Legislative Council of India.

20th November 1858.

The following Bill was read a first time on the 6th November 1858. The second reading has been postponed for four months, in order that the Bill may be published with a view to elicit the opinions of the public generally upon the subject of Judicial Oaths and Affirmations:—

A Bill concerning Oaths and Affirmations.

Whereas it is expedient to amend the law relating to Oaths and Affirmations; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

I. Acts V. of 1840, and II. of 1847, are hereby repealed.

II. In all cases in which at present any person is required to make oath or affirmation in any Court of Justice, or before any person empowered by law to administer oaths or affirmations, such person shall, from and after the passing of this Act, be sworn to speak the whole truth and nothing but the truth (or, in the case of a juror, to give a true verdict according to the evidence), in the manner that may be considered most binding on the conscience of such person, by the Court or person before whom such person may be examined.

Person required to make oath in any Court, &c. shall be sworn in manner most binding on his conscience.

III. Provided always, that if a person be of a rank which, according to the customs of the country, would render it improper to compel him or her to take an oath, or if any person have conscientious scruples against taking an oath, the Court or person empowered by law to administer oaths or affirmations may dispense with such person being sworn, provided that such person shall make the following affirmation:—

"I solemnly affirm that what I shall state in the matter now under investigation shall be the whole truth and nothing but the truth."

Or, if the person be a juror,—

"I solemnly affirm that I will give a true verdict according to the evidence."

IV. If any person, making such oath or affirmation as aforesaid, shall wilfully and falsely state for truth that which he knows or believes to be false, or which he does not know or believe to be true, such person shall be punishable in the manner provided by any law for the time being in force for the punishment of perjury and giving false evidence.

V. Any person causing or procuring another to commit the offence defined in the last preceding Section shall be punishable in the manner provided by any law for the time being in force for the punishment of subornation of perjury, or causing or procuring false evidence.

VI. Nothing in this Act shall be held to interfere

Act not to interfere with certain provisions of Act II. of 1855.

with the provisions of Sections XV. and XVI. of Act II. of 1855 (for the further improvement of the Law of Evidence), which enact that any person who, by reason of immature age, or want of religious belief, or by reason of defect of religious belief, ought not, in the opinion of the Court or person before whom his or her attendance is required, to be admitted to give evidence on oath or solemn affirmation, shall be admitted to give evidence on a simple affirmation that he or she will speak the whole truth and nothing but the truth, and that the same provision shall apply to testimony given by affidavit or otherwise; and the provisions of the said Sections shall have the same force and effect as if this Act had not been passed.

Legislative Council of India.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 27th November 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 1st of March next:—

A Bill for the Establishment of Courts of Small Causes beyond the Local Limits of the Jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter.

Whereas, with a view to the more easy recovery of small debts and demands, it is expedient to establish Courts of Small Causes beyond the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter at the several Presidencies of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay; It is enacted as follows:—

I. It shall be lawful for the Executive Government of any of the said Presidencies or of any place, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to constitute Courts of Small Causes, with the required establishment of Officers, at any place within the limits of their respective Governments, for the trial of suits under this Act. Whenever any such Court may be so constituted, the Executive Government shall fix the territorial jurisdiction of such Court, and may from time to time alter the same, as may appear proper.

II. It shall also be lawful for any such Executive Government to invest any Court subordinate to a District Court, now existing, or which may hereafter be established, within the limits of their respective Governments, with Small Cause jurisdiction for the trial of suits made cognisable by Courts of Small Causes constituted under this Act.

III. The following are the suits which shall be cognisable by Courts of Small Causes constituted under this Act, namely, claims for money due, whether on bond or other contract, or for rent, or for personal property, or for the value of such property, or for damages, when the debt, damage, or demand does not exceed in amount or value the sum of five hundred Rupees. Provided that no action shall lie in any such Court on a balance of partnership account, unless the balance shall have been struck by the parties or their agents; or for a share or part of a share under an intestacy, or for a legacy or part of a legacy under a will; or for any claim relating to arrears or

exactions of rent, or to alleged illegal distrains for rent, for which claim or for any part whereof a summary suit could have been brought before an Officer of Government in the Revenue Department, if commenced in due time; or for the recovery of damages on account of alleged personal injuries, unless special damage of a pecuniary nature shall have resulted from such injury.

