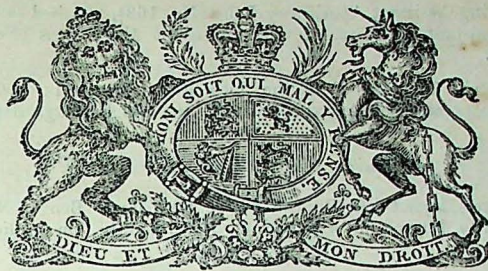

FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

The following communication, received from the Government of India, is published for general information :—

Extract from a Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, addressed to the Government of India, in the Financial Department, No. 2 of 1859, dated the 6th January.

Paragraph 91.—On the vacation by Mr. Ross of his appointment as Magistrate and Collector of Ghazeepore, Mr. Bax was appointed to officiate for him, but before he had been employed for two months in that capacity, he was relieved by Mr. Brereton, a Civilian out of employ, who had to be provided for. Three weeks afterwards Mr.

Reply to Financial Government Letter, No. 112, dated 23rd August 1858, reporting the Proceedings for the 1st Quarter of 1858.
Paragraphs 365 and 366.—Have refused to allow Mr. J. Bax, Joint Magistrate and Deputy Collector of Ghazeepore, Deputation Allowance for the first month of the second occasion on which he officiated as Magistrate and Collector of that District.

Brereton was appointed Magistrate and Collector of Goruckpore, and Mr. Bax was again directed to take charge of the District of Ghazeepore.

92. Under Section XXVII. of the Absentee Rules, which provides that "no subordinate Officer, acting for his Principal or for any other person holding a superior appointment in the same Office or Establishment at the same Station, shall be entitled to any Deputation Allowance until after the expiration of one month," Mr. Bax was not granted Deputation Allowance for the first month that he officiated as Magistrate and Collector; but your Government have also refused to pass Deputation Allowance to him for another month, after his re-appointment to the above capacity.

93. The Civil Auditor remarks that the Rule above quoted "does not, in his opinion, deprive Mr. Bax of another month's Deputation Allowance from the date he resumed charge of his officiating

duties from Mr. Brereton," and that he does "not consider that the two periods into which his (Mr. Bax's) officiating incumbency of the Office of Magistrate and Collector of Ghazeepore was divided, by the intermediate appointment thereto of another Officer for the short space of three weeks, can be properly regarded as two different cases."

94. I concur in the opinion expressed by the Civil Auditor, that the Rule above alluded to is intended to apply only when a Principal or Superior Officer is away from his Station on leave or otherwise, and not on every occasion that the same Subordinate may be appointed his *locum tenens* in the course of the same absence or deputation, and I authorise you to pass the Deputation Allowance claimed by Mr. Bax for the second period of his officiating appointment.

With a view to obviate the inconvenience that, under existing rules, may arise from the absence, on Privilege Leave, of Executive Officers, without a previous communication with the Civil and Military Authorities of their Stations, the Govern-

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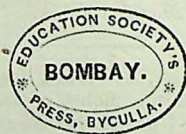

Officiating Post Master General.

Mail Robbery.—The Mail despatched from Bombay on the 16th December 1858, for Hyderabad, Deccan, was **ROBBED** whilst in transit between Sholapoor and Hyderabad.

Hours of Posting.—**BANGHY PARCELS** will, from and after the 1st February 1859, be received every day, Sundays excepted, for despatch, from 10 A. M. till 5 P. M., and **LETTERS** and **NEWSPAPERS** every day till 6 P. M., after which hours respectively Late Letters, Newspapers, or Parcels will be received till 7 P. M., on payment of an extra postage (or fee) of 8 annas on each cover. The full postage, and likewise the fee, must be prepaid in Stamps. **REGISTERED LETTERS** can be posted as heretofore, but the Prepayment of Postage is no longer optional. The Postage, as well as the Registration Fee of 4 annas, must be Prepaid in Stamps.

Malta and Gibraltar.—Letters for **MALTA** and **GIBRALTAR** may be prepaid or not, at the option of the sender.

Cairo.—Letters for Cairo must be **PREPAID**, but cannot be Registered.

Constantinople.—Letters for **CONSTANTINOPLE** cannot be Registered.

Ionian Islands.—Letters for the **IONIAN ISLANDS** must be prepaid to Alexandria, whence they will be forwarded *viâ* Trieste. Postage Eight Annas on a letter not exceeding half an ounce.

Banghy Parcels for Scinde and the Punjaub.—Notice is hereby given, that all Banghy Parcels for Scinde and the Punjaub, intended to be sent by Sea *viâ* Kurrachee, must be so marked, that is "Per Steamer," or else they will be subject to be sent by land, and to be charged with Banghy rates of Postage.

Holders of Window Delivery Tickets.—The Holders of Window Delivery Tickets are reminded that their Overland Letters, if not sent for before the Second Delivery, will be sent out by that Delivery instead of being kept in the Post Office for an indefinite period.

Newspapers.—Newspapers **RE-DIRECTED** are chargeable with **FORWARD POSTAGE**.

Securing Letters with Sealing Wax.—The Public are urgently recommended to close all letters, containing Remittances, Cheques, Bank Notes, or valuable Documents, with *Sealing Wax*. Bank Notes ought always to be divided, one half being sent after the receipt of the other half has been acknowledged.

Letters closed with gum, or the ordinary wafer, can be opened without any difficulty, or the slightest chance of detection.

Compulsory Prepayment of Letters to the United Kingdom.—From the 1st of September next the present system of *optional* Prepayment of Letters sent from India to the United Kingdom will be abolished, and from that date the Prepayment of Postage on Letters post-d in any part of India for the United Kingdom, whether marked *viâ* Southampton or *viâ* Marseilles, will be *compulsory*. The Rates of Postage are as under:—

All Letters posted on or after the 1st of September upon which at least a single rate of Postage—that is to say, 4 Annas on a Southampton Letter, and 6 Annas on a Marseilles Letter—has not been paid, will be returned to the senders. But in order to obviate the inconvenience which would be caused to the public by detaining and returning to the senders Letters which, *through inadvertence*, may be posted without the full amount of Postage being paid upon them, Letters insufficiently prepaid, but on which at least a single rate of Postage has been paid, will be forwarded, charged with the deficiency of Postage and a fine of Sixpence, or four Annas.

Prepayment must be made, as now, by Stamps.
