## PROCLAMATION.

**B**OMBAY TO WIT. By virtue of a precept to me directed, I hereby proclaim and give notice, that the Sessions of Oyer and Terminer and general Gaol Delivery, will be holden before the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, at the Court House, on Saturday 25th Sept. instant at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses and other Crimes, and Misdemeanors, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the limits thereof, and the Factories subordinate thereto, and also to enquire, hear and determine, in like manner, all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done, or committed, by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects, in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependant upon the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India, in alliance with the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place, will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound

to prosecute, and give evidence, at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend, at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give notice, to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, that they be then and there, in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments and other Remembrances, to do those things, which to their offices in that behalf appertain to be done. **POST OFFICE NOTICES.**

The following extract from the new Post office ordinance recently passed at the Mauritius, is published for general information.

ART. 22.—The following premiums shall be given to the Masters or Commanders of Vessels bringing Mails or Overland Newspapers to Mauritius under the annexed condition.

£ 30 for any vessels touching expressly for the purpose of landing the *Overland Post office Mail*, upon proof of the vessel having sailed from the Port at which such Mail was taken on board within five days after the arrival thereat of the said mail.

£ 30 for any vessel bringing the same, upon proof of the vessel having sailed within 48 hours of the arrival of the Mail as above described,

£ 20 for any vessel upon proof of the vessel having sailed within five days of the said arrival.

And £ 10 for any vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an *Overland newspaper* of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication and be made public in the exchange room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel.

In consequence of several complaints recently made, the Post Master General requests the attention of the public to the following extract from Clause VI. of the Post Office Rules, 30th August 1837.

"Newspapers, printed papers or parcels will not be received bearing postage, unless the sender shall give his name and address, in order that the regulated postage may be recovered from him in case of such paper or parcel being refused by the party addressed."

Parties coming to the General Post office to enquire for letters awaiting their arrival, are requested to make application to the "Dead and Unclaimed letter department" in the South wing of the building.

The following Notification by H. M. Post Master General of London, is republished for general information :

BY COMMAND OF THE POST MASTER GENERAL,  
NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, MAY 1847.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay" and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates.

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage, on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

No. 516 of 1847.—The Honorable the Governor in Council, having had under his consideration the present state of the regulations with regard to Cadets on their first arrival at the Presidency, has been pleased to prescribe the following additional rules which will in future be punctually observed by all the parties concerned.

The Town Major will be careful to ascertain from the passenger reports of vessels arriving, the number of Cadets on board; and will depute as soon as possible after the arrival of the vessel a Non-commissioned officer of the Garrison to assist them in landing with their baggage, and to direct them to his office.

From the Town Major's office the Cadets will be conducted to that of the Adjutant General, by whom they will be attached to one or other of the regiments at the Presidency or otherwise disposed of as His Excellency the Commander in Chief may consider best. Those who have friends will be permitted to reside with them, and to remain for a short time unattached, but it is to be considered an imperative rule that the friend desirous of receiving the Cadet, shall intimate his wish, personally or in writing, to the Adjutant General.

It must be clearly understood that the charge of the Town Major over the cadets is not ended until they are made over to the regiment to which they are attached, or to their friends, as the case may be.

Regiments stationed at the Presidency are authorized to indent upon the public stores for 3 tents to be kept always ready pitched for the accommodation of Cadets during the fair season, each of these tents is to be furnished with 2 chairs, 1 camp table, and 1 bedstead to be supplied by the barrack department; and the whole are to be held in regimental charge to be returned into store on the 1st June, and indented out again on the 1st October.

During the monsoon months, arrangements will be made in the Garrison, for the appropriation of some of the rooms of the barracks for the use of the Cadets, the same furniture being supplied as in the tents during the fair weather, and kept under charge of the Barrack Master

The accommodation thus provided for Cadets is to be altogether at the public expense for one full month in the fair season, and two in the monsoon, after which the Cadet will be expected to provide himself with all he requires. And if specially allowed to continue to occupy the tent or the room, he will be subjected to the usual deduction for free quarters.

Cadets on arriving in the harbour of Bombay, are directed to await on board the permission to land, which will be given to them without delay, either by the Town Major or by some person deputed by him.

2. The Governor in Council deems this a fitting occasion to offer to Sir Robert Oliver, the warmest acknowledgments, on the part of the Government, of the able manner in which he has for many years conducted the department under his control, and by his indefatigable exertions, drawn forth from its very inadequate and defective means, most important services to the State, and the Governor in Council feels confident that the additional powers now placed in the hands of the Superintendent, will enable him to improve the discipline of the Indian Navy, to raise its character and to promote its efficiency in all its parts.

Commodore Sir Robert Oliver is requested to take the earliest opportunity of hoisting his broad pendant in the vessel of the Indian Navy which he may select for the purpose.

No. 98 of 1847.—The following extracts of a despatch, from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors No. 50, dated 28th July 1847, are published for general information.

Para. 8.—We authorise you, on the receipt of this despatch, to make the promotions required to raise the establishment of officers to 8 Captains, 16 Commanders, 68 Lieutenants and 14 Pursers, and to maintain in future each of these classes at the same complement; to enable you to do this we shall increase the number of midshipmen to 110, and we shall appoint as many clerks as will raise the number of that class to 12.

