Legislative Council of India.

12th June 1858.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 2nd June 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 12th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXII. of 1858.

An Act to continue in Force, for a Further Period, Acts XIV. of 1857, XVI. of 1857, and XVII. of 1857, and to Authorise, in certain Cases, the Transportation of Offenders Sentenced to Imprisonment.

Whereas it is expedient that Acts XIV. of 1857, XVI. of 1857, and XVII. of 1857, should continue in force until the end of the year 1859; and that, in certain cases, offenders sentenced to imprisonment under the said Acts should be transported beyond the sea; It is enacted as follows:—

I. Acts XIV. of 1857, XVI. of 1857, and XVII. of 1857 shall continue in force until the end of the year 1859.

II. Unless the Governor General in Council shall otherwise order, whenever any Court or other Officer shall sentence an offender under any of the said Acts to imprisonment for a term exceeding three years, it shall be lawful for such Court or other Officer at the

same time to order that the offender be transported beyond sea for such term.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 12th June 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 26th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXIII. of 1858.

An Act for Bringing the District of Kurnool under the Laws of the Presidency of Fort Saint George.

Whereas it is expedient that the District of Kurnool should be brought under the Laws of the Presidency of Fort Saint George; It is enacted as follows:—

Act repealed. I. Act X. of 1843 is hereby repealed.

II. It is hereby enacted that, from and after the 1st day of July 1858, the District of Kurnool shall be subject to the Laws in force for the administration of Justice and collection of the Revenue in the several Zillahs and Collectorates under the Presidency of Fort Saint George.

Legislative Council of India.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 12th June 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon (under a suspension of the Standing Orders) at the next Meeting of the Council:—

A Bill to make Further Provision for the Trial and Punishment of Offences against the State.

Whereas it is expedient to make further provision for the trial and punishment of Offences against the State;

Preamble.

It is enacted as follows:—

I. If any person, owing allegiance to the British Government, shall collect

Collecting arms, &c., with the intention of levying war against the State.

men, arms, or ammunition, or otherwise prepare to levy war, with the intention of

either levying or being prepared to levy war against the Queen, or the East India Company, or shall instigate any other person to commit such offence, or shall knowingly aid in the commission thereof, such person shall be liable to the punishment of death, or to the punishment of transportation for life, or of imprisonment with hard labour for any term not exceeding Fourteen years, and shall also forfeit all his property and effects of every description.

II. Whoever shall knowingly harbour or conceal

Harbouring or concealing offenders.

any person who shall have been guilty of any of the offences mentioned in the preceding Section, shall be liable to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for any term not exceeding Seven years, and shall also be liable to fine.

III. If any person, having knowledge of the com-

Person having knowledge of the commission of certain offences, and neglecting to give information.

mission of any of the offences mentioned in Section I. Act XI. of 1857, or in Section I. of this Act, shall conceal the fact, or shall neglect to

declare and make known the same to the Governor General in Council, or to the Executive Government of the Presidency or place, or to the Magistrate or person exercising the powers of a Magistrate in the District in which such offence shall be committed, or such person shall be, he shall be liable to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding Seven years, and shall also be liable to fine.

Is hereby given, that a small supply of ADHESIVE ENVELOPES, referred to in the undermentioned Notice of the Officiating Director General of the Post Office in India, dated Calcutta, the 29th November 1856, have been received by this Department from Calcutta. Officers in charge of Local Depôts, requiring any, should prefer their Indent to this Department, as directed in the above notice.

"NOTICE.

"The Officers in charge of Treasuries and Depôts for the custody and sale of Postage Stamps are informed that Adhesive Envelopes, stamped with the value of One Anna, have been received from England, and, being now in charge of the Superintendent of Stamps, Calcutta, are now available on Indent.

"2. These Envelopes are in packets of 16, and each packet is enclosed in a wrapper, on which is marked the price, Rs. 1-2-0.

"3. The Rules for the sale of Postage Stamps are applicable to the sale of the Stamped Envelopes; but discount is allowed on the actual value of the latter, and not the extra charge of 2 annas on every 16 Envelopes, which is added to cover the cost of the paper and manufacture.

