The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to re-publish the following Resolution passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council, under date the 29th ultimo.

FORT WILLIAM,

FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT,

The 29th January 1847.

Resolution.—The President in Council observes, that, under a rigid construction of the provisions of the rules for regulating leave of absence to the uncovenanted service, an incumbent in the receipt of a personal allowance, in addition to the fixed salary of his appointment, would forfeit, during any absence on authorized leave, the moiety of his consolidated allowances, while on the other hand, the party officiating for him would be entitled to claim as deputation allowance, the half of the fixed salary of the appointment only, thus leaving the moiety of the personal allowance to revert to the Government.

But the President in Council has no desire to take advantage of this strict action of the rules to the prejudice of deserving persons in the receipt of their due reward for meritorious services, especially where the grant is of so personal a nature as not to be claimable in the shape of pension; on the contrary, he is anxious to give the fullest effect to honorary allowances earned by approved service in the employment of government, and he is accordingly pleased to resolve, that personal allowances be exempted from deduction under the operation of the Absentee Rules; and parties in the receipt of personal allowances, whilst absent on authorized leave, will, accordingly, be entitled to continue to draw the whole of such personal allowance, in addition to the proportion of ordinary salary claimable by them under the general provisions of the rules.

M. till 5 P. M. daily (Sundays excepted) obtain a list of the prices and such other information relating thereto, as they may require.

Verbal offers for the contract will be received at this office at 3 o'clock on Monday the 15th proximo, when persons will be required to bid a per centage below the price exhibited in the above mentioned list, on the understanding that the article embraced therein is to be of good quality and delivered in good condition free of all further expence, in such number or quantity as may from time to time be demanded to the indenting departments, and will be liable to examination and rejection by a committee of officers appointed on the part of government.

The Bread for the vessels of War, in this harbour is to be delivered free of all expence at the water edge at any of the bunders that may be indicated by the indenting officers &c. by 6 o'clock in the morning of each day.

The contractor will be required to sign and seal a contract stipulating to the above effect, and that he will comply immediately with all emergent demands for the articles included in the abovementioned list, and others of less urgency must be met within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him, in failure whereof, the article or such others as may be required in lieu may be purchased at his risk and loss, and in all such cases and advance of Rupees (30) thirty per cent upon the amount of expences incurred, or a fine of Rupees (50) fifty at the option of the executive officer will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract as often as the same may occur, and the contract may also in all such cases be put an end to on the part of the East India Company.

No person will be allowed to bid for the contract unless he previously deposits in this office, the sum of Rupees (200) two hundred in cash, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract, should his offer be accepted he must be prepared to add thereto a further sum of Rupees (214) two hundred and fourteen, making in all Rupees (414) four hundred and fourteen in cash, and unexceptionable bonded security to the extent of Rupees (1659) sixteen hundred and fifty-nine, to be held by the government as security for the due performance of his contract.

It is to understood that all retrenchments made by the military board on the contractors bills are to be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment by the contractors, but in the event of such retrenchments being subsequently removed the amount thereof will be returned to them.

The annual outlay on account of the above contract is estimated at Rupees (8297-0-0) or thereabouts. All further particulars will be communicated at the time of bidding and no reason will be assigned for the rejection of any offer.

No. 141 of 1847.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the following rules be observed on all occasions of despatching remount horses to their several corps at outstations, or to the other Presidencies thro' the agency of the Commissariat Department.

When horses are to be sent through the Commissariat Department to outstations, the joint Remount Agent should give early notice of the same to the officers commanding the respective mounted corps for which the horses are selected, in order that a non-commissioned officer's party may be sent down to the Presidency to take charge of the horses, and to attend to the feed and proper treatment of them by the contractor's people on the journey.

On arrival of the Remounts at every military station, a committee of officers whenever practicable is invariably to be appointed by the commanding officer, to report upon the condition of the horses, and to make such remarks as may appear called for. The proceedings of such committees to be forwarded to the Adjutant General and a duplicate to the Commissary General.

A discretionary power is vested in the committee under the sanction of the officer commanding the station to authorize an advance of cash for the subsistence of the horses when necessary, by the nearest Commissariat Officer, by whom immediate intimation should be given to the Commissariat Department at the Presidency, of the extent of such advance, in view to a recovery being made from the contractor.

The horses for regiments serving in Scinde should be taken charge of and shipped by the Commissariat, and for horses proceeding beyond Kurrachee, regimental parties should be in readiness at the latter place to accompany the horses to their destination.