IV. Every Court constituted under this Act shall use a seal, bearing the following inscription in English and in the language of the Court—“Court of Small Causes of —”; and every such Court shall be a Court of Record, and shall be subject to the general control and orders of the Judge of the District and of the Sudder Court.

V. The language to be used in the proceedings of the Courts constituted under this Act shall be the same as that in use in the principal Court of Civil jurisdiction in the District in which such Courts are established.

VI. No person whatever shall, by reason of place of birth, or by reason of descent, be excepted from the jurisdiction of any Court of Small Causes constituted or invested with Small Cause jurisdiction under this Act; and any such Court shall be competent to hear and determine all claims cognisable by such Court, when the cause of action shall have arisen, or the defendant at the time of the commencement of the suit shall reside as a fixed inhabitant, or personally work for gain, within the local limits of the jurisdiction of such Court.

VII. Whenever a Court of Small Causes is constituted under this Act, all suits cognisable under the provisions of this Act, which shall arise within the limits of the jurisdiction of such Court, shall be heard and determined in such Court, and shall not be cognisable, except in the way of appeal, in any other Court. In like manner, whenever any Court is invested with Small Cause jurisdiction under this Act, all suits cognisable under the provisions of this Act, which may arise within the limits of the jurisdiction of such Court, shall be heard and determined in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

VIII. Nothing in this Act shall be held to take away the jurisdiction which a Magistrate, or a person exercising the powers of a Magistrate, or an Assistant or a Deputy Magistrate, can now exercise in regard to debts or other claims of a Civil nature; or the jurisdiction which can be exercised by Village Moonsiffs or Village or District Panchayets in Madras; under the provisions of the Madras Code, or by Panchayets under Regulation VII. 1827 of the Bombay Code, or by Military Courts of Request, or by a single Officer duly authorised and appointed, under the rules in force in the Presidencies of Fort St. George and Bombay respectively, for the trial of small suits in Military Bazaars, in Cantonments, and Stations occupied by the troops of those Presidencies, respectively, or by Panchayets in regard to suits against Military persons, according to the rules in force under the Presidency of Fort St. George.

IX. Courts of Small Causes, constituted under this Act, shall be held at such place or places within the local limits of their respective jurisdictions as shall be appointed by the local Government to which such Courts are subordinate.

X. Whenever any such Court is directed to be held

Time of holding Courts, if they be directed to be held in more places than one. at more places than one within the local limits of its jurisdiction, the Judge of such Court, subject to the control of the Judge of the District, shall appoint the time at which the Court shall hold its sittings in every such place. Due notice of the time so appointed shall be given by a proclamation, to be fixed up in some conspicuous place in the Court-house or other building in which the sittings of the Court are to be held.

XI. The procedure to be observed in the trial of cases cognisable under this Act, shall be that prescribed

in Act,—(for *Simplifying the Procedure of the Courts of Civil Judicature not established by Royal Charter*), and the provisions of that Act, unless otherwise herein provided, shall be applicable to cases tried under this Act.

XII. In suits tried under this Act, the decision of the Court shall be final, if

Decision in certain suits to be final. the amount or value of the property in dispute shall not exceed the sum of fifty Rupees; but if it exceed that sum, an appeal shall lie from the decision to the District Court, and the decision of the District Court upon the appeal, if any, shall be final.

XIII. If in the trial of any suit under this Act,

Court may refer questions of law, &c. to Sudder Court. whether originally or in appeal, any question of law or usage having the force of law, or the construction of a document affecting the merits of the decision, shall arise, on which the Court may entertain reasonable doubts, the Court may, either of its own motion or on the application of any of the parties to the suit, draw up a statement of the case, and submit it, with its own opinion, for the decision of the Sudder Court.

