The following extract from the new Post office ordinance recently passed at the Mauritius, is published for general information.

ART. 22.—The following premiums shall be given to the Masters or Commanders of Vessels bringing Mails or Overland Newspapers to Mauritius under the annexed condition.

£ 30 for any vessels touching expressly for the purpose of landing the *Overland Post office Mail*, upon proof of the vessel having sailed from the Port at which such Mail was taken on board within five days after the arrival thereat of the said mail.

£ 50 for any vessel bringing the same, upon proof of the vessel having sailed within 48 hours of the arrival of the Mail as above described.

£ 20 for any vessel upon proof of the vessel having sailed within five days of the said arrival.

And £ 10 for any vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an *Overland newspaper* of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication and be made public in the exchange room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 30TH JULY 1847.

No. 450 of 1847.—With reference to G. G. O. No. 423 of the 22nd June 1846, and to the several authorities therein quoted, the Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased, under instructions from the Government of India, and with a view to the assimilation of the rule and practice under the three Presidencies, to publish the following explanatory order.

An officer acting in the room of an absent staff officer, continues to draw a moiety only of the salary attached to the situation, (notwithstanding in the interim the appointment may become vacant, by the death of the absentee, or otherwise) until confirmed in the situation, when he is allowed the full salary, from the date of such confirmation.

The above rule is not applicable to officers nominated to full vacancies, that is, situations with which no other officer is connected, as in that case, such officers draw the full salary of the appointment from the date of entering on its duties.

The above rules are to have retrospective effect from the date of the before mentioned order of 22nd June 1846.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 3rd of July, 1847.

Act No.—OF 1817.

An Act for remedying a defect in the Law regarding undiscovered defaults in the prosecution of Suits.

Whereas inconvenience has resulted from the rule that the discovery of defaults in the prosecution of suits and appeals brought in any Court of the East India Company, within the Territories subject to the Presidencies of Bengal and Madras, invalidates all proceedings in such suits and appeals which may have been had since the occurrence of such default.

It is hereby enacted, that in the said Courts every default of a plaintiff or appellant, in all suits or appeals now pending or hereafter to be brought, and in all suits which have been decided but are still open to appeal, shall be held to be cured whenever the opposite party, passing over the default, shall have taken any step in the suit or appeal, and whenever the Court shall have passed judgement in the suit or appeal, whether such opposite party shall or shall not have taken any such step.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 3rd day of October next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 3d of July 1847.

Act No — OF 1847.

An Act to amend the Law regarding the taking of Mochulkas or Penal Recognizances.

I. It is hereby enacted, that Section 4, Regulation IV. of 1825, of the Bengal Code, is repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that in the Territories subject to the Presidency of Bengal, it shall be lawful for the Zillah and City Magistrates and Joint Magistrates to take Mochulkas or Penal Recognizances according to established usage in all cases wherein it may appear just and necessary to require the same for the maintenance of the peace in their respective jurisdictions although the party to be bound in such recognizance may not have been convicted of any specific offence, provided that the amount of the recognizance in all such cases shall be proportionate to the condition in life of the said party and to the circumstances of the case.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that in cases of an aggravated nature wherein it may appear necessary to require security for keeping the peace in addition to the recognizance of the party, it shall be lawful for such Magistrates to direct the same and to fix a reasonable amount for the security bond to be executed by the surety or sureties.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever it shall appear to the Magistrate that the period for which the party should be bound to keep the

peace with or without additional security, need not exceed one year, it shall be lawful for him without reference to superior authority to give directions accordingly, and in default of such recognizance or additional security, to commit the party to prison in the Civil Jail until he shall do what has been required of him.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever it shall appear to the Magistrate that the period for which the party should be bound to keep the peace with or without additional security ought to exceed the period of one year, the Magistrate shall record his opinion to that effect with an order specifying the amount of recognizance and security as well as the number of sureties which should in his judgment be required, and the period for which the recognizance and security should be required, which however shall in no case exceed three years. If the party shall not furnish the recognizance and security so required, the proceedings shall be laid before the Sessions Judge, who after examining then and calling for any further information which he may think necessary, shall pass orders on the case confirming, modifying or annulling the orders of the Magistrate, and if the orders so passed by the Sessions Judge confirm to any extent the requisition for recognizance or securities, the Sessions Judge shall direct the Magistrate to commit the party to prison in the Civil Jail until he shall do what has been required of him.

