The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 9th May 1856, and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XII. OF 1856.

An Act to amend the Law respecting the Employment of Ameens by the Civil Courts in the Presidency of Fort William.

Whereas the Law by which the Civil Courts are authorised to employ Ameens upon local investigations is defective, and requires amendment; and whereas, in consequence of the extended jurisdiction which has been given to Moonsiffs, and the change which has been made in the constitution of the office, it is no longer expedient that Moonsiffs should be employed in the attachment and sale of personal property, nor, except on rare and special occasions, in any of the duties enumerated in Sections L., LI., and LIII. Regulation XXIII. 1814; and it is necessary to make provision for the performance of those duties by other agency; It is enacted as follows:—

I. Section XVII. Regulation IV. 1793, Section XVIII. Regulation III. 1803, and Clauses 2 and 3 of Section LI. and Section LII., Regulation XXIII. 1814, are repealed.

II. In each district officers, to be designated Civil Court Ameens, shall be appointed for the purposes of this Act, and shall be remunerated by fixed monthly salaries. The number of Ameens to be employed in each district, and the salaries

to be allowed to them, shall be determined by the local Government, with the sanction of the Governor General of India in Council.

III. The Civil Court Ameens shall be appointed by the Judge of the district, with the sanction of the Court of Sudder Dewanee Adawlut, and the Judge shall from time to time attach them to the several Courts of the district according as the state of business may require: provided that an Ameen attached to any particular Court may, with the sanction of the Judge, be employed occasionally by any other Court.

IV. Before entering upon the duties of their office, the Civil Court Ameens shall subscribe a declaration in the following form:—

I, A. B., appointed to the office of Civil Court Ameen, solemnly declare that, in the performance of the duties of my office, I will act according to the best of my abilities and judgment, without partiality, favour, or affection; and that I will not directly or indirectly receive for my own benefit, or knowingly permit any other person to receive on my behalf, any money, effects, or property, on account of any duty which I may have to execute, except the authorised allowances of my office.

V. Subject to such general directions and restrictions as may from time to time be prescribed by the Sudder Court, the Civil Court Ameens may be employed in any of the following duties:—

1. In investigating or adjusting accounts in any suit or other judicial proceeding.

2. In making local investigations when the Court may deem investigation on the spot to be requisite and proper for the purpose of elucidating the matters in dispute, or of ascertaining the amount of mesne profits or damages, in any suit or other judicial proceeding.

3. In delivering over possession of lands, houses, and other immovable property, in execution of decrees or orders of Court.

4. In the sale of moveable property, and of houses, gardens, and other immovable property of the kind described in Section III. Regulation VII. 1825.

5. In ascertaining the sufficiency of sureties, and the means of persons suing *in forma pauperis*.

VI. Whenever any accounts shall be referred to a Civil Court Ameen for investigation or adjustment,

Procedure in referring accounts to Civil Court Ameen for investigation or adjustment.

furnish him with such part of the proceedings and such detailed instructions as may appear necessary for his information and guidance; and the instructions shall specify whether the Ameen is merely to transmit the proceedings which he may hold on the inquiry, or also to report his own opinion on the matter referred for his investigation.

VII. *Clause 1.*—Whenever a local inquiry is directed, the Court shall distinctly specify the point or points to be investigated, and the Civil Court Ameen shall have power to examine, on oath or affirmation, such witnesses as may be produced to him by the parties or any of them, the parties themselves, and any other persons whom he may think proper to call upon to give evidence; and also to call for and examine documents and other papers relevant to the subject of inquiry: and persons not attending on the requisition of a Civil Court Ameen, or refusing to give their testimony or sign their depositions, or to produce any documents or other papers, shall be subject to the like penalties and punishments by order of the Court, on the report of the Ameen, as they would incur for the same offences in suits tried in Court.

Procedure in cases of local inquiry.

Clause 2.—Having completed his proceedings, the Civil Court Ameen shall return the depositions taken by him, together with his report, in writing to the Court. The report and depositions shall be received as evidence in the case; but it shall be competent to the Court, or to the parties, or any of them, with the permission of the Court, to examine the Ameen personally in open Court touching any of the matters referred to him or mentioned in his report, or the manner in which he may have conducted his investigation.

Report of the Civil Court Ameen, and return of the depositions taken by him.

VIII. Whenever a Civil Court Ameen may be employed on any duty connected with a pending suit, or the execution of a decree, except the sale of property, the Court shall estimate the time which the duty may be expected to occupy, and shall charge for the expense of the Ameen such fixed rate *per diem* as may be determined by the Sudder Court. The amount shall be paid into Court by the party at whose instance or for whose benefit the Ameen is deputed, and shall be added to the costs of suit.