"4. The Superintendent of Stamps will not supply the Stamped Envelopes in a smaller quantity than one Ream at a time, which consists of 30 Packets, and is of the value of Rs. 33-12-0, including the extra charge of 2 annas on each Packet."

The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to republish, for general information, the following ADMIRALTY NOTICE respecting LIGHTS and FOG SIGNALS to be carried and used by Sea-going Vessels, to prevent Collision:—

By the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, &c.

By virtue of the power and authority vested in us, we hereby revoke, as from and after the Thirtieth day of September 1858, the regulations made and published by us on the First day of May 1852, relating to the Lights to be carried by Sea-going Vessels to prevent collision: And we hereby make the following Regulations, and require and direct that the same be strictly observed and carried into effect on and after the First day of October 1858:—

STEAM VESSELS.

All Sea-going Steam Vessels, when under steam, shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit the following Lights:—

1. A bright White Light at the Foremast Head.
A Green Light on the Starboard side.
A Red Light on the Port side.
2. The Mast-head Light shall be so constructed as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least 5 miles, and shall show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass, and it shall be so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the ship, viz. from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either side.
3. The Green Light on the Starboard side and the Red Light on the Port side shall be so constructed as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least 2 miles, and show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, and they shall be so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the Starboard and on the Port sides respectively.
4. The side Lights are to be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least 3 feet forward from the Light, so as to prevent the Lights from being seen across the bow.
5. Steam Vessels under Sail only are not to carry their Mast-head Light.

FOG SIGNALS.

All Sea-going Steam Vessels, whether propelled by paddles or screws, when their steam is up, and when under-way, shall in all cases of Fog use as a Fog Signal a Steam Whistle, placed before the Funnel at not less than 8 feet from the deck, which shall be sounded once at least every five minutes; but when the steam is not up, they shall use a Fog Horn or Bell, as ordered for Sailing Ships.

SAILING VESSELS.

1. All Sea-going Sailing Vessels, when under-way or being towed, shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit a Green Light on the Starboard side and a Red Light on the Port side of the vessel, and such Lights shall be so constructed as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least 2 miles, and shall show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the Starboard and on the Port sides respectively.
2. The Coloured Lights shall be *fixed* whenever it is practicable so to exhibit them; and shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least 3 feet forward from the Light, so as to prevent the Lights being seen across the bow.
3. When the Coloured Lights cannot be fixed (as in the case of small vessels in bad weather), they shall be kept on deck between sunset and sunrise, and on their proper sides of the vessel, ready for instant exhibition, and shall be exhibited in such a manner as can be best seen on the approach of, or to, any other vessel or vessels, in sufficient time to avoid collision, and so that the Green Light shall not be seen on the Port side, nor the Red Light on the Starboard side.

FOG SIGNALS.

All Sea-going Sailing Vessels, when under-way, shall, in all cases of Fog, use, when on the Starboard Tack a Fog Horn, and when on the Port Tack shall Ring a Bell. These Signals shall be sounded once at least every five minutes.

SAILING PILOT VESSELS are to carry only a White Light at the Mast-head, and are to exhibit a Flare-up Light every 15 minutes, in accordance with Trinity House Regulation.

VESSELS AT ANCHOR.

All Sea-going Vessels, when at anchor in roadsteads or fairways, shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a White Light in a Globular Lantern of 8 inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light all round the horizon, at a distance of at least 1 mile.

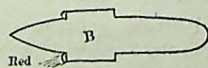

BY THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

Bombay Castle, 7th July 1858.

SIR,—I am directed by the Commander in Chief to report, for the information of the Right Honorable the Governor in Council, that intelligence, by telegram, was received from Belgaum, at 10 A. M. this day, of the sudden death of Major General Lester, Commanding the Southern Division.

