The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 12th June 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 26th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

Act No. XXIII. of 1858.

An Act for Bringing the District of Kurnool under the Laws of the Presidency of Fort Saint George.

Whereas it is expedient that the District of Kurnool should be brought under the Laws of the Presidency of Fort Saint George; It is enacted as follows:—

I. Act X. of 1843 is hereby repealed.

II. It is hereby enacted that, from and after the 1st day of July 1858, the District of Kurnool shall be subject to the Laws in force for the administration of

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 22nd June 1858 (com-

municated to the Legislative Council on the 3rd July 1858), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXIV. of 1858.

An Act to Continue, for Six Months, the Privileges granted by Act I. of 1844 to certain Members of the Family, Household, and Retinue of His late Highness the Nabob of the Carnatic.

Whereas a Bill to continue certain privileges and immunities to the family and retainers of his late Highness the Nabob of the Carnatic

was read a second time in the Legislative Council, and referred to a Select Committee of the said Council on the 5th day of June 1858; and whereas, according to the Standing Orders of the said Council, such Bill must be published twelve weeks before the Select Committee can report thereon; and whereas the protection granted by Act XVIII. of 1857 to certain members of the family, household, and retinue of the said late Nabob will expire on the 4th day of July 1858, and it is expedient that such protection should be continued until after the Report of the Select Committee upon the abovementioned Bill shall have been presented to, and the said Bill shall have been fully considered by, the Legislative Council; It is enacted as follows:—

I. No writ or process shall, at any time within the period of six months from the time of the passing of this Act, be sued forth or prosecuted against the person, goods, or property of any person whose name was

No process to issue against the family or retinue of the late Nabob of the Carnatic for six months, unless with the consent of the Governor in Council.

included in any list which was published under the provisions of the said Act I. of 1844, and which was in force and effect, for the purpose of the said Act, at the time of the death of his said late Highness the Nabob of the Carnatic, unless such writ or process shall be sued forth or prosecuted with the consent of the Governor in Council of Fort Saint George first had and obtained, such consent to be testified by the signature of the Secretary or one of the Secretaries of Government.

II. Every writ or process which shall be sued forth, or prosecuted contrary to the provisions of this Act, shall be utterly null and void.

The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to republish, for general information, the following ADMIRALTY NOTICE respecting LIGHTS and FOG SIGNALS to be carried and used by Sea-going Vessels, to prevent Collision:—

By the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, &c.

By virtue of the power and authority vested in us, we hereby revoke, as from and after the Thirtieth day of September 1853, the regulations made and published by us on the First day of May 1852, relating to the Lights to be carried by Sea-going Vessels to prevent collision: And we hereby make the following Regulations, and require and direct that the same be strictly observed and carried into effect on and after the First day of October 1853:—

STEAM VESSELS.

All Sea-going Steam Vessels, when under steam, shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit the following Lights:—

1. A bright White Light at the Foremast Head.
A Green Light on the Starboard side.
A Red Light on the Port side.
2. The Mast-head Light shall be so constructed as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least 5 miles, and shall show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass, and it shall be so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the ship, viz. from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either side.
3. The Green Light on the Starboard side and the Red Light on the Port side shall be so constructed as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least 2 miles, and show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, and they shall be so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the Starboard and on the Port sides respectively.
4. The side Lights are to be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least 3 feet forward from the Light, so as to prevent the Lights from being seen across the bow.
5. Steam Vessels under Sail only are not to carry their Mast-head Light.

FOG SIGNALS.

All Sea-going Steam Vessels, whether propelled by paddles or screws, when their steam is up, and when under-way, shall in all cases of Fog use as a Fog Signal a Steam Whistle, placed before the Funnel at not less than 8 feet from the deck, which shall be sounded once at least every five minutes; but when the steam is not up, they shall use a Fog Horn or Bell, as ordered for Sailing Ships.

SAILING VESSELS.

1. All Sea-going Sailing Vessels, when under-way or being towed, shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit a Green Light on the Starboard side and a Red Light on the Port side of the vessel, and such Lights shall be so constructed as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least 2 miles, and shall show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the Starboard and on the Port sides respectively.
2. The Coloured Lights shall be fixed whenever it is practicable so to exhibit them; and shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least 3 feet forward from the Light, so as to prevent the Lights being seen across the bow.
3. When the Coloured Lights cannot be fixed (as in the case of small vessels in bad weather), they shall be kept on deck between sunset and sunrise, and on their proper sides of the vessel, ready for instant exhibition, and shall be exhibited in such a manner as can be best seen on the approach of, or to, any other vessel or vessels, in sufficient time to avoid collision, and so that the Green Light shall not be seen on the Port side, nor the Red Light on the Starboard side.

FOG SIGNALS.

