Legislative Council of India.

30th October 1858.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 5th October 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 30th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

Act No. XXXVII. of 1858.

An Act to Continue certain Privileges and Immunities to the Family and Retainers of His late Highness the Nabob of the Carnatic.

Whereas the exemption from the jurisdiction of the

Preamble.

Civil and Criminal Courts, enjoyed by the said late

Nabob, his family, and servants, by virtue of the provisions of Act I. of 1844, ceased at the death of the said late Nabob; and it is deemed expedient that some of the said persons should continue to be privileged, and that the privilege enjoyed by others should be continued as respects all acts done by them prior to the commencement of this Act; It is enacted as follows:—

I. No action shall be commenced or prosecuted,

and no writ or process shall at any time be sued forth against the person, goods, or property of any of the members of the family of the late Nabob, whose names are entered in Schedule A attached to this Act, unless such

action shall be commenced, or such writ or process shall be sued forth, with the consent of the Governor in Council of Fort St. George first had and obtained, such consent to be certified by the signature of one of the Secretaries to Government; and any action which shall at any time be commenced, and any writ or process which shall at any time be sued forth, against the person, goods, or property of any such person as aforesaid, without such consent as aforesaid, so certified as aforesaid, shall be utterly null and void.

II. No action shall be commenced or prosecuted,

and no writ or process shall be sued forth, against the person, goods, or property of any of the members of the family or of the retainers of the late Nabob,

who were protected from the process of the Civil and Criminal Courts by Act I. of 1844, and whose names are entered in Schedules B and C annexed to this Act, on account of any contract which shall have been entered into, or cause of action which shall have accrued at a time preceding the commencement of this Act, unless such action shall be commenced, or such writ or process shall be sued forth, with the consent of the Governor in Council of Fort St. George first had and obtained, such consent to be certified by the signature of one of the Secretaries to Government; and any action which shall at any time be commenced, and any writ or process which shall at any time be sued forth, in respect of any such contract or cause of

action, against the person, goods, or property of any such person as aforesaid, without such consent as aforesaid, so certified as aforesaid, shall be utterly null and void.

III. This Act shall commence and take effect from the expiration of Act XXIV. of 1858.

THE "CAIRNSMORE" ROCK.

The position of this Rock, upon which the British Ship *Cairnsmore*, of Liverpool, John Bragg, Master, bound from Hongkong to Shanghai, was totally wrecked, on the 26th of June last (see *North China Herald*, July 3rd), is given as follows, by Lieut. Ward, R. N., in charge of H. M.'s Yacht *Emperor*, from observations taken whilst the Wreck was upon it:—

"The *Cairnsmore* Rock lies in Latitude 30° 42' 10" North, and Longitude 122° 34' 40" East, very nearly in mid-channel between the Parker Islands and the Saddle Group. The following are the Bearings of the most conspicuous objects seen from the Rock:—

South-east point of Senhouse Island.. South.

A small rugged rock close to the
South-east point of Raffles Is- } S. 59° W.
land, and in a line with the point.

The Northernmost Rock of the
Group off Chesney Island (very } N. 59° W.
conspicuous)

On approaching this dangerous Rock, the lead can give no warning whatever, as the Rock is very small, apparently not more than 30 or 40 feet in diameter, and rises very abruptly.

It will be prudent, in future, for vessels navigating this channel, to keep on the Saddle Island side. When, going North, the Bit rock opens South of South Saddle Island, they will be to the Northward of the *Cairnsmore* Rock, and, when going South, the same Rock opens to the Northward of the South Saddle, they will be to the Southward of it."

BYE-LAWS for the INSPECTION of PLACES used for OFFENSIVE and DANGEROUS TRADES, and for the MANAGEMENT and CONDUCT thereof, made by the Municipal Commissioners for the Town and Island of Bombay, under authority of Section CIV. of Act XIV. of 1856.