VI. Provided always and it is hereby enacted, that no party shall be kept in prison under this Act for a longer period than that for which the recognizance and securities have been required from him.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that the Provisions contained in Sections 5, 6 and 7, of Regulations VIII. of 1818, of the Bengal Code, shall be applicable to all persons confined under this Act, and to all sureties who shall have given security under this Act.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that all sentences and orders passed under this Act shall be appealable subject to the general provisions which regulate appeals.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 3d day of September next.

The following extract from the proceedings of the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council, in the Legislative branch of the Home Department, under date the 10th July 1847, is published for general information.

Read a second time the Draft of a proposed Act dated the 7th November 1846, and published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 11th November 1846, for the Survey and Assessment of Lands in the Town of Calcutta, within the local limits of the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature.

Resolution.—The Hon'ble the President in Council resolves, that the following amended Draft on the subject be published for general information.

Act No.—of 1847.

An Act for the Survey of Lands in the Town of Calcutta, within the Local limits of the Jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature.

Whereas it is expedient that a correct Survey should be made of all lands in the Town of Calcutta within the local limits of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature.

It is therefore hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor of Bengal to appoint an Officer to Survey the lands situate within the said local limits, and such Officer shall proceed to Survey the same and to register the names of the owners and occupiers thereof as far as they can be ascertained, and such Officer shall, by public notification, invite all persons owning or occupying lands and

tenements within the said local limits to appear before him in person or by duly constituted attorney at whatever place within the said limits his office may be held, and to bring with him all Pottahs, Ground Rent Bills, Bills of Sale, or other writings requisite for the ascertainment of the past and present boundaries of such lands.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that the said officer shall for the purposes of this Act have full power and authority at all reasonable hours in the day time, to enter or to direct his subordinate officers to enter into and upon any land or tenement within the said local limits, and in and upon the land on which any house, building or other erection is built, or building or intended to be built, and into and upon any buildings or any part thereof without being liable to any action at law or suit in Equity, or any other legal proceedings or molestation whatsoever for or on account of such entry into, or of any thing done or to be done in any part thereof in pursuance of this Act. Provided, that such Officer or Subordinate Officers shall not enter upon any lands or tenements which may be occupied at the time, unless with the consent of the occupier thereof, without previously giving the said occupier reasonable notice of his or their intention to do so. Provided also, that if any action shall be commenced in the Supreme Court against any such Officer or Subordinate Officer for any entry made or other thing done under the authority of, or in pursuance of this Act, it shall be lawful for him or them to plead the general issue and to give the special matter in evidence.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that if any person at any time shall obstruct or molest the said Officer or any of his subordinate Officers in the performance and execution of his or their duty, or any thing which they are required to do by or by virtue of in consequence of this Act, every such person so offending shall be guilty of a misdemeanour and shall on conviction before a Magistrate for the Town of Calcutta, forfeit and pay for every such offence any sum not exceeding 200 Rupees.

IV. And whereas such notification as is directed by Section I of this Act, may not in all cases be effectual, it is therefore hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Surveying Officer to cause any person owning or occupying lands or tenements within the said local limits, or his Agents or representatives, to be served with a special notice under his official seal and signature, stating the purpose for which the attendance of such person is required, and any document essential for the purposes of this Act which such person is to bring with him and the period within which such person is to attend, and if such person cannot be found, the notice shall be affixed to his usual place of residence, if that be within the said local limits, or if not, then on the premises to be surveyed. Provided always, that no person shall be required to produce any Title Deed which such person may object to produce.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that for any investigation connected with the purposes of this Act it shall be lawful for the Surveying Officer by writing under his hand to summon any person whatsoever to attend as a witness at a time and place to be specified in such Summons, and that every witness so duly summoned to attend, as aforesaid, who shall not attend, or who attending shall refuse to give evidence on oath or solemn affirmation or declaration, or to answer all such questions as the Surveying Officer may legally demand, shall be liable to be attached in the Supreme Court upon complaint made in like manner as if such witness had neglected to attend on any trial in such Supreme Court.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that any witness examined before such Surveying Officer shall be examined upon oath, which such Surveying Officer is hereby authorized to administer. Provided always, that in all cases wherein a solemn declaration or affirmation would be allowed in Her Majesty's Courts of Judicature to be substituted for an oath, the said Surveying Officer shall substitute such solemn declaration or affirmation for an oath.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that any witness wilfully and knowingly giving false testimony on oath or solemn declaration or affirmation before such Surveying Officer shall be deemed guilty of wilful and corrupt perjury.

Ordered, that the Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 10th day of September next.
