Is hereby given, that sealed tenders will be received at this office on Monday the 12th proximo, at 12 o'clock meridi, for the exclusive privilege of vending country liquor to the troops and followers, composing the Brigade at Poona and Kirkee, for one year from the 1st August 1847.

The troops and followers composing the brigade are as follows, and are to be considered as divided into the shares stated opposite to each, viz.

The arrival at, or departure from Poona and Kirkee of 200 men or under, will have no effect on the amount payable for the monopoly, but all additions to that number will be adjusted according to the preceding proportions.

A regular supply of good and wholesome country liquor shall be kept up and retailed at the following rates.

The stipulated amount for the monopoly for one month is to be paid in advance, and two unexceptionable securities furnished for the due fulfilment of the agreement, who will be bound to make good any deficiency in the payment.

No liquor whatever is to be sold to European troops without the written permission of the Military Superintendent of Bazars, or by such

regulations as may from time to time be issued under the instructions of the officer commanding the brigade.

The contractor will be bound in the penalty of the forfeiture of his contract as well as the advance security deposited, neither to sell nor to permit any liquor to be sold at a lower rate than that stated above.

Should it hereafter appear that there are present at Poona and Kirkee, on 1st August, a greater number of troops and camp followers than are mentioned above, a corresponding increase to the monthly sum for which the contract is sold shall be paid to government by the contractors for all variations above 50, and vice versa if a decrease should occur in the above number on the date before specified viz. 1st August 1847,

The contractor is to take the contract with all its advantages and drawbacks, as he will not be considered entitled to any remission in consequence of failure of seasons, or any other causes save those distinctly specified in the contract, all petitions for remissions of monthly payments will consequently not be attended to.

The condition of the contract shall not be considered binding or in force in any respect until it be confirmed by government.

Further particulars can be obtained on application at this office from 10 A. M. till 4 P. M. daily Sundays excepted.

No reason will be assigned for the rejection of any tender, neither will any person be allowed to offer a tender for the contract unless it is accompanied with the sum of Rupees (500) five hundred in cash, which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the deed of contract should his offer be accepted.

PROCLAMATION.

BOMBAY TO WIT. By virtue of a precept to me directed, I hereby proclaim and give notice, that the Sessions of Oyer and Terminer and general Gaol Delivery, will be holden before the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, at the Court House, on Monday the 5th day of July next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses and other Crimes, and Misdemeanors, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the limits thereof, and the Factories subordinate thereto, and also to enquire, hear and determine, in like manner, all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done, or committed, by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects, in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependant upon the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India, in alliance with the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place, will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound to prosecute, and give evidence, at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend, at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give notice, to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, that they be then and there, in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments and other Remembrances, to do those things, which to their offices in that behalf appertain to be done. The contractor will be required to sign and seal a contract stipulating to the above effect, and that he will comply immediately with all emergent demands for the articles included in the abovementioned list, and others of less urgency within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him, in failure whereof the articles or such other as may be required in lieu may be purchased at his risk and loss and in all such cases an advance of (30) thirty per cent upon the amount of expences incurred or a fine Rupees (50) fifty at the option of the executive officer will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract as often as the same may occur, and the contract may also in all such cases be put an end to on the part of the East India Company.

Every person submitting a tender will be required to lodge with it the sum Rupees (100) one hundred in cash which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract; should his offer be excepted he must be prepared to add thereto a further sum of Rupees (55) fifty-five making Rupees one hundred and fifty five (155) in cash, and unexceptionable bonded security to the extent of Rupees (620) six hundred and twenty, which together with the above deposit amount will be held by the government as security for the due performance of his contract.

The tenders will be opened at the time above specified in the presence of the parties concerned or of such as may be in attendance, but none can be taken into consideration that are not accompanied with the requisite deposits.

The amount of retrenchments made by the Military board on the contractor's bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment by the contractors, but in the event of such retrenchments being subsequently removed, the amount thereof will be returned to them.

The following extract from the new Post office ordinance recently passed at the Mauritius, is published for general information.

ART. 22.—The following premiums shall be given to the Masters or Commanders of Vessels bringing Mails or Overland Newspapers to Mauritius under the annexed condition.

NOTIFICATION—Act No. VI. of 1847 is re-published, a misprint in Section 111, being corrected: For "₹ of a Dollar" read "₹ of a Dollar."

ACT No. VI. OF 1847.

Passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council on the 1st May 1847, with the assent of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India.

An Act for establishing a Copper Currency in the Settlements of Penang, Singapore and Malacca.

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the date of the passing of this Act, the provisions of Act to XX I. of 1835 and XXII. of 1841, shall not be deemed to apply to Copper Currency of the Settlements of Penang, Singapore and Malacca.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the 1st day of January 1848, the following Copper Coins only shall be received at or issued from any Government Treasury within the said Settlements:

1. A cent. weighing 144 grains troy.
2. A half cent. weighing 72 grains.
3. A quarter cent. weighing 36 grains.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the date of the passing of this Act, the said cent. shall be legal tender throughout the said Settlements for ₹ of a Dollar, and the said half cent. for ₹ of a Dollar, and the said quarter cent. for ₹ of a Dollar.

IV. Provided always and it is hereby enacted, that none of the said Coins shall be legal tender except for fractions of a Dollar.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that after the 1st day of January 1848, no other Copper Coins or Tokens than those specified in Section II. of this Act shall be legal tender of payment for the fractional parts of a Dollar within the said Settlements.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that with the exception of the Copper Coins specified in Section II. of this Act, the circulation in the said Settlements after the said day of all Copper Coins or Tokens not being the authorized legal Coinage of any British or Foreign Government is prohibited.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that after the said day any person who shall circulate, or attempt to circulate, in the said Settlements, any Copper Coins or Tokens other than those specified in Section II. of this Act, and not being the authorized legal Coinage of any British or Foreign Government shall on summary conviction before a Magistrate be liable to a fine not exceeding Ten Rupees, and in default of payment any person so convicted shall be subject to imprisonment for a term not exceeding one month.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the Governor General in Council in his executive capacity to direct the coining and issuing, and to prescribe the devices and inscriptions of the Coins to be issued under the authority of this Act.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 12th of June 1847.

ACT No.—of 1847.

An Act for regulating Coroner's Juries.

It is hereby enacted, that on all inquests hereafter to be held by the Coroner of Calcutta, no greater number than three Jurors shall be necessary, and that every finding of a Jury consisting of not less than three Jurors shall be to all intents and purposes as good, valid and effectual in Law as if such finding had been the finding of twelve Jurors.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that when any person shall have been duly summoned to attend as a Juror by the said Coroner of Calcutta, and shall fail or neglect to attend at the time and place specified in such summons, it shall be lawful for the

said Coroner to cause such person to be openly called in his Court three times to appear and serve as a Juror, and upon the non-appearance of such person and proof that such summons has been served upon him, or left at his usual place of abode, to impose such fine upon the person, so making default, not exceeding Fifty Rupees, as to such Coroner shall seem fit, and such Coroner shall make out and sign a Certificate, containing the name and surname, the residence and trade, or calling of every person so making default, together with the amount of the fine which shall have been imposed, and the cause of such fine, and shall transmit such Certificate to one of the Magistrates of Calcutta, and shall cause a copy of such Certificate to be served upon the person so fined, by having it left at his usual place of residence, or by sending the same through the Post Office, addressed as aforesaid, and thereupon such Magistrate shall cause such fine to be levied according to the provisions of Act No. II of 1839, in the same manner as if such fine had been imposed by himself.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 12th day of August next.