I. Every House, Yard, Compound, or other Places for Melting Tallow. Place, whether registered or licensed by the Municipal Commissioners to be used for Melting Tallow, shall be thoroughly cleansed daily, as well as all Boilers, Pans, or other Utensils used for the purpose; and all refuse-matter shall be removed from the premises, and deposited in such place as may be approved by the Commissioners.

II. Every House, Building, or Shed, used as a place for the receiving and depositing of Fat and other animal-matter intended to be melted in such place, shall be kept thoroughly clean; all decomposed or offensive animal-matter shall be immediately removed therefrom; the whole of the fat, and other animal-matter shall be daily removed to the melting-house; and the inside walls of such building shall be white-washed with chunam once at the least in every two months.

III. Every Dyeing-house, Compound, Yard, or Dyeing Houses. Place used for the Dyeing of Cloths with Indigo, whether registered or licensed by the Municipal Commissioners, shall be paved, and shall be pro-

vided with covered drains for the conveyance of the wastage-water to the nearest public drain or sewer, constructed in such manner as may be approved by the Commissioners. Every such Dye-house shall be daily thoroughly cleansed, and no filthy or offensive liquid or other matter shall be allowed to accumulate.

IV. No Cloths, during the process of Dyeing, shall be spread to dry in any place within 400 yards of any dwelling-house, nor in any spot or piece of ground generally known as the Esplanade of Bombay.

V. Every House, Building, Yard, Compound, or other Place, whether registered or licensed by the Municipal Commissioners as a Tannery, shall be effectually drained by means of covered and paved drains, so as to convey all the wastage-water to the nearest public drain or sewer, in such manner as shall be approved by the Commissioners.

VI. Every part of such Tannery as shall be used for the removal of the hair or wool from the hides or skins of animals shall be completely paved in such a manner as shall be approved by the Commissioners.

VII. All Refuse from the process of Tanning, and all animal and other offensive matter, shall be removed from the Tannery daily, and deposited in such place as may be approved by the Commissioners.

VIII. Every House, Building, or other Place, Catgut Manufactories. whether registered or licensed by the Municipal Commissioners as a place for the Manufacture of Catgut, shall be daily cleansed of all refuse, animal, or other offensive matter, and no cause of nuisance whatever permitted to remain therein.

IX. Every Place, whether registered or licensed by the Municipal Commissioners as a Yard or Depôt for Hay or Straw, shall be drained in such manner as may be approved by the Commissioners.

X. No Stack or other Pile of Hay or Straw shall be erected or deposited in such Yard or Depôt at a less distance than 100 yards from any dwelling-house or other building.

XI. No Smoking, Cooking, Lighting of Fires, or Lights of any description, shall be allowed within the space so registered or licensed as a Yard or Depôt for Hay or Straw.

XII. Every place, whether registered or licensed by the Municipal Commissioners to be used as a Yard or Depôt for Wood or Coal shall be drained in such manner as may be approved by the Commissioners.

XIII. No Yard or Depôt, established within the Town, for the storing or sale of Firewood, shall have stored therein at one time a larger quantity of Wood than 300 candies, unless the Yard or Depôt is open ground, and not adjoining any dwelling-houses.

XIV. The Municipal Commissioners, or any Officer appointed by them, may, at any time between sunrise and sunset, enter and inspect any of the places to which these Bye-laws are applicable, without obstruction or hindrance.

Rules for the Conduct of Assemblies and Processions.

The following Rules for the Conduct of Assemblies and Processions in the Public Roads, Streets, and Thoroughfares within the Town of Bombay, and for Keeping Order therein, have been made, under authority of Section LXXVII. of Act XII. of 1856, with the sanction of the Right Honourable the Governor in Council.

1. All Assemblies and Processions in the Public Roads, Streets, or Thoroughfares shall not occupy more than one-half of such Road, Street, or Thoroughfare, and in moving shall keep to the left, in order that there may be no obstruction to the free passage of Horses, Vehicles, and Foot Passengers.