2. It appears that the General was seen alive this morning at 5 o'clock ; at 7 he was dead !

3. In making this melancholy announcement, I am to communicate the very deep regret with which His Excellency has heard of the loss of an Officer, who, during a period of nearly 47 years, has ever been an honour to the Service, and had established a character which caused him to be respected and esteemed throughout the Presidency.

4. As Commanding a Division of this Army, the Commander in Chief deplors the loss of one in whom His Excellency placed the highest confidence, and whose services, during the last twelve months, have been so valuable, that Sir Henry Somerset feels assured His Lordship in Council will share in the sorrow with which this announcement is made.

No. 709 of 1858.—The following Rules are established, for the guidance of the Inspector General, Medical Department :—

1. The duties of the Inspector General, Medical Department, are, to make an Annual Tour of Inspection (under instructions from the Director General) of all Military and Civil Stations, Hospitals, Dispensaries, Jails, Lunatic Asylums, Vaccination Establishments, Depôts of Medical Stores (except the Central Store, Bombay), and all other Establishments, whether Military, Naval, or Civil, connected with the Medical Department, in the Presidency of Bombay.

2. The leading objects of Inspection are, in regard to Military and Civil Stations, to inquire into, and to report upon, the sanitary condition, site, construction, adaptation, and defects of all Public Buildings, Barracks, Hospitals, &c. ; to ascertain that the sanitary requirements of Jails are strictly observed ; to investigate the causes of any unusual sickness or mortality amongst Troops, Prisoners, &c. ; and to report fully upon all subjects affecting the healthiness, or otherwise, of Buildings, Localities, or Stations.

3. With respect to Hospitals, Dispensaries, Lunatic Asylums, and Depôts of Medical Stores, the objects of Inspection are, to ascertain that the duties in every branch are thoroughly performed by all Medical Officers and Subordinates; that the Regulations bearing upon each Department are strictly obeyed; and that nothing is neglected which can in any way conduce to the welfare of the Sick. Whilst, with regard to Vaccination, the object is to discover how far it is encouraged, supported, and efficiently carried out, by all Medical Officers, as well as by Superintendents of Vaccination, and Members of that Establishment.

4. The Inspector General will avail himself of every opportunity of observing the professional efficiency, attainments, character, and zeal of all Medical Officers; and upon these points he will unreservedly communicate with the Director General.

5. Whilst engaged on the duties of Inspection, the Inspector General is empowered to call for any documents which may assist him, both from executive Medical Officers and from Superintending Surgeons; but on no other subject whatever, than that relating to his Inspection, is he to correspond with Medical Officers or with Superintending Surgeons; and with the duties of the latter he is in nowise to interfere.

6. At the Presidency, the Inspector General will have access to the records in the Office of the Director General on application to the Secretary.

7. Within a month after the Inspection of any Station, Hospital Establishment, &c., the Inspector General will forward to the Director General a Report, embracing every particular before mentioned.

8. Whenever, owing to circumstances, a special Inspection of any locality, Hospital, &c., may be necessary, the Inspector General will receive detailed instructions connected therewith from the Director General, Medical Department.

Registration of Letters.—Notice is hereby given, that, after the 1st July next, PREPAID LETTERS addressed to GREAT BRITAIN can be REGISTERED IN INDIA, on payment of a Fee of Four Annas. The Registration Rules in force in India will apply also to Letters for Great Britain, which may be registered according to this Notice.

Only Prepaid Letters can be registered.

Compulsory Prepayment of Letters to the United Kingdom.—From the 1st of September next the present system of *optional* Prepayment of Letters sent from India to the United Kingdom will be abolished, and from that date the Prepayment of Postage on Letters posted in any part of India for the United Kingdom, whether marked *via* Southampton or *via* Marseilles, will be *compulsory*. The Rates of Postage are as under :—

But in order to obviate the inconvenience which would be caused to the public by detaining and returning to the senders Letters which, *through inadvertence*, may be posted without the full amount of Postage being paid upon them, Letters insufficiently prepaid, but on which at least a single rate of Postage has been paid, will be forwarded, charged with the deficiency of Postage and a fine of Sixpence, or four Annas.

Prepayment must be made, as now, by Stamps.