When batches of horses are destined for upper India, the Commissary General should detach a Commissariat Warrant Officer to proceed in charge of them, but in the event of one not being available for the duty, the services of a steady European Non-Commissioned Officer of the Horse Artillery should be applied for by the Commissary General direct to army head quarters.

In order that the Committee may be satisfied that the horses produced before them are actually those originally entrusted to the contractor, a copy of the register from the remount Agent should accompany every batch of horses, and be confided to the care of the officer commanding the escort, or such other person as may be in charge, for production before the Committee of examination, but this will in no way abrogate or supersede the existing rules under which the registers are forwarded by the Presidency Executive Officer direct to the Commissariat of the station to which the horses are proceeding, as well as to the intermediate Commissariat Officer at the principal cantonments through which the line of route may traverse.

Resolved, that the Rule requiring a previous publication of two months or three months before the passing of any Act of the Government of India be suspended in respect to the following proposed Act, and that it be reconsidered at the first Legislative Meeting after the 10th proximo :

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 20th January 1847 :

Act No.—or 1847.

An Act to declare the meaning and extent of certain words in Act V. of 1840.

Whereas by Section IV. of Act V. of 1840, it was amongst other things provided that the said Act should not extend to any declaration or affirmation made in any of Her Majesty's Courts of Justice, and doubts have arisen whether the words "Her Majesty's Courts of Justice" mean and extend to the Courts of the Justices of the Peace :

It is hereby declared and enacted, that the said words "Her Majesty's Courts of Justice," in the said Act shall be deemed not to have meant nor extended to and not to mean nor extend to the Courts of the Justices of the Peace.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 10th day of February 1847.

The 30th January 1847.—The following Act is passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council on the 30th January 1847, with the assent of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India, which has been read and recorded.

Ordered, that the Act be promulgated for general information.

Act No. I. of 1847.

An Act for the establishment and maintenance of Boundary Marks in the North Western Provinces of Bengal.

Whereas it is desirable with a view to the better definition and security of landed property, the prevention of encroachments and disputes, and the iden-

tification of lands assessed to, or exempted from, the Public Revenue, that provision should be made for the establishment and maintenance of permanent marks to distinguish the boundaries of Fields or Estates :

I. It is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful within the Territories subject to the Government of the North Western Provinces of Bengal, for Collectors of Land Revenue, or persons exercising the powers of Collector, or such Revenue Officers as the Lieutenant Governor may entrust with that authority, to fix the boundaries of Fields or Estates, and to require that marks be formed and maintained by the owners or occupants on the boundaries, of such materials and in such number and manner as may appear to such Officers sufficient for distinguishing the limits of those Field or Estates whenever they may be of opinion that such demarkation is necessary for the prevention or adjustment of disputes

II. And it is hereby enacted, that notices shall be served on the persons owning or occupying the conterminous Fields or Estates requiring them to form or repair the said boundary marks within ten days from the date of the notice, and in the event of these persons not being found in the Village that the said requisition shall be posted at the Village Chowree or Chopal, or other conspicuous place in the Village, which shall be held to be a sufficient service, notwithstanding it may afterwards appear that the owners or occupants were not correctly named or designated in the notice.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that in default of the owners or occupants of the Fields or Estates complying with the requisition, the said Revenue Officers shall give directions for the erection and repair of such boundary marks, the cost of which shall be equitably apportioned on the Fields or Estates which they serve to distinguish, and shall be charged to the persons possessing a right of ownership or occupancy in such Fields or Estates, and shall be realized in the same manner as arrears of land revenue.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that any person who may be convicted of wilfully erasing, removing or injuring such boundary marks, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Fifty Rupees for each mark so erased, removed or injured ; one half of which fine may be awarded on conviction to the informer, and the other half shall be chargeable with the cost of restoring the mark ; whenever it may not be possible to detect the person who erased, removed or injured the boundary marks as aforesaid, the marks shall be re-erected or repaired at the charge of one or both parties, as the Collector or other Officer authorized to make the demarkation may consider just and equitable.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that disputed boundaries shall be fixed by Revenue Officers under the powers and in the manner prescribed in Regulations VII. 1522 and IX. of 1833, and shall be similarly open to appeal.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that Magistrates are prohibited from taking cognizance under Act IV. of 1840 of boundary disputes of the nature for which provision is here made, but whenever they have reason to apprehend any breach of the peace in consequence of a disputed boundary, they shall certify the circumstances to the Collector of Land Revenue, who shall be bound immediately to mark off the boundary in the mode here indicated, and to uphold the possession of the parties according to the demarkation.