All Sea-going Sailing Vessels, when under-way, shall, in all cases of Fog, use, when on the Starboard Tack a Fog Horn, and when on the Port Tack shall Ring a Bell. These Signals shall be sounded once at least every five minutes.

SAILING PILOT VESSELS are to carry only a White Light at the Mast-head, and are to exhibit a Flare-up Light every 15 minutes, in accordance with Trinity House Regulation.

VESSELS AT ANCHOR.

All Sea-going Vessels, when at anchor in roadsteads or fairways, shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a White Light in a Globular Lantern of 8 inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light all round the horizon, at a distance of at least 1 mile.

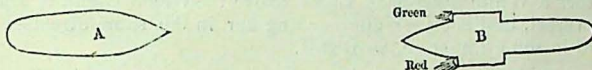

FIRST.—When both Red and Green Lights are seen:

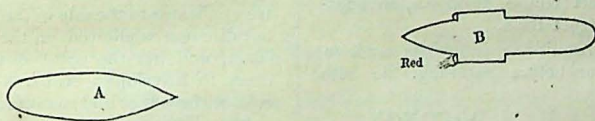
A sees a Red and Green Light ahead;—A knows that a vessel is approaching her on a course directly opposite to her own, as B;



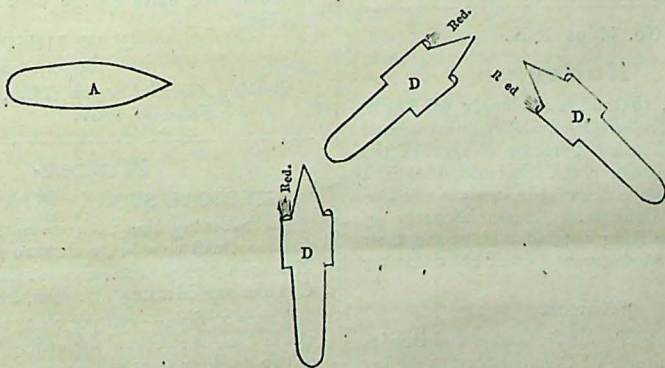
If A sees a White Mast-head Light above the other two, she knows that B is a steam vessel.

1st, a vessel is approaching her on her port bow, as B;



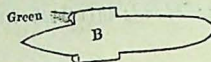
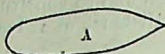

Extract from the Proceedings of the Honorable the President of the Council of India in Council, in the Public Works Department (Public), under date the 29th May 1858.

READ special letter to the Honorable the Court of Directors from this Department, No. 34, dated 23rd June 1857, regarding the grant of leave to Europe to Mr. Rickards, Civil

Engineer, and soliciting orders with regard to the grant of leave to English Civil Engineers and Overseers.

READ Honorable Court's reply, No. 10, dated 6th April 1858.

OBSERVATIONS.—The Honorable the President in Council observes, that an inquiry having been made of the Honorable Court as to the footing on which Uncovenanted Officers in the Department of Public Works, who have been sent out from England under special engagement, were to be placed as regards leave on Medical Certificate to Europe, the Honorable Court has decided that they shall, in all things, be held to be placed under the ordinary Absentee Rules for Uncovenanted Servants of the Government, with the excep-

tion that the length of absence allowed under Clause 1 Section V. will, in their case, be limited to two years.

The Honorable Court further directs, however, that the admission of any such person to the advantages of Furlough to Europe, under the regular Uncovenanted Rules, must be made dependent on his relinquishing any claim which he otherwise might have, under his engagement with the East India Company, to a free return passage to England.

ORDER.—Ordered, that a copy of this Resolution, and of the Honorable Court's Despatch, be sent to the Financial Department, for the issue of such orders as may be deemed necessary to give effect to the Honorable Court's instructions.

OUR GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL.

1. In accordance with para. 61 of our Financial Despatch

Letter dated 23rd June (No. 34) 1857, forwarding correspondence respecting the grant of leave of absence on Medical Certificate to Mr. J. L. Rickards, one of the Civil Engineers from England, and requesting Court's instructions as to the application to the case of Civil Engineers of the ordinary Rules regulating the grant of leave of absence to the Uncovenanted Servants of Government.

Public Works properly comes within the general scope of the Rules under which leave of absence is granted to Public Officers in India not in our regular Covenanted Service; but the length of absence allowed under Clause 1 of Section V. must in their case be reduced to two years.

2. We shall inform Mr. Rickards of our decision on the subject, and we shall adjust his allowances accordingly. We shall deduct from the payments to be made to him the sum of Rupees 850, the amount paid for his passage money to this Country, and we direct that, the admission to the benefit of the Uncovenanted Furlough Rules of any of the Civil Engineers and Overseers engaged by us in this Country be made dependent on the relinquishment of the advantage of a free return passage, the engagement to pay which was made by us on the supposition of a final relinquishment of the Service at a time when the savings of the Officer might not enable him to pay for his passage to this Country.