2. All Assemblies and Processions shall, on the approach of Carriages or Horses, cease playing Country or other Music, and shall not re-commence playing until such Carriages or Horses shall have passed clear of the Assembly or Procession.

3. No such Assembly or Procession shall

occupy or pass along with Country or other Music any part of the Parrell Road from the Esplanade to the Railway Bridge at Byculla, or the Breach Candy Road from the Esplanade to Chowpatty, from 9 till 12 o'clock in the Forenoon, or from 4 till 8 o'clock in the Evening.

4. No unnecessary noise will be permitted in the neighbourhood of any place of Public Worship: Processions passing such places during the time of worship shall cease playing Music.

5. Processions with Corpses from those parts of the Town south of Warree Bunder, Baboolah Tank Road, Obelisk Road, and Grant Road, shall proceed by the Grant Road to the new Junction Road leading to the Bridge on the Bellasis Road, and thence to the Burial-Place on the Flats beyond Byculla.

6. Every person committing a breach of any of the foregoing Rules is liable to a fine of One Hundred Rupees.

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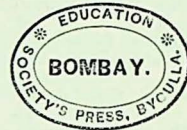

Compulsory Prepayment of Letters to the United Kingdom.—From the 1st of September next the present system of *optional* Prepayment of Letters sent from India to the United Kingdom will be abolished, and from that date the Prepayment of Postage on Letters posted in any part of India for the United Kingdom, whether marked *via* Southampton or *via* Marseilles, will be *compulsory*. The Rates of Postage are as under:—

All Letters posted on or after the 1st of September upon which at least a single rate of Postage—that is to say, 4 Annas on a Southampton Letter, and 6 Annas on a Marseilles Letter—has not been paid, will be returned to the senders. But in order to obviate the inconvenience which would be caused to the public by detaining and returning to the senders Letters which, *through inadvertence*, may be posted without the full amount of Postage being paid upon them, Letters insufficiently prepaid, but on which at least a single rate of Postage has been paid, will be forwarded, charged with the deficiency of Postage and a fine of Sixpence, or four Annas.

Prepayment must be made, as now, by Stamps.

Letters on the Public Service.—It is hereby notified, for information and guidance, that as some uncertainty seems to prevail on the subject of the obligation on Public Officers to receive Letters, purporting to be Public Letters, which are charged with Postage, the Director General considers it desirable that the rule in this matter should be known as widely as possible, and that all Officers of the Postal Department, at all events, should have it constantly in mind, in order that they may direct attention to it when necessary.

The following Extract of an Order by the Supreme Government, No. 884, dated 13th July 1855, is therefore republished:—

“No Public Officer is authorised to send covers on the Public Service by Post without payment of Postage, unless he is at the time on active duty and in charge of the Office by virtue of which the privilege is enjoyed. All Letters superscribed as ‘On the Public Service only’ must, even though the Postage thereon be not paid, be received and opened by the Officer to whom they are addressed; but if any such or partially paid Letter so superscribed, and addressed to any Officer except a Secretary to Government, be found, when opened, to relate to the private affairs of the sender, the Postage will be debited to him, and he will be further liable to be dealt with under Section 47, Act No. XVII. of 1854.

“His Honor in Council further directs, that unpaid or insufficiently paid Letters addressed to any such Officer or Department, and not superscribed ‘On the Public Service only,’ be refused, or, if opened, that it be at the risk and cost of the opener.”

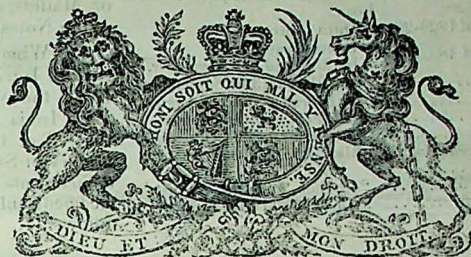

The following Notification, issued by the Government of India under date the 12th instant, is republished for general information :—

No. 61.

