Legislative Council.

19th January 1856.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council on the 19th January 1856, and was referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 23rd of April next:—

A Bill to remove all legal obstacles to the Marriage of Hindoo Widows.

Whereas it is known that, by the law as administered in the Civil Courts established in the territories in the possession and under the Government of the East India Company, Hindoo widows, with certain exceptions, are held to be, by reason of their having been once married, incapable of contracting a second valid marriage, and the offspring of such widows by any second marriage are held to be illegitimate, and incapable of inheriting property: and whereas many Hindoos believe that this imputed legal incapacity, although it is in accordance with established custom, is not in accordance with a true interpretation of the precepts of their religion, and desire that the Civil law administered by the Courts of Justice shall no longer prevent those Hindoos who may be so minded from adopting a different custom, in accordance with the dictates of their own consciences: and whereas it is just to relieve all such Hindoos from this legal incapacity of which they complain; and the removal of all legal obstacles to the marriage of Hindoo widows will tend to the promotion of good morals and to the public welfare; It is enacted as follows:—

I. No marriage contracted between Hindoos shall be invalid, and the issue of no such marriage shall be illegitimate, by reason of the woman having been previously married or betrothed to another person since deceased.

No marriage between Hindoos to be invalid by reason of the woman having been previously married or betrothed to another person since deceased.

Interpretation of Hindoo law to the contrary notwithstanding.

II. All rights and interests which any widow may by law have in her deceased husband's estate, either by way of maintenance or by inheritance, shall, upon her second marriage, cease and determine as if she had then died; and the next heirs of such deceased husband then living shall thereupon succeed to such estate. Provided that nothing in this Section shall affect the rights and interests of any widow in any estate or other property to which she may have succeeded by inheritance otherwise than through her deceased husband, or to which she may have become entitled under the will of her deceased husband, or in any estate or other property which she may possess as *stridhan*, or which she may have herself acquired, either during the life-time of her deceased husband, or after his death.

Legislative Council.

19th January 1856.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council on the 19th January 1856, and was referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 23rd of April next:—

A Bill to facilitate the Remedies on Bills of Exchange, Hoondies, and Promissory Notes by the Prevention of Frivolous or Fictitious Defences to Actions thereon in Her Majesty's Supreme Courts.

Whereas *bona fide* holders of dishonored Bills of Exchange, Hoondies, and Promissory Notes, are often unjustly delayed, and put to unnecessary expense in recovering the amount thereof by reason of frivolous or fictitious defences to actions thereon, and it is ex-

pedient that greater facilities than now exist should be given for the recovery of money due on such Bills, Hoondies, and Notes: It is enacted as follows:—

I. From and after the day of , all actions upon Bills of Exchange, Hoondies, or Promissory Notes commenced in any of Her Majesty's Supreme Courts of Judicature within six months after the same shall have become due and payable, may be by writ of summons in the special form contained in the Schedule A to this Act annexed, and endorsed as therein mentioned,

II. Such writ of summons shall issue, without plaintiff filed, on an order to be obtained from a Judge of any of the said Courts upon production of the Bill of Exchange, Hoondie, or Promissory Note; and on an Affidavit or Affidavits showing that the amount sought to be recovered is due to the plaintiff as the holder of such Bill of Exchange, Hoondie, or Promissory Note from the party sought to be charged thereon, and that such party is subject to the jurisdiction of the Court.

III. The service of such writ shall in all cases be personal, unless a Judge of the Court out of which the same is issued shall, upon special grounds, have directed that a particular mode of substituted service shall be good service thereof; and the time to be named therein shall in no case be less than twelve days including the day of service, and shall be increased in proportion to the distance of the defendant's residence from the Court, according to the usual practice of the Court in like cases.

IV. If the defendant shall not have obtained leave to appear, and shall not have appeared to such writ according to the exigency thereof, it shall be lawful for a Judge of any of the said Courts, upon being satisfied by affidavit, and by the production of a copy of the said writ of summons and the endorsements thereon that the same has been duly served, and upon such further proof of such service, and of the truth of the plaintiff's demand (if any) as he may see fit to require, to order that the plaintiff be at liberty to sign judgment in the form contained in Schedule B to this Act annexed, for any sum not exceeding the sum endorsed on the writ, together with subsequent interest calculated to the date of judgment, and a sum for costs to be fixed by the Judges of the said Courts respectively (unless on special grounds the Judge shall see fit to allow the plaintiff more than such fixed sum, in which case the costs shall be taxed in the ordinary way); and the plaintiff may, upon such judgment, issue execution forthwith.