XIV. The Court may proceed in the case, notwithstanding a reference to the

Court may pass decree contingent upon the opinion of the Sudder Court, pending which execution not to issue. Sudder Court, and may pass a decree contingent upon the opinion of the Sudder Court on the point referred; but no execution shall be issued in any case in which a reference may be made to the Sudder Court, until the receipt of the order of that Court.

XV. Cases referred for the opinion of the Sudder Court shall be dealt with by a full bench of that

XVI. The Sudder Court shall fix an early day for

Sudder Court to fix an early day for the hearing of the case, and shall notify the same by a proclamation, to be fixed up in the Court-house of that Court.

XVII. The parties to the case may appear and be

Parties may appear and be heard in person or by pleader. heard in the Sudder Court, in person or by pleader.

XVIII. The Sudder Court, when it has heard and

Decision of Sudder Court how to be transmitted. considered the case, shall transmit a copy of its judgment, under the seal of the Court and the signature of the Register, to the Court by which the reference was made; and such Court shall, on the receipt thereof, proceed to dispose of the case conformably to the decision of the Sudder Court.

XIX. Each party shall bear his own costs, if any,

XX. In cases decided under this Act, in which no

New trial. appeal is allowed, or, if allowed, in which no appeal may

have been referred, it shall be competent to the Court which decided the case, to grant one new trial, if applied for within the period of thirty days from the date of the decision, unless the party making the application can show just and reasonable cause for not having preferred the same within that period.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 4th December 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 15th of February next:—

A Bill to Amend the Law for the Trial of Officers of the Bengal Pilot Service for Breach of Duty.

Whereas it is expedient to amend the law for the trial of persons employed in the Pilot Service of Government, at the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, when accused of breach of duty; It is enacted as follows:—

I. Act XXIV. of 1845 (*For Establishing a Court for the Trial of Officers of the Pilot Service accused of Breach of Duty*) and Act I. of 1851 (*For the Appropriation of Fines levied under Act XXIV. of 1845*), are hereby repealed.

II. When any person employed in the Pilot Service of Government at the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal shall be accused of having committed any breach of duty while engaged in such Service, and it shall appear to the Superintendent of Marine, or to the Lieutenant Governor of Bengal, that such person ought to be brought to trial for such breach of duty, such person shall be brought to trial upon a charge or charges framed by the said Superintendent of Marine, or such other person as the said Lieutenant Governor shall direct, before a Court constituted under the provisions of this Act.

How Pilots accused of breach of duty shall be brought to trial. of duty while engaged in such Service, and it shall appear to the Superintendent of Marine, or to the Lieutenant Governor of Bengal, that such person ought to be brought to trial for such breach of duty, such person shall be brought to trial upon a charge or charges framed by the said Superintendent of Marine, or such other person as the said Lieutenant Governor shall direct, before a Court constituted under the provisions of this Act.

III. The Lieutenant Governor of Bengal shall appoint a fit person to be Judge of the said Court.

IV. When the Judge of the said Court shall be about to hold a trial under this Act, he shall summon, by writing under his hand, three persons, two of whom shall be Merchants of Calcutta and one a Master of a Merchant Ship lying in the Port of Calcutta, to sit as a Jury at the said trial. If any such person, when duly summoned, shall, without lawful cause, neglect or refuse to attend at the time appointed, or to remain in attendance until the trial shall be completed, it shall be lawful for the said Judge to impose upon any such person a fine not exceeding two hundred Rupees for every such default; and such fine, if not paid, shall be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the defaulter under a warrant to be issued for that purpose by the Judge. Such warrant may be transmitted by the Judge to any Magistrate of Police for the town of Calcutta, and thereupon such Magistrate shall endorse the same, and shall cause it to be executed in the same manner as if the warrant had been issued by such Magistrate.