Expense of Civil Court Ameens how to be charged.

IX. When a Civil Court Ameen shall be employed to sell property, a deduction at the rate of one anna in the rupee shall be made from the proceeds of the sale. If no sale takes place by reason of the claim being satisfied, or for any other cause, a charge shall be made for the expenses of the Ameen according to the time he may be employed. A deposit to meet this charge, calculated in the manner prescribed in the preceding Section, shall be made before

When employed to sell property, deduction to be made from proceeds.

If no sale takes place by reason of the claim being satisfied, or for any other cause, a charge shall be made for the expenses of the Ameen according to the time he may be employed.

Expenses, if no sale takes place.

A deposit to meet this charge, calculated in the manner prescribed in the preceding Section, shall be made before

the Ameen is deputed, and shall be returned to the depositor if the sale takes place. All sums paid for the employment of Ameens, and all sums deducted from the proceeds of sales, shall be credited to Government.

X. Nothing contained in this Act shall be held to prohibit the Civil Courts in the North-Western Provinces of the Presidency of Fort William from making use of the agency of the Revenue Officers in investigations and adjustments of accounts connected with land paying revenue to Government, under such general directions as may from time to time be prescribed by the Sudder Court. Whenever a Tuhseeldar, or a Naib Tuhseeldar, or a Peshkar, shall be employed in any such investigation or adjustment under the orders of a Civil Court, he shall possess all the powers vested in Civil Court Ameens by Section VII. of this Act; and the provisions of the said Section shall be applicable to the proceedings held by such officer.

Civil Courts in the North-Western Provinces may employ Revenue Officers in certain cases.

A Bill for enforcing the Attendance of Petty Offenders and Witnesses.

Whereas it is expedient to amend the Law for enforcing the attendance of persons charged with misdemeanors, or other trivial offences, and of witnesses in all criminal trials; It is enacted as follows:—

Preamble.

Act repealed.

I. Act X. 1845 is hereby repealed.

II. Whenever any summons shall be issued by a Magistrate, or other officer subordinate to a Magistrate, competent to summon parties or witnesses, for the attendance of any person charged with any misdemeanor or other trivial offence, or of any witness, and such person or witness cannot be found, service of the summons may be made by leaving the same for him with some adult male member or servant of his family.

III. When any person or witness so summoned neglects or refuses to appear at the time and place appointed by the summons, and no just excuse shall be offered for such neglect or refusal, or when such accused person or witness cannot be found, and there is no adult male member or servant of his family on whom the summons can be served, then it shall be lawful for the Magistrate or other officer as aforesaid to issue a warrant for the apprehension of such person or witness.

IV. When any accused person or witness, against whom a warrant has issued, absconds or conceals himself, so that he cannot be found, the Magistrate or other officer as aforesaid shall, on proof thereof, cause a written proclamation, requiring the absent person to appear and attend before the said Magistrate or other officer, within a fixed period, not less than one month, to be publicly read and proclaimed by beat of drum, and shall cause such proclamation to be affixed in some conspicuous place upon or near the house in which the absent person has usually dwelt. In case the absent person does not appear and attend within the period fixed, it shall be lawful for the Magistrate or other officer as aforesaid, on receiving the return of the proper officer to this effect, and on proof of the publication of the proclamation,

Under the authority of the Mint Committee, the Mint Master hereby notifies, that from and after the 1st of December 1856, all Gold and Silver Bullion and Coins that may be tendered to the Mint for coinage will be melted and cast into bars, by the Mint Premelting Establishment, prior to their being received or assayed, in conformity with the practice which obtains in the Calcutta Mint.

In modification of the charges for premelting Bullion laid down in the Notification published at page 671 of the *Government Gazette* of the year 1846,* the Mint Master

* Viz. Rupees eleven and Annas twelve for premelting a Pot of 10,000 Tolas of Merchants' Silver.

begs to notify that, on the introduction here of the new or Calcutta system, a premelting charge will be levied of seven and a half Rupees per one thousand Tolas of Standard Gold, and of one Rupee per one thousand Tolas of Standard Silver, which premelting charge will be independent of the ordinary charge for seignorage.

All charges at present levied for cutting, burning, and preliminary examination, will cease on the introduction of the new system.