V. A Judge of any of the said Courts shall, upon the application of the defendant at any time within the period fixed by the writ of summons for obtaining such leave, give leave to appear to such writ and defend the action, on the defendant paying into Court the sum endorsed on the writ; or upon affidavits, satisfactory to the Judge, which disclose a legal or equitable defence, or such facts as would make it incumbent on the holder to prove consideration, or such other facts as the Judge may deem sufficient to support the application, and on such terms as to security, making admissions, or otherwise, as to the Judge may seem fit; and in every such case the order giving leave to appear shall be filed by the defendant at the time of entering his appearance with the proper Officer, and no plea which is inconsistent with such order shall afterwards be received.

VI. After judgment, the Court or a Judge may, under special circumstances, set aside the judgment, and, if necessary, stay or set aside execution, and may give leave to appear to the writ, and defend the action, if it shall appear to be reasonable to the Court or Judge so to do and on such terms as to the Court or Judge may seem just.

VII. In any proceedings under this Act it shall be competent to the Court or a Judge to order the Bill, Hoondie, or Note sought to be proceeded upon, to be forthwith deposited with an Officer of the Court, and further to order that all proceedings be stayed until the plaintiff shall have given security for the costs thereof.

VIII. The holder of every dishonored Bill of Exchange, Hoondie, or Promissory Note, shall have the same remedies for the recovery of the expenses incurred in noting the same for non-acceptance, or non-payment, or otherwise by reason of such dishonor, as he has under this Act for the recovery of the amount of such Bill or Note.

IX. The holder of any Bill of Exchange, Hoondie, or Promissory Note, may, if he think fit, issue one writ of summons according to this Act against all or any number of the parties to such Bill, Hoondie, or Promissory Note, and such writ of summons shall be the commencement of an action or actions against the party or parties therein named respectively; and all subsequent proceedings against such parties respectively shall be in like manner, so far as may be, as if separate writs of summons had been issued.

X. If the defendant in any such action shall, under the provisions of this Act, have obtained the leave of a Judge to appear, and shall have appeared to such action, the plaintiff shall, within one week from the date of such appearance, file a plaint in the usual form, and rule the defendant to plead thereto; and if he shall make default herein, the defendant shall be entitled at any time thereafter to move for judgment as in the case of a non-suit.

XI. The term "Her Majesty's Supreme Courts" used in this Act shall be taken to include the Court of Judicature of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca, and every division of that Court.

It is hereby notified, for general information, that a CHARITABLE DISPENSARY for the relief of the sick poor, designated "the Meetheebye Hormusjee's Charitable Dispensary," was opened at Coorla, on the Island of Salsette, on 1st January 1856.

2. This Charitable Institution is founded to commemorate the many estimable qualities of the benevolent lady whose name it bears, and by whom a sum of Rupees ten thousand was bequeathed for its support.

3. To this munificent donation the members of the deceased lady's family have added the sum of Rupees two thousand, and Government have consented to include the Institution amongst the 2nd Class Dispensaries of the Bombay Presidency, thus ensuring its stability by providing for its superintendence by a qualified Medical Officer, and for the maintenance of an adequate establishment.

4. The Dispensary is open at all times, but the special hours of attendance are from 6 to 10 A. M. and from 4 to 6 P. M., when medical and surgical aid, medicines, &c. are gratuitously administered to all applicants for relief.

5. Vaccination is performed on Mondays and Tuesdays at 10 A. M.

6. For the treatment of severe and dangerous medical and surgical cases, an apartment will be set aside, capable of accommodating from 4 to 6 in-patients.

7. The Collectors of Tannah and Bombay will direct their subordinate officers in the neighbouring villages, to use every means in their power, to make generally known the existence of this most useful Charitable Institution.

NOTICE.

The following Rules, which, under the orders of the Government of India, have been issued for the guidance of the Officers of the Post Office, are published for general information:—

I. Letters arriving at the Presidency towns by Mail Steamers will be immediately sorted for delivery, without any reference to instructions which may have been received regarding change of address. Such changes will be left to be discovered by the Delivery Officers, and be corrected in the Forward and Unclaimed Departments of the Office.

II. A separate instruction will be required for every change of address, and no instruction will be attended to for more than three months after its receipt.

III. Under Section XXIII. of Act XVII. of 1854, Forward Postage will be charged, in addition to all other Postage due or paid thereon, upon every letter without exception which may be re-directed in any Post Office. For example, if a letter posted in Calcutta, and addressed to Hooghly, is, under instructions which may have been received from the addressee, re-directed in the Calcutta Post Office, and sent to Barrackpore, Forward Postage will be charged in addition to the Postage which would have been due had the letter been despatched to Hooghly according to its original address.

IV. The practice of giving instructions to the Officers of the Post Office to intercept and re-direct letters not only imposes much labour upon them, but, in large Offices, seriously retards the delivery and despatch of the Mails. A Register of instructions regarding changes of address will be kept in every Post Office, but it must be understood that it is impossible to guarantee that they shall be attended to, except in the case of letters received for delivery.