Penalty for persons, so summoned, not attending. any such person, when duly summoned, shall, without lawful cause, neglect or refuse to attend at the time appointed, or to remain in attendance until the trial shall be completed, it shall be lawful for the said Judge to impose upon any such person a fine not exceeding two hundred Rupees for every such default; and such fine, if not paid, shall be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the defaulter under a warrant to be issued for that purpose by the Judge. Such warrant may be transmitted by the Judge to any Magistrate of Police for the town of Calcutta, and thereupon such Magistrate shall endorse the same, and shall cause it to be executed in the same manner as if the warrant had been issued by such Magistrate.

V. The Lieutenant Governor shall appoint such person as he may think proper, to conduct the proceedings before the Court as Prosecutor on the part of Government.

VI. The Judge of the said Court shall give sufficient notice to the Prosecutor, and to the party accused, of the time and place at which it is proposed to hold the trial.

VII. Before the commencement of any trial under this Act, the persons summoned and attending as Jurors shall be sworn by the Judge of the Court to give a true verdict according to the evidence.

Jurors to be sworn.

Jurors shall be sworn by the Judge of the Court to give a true verdict according to the evidence.

VIII. It shall be lawful for the Judge of the said Court, at the instance of the Prosecutor, or of the party accused, or of his own motion, by writing under his hand, to summon any person to attend as a witness at a time and place to be specified in the summons, for the purpose of being examined at any trial before the said Court; or if such person shall be about to depart from Calcutta, so as to be unable to attend at such trial without serious inconvenience, then to be examined before the Judge of the said Court before the day fixed for the trial: provided always, that due notice of the time and place of such examination shall be given to the accused party; provided also, that such witness may nevertheless be examined at the trial, if he shall be able to attend thereat, in which case his previous examination may also be read at the trial.

Judge may summon witnesses to attend at a certain time and place.

Penalty for witnesses not attending or refusing to give evidence.

IX. If any person who shall have been duly summoned to attend as a witness shall, without sufficient excuse, neglect or refuse to attend, or, attending, shall refuse to give evidence, or to answer any question which may be lawfully put to him, such person shall forfeit and pay such fine, not exceeding five hundred Rupees, as the Judge of the said Court shall order; and such fine, if not paid, shall be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the person ordered to pay the same, in the manner prescribed in Section IV. of this Act.

Penalty for witnesses not attending or refusing to give evidence.

X. The evidence of every witness examined before the said Court shall be given on oath, affirmation, or otherwise, according to the rules in that behalf for the examination of witnesses in Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature.

Witnesses to be examined on oath, according to the rules in force in the Supreme Court.

XI. Upon the completion of the trial, the Jurors shall give their verdict upon the charge, or, if there be more than one, upon each separate charge. The verdict shall be according to the opinion of the majority of Jurors.

Verdict of Jurors.

XII. If, by such verdict, the accused person is found guilty of the charge, or of any one or more of the charges preferred against him, the Judge of the Court shall sentence him to be dismissed from the said Pilot Service, or shall award such other punishment, by loss of rank or pay, or by suspension from employment for a specified period, as to the Judge shall appear fit. The Lieutenant Governor of Bengal, with the sanction of the Governor General in Council, may prepare a Schedule of offences and punishments (such punishments being of the same nature as those hereinbefore mentioned) for the guidance of the said Court; and if such Schedule be prepared and sanctioned, and the charge proved before the said Court is an offence specified in such Schedule, the Judge of the said Court shall award such punishment as is prescribed for such offence in the said Schedule, and no other. If by such verdict as aforesaid the accused person is found not guilty of the charge, or charges preferred against him, the Judge shall declare him acquitted of the same.

XIII. The Proceedings of the Court shall be sent by the Judge to the Superintendent of Marine for submission to the Lieutenant Governor of Bengal; and no sentence of punishment, pronounced by the Judge of the said Court, shall be final until it has been approved of by the said Lieutenant Governor. The said Lieutenant Governor may remit the whole or any part of such sentence, or may direct the substitution of any mitigated punishment in lieu of the punishment awarded by the said Court, as he shall think fit.