In order to further assimilate the practice of the Calcutta and Bombay Mints, the Mint Master begs also to notify that from the 1st of December 1856 Mint Bills will be granted on the Treasury at twenty days' sight after actual receipt and registry of any Bullion or Coins that may be tendered; the receipt and registry to date from the day on which the actual out-turn value shall be ascertained,—that is, after premelting and assay operations have been completed.

Promotions to the grade of Warrant Officers are to be made by selection, with a view to secure efficiency, energy, and honesty on the part of the individuals recommended—seniority having the preference only when the talents and claims of the parties are similar; explanation of the grounds for passing over any Warrant Officer in promotion accompanying the recommendations.

The Medical Examinations will be made by the Medical Officer in charge of the Magazine to which the Candidates may belong, in such manner as he may consider requisite, and will be at liberty to avail himself of any information that the Commissary may be able to afford on the subject.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

The following is published for general information, in supersession of Sections XII. and XIII. of the Civil Absentee Rules, published under date the 4th July 1855:—

SECTION XII.—The Government may grant to Civil Servants leave of absence to any place in India, Europe, or elsewhere, without any restriction whatever as to the place to which they may resort, for one month in each calendar year, without deduction from the Salaries and Emoluments drawn by such Servants. Such leave, however, will only be granted when the Government is satisfied that no inconvenience will arise from the departure of the Officers seeking it. No second leave can be granted under this Rule until the completion of eleven months from the expiration of the last leave, if taken at one time, or from the date of return from any sick leave, or until the completion of six months from the expiration of the last instalment of a leave, if it has been divided. Servants not availing themselves of the indulgence in any one year may obtain, under the like conditions, leave of absence for two successive months, to commence at or after the expiration of twenty-two months from the termination of their former leave; and if two years elapse without enjoyment of the privilege, leave for three months may, in like manner, be granted at the expiration of thirty-three months from the termination of the last preceding leave; but no leave shall be granted under this Rule for any period exceeding three months. If an Officer shall not return at the expiration of the period of leave granted him under this Rule, he shall forfeit all Pay and Allowances during the time of his remaining so absent without leave; and if he shall so continue absent for more than one month beyond the term granted, his Office shall become vacant.

Civil Servants absent from their Stations under Medical Certificate cannot be admitted to leave under this Rule in continuation of their sick leave; and if, while absent under this Rule, they be granted extended leave under Medical Certificate, they shall be considered liable to the Rules applicable to leave of absence on Medical Certificate for the whole period of their absence.

Civil Servants who have been absent on Medical Certificate during any portion of a calendar year are not entitled to leave under this Rule during that year; but, in determining the interval necessary to entitle a person to leave under this Rule, no reference will be made to any intermediate leave of absence that may have been granted under Section XIV. Clause 1.

SECTION XIII.—As a general rule, when leave is granted under Section XII., such leave will be in one period only, whether for a whole month or less, and not in detached portions to complete one month; but as an exception to this Rule, it shall be discretionary with the several local Governments, where good cause is shown for the indulgence, and it is attended with no public inconvenience, to sanction leave of absence under this Rule, to such parties as may not have occasion to apply for the whole at once, in two instalments only, which are not to exceed in the aggregate one month within the calendar year.

2. As a precaution against miscarriage, it is recommended that the address on Books, Pamphlets, &c. be written not only on the wax-cloth covers, but also *inside the boards, or on the title-page*. The address, when written only on *flimsy paper covers, as heretofore customary*, has not unfrequently, together with the covers, been lost, or destroyed by friction while in transit by the dâk, and in consequence it has been found impossible to have such Books, Pamphlets, &c. delivered to the addressees.

3. Although every possible degree of care is taken by the Post Office, it is impossible in all cases to secure Parcels against injury from wet during the rains, except on the main lines of road, on which Mail Carts are used.

4. Under instructions from Government, Public Officers, when despatching Books on the Public Service during the rains, are directed to have them packed in tin, and sent by the *Banghy* in the place of the *Book Post*.

I. Letters arriving at the Presidency towns by Mail Steamers will be immediately sorted for delivery, without any reference to instructions which may have been received regarding change of address. Such changes will be left to be discovered by the Delivery Officers, and be corrected in the Forward and Unclaimed Departments of the Office.

II. A separate instruction will be required for every change of address, and no instruction will be attended to for more than three months after its receipt.

III. Under Section XXIII. of Act XVII. of 1854, Forward Postage will be charged, in addition to all other Postage due or paid thereon, upon every letter without exception which may be re-directed in any Post Office. For example, if a letter posted in Calcutta, and addressed to Hooghly, is, under instructions which may have been received from the addressee, re-directed in the Calcutta Post Office and sent to Barrackpore, Forward Postage will be charged in addition to the Postage which would have been due had the letter been despatched to Hooghly according to its original address.

