and to receive the desired and incomplete. ing, and to prescribe the devices and inscriptions of the Coins to be issued under the authority of this Act.

ACT No. VII. OF 1847.

An Act to regulate Distresses for small Rents in Calcutta.

I. It is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners of the Court of Commissioners

for the Recovery of small Debts in and for the Settlement of Fort William in Bengal to appoint four or more persons to be Bailiffs and Appraisers for the purposes of this Act, and to fix such remuneration for the services of the said Officers as shall appear to the said Commissioners expedient, and that such persons shall be duly sworn before the said Commissioners, and shall also give security to be approved by the said Commissioners faithfully to discharge the dutes of their office, and that the said Commissioners shall have power to suspend or remove such persons so appointed, provided that it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners to appoint the Bailiffs who may be attached from time to time to the said Court to the office of Distraining Bailiffs and Appraisers for the purposes of this Act, and to award to the said Officers such remuneration in addition to their respective salaries drawn from the said Court as to the said Commissioners shall appear expedient.

as to the said commissioners shart appear expedient.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that it islall be lawful for any Commissioner of the said Court upon the Affidavit in the Form contained in the Schedule to this Act annexed (marked D.) of any party claiming to be entitled to arrears of rent of any House or Premises situate in Calcutta not exceeding the amount of 100 Rupees, or in case of absence of such party from Calcutta, or in case of respectable females who do not appear in public, upon the Affidavit of the Constituted Attorney of such party stating the amount of such arrears and for what time and at what rate the same become due, to issue a warrant under his hand and seal in the Form contained in the Schedule to this Act annexed (marked A) addressed to any one of such Officers directing him to levy the amount of such rent, together with the costs of the said distress in the manner therein mentioned, provided that it shall be lawful for any of the said Commissioners upon personal examination of the party applying for such warrant to grant or withhold the same at the discretion of the said Commissioners.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that by virtue of such warrant it shall be lawful for such Officer to seize the whole or such part of the Goods and Chattels upon the said Premises as shall be sufficient to cover the amount of the said rent, together with the costs of the said distress, and that he shall thereupon make an Inventory of the Goods and Chattels so seized, and shall give a notice in writing in the Porm in the Schedule to this Act annexed (marked B) to the party from whom such rent is claimed to be due, or to any other person upon behalf of such party upon the said Premises that the said Goods and Chattels will be appraised and sold in manner therein mentioned. And that the said Officer shall file in the said Court true copies of the said Inventory and Notice, provided that it shall be lawful for the party from whom such rent is claimed to be due, at any time within five days from such seizure, to apply to any Commissioner of the said Court to discharge or suspend such warrant, and it shall be lawful for such Commissioner to discharge or suspend such warrant accordingly, with or without costs, provided always that it shall be lawful for any of the said Commissioners in his discretion to give reasonable time to such party to pay the said rent.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that in default of such application, it shall be lawful for any two of such Officers at the expiration of five days from such Seizure to appraise the Goods and Chattels so seized, and to give notice in writing in the Form in the Schedule to this Act annexed (marked E.) of the sale thereof at such time and place as they shall direct, after an interval of not less than two days, and that they shall file in the said Court a true copy of the said Notice, and that the same shall be sold accordingly, and that the said Officers shall forthwith after realization of the produce of the said sale, pay over the amount thereof to the Chief Clerk of the said Court, and the amount of such produce shall be applied in satisfaction of the sum claimed to be due, together with the costs of the said distress, and that the surplus, if any, shall be returned to the party from whom the said rent was claimed to be due, provided that it shall be lawful for such party to direct that such sale shall take place in any other manner, such party giving security for any extra costs attending such mode of sale.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that no costs shall be taken or demanded for such distress except those contained in the Schedule to this Act annexed (marked C), and that it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners to apply the sum so raised as costs, towards the payment of the contingent charges and reemune atton of the said Bailiffs and Appraisers as shall appear to the said Commissioners expedient, and that the Chief Clerk of the said Court shall keep a book in which all sums received as costs upon distresses made under the prvisions of this Act, and all sums paid as remuneration to the said Bailiffs and Appraisers and all contingent charges incurredling respect of such distresses shall be duly entered, and that the Chief Clerk of the said Court shall also enter it the said book all sums realized by sale of the Goods and Chattles distrained and paid over to the landlords under the provisions of this Act.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that after the passing of this Act no distress shall be levied for arrears of rent amounting to Rupees 100, or less, except under the provisions of this Act, and that any person, except such Officer as appointed, levying or attepting to levy any such distress shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to be punished by fine and imprisonment for the same in addition to any other liability he may have incurred by such trespass.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that this Act shall not extend to any arrears of rent exceeding 100 Rs., nor in respect of any House or Premises situate out of Calcutta, nor to any rent due to Government, nor to any scizure except on the Premises in respect of which such rent is claimed.

An Act to authorize the reception of Convicts transported from Her Majesty's Settlement of Hong-Kong.

It is nereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor General of India, in his executive capacity to authorize the Governor of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, to receive in the said Settlements, and the Resident Counselors of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, to receive in each of the said Settlements respectively, Convicts who have been duly sentenced to transportation by any competent Court in Her Majesty's Settlement of Hong Kong, and that every such Convict when so received at any such place shall be lable to all such and the same Laws, Rules and Regulations as are or shall be in force in any such place with pespect to Convicts transported from any place within the Territories, subject to the Government of East India Company.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 1st day of August next.