XIV. If it shall appear to the Judge of the said Court that the verdict of the Jurors is manifestly contrary to the evidence, or that the trial is otherwise insufficient, the Judge, instead of passing sentence on the accused person, or declaring him acquitted, as the case may be, may certify the same to the Lieutenant Governor of Bengal. If the verdict of the Jurors be a verdict of acquittal, the said Lieutenant Governor may either direct that no further proceedings shall be taken in the case, or may order a new trial before another Jury, as he shall think fit. If the verdict be a verdict of conviction, the said Lieutenant Governor shall order a new trial before another Jury.

If verdict of Jurors be manifestly contrary to evidence, or trial be otherwise insufficient.

XV. It shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor of Bengal to make such rules as he shall think proper, not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, for conducting the proceedings and regulating the practice of the said Court.

Power of Government to make rules.

XVI. Nothing contained in this Act shall be held to restrict the Marine Authorities or the Government from passing such orders as may be deemed proper, upon any charge of breach of duty preferred against any person employed in the said Pilot Service, when it shall not be deemed necessary that such person should be brought to trial for such breach of duty under the provisions of this Act.

Act not to restrict Government from giving such orders as may be thought proper, upon a charge of breach of duty, where a trial is not deemed necessary.

XVII. The provisions of this Act shall extend to all persons employed in the Pilot Service at the said Presidency, and borne on the rolls of the Government establishment, whether such persons receive fixed salaries, or are remunerated by a portion of the Pilotage charged on the vessels piloted by them, or in any other manner.

The position of this Rock, upon which the British Ship *Cairnsmore*, of Liverpool, John Bragg, Master, bound from Hongkong to Shanghai, was totally wrecked, on the 26th of June last (see *North China Herald*, July 3rd), is given as follows, by Lieut. Ward, R. N., in charge of H. M.'s Yacht *Emperor*, from observations taken whilst the Wreck was upon it :—

"The *Cairnsmore* Rock lies in Latitude 30° 42' 10" North, and Longitude 122° 34' 40" East, very nearly in mid-channel between the Parker Islands and the Saddle Group. The following are the Bearings of the most conspicuous objects seen from the Rock :—

South-east point of Senhouse Island. . South.

A small rugged rock close to the
South-east point of Raffles Is- } S. 59° W.
land, and in a line with the point.

The Northernmost Rock of the
Group off Chesney Island (very } N. 59° W.
conspicuous)

On approaching this dangerous Rock, the lead can give no warning whatever, as the Rock is very small, apparently not more than 30 or 40 feet in diameter, and rises very abruptly.

It will be prudent, in future, for vessels navigating this channel, to keep on the Saddle Island side. When, going North, the Bit rock opens South of

South Saddle Island, they will be to the Northward of the Cairnmore Rock, and, when going South, the same Rock opens to the Northward of the South Saddle, they will be to the Southward of it."

REGULATIONS

OF THE

SEVENTH BOMBAY LAUDABLE SOCIETY.

AT A GENERAL MEETING of the SUBSCRIBERS to the SIXTH BOMBAY LAUDABLE SOCIETY, held on the 22nd instant, at the Office of the Secretaries, it was determined to establish a Seventh Society in succession to the Sixth, which closes on the 31st instant.

The Seventh Bombay Laudable Society will commence on 1st January 1859, and the following Regulations are published for general information:—

REGULATIONS OF THE SEVENTH BOMBAY LAUDABLE SOCIETY.