IV. The practice of giving instructions to the Officers of the Post Office to intercept and re-direct letters not only imposes much labour upon them, but, in large Offices, seriously retards the delivery and despatch of the Mails. A Register of instructions regarding changes of address will be kept in every Post Office but it must be understood that it is impossible to guarantee that they shall be attended to, except in the case of letters received for delivery.

RULES REGARDING THE LEVY OF STEAM POSTAGE.

The following Rules relating to the Rates of Postage chargeable upon Letters conveyed to or from India by Her Majesty's Mail Steamers are published for general information :—

1. All Notices on the subject which have been previously published are hereby cancelled.
2. Letters posted in India, addressed to Great Britain, either *via* Southampton or *via* Marseilles, or to Calcutta, Madras, Bombay, Aden, Ceylon, Singapore, Penang, Malacca, or Hong-Kong, can be pre-paid or not at the option of the sender.
3. Letters sent through Great Britain, to any Colony, or to any place in Foreign Europe, cannot be pre-paid in India.
4. Letters addressed to Great Britain *via* Trieste, to Malta, Gibraltar, the Ionian Islands, to any place in Egypt or Foreign Europe, to China, except Hong-Kong, or to the Australian Colonies, Manilla, Batavia, Java, Mauritius, Bourbon, or any place not a British Possession, must be pre-paid in India.

5. Unpaid letters addressed to, or paid letters received from, any of the places named in the margin, will be despatched or delivered, as the case may be, without any demand for Indian Postage.

6. Pre-paid letters addressed to, or unpaid letters received from Great Britain, any Port in India, Singapore, Penang, Malacca, Ceylon, Aden, Hong-Kong, Malta, Gibraltar, the Ionian Islands, Australian Colonies, Mauritius, or any British Colony, the route to which is not through Great Britain, or any Foreign Port, the route to which is not through Egypt, will, when conveyed by Her Majesty's Mail Packets, be liable to a combined Indian and English Postage rate of four annas per half ounce, according to the Table given in the margin.

This rate of Postage will include Indian Inland Postage as well as British Steam Postage.

7. Unpaid letters addressed to, or paid letters received from Ceylon or Hong-Kong, except when posted at or delivered in the Presidency towns, will be liable to Indian Inland Postage at the ordinary rates.

8. Letters addressed to or received from Great Britain *via* Marseilles, if pre-paid in India or received

And so on, adding 4 annas for every quarter of an Ounce in addition to the combined British and Indian rate chargeable on the letter.

unpaid for delivery, will be charged, according to the scale in margin, an additional tax of four annas per quarter ounce over and above the combined Indian and English rate specified above in Rule 6. Indian Inland Postage will not be chargeable on receipt or on despatch.

9. Letters addressed to Egypt, or sent through Egypt to any place not a British Possession, in Foreign Europe or elsewhere, are liable to Steam Postage of 8 annas per half

ounce, which must be pre-paid, and except when posted at or delivered in a Presidency town are liable to Indian Inland Postage in addition to the Steam Postage.

10. When letters on which the combined rate is due or paid are re-directed in India, they will be chargeable with Indian Postage at the ordinary rates in addition to the combined rate.

11. Newspapers and Prices Current brought to India by Her Majesty's Packets from any Foreign Port, except a French Port, without having passed through Great Britain, are chargeable with a Steam Postage rate of One Penny (9 pie) on delivery.

12. Colonial Newspapers or Prices Current, posted in India for Great Britain, are not subject in India to any charge for Steam Postage; but Newspapers posted in India, addressed to any British Colony or Possession, or any Foreign Port or any Port in India, are, if sent by Her Majesty's Steamers, or *via* Southampton through England, liable to a Steam Postage charge of One Penny (9 pie), which must be pre-paid. Newspapers sent through Great Britain *via* Marseilles are liable to a Steam Postage charge of Four Pence (3 annas,) and if addressed to British North America *via* the United States, a further charge of One Penny must be levied on account of the United States, in addition to all other Postage.

13. Newspapers sent or received through Great Britain to or from Peru, Chili, Bolivia, Ecuador, the Sandwich Islands, California, Oregon, or any Colony addressed *via* Panama, are subject to a Steam Transit charge of 1 anna and a half, which must be paid on despatch or delivery, in addition to any Indian Postage.

14. The Steam Postage chargeable on newspapers and every other kind of printed papers sent to or received from France will be collected in France.