FORT WILLIAM, FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

The 12th November 1858.

The Holders of Indian Government Promissory Notes are hereby informed that, from and after the 1st of December 1858, Interest on their Promissory Notes will be made payable, if desired, at the East India House in London, by Bills on demand on the General Treasuries of Calcutta and Madras, subject to the Rules and Regulations at present in force, or that may hereafter be issued by the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, or by this Government.

2. When Holders of Notes in Calcutta desire that the Interest thereon should be made payable by Bills issued in London, they must present their Notes at the Office of the Accountant General to the Government of India, where an enfacement will be made on each of the Notes in question as follows :—

"Interest payable in London by Draft on Calcutta (or Madras, as the case may be").

3. Notes presented for enfacement at Bombay and Madras will be forwarded to the Accountant General to the Government of India at this Presidency, by whom the Notes, after enfacement and registry, will be returned to the Presidency whence they were sent, for delivery to the Holders.

4. Notes presented for enfacement in India will be double-numbered, for transmission, if desired, by halves, in order to facilitate the issue of a Duplicate in case of loss in transit. A fee of one Rupee will be levied for the transfer-enfacement and double-numbering.

5. On presentation of the transferred Notes at the East India House, on or after the dates* on which the Interest falls due on the different Loans, Drafts for the Interest then payable will be granted on the General Treasury of Calcutta or Madras, after due examination and check of the Notes.

6. Whenever Holders of such Notes may require Interest to be made again payable in India, the Notes must be presented at the East India House, with an application to that effect to the Right Honorable the Secretary of State, who will cause the previous enfacements to be cancelled, and a fresh enfacement-entry to be made on each Note as follows :—

"Interest payable in India."

7. Holders of Promissory Notes in London, on which Interest is payable by Draft on Calcutta, may acquire Drafts on Madras in lieu, or *vice versa*. This object will be effected by a cancellation of the previous enfacement on the Notes, and by a fresh enfacement-entry, to be made in London.

8. Every Applicant, upon sending in a Note for enfacement, must, in his application, state that he agrees to be bound by the Rules which, for the time being, may be in force relative to Notes enfaced for payment of Interest in England.

9. Whenever application is made by the Endorsee of a Note for the payment of Interest in England by Drafts on the General Treasury at Calcutta or Madras, the Applicant must have his Note previously renewed in his own name. Any endorsement made in India of an enfaced Note will not be recognized in England.

10. Interest payable in Sicca Rupees will be paid in England by Bills for the equivalent amount in Company's Rupees, at the rate of Company's Rupees 106-10-8 for every 100 Sicca Rupees.

11. Any charge incurred in England on account of Stamps must be borne by the Holders of the Promissory Notes, and must be paid at the India House on application for Drafts.

12. Enfaced Notes will be received at the East India House, for renewal or consolidation or subdivision, and will be sent out thence to Calcutta, a receipt being given to the Holder of the Notes. The new Notes, when received from India, will not be delivered except upon the production of the receipt, and payment of a fee of Two Shillings for each new Note, and the amount of Postage levied on the Notes in transmission to and from India.

13. No Duplicate of a lost Note, enfaced for payment of Interest in England, will be issued until notice of such loss and of an application having been made for a duplicate has been advertized in *three* successive issues of the *London Gazette*, and also of the *Times*, or such other newspaper as the Right Honorable the Secretary of State may direct, in addition to the Advertisements in India required by the Rules for the time being in force in India; and such Duplicate will not be granted except at the Loan Office in Calcutta, and to the person nominated by the Home Authorities to receive the Duplicate.

14. In all other respects the Rules for the time being in force in India relating to the issue of Duplicates of lost Notes will be applicable to enfaced Notes.

15. Interest will be payable only to the legal Holder of a Note, and no Trust will be recognized.