ARTICLE 1st.—The object of this Association is to provide a Fund for the Insurance of Lives. This Fund is to be portioned into Shares, and an individual may subscribe for a certain number of Shares, either on his or her own life, or on the life of any other individual. In the former case, the general estate of the deceased, or such person or persons as he or she may, by will or assignment, have appointed, shall benefit in the event of a lapse; in the latter, the person who may have subscribed on the life of the deceased shall benefit to the extent of the shares subscribed for, unless in either case such shares be especially declared, at the time of subscription, to be for the benefit of any other person or persons, or be subsequently made over, according to the form hereafter prescribed, for the benefit of any other person or persons, in which case such person or persons shall be entitled to benefit in the event of a lapse, and no other.

2nd.—In the case of a person subscribing on the life of another, the party subscribing, and not the party on whose life the subscription is made, shall be considered a Member of the Society, and have a voice in the management of its concerns. Co-partners or other bodies of individuals may hold one or more shares jointly on any given life, either for their own benefit or for that of others; but in such case the parties uniting in the subscription shall not be entitled each to a separate voice in the concerns of the Society, but must vote collectively, or by the deputation of one of their number, on all matters thereto relating.

The concurrent opinion of three of the five Directors shall be decisive on all matters relating to the concerns of the Society, not at variance with these fundamental Regulations, which can be altered only by a majority of the members residing in Bombay. No question, however, shall be proposed to the members at large without the concurrence of the whole of the Directors. In case of the death or removal from Bombay of any of the Directors, another or others shall be chosen by a majority of the members of the Society then residing in Bombay, or by a majority of such members residing in Bombay as may attend at a general meeting to be convened for that purpose. The sum of Fifteen hundred Rupees annually shall be set apart from the Funds of the Society for distribution among the Directors.

11th.—A meeting of the Directors of the Society shall be convened annually between the 1st of January and 30th April in each year, when a Statement of the Accounts of the Society shall be laid before them by the Secretaries; and no account which shall once have been submitted to and passed by the Directors at such meeting, not less than three then attending, shall afterwards be called in question, unless for some special and manifest error, to the amount of Five hundred Rupees or upwards.

12th.—In the election of Directors, as well as on all other questions relative to the concerns of the Society which may be proposed for the decision of the members at large, a member holding four shares on any one life shall be entitled to three votes, one holding three shares to two votes, and one holding any number of shares less than three to one vote only. 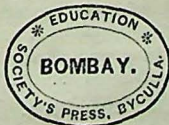

Letters, &c. on the Public Service.—Under orders of the Honorable the President in Council the following addition is to be made to List No. II., published under date the 29th September 1854, of parties authorised to send by Post, without actual payment of Postage, all Letters, Packets, or Parcels *bonâ fide* and exclusively on the Public Service.

Head Assistant in charge of the Office of the Forest Department in the Tenasserim and Martaban Provinces, to the Superintendent of Forests in Pegu, Tenasserim, and Martaban Provinces.

Letters on the Public Service.—It is hereby notified, for information and guidance, that as some uncertainty seems to prevail on the subject of the obligation on Public Officers to receive Letters, purporting to be Public Letters, which are charged with Postage, the Director General considers it desirable that the rule in this matter should be known as widely as possible, and that all Officers of the Postal Department, at all events, should have it constantly in mind, in order that they may direct attention to it when necessary.

The following Extract of an Order by the Supreme Government, No. 884, dated 13th July 1855, is therefore republished:—

“No Public Officer is authorised to send covers on the Public Service by Post without payment of Postage, unless he is at the time on active duty and in charge of the Office by virtue of which the privilege is enjoyed. All Letters superscribed as ‘On the Public Service only’ must, even though the Postage thereon be not paid, be received and opened by the Officer to whom they are addressed; but if any such or partially paid Letter so superscribed, and addressed to any Officer except a Secretary to Government, be found, when opened, to relate to the private affairs of the sender, the Postage will be debited to him, and he will be further liable to be dealt with under Section 47, Act No. XVII. of 1834.

"His Honor in Council further directs, that unpaid or insufficiently paid Letters addressed to any such Officer or Department, and not superscribed 'On the Public Service only,' be refused, or, if opened, that it be at the risk and cost of the opener."