Para. 18.—You will modify the duties of the "Assistant Superintendent of the Indian Navy" retaining that title, and we authorise you to appoint to that post one of the Captains on the effective list of the Indian Navy, to make him the allowance of a first rate command, or Rupees 900 per mensem, and to assign to him a suitable allowance for house rent. The appointment must not be held for more than three years consecutively by the same officer, but at the end of that period it must be committed to another of the captains in order that his predecessor in the situation may again be available for service afloat. We desire this to be understood as the general rule; it is not however our intention to interdict you from re-appointing the same officer for a further term, if it shall appear for the advantage of the public service to do so.

Para. 19.—We likewise sanction the appointment of a Secretary to the Superintendent, but the salary of that office must not be fixed at a higher rate than Rupees 600 a month.

An Act for amending Act XXX. of 1836.

It is hereby enacted, that within the Territories sub- ject to the Government of the East India Company whenever any Court not included under the provisions of Act XIV. of 1844 shall sentence any offender to im- prisonment for life under the provisions of Act XXX. of 1836, it shall at the same time sentence such offen- der to transportation beyond sea for life, unless there should be special reasons inducing the Court to think such prisoner not a proper subject for transportation, which special reasons the Court is hereby directed to record.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 14th of August 1847.

ACT No.—of 1847.

An Act for curing the invalidity in the registration of Deeds arising from the fact of having been registered by persons not duly appointed or on other than Court days.

Whereas instances have occurred of persons exer- cising the office of Register of Deeds who have not been duly appointed, and whereas in some cases registration of Deeds has been made on other than Court days, that in on days other than those on which the Zilla or City Court has been open for business, and doubts may therefore arise as to whether the registration of any Deed registered by such persons not duly appointed, or registered on other than a Court day, is valid in law :

I. It is therefore hereby enacted, that acts which may have been done in that capacity in any Zillah, subject to the Presidency of Bengal, by persons who have had charge of the office of Register of Deeds without being duly appointed to the said office, shall be and shall be taken to have always been as valid in law as such acts would have been if the said persons had been duly appointed to have charge of the said office.

II. And it is enacted, that all acts which may have been done on other than Court days by the Register of Deeds, or by the person having charge of the office without being duly appointed in any Zillah subject to the Presidency of Bengal, shall be and shall be taken to have always been as valid in law as such acts would have been if they had been done on a Court day.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for ge- neral information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 14th day of October next.

ACT No. XII. OF 1847.

*An Act for repealing the Law which authorizes the imposition of fines on Moonsiffs and Sudder Ameens.*

Whereas it was enacted, by Clause 3, Section 9, Regulation XXIII. of 1814, of the Bengal Code, that in cases of misconduct and neglect of duty which might not be of a nature to require the suspension or dismissal of a Moonsiff from his office, the Judge should be authorized to impose on the Moonsiff a fine not exceeding Twenty Rupees in amount, and that the order of the Judge in such case should be final:

And whereas by Section 67 of the said Regulation the provision above recited, was declared amongst other things to be applicable to the office of Sudder Ameens, as well as to that of Moonsiffs:

And whereas the provision above recited, is no longer adapted to Moonsiffs and Sudder Ameens, in the more elevated Judicial position which they now occupy:

It is therefore hereby enacted, that Clause 3, Section 9, Regulation XXIII. of 1814, and Section 67 of the said Regulation, so far as it declares the said Clause to be applicable to Sudder Ameens, are repealed.

Ordered, that the Act be promulgated for general information.

ACT No. XIII. OF 1847.

*An Act for repealing Act XIV. of 1839 so far as it relates to the Emigration of Natives of India to the Island of Ceylon.*

1. Whereas by Act XIV. of 1839 it was enacted, that every person who should make with any Native of India any contract for labor to be performed in any British or Foreign Colony without the Territories of the East India Company, or who should knowingly abet or aid any Native of India in emigrating from the said Territories for the purpose of being employed as a laborer, should be liable on conviction before a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, to a fine not exceeding 200 Rupees for every Native so contracted with, aided or abetted, and in default of payment of such fine, should be liable to be imprisoned for a term not exceeding three months:

Provided always that nothing in that Act contained should be taken to apply to any Native Seaman who should of his own free will contract to navigate any Vessel, or who should embark on board such Vessel in pursuance of such contract, or to any person who should contract to serve as a Menial Servant only, or who should embark as such Menial Servant:

And whereas the island of Ceylon geographically, historically and socially considered is analogous to the Countries subject to the Government of the East India Company:

It is hereby enacted, that Act XIV. of 1839 in so far as it makes liable to penalties every person who shall make with any Native of India any contract for labor to be performed in the said Island, or who shall knowingly aid or abet any Native of India in emigrating from the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company to the said island, is repealed.

II. But whereas the said Island is not subject to the Legislative power of the Governor General of India in Council, so that the said Governor General in Council is unable to make Laws for the protection of such Natives of India as may emigrate to the said Island against the evils which might attend the emigration of such Natives of India from the said Island to any British or Foreign Colony:

It is therefore hereby enacted, that this Act shall not come into operation until the Governor General of India in Council shall be duly certified that the Legislature of the said Island has made such Laws as the said Governor General in Council shall think sufficient for the protection of such Natives of India so emigrating to the said Island against the evils aforesaid, and shall notify in the Gazette that he has been so certified.
